

WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

To the inhabitants of the Town of Webster in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Webster on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to secure State Highway Construction to complete Davisville Road, the balance to be used on Class V Roads.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of highways and bridges.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for plowing roads in winter.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling roads.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Poor.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Library.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for new snow fences.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necssary to buy a new road machine.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to buy a new truck plow.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to co-operate with the State in the control of White Pine Blister Rust, using town labor.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay Serial Note.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of Interest.

18. To see if the town will vote to give a discount of 2% on 1936 taxes paid on or before August 1, 1936.

19. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen the right to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to buy Insurance for Town Help.

21. To see if the town will vote to sell the snow rollers and hearse.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

For several years, no Budget has been printed as a part of the School Report. This year the School Board's Estimates for the coming year is printed, and also, for purposes of comparison, the current budget for 1935-36. It is felt that citizens can vote more intelligently if the budget is before them.

At last year's annual meeting a cut of \$500 was made on the School Board's budget presented there, possibly because it was not fully understood that the Board had already deducted \$885 from their final figures because of a cash balance estimated as likely to be on hand at the close of the year, June 30, 1935. The Board's estimates had been very carefully made and the cut of \$500 leaves the Board short of money to complete the school year. The raising of \$500 for this purpose at the coming district meeting is called for under "Special Appropriation Proposed."

In general any enterprise is better conducted without too frequent changes of its personnel. After a period when few changes have been made, we have this year been sorry to lose Mrs. Fifield as School Nurse, Mrs. Anderson as teacher at Putney Hill, and Miss Currier as teacher of music. We believe, however, that their successors will carry on in a creditable manner.

Mrs. Fifield's report for last year is as follows: "A dental clinic was held in November 1934. Dr. Baldwin was here two days and saw nearly all the pupils of both schools. 93 fillings, 25 extractions and 13 cleanings were done. Five pupils were taken to the oculist by the nurse. Five trips were made for special dental treatment and x-ray. Visits were made to all the homes and the pupils'

condition discussed with the parents. The teachers have encouraged the pupils to form daily health habits and in the Putney Hill School the daily check up on dental care resulted in marked improvement in the cleanliness of the teeth."

The statistical table shows a satisfactory drop in cases of tardiness, mentioned as excessive in last year's report. We understand that more pupils will be attending high school next year.
