TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Eaton in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Eaton on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to recess this meeting until 6 p.m. this evening.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration expenses, expenses of the Town Hall and other buildings, Social Security, police department, fire department, insurance, planning and zoning, damages and legal expenses, Civil Defense, health department, vital statistics, town dump, town maintenance (summer, winter, and general expenses), street lighting, town road aid, town poor, old age assistance, parks and playgrounds, cemeteries, Capital Reserve Fund, and interest.
4. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes if necessary.
5. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the so-called Snow Road from the east bank of Snow Brook where it crosses said brook via the "Twin bridge" so-called, to the Potter town road.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to help support the Carroll County Mental Health Service, Inc.
7. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase and construction of an addition to the Snowville Cemetery.

8. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to replace the present grader and to raise and appropriate and borrow necessary funds to do so.

9. To see if the town will authorize the withdrawal of the Capital Reserve Fund for snow removal equipment.

10. To see if the town will vote to subsidize ambulance service in the Eastern Slope Region, the town having been notified that the two local private ambulance services will no longer operate after April 1, 1969. And to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$432.00 to subsidize such service for one year.

11. To act upon any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

12. To establish a time to close the polls.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

We are proud to report that during 1968 Eaton had a perfect record in that there were no forest fires here. We all wish this to continue in 1969.

People — and rarely, lightning — cause fires. The state records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases. We in Eaton must all be aware of fire causes and work to prevent their occurrence.

The following action will help:

1. Teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
2. Never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
3. Safely dispose of rubbish, preferably at the town dump. If you must burn —
 - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for *all* burning of debris and dead grass except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal braziers in your own yard is permitted on notification to the warden.
 - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on grass and leaves by householders between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.
 - c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire *before* you light it.
4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden, his deputies, any selectmen, or the fire department chief.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

A REPORT FROM THE PLANNING BOARD

Town of Eaton, N. H. — 1969

In the ten-month period between last Town Meeting and the date of this writing, the Planning Board convened formally on ten occasions; there were also a number of informal discussions participated in by the Chairman and various members of the Board, principally for the purpose of reviewing Applications to Build. It is to be noted in passing here that the Board, in discharging this particular phase of its responsibility, attempted to act with as much dispatch and expediency as possible so as to not inconvenience the applicant.

The Board reviewed and there are on file in the Selectmen's Office eleven such Applications; all were approved. Three additional Permits to Build were issued by the Selectmen previous to the time the presently used Application form was established as a prerequisite document to the granting of the Permit.

A considerable portion of the Board's attention and time in session was devoted, over a span of four or five meetings, to availing itself of a markedly unique opportunity in the annals of such municipal bodies: that of addressing itself, at the invitation of the owner, to the problem of to what use a specific piece of property newly purchased, could be put in order to best serve the investment of the purchaser and at the same time meet the over-all purposes and intent of Town planning. This chance for the Board to so constructively act in collaboration with the new owner, and to thus set a classic example of the effectiveness of such co-operation between investor and the Town wherein the investment was made, unfortunately has not as yet as of this date produced the satisfaction for both sides of which the circumstances are so obviously conducive, for the reason of the absence of an officially established Town Plan in Eaton.

It is the principal purpose of this Report, and of the Board, therefore, to point out that without the guidelines, and the authority afforded by such a Town Plan, the efforts of the Planning Board in all phases of planning, are as was the case in this particular one, quite futile, or at best academic, since as things now stand, it is only within our province to advise and persuade according to our own individual and collective opinions and judgments.

Logically, if the Planning Board is to serve the Town responsibly and effectively, then a Town Plan must be established as the legal framework within which the Board can act constructively in the name of the Town, and within which in so doing the Board will properly exercise the powers delegated to it. We would remind that this eventuality was included in the original prospect of Planning at the time the Board was appointed.

We submit that the first steps in this direction are consultations with professional planners by the members of the Board, since it is evident that in these complex times it is completely beyond the capacity of the amateur Town Board, without experienced aid, to produce a Town Plan that will meet the legal, economic, political, and social exigencies in the community's future with which, to be worthwhile to the Town, it must be so fabricated to deal. To meet the expense of such consultation, which for this year will be restricted in scope to determining for the Town's information and deliberation the cost of such professional experience and assistance in the creating of a