**WARRANT FOR TOWN OF ACWORTH  
MARCH 8, 2016**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Acworth, NH in the County of Sullivan in said state, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to bring your votes for Town Officers, and any other questions, to the Town Hall on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at 10:00 of the clock in the morning at which time the polls shall be opened for voting on Articles 1 and 2 by use of the official ballot, and shall close not earlier than 9:00 of the clock in the evening; AND you are hereby notified that discussion and voting on Articles 3 through 14 shall commence at 7:30 of the clock in the evening on the same day, March 8 next at the Town Hall.

ARTICLE ONE: To vote by non-partisan ballot for the following Town Officers:

- Selectmen: 1 for 3 Year Term
- Tax Collector: 1 for 1 Year Term
- Treasurer: 1 for 1 Year Term
- Moderator: 1 for 2 Year Term
- Local Auditor: 1 for 1 Year Term
- Trustee of Trust Funds: 1 for 3 Year Term
- Library Trustee: 1 for 3 Year Terms
- Cemetery Trustee: 1 for 3 Year Term
- Budget Committee: 2 for 3 Year Terms
- Planning Board: 2 for 3 Year Terms
- Supervisor of the Checklist: 1 for 6 Years

ARTICLE TWO: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the Acworth Zoning Ordinance concerning the use of storage containers by property owners. Copies of the amendment is available at the Town office and will be available to day of voting. The question will appear on the Official Ballot:

“Are you in favor of amending the existing Town of Acworth Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board? The amendment provides long and short term storage capacity to property owners and adds a clarifying definition.”

ARTICLE THREE: To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to serve as pound keepers, measurers of wood and fence viewers.

ARTICLE FOUR: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE FIVE: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,178,601 for general municipal operations. This article does not include appropriations contained in special or individual articles addressed separately. The Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend this article. Majority vote required.

ARTICLE SIX: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150,000 for the replacement of the Forest Road bridge with \$50,000 to be withdrawn from the Bridge Repair or Replacement Capital Reserve Fund established in 2014 for that purpose, \$50,000 to come from Unassigned Fund Balance, and the remaining \$50,000 from taxation. The Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend this article. Majority vote required.

ARTICLE SEVEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 to be added to the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund established in 2000. The Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend this article. Majority vote required.

ARTICLE EIGHT: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$49,250 for the revaluation of the Town and authorize the withdrawal of \$32,000 from the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund created in 2010 for that purpose. The balance of \$17,250 is to come from taxation. The Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend this article. Majority vote required.

ARTICLE NINE: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 for the purpose of adding to operating budget Account 4312, Highway Maintenance, for the purpose of engaging an outside contractor to repair potholes in the Town's paved roads. The Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend this article. Majority vote required.

ARTICLE TEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$39,000 for the purpose of chip sealing the Charlestown Road. The Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend this article. Majority vote required.

ARTICLE ELEVEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to pay for storage of the Town Hearse in the Horse shed owned by the United Church. This appropriation is the total amount of a ten-year lease of space at \$500 per year and is payable in full on completion of the Horse shed restoration. This article is to be nonlapsing for up to 2 years. The Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend this article. Majority vote required.

ARTICLE TWELVE: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$100,000 to be deposited in the Bridge Capital Reserve Fund established in 2014 for the purpose of replacing the Allen Road Bridge with said funds to come from Unassigned Fund Balance. No additional taxation to be required. Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE THIRTEEN: To see if the Town will vote to return to having a part time police department. *Submitted by petition.*

ARTICLE FOURTEEN: To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this Town Meeting.

## 2015 Tax Collector's Report

The Board of Selectmen issued warrants for the collection of 2015 property taxes in the amount of \$2,399,554.00. Tax Collector remitted to Town Treasurer \$2,445,850.50 in tax payments, \$3,795.00 in credit balances, and \$3,726.51 from abatements for a total of \$2,453,372.01. On 12/31/2015 the Town received \$2,188,072.75 in payments for 2015 property taxes, which means 91% of 2015 taxes has been collected, 1% less than 2014.

In addition I received warrants for 2015 Yield Taxes in the amount of \$23,743.36 and 2015 Gravel Taxes for \$42.72. On 012/31/2015 the balance due was \$137.54.

I have mailed the delinquency notice for the 2015 Taxes on February 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2016 to delinquent taxpayers alerting them to their delinquency and to notify them of the lien date for 2015 Taxes: August 1, 2016

All properties with uncollected 2015 taxes on August 1st, 2016 will receive a Lien regardless of the amount of taxes. Liens are an expensive proposition – 18% interest plus various fees. Please pay.

The unpaid Tax levy of 2013 is scheduled for tax deeding on October 31, 2016.

In 2015, 40 real estate liens for the levy of 2014 were executed. 3 Tax payers were scheduled for Tax Deeding, but waivers were issued by the Board of Selectmen for payment plans. Tax Deed waivers can be rescinded with a thirty day notice.

Payments are entered as received on the day of the postal cancellation. You do not have to wait for a Monday to see me personally. Payments can be dropped off at the Town Offices, but I prefer that you put your payments in the mail. If everything else fails you can call me to make an appointment for when it is convenient for you.

I enjoy performing my responsibilities and serving as Acworth's Town Clerk and have done so since 2004. Implementing new programs for this office and improving procedures has given me great satisfaction and provides a more complete service for Acworth residents. My term is up in 2016 and I am happy to say that I plan to run again. I look forward to another three years, presuming I am re-elected!

I want to take the opportunity to list some of the services available at this office for those of you that may be new in town. I am responsible for registering and titling vehicles. I complete marriage license applications, process birth, marriage and death certificates, file wetland permit applications, pole licenses and dog licenses. I accept voter registration forms, mail absentee ballots, prepare the town ballot and administer the oath of office to any newly elected or appointed Town Official. Notary Public services are also available. There is more detailed information as well as various printable forms on the Town Clerk website at [www.acworthnhntownclerk.com](http://www.acworthnhntownclerk.com).

My office hours are Tuesday evening from 5:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. and Saturday morning from 8:00 to noon unless posted otherwise. If I close the office during these hours, I will post this information ahead of time either in the Acworth Community Newsletter, at the Acworth post office, the Acworth Village Store and town hall office and on the Town Clerk website. I will always be closed on a Tuesday evening of an election.

It will soon be time to renew your dog licenses for 2016. The 2015 license will expire on April 30th. Beginning June 1<sup>st</sup> a \$1.00 per month late fee is assessed.

As a reminder, there is the option of renewing your registration and/or dog license on the Internet. To do this, go to the Town Clerk website, scroll down and select the appropriate icon and follow the step-by-step instructions.



Please be sure to make out two checks for vehicle registration and print out the confirmation. Make out one check to The Town of Acworth and the other to The State of NH DMV. Mail the confirmation in with your checks and keep a copy for yourself until you receive your registration in the mail. You are able to renew your registrations up to four months in advance.

If you don't have a computer and would like to access the Internet for these services, you could go to the village store or library.

## 2015 Selectmen's Report

A matter of significance to many in Acworth came near the end of the year when the State Department of Transportation ordered the Forest Road Bridge closed. The bridge leads to Beryl Mountain Road which is widely traveled by our own Highway Department and R. L. Balla Lumber, a longstanding Acworth business. The bridge closing dominated the Selectmen's agenda in November and December and weighed heavily on budget planning for 2016.

We are fortunate that the Town has prepared for bridge repairs by depositing money in a capital reserve fund and that Selectmen were able to under expend the 2015 budget in an amount which can be applied to the 2016 bridge reopening. The use of capital reserve and 2015 money for the bridge will allow work to continue on Crane Brook Road where the Town is approximately one third through that road's rehabilitation. A comprehensive plan for Crane Brook Road projects its completion in 2018. The project began in 2014.

The Select Board began the year with a new member as Frank Emig was appointed and later voted to fill the term left by Craig Oshkello who moved from Acworth. In March Dave Goodwin was voted to follow Rob DeValk whose term was completed. The new Board worked through personnel changes in the Highway Department with the help of a Hiring Committee of Townspeople. Ed Babneau moved in to the Highway Supervisor position and John Lyman and Ernest Porter were hired as full time crew members. The crew took delivery of a new truck voted in March and has been able to break it in slowly with mild fall and early winter weather.

During the year Selectmen met with the State Department of Revenue and assessors to choose a proposal for the updating of the Town's property values. State law requires towns to revalue every five years. Our last revaluation took place in 2011. Field workers from Municipal Resources, a New Hampshire assessing company, will visit each property. Owners will receive a mailed notice of their updated value later in the year and have opportunities to meet with assessors as needed.

In other areas, the Board attended several court hearings regarding the unlicensed junkyard on Connecticut Heights Road. As of this writing the court has ordered the cleanup of affected properties by July, 2016. An update of the Town's Emergency Operations Plan was completed with grant funding from the State Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management. The update required successive meetings by our emergency, highway and Town office personnel. A number of weatherization improvements were made to the Town Hall. The Hall continues to be a resource for recreation groups, public and private functions and a gymnasium for Acworth Primary School students during inclement weather.

Going forward our greatest challenge continues to be the maintenance of our infrastructure and our greatest resource is our people. Selectmen meet the first, third and fifth Mondays of each month. Our meetings are open to the public.

## 2015 Highway Department Report

The Highway Department underwent a series of changes in 2015. During the spring Supervisor Dave Lacasse and driver/operator Jeremy Rowe left the Department. We were fortunate that driver/operator Ed Babneau was able to move into the Supervisor position while the Selectmen began a search for replacement personnel. A Hiring Committee of Townspeople assisted the Board in interviewing and Ed was officially hired as Supervisor in August. Ed brings 40 years of experience in the road maintenance and construction industry along with a network of associations gained over that time.

Later in the fall John Lyman and Ernest Porter were hired as driver/operators giving the Town a full crew going into the winter maintenance season. John grew up in Acworth and worked in the Department with Don Porter. Ernest comes with years of experience in both town and commercial road maintenance and construction.

The time spent on securing personnel set back anticipated work on the reconstruction of Crane Brook Road. After a bid process, St. Pierre continued the work begun in 2014. During the summer and fall Glenn Elsesser of Elsesser Blueberry Farm began attending Selectmen's meetings and working with the Board and Ed on planning the remaining work needed on Crane Brook Road. With that help we now have a plan to carry us through completion of the project. The plan anticipates finishing in 2018 and a multiyear total cost of approximately one million dollars. From there the Capital Improvement Plan shows Beryl Mountain Road to be the Town's next long term reconstruction. The Allen Road Bridge replacement is likely to need to be inserted in the near future as well.

The Department took delivery of the new dump truck voted at the 2015 Town Meeting. At this time last year it was expected the new truck would replace the International but it was the Mack which developed insurmountable problems. After a bidding process the Old Mack went to a new home and the International, purchased in 2005, received a going over. It continues to be a basically good but temper mental vehicle. Our aging grader is tender but starts each time we turn the key. The grader is the next piece of equipment listed on the Capital Improvement Plan for replacement.

With Crane Brook in progress and our regular gravel road maintenance the Town has gone through the gravel crushed in 2014. The 2016 budget includes a request for an increase to our traditional crushing quantity. This will be necessary to meet the needs of this year's work.

Most of you know the Department will also be overseeing the replacement of the Forest Road Bridge this spring. We were fortunate to secure the services of Eckman Engineering who are in the process of designing and permitting the new bridge and will work with us to bid the actual contract.

The Garage phone hasn't changed, 835-6866. The messages are checked regularly and requests are addressed as soon as possible. Ed and the crew appreciate your support.

## 2015 Trustees of Trust Funds Report

The Trustees held five public meetings during 2015, to fulfill our duties as fiduciaries and administrators for 123 separate accounts. We reviewed and accepted 3 capital reserve checks totaling \$97,935.25 and one check of \$2,500.00 all for deposit under the item New Funds Created.

We also reviewed 3 voucher requests for payments totaling \$79,039.21, that were withdrawn from capital reserve funds, and one voucher from a unique cemetery trust account from which principal may be withdrawn, as requested by the cemetery trustees.

Capital Reserve Funds are public funds created by selectmen, using the town warrant, and the affirmative votes of the town meeting. It follows that by statute only the town meeting and no other body may change the purpose of these funds. At this time the trustees manage 6 public funds financed by public real estate taxes.

Private Funds are created by a private donor. The donation of funds may be made while the donor is alive or via a will with specific instructions. Once accepted by the town, and held by the trustees of trust funds, no changes of purpose may be made by the town or trustees. At this time the trustees manage 117 private funds.

As is the case with private investors, the trustees of trust funds, are equally frustrated by the market's lack of good returns in recent decades on our deposits. Unlike private investors, the trustees have fewer options available, and we are bound by both statutes and oath of office to fore most protect the principal of the funds entrusted to our care. We greatly appreciate your understanding and patience.

A large, enthusiastic crowd attended the Library's celebration of Poetry Month in April. Ken Grant and Fritz Weatherbee entertained a packed house with readings of their favorite poems as well as readings from their own personal writing.

Our annual Book Sale was held in July and coordinated well with the Acworth Charitable Trust's Garden Tour. We raised a total of \$896.70 and look forward to another successful event in July 2016. Book donations are always appreciated for this sale. We will begin collecting donations in June of 2016 for the July 2016 Book Sale.

The Children's Summer Reading Program returned this year with 20 students enrolled. We hosted author/illustrators Jason Chin and Donald Saaf on separate occasions to share their work and explain their approach to writing and illustrating children's' books. All participants in the summer program were given the gift of a book to thank them for their participation and for their love of reading. We hope to increase the number of participants in the summer of 2016.

*Old Acworth*, a softbound book featuring Acworth photographs from 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> centuries from the Library's historical photograph collection, was made available to the public in November. Sales are by donation of \$15.00 or more. ## 2015 Librarians' Report

Acworth Silsby Library had 3,713 visits from patrons and visitors in 2015 and welcomed 21 new patrons. We circulated 4,365 books during the year and continue to add fiction, non-fiction, children's books and DVDs to our collection monthly.

We had 423 patron visits for computer use in 2015. We have a high speed DSL internet connection and computers for public use as well as a wireless connection. We provide access to Ancestry.com via the State Library. Patrons use our computers for a variety of activities such as checking e-mail, looking for jobs, preparing school work, researching hobbies and interests.

We are delighted to have the Acworth School students and teachers visit the library on a regular basis.

We had a summer reading program in which 20 young readers participated. Each received a new book. We hosted two programs put on by children's authors Donald Saaf and Jason Chin during the summer months.

We have two Reading Groups meeting monthly, one is reading classics and the second is reading general fiction. New members are always welcome.

Our annual Book Sale was held in July, raising additional funds for the Library. We thank all who participated either by donating or purchasing books. We have an ongoing book sale set up in the small meeting room of the Town Hall. Please check it out. In 2016, book donations will be accepted at the Library after June 1st.

We are an active member of the Nubansit cooperative, which provides a collection of movies that rotate bi-monthly among 22 local libraries. Patrons borrowed 115 Nubansit items during 2015. This year the Nubansit coop added a large bin of Legos to its circulating collection and Acworth hosted several Legos events during December.

Inter-library loans (ILL) continue to be a popular way for patrons to read books not owned by our library. We have access to books at all NH libraries and many of the NH college libraries. A total of 762 books circulated via the ILL system.

We thank our patrons, volunteers and all who assisted us throughout the year. ## 2015 Acworth Cemeteries Report

During 2015 the cemetery trustees and sexton undertook two special projects in addition to the usual tasks of cemetery maintenance and management. First, we contracted with Independent Archaeological Consultants of Portsmouth, NH to map the Batchelder-Nye cemetery. State law requires that all municipal cemeteries be mapped, and we are finally in compliance, thanks to a \$2,500 grant from the Acworth Community Charitable Trust. Additional funds were re-allocated from our budget lines for monument repair and tree work. We now have electronic and hard copies of a spreadsheet and a map showing approximately 500 burials in the Batchelder-Nye cemetery, including the burial locations and monument inscriptions. Copies can be consulted in the town office or library.

Our second project has been finding a permanent shelter for our antique horse-drawn hearse, presently stored in a privately-owned barn at a cost of \$480 a year. The Friends of the Acworth Meetinghouse have received a \$34,000 grant from the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) to restore the church-owned horse sheds near the town pound. Our hope is to restore these sheds in a historically appropriate manner so that one bay can be used to shelter the hearse. To that end, we propose that the town appropriate \$5,000 for a 10-year lease of one bay of the sheds, to be paid when one bay has been restored suitable for hearse storage. A vote for this warrant article will ensure long-term storage at a very reasonable price. Furthermore, it would be wonderful to complete restoration of the horse sheds in time for the celebration of Acworth's 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary in August, 2017.

Again this year the Acworth cemeteries were spared severe windstorms and tree or monument damage. We removed several trees including a large cherry that was a serious threat to monuments in the northeast corner of the Hill Road cemetery; we left two healthy maple trees in place. We also completed a boundary survey of the New Hill Road Cemetery in preparation for demarcation of further lots there. Although our mowing costs increased when we hired a new mowing service in 2014, we have received many compliments on the improved appearance of our cemetery.

We were fortunate that Lillie LeBlanc stepped forward this year to serve as cemetery trustee, replacing Kenneth Reed. Much of the work involved in lot purchases, record-keeping, and management of services such as tree-cutting, mowing and monument repair is done on a volunteer basis by our sexton, Kristian Fenderson. We very much appreciate his generosity in donating time to these responsibilities.

Cemetery trustees meet at 4 PM in the town hall on the fourth Thursday of the months from April through November. Members of the public are welcome to attend any of these meetings.

## 2015 Planning Board Report

In 2015 the Planning Board held discussions and public hearings when required for two mergers, two annexations and one subdivision. A spring Joint Boards Meeting was held for planning discussion and a fall meeting with the Selectmen and Budget Committee was held for discussion of the Town's 2015-16 Capital Improvement Plan. In addition, from March throughout the rest of the year time was spent at each Planning Board meeting in development of an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance concerning the use of storage containers by property owners.

Mergers of adjacent lots of record are favored by the State and only require completion of a simple form and a vote at a regularly scheduled Board meeting. Annexations and subdivisions are subject to the Town's Subdivision Regulations and require public hearings, abutter notifications and filing of a surveyor's mylar. The annexation and subdivision processes can involve successive meetings. Each of these three types of lot change are recorded in the county registry once they have final approval from the Planning Board.

The Capital Improvement Plan meeting held in October set a valuable precedent for inter-board dialog prior to the drafting of the Town budget. At a time when the Town is faced with substantial expenses to rehabilitate and maintain its roads pooling the input from as many Town boards' members is needed. The meeting produced valuable ideas. Unfortunately within a week of the meeting Forest Road Bridge was ordered closed by the State Department of Transportation. The Planning Board agreed to delay completing the updating of the 2015-16 Capital Improvement Plan while Selectmen researched costs of options for reopening the bridge. Since 2012 the Capital Improvement Plan has included a note that a bridge closure would take precedent over previously scheduled capital projects.

The Board's work on a zoning amendment to address the use of storage containers came in response to repeated requests during public meetings beginning in 2009. The issue is large and complicated due to the variety of containers available. The Board's discussions ranged from how to define a storage container to how to permit storage containers to how to protect neighbors from the effect storage containers can have on property values. Town Counsel was engaged to review the draft language from a legally defensible point of view. After eight months of work a public hearing was held for input from Townspeople and the draft was adjusted in response. The final version of the amendment will be voted on at Town Meeting and information can be had from the Town office.

During the year the Planning Board also sent representatives to the State Office of Energy and Planning's annual planning conference and to the State Department of Resource and Economic Development's annual inspection of the Allstone Quarry.

The Planning Board meets monthly and all are welcome. Alternate member positions are available.

## 2015 Acworth Conservation Commission

The Acworth Conservation Commission oversees and protects our natural environment. At each meeting we review intents to cut (logging permits) and septic permits, dredge and fill applications, and communications from the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services. With the town of Unity, we share costs of water testing and of monitoring to prevent the spread of milfoil in Crescent Lake.

The recent approach of the emerald ash borer threatens our native ash trees, and we have authorized a winter timber harvest in the town-owned Gove Forest to remove ash trees while their timber can still be marketed.

There are eight properties whose conservation easements we are responsible for monitoring; two of them are town owned. At present we are working to develop a schedule for monitoring these easements and reporting our findings on a regular basis to the easement holders: the Land Conservation Investment Program housed in the state Office of Energy and Planning, and the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests.

At the March, 2015 town meeting, townspeople voted to accept the gift of a 5.48-acre parcel of land abutting the East Acworth Wetlands. This piece will be added to the existing conservation easement on the Wetlands, held by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests. When the process of surveying and documenting this gift is complete, the protected Wetlands will total 76.5 acres. While this marsh land provides important wildlife habitat, we have ongoing problems with litter from target shooting in the old gravel pit. The upper section of the Keyes Hollow Road has been flooded by beaver, and we remind drivers that state law prohibits driving vehicles through standing water.

Each spring we organize Green Up Day for the last Saturday in April. With the help of schoolchildren, 4-H'ers, and many townspeople, we collect bottles, cans, papers, cups, plastic bags, and piles of other refuse from our roadsides and culverts. We appreciate the help of the walkers and neighbors who regularly clean up litter along their routes.

From time to time we lend our support to other conservation causes. We signed a petition from the Mason, NH Conservation Commission opposing a natural gas pipeline being routed through several southern New Hampshire towns. We also help fund tuition for Acworth children attending summer nature camps at the Orchard School in Alstead.

March of 2016 marks the retirement of Debby Hinman, the longest-serving member of the Conservation Commission, and our Chair for the past several years. Her knowledge of conservation and her dedication to protecting the Cold River watershed have made her irreplaceable. Our deepest thanks for her many years of service.

The Conservation Commission meets on the second Wednesday of each month at 7 PM in the town hall. Everyone is welcome to join us, and please let us know if you are interested in becoming an alternate member.

## **2015 Crescent Lake Association Milfoil Committee Report**

Crescent Lake Association (CLA) continued our decade-plus successful water quality program in 2015 to prevent invasive threats from our lake. The program began in April 2015 with training conducted by NH DES and concluded the weekend after Labor Day.

The summer 2015 season, supported by 4 paid Lake Hosts and an equal number of volunteer Lake Hosts conducted 963 courtesy boat inspections. A handful of boats presented to Crescent Lake with weeds that proved non-invasive. Invasive animal life (such as snails) have become a concern and Crescent Lake Association is taking more rigorous training from NH DES for boat inspections of invasive plants and animals.

We will begin recruitment of paid Lake Hosts in late February.

## 2015 Merger Notice

If you owned real estate lots that were involuntarily merged, you may be able to have those lots restored to their pre-merger status.

Your property may qualify if:

Two or more lots were merged without your consent for zoning, assessing or taxation purposes;

No previous owner consented to the merger.

To restore your property to pre-merger status you must:

Make a request to the Board of Selectmen no later than December 31, 2016.

Once restored:

Your properties will again become separate lots; however, they must still conform to existing land use ordinances.

Per RSA 674:39-aa, this Notice must be posted in a public place from January 1, 2012 until December 31, 2016 and be published in the Town's Annual Report from 2011 through 2015.
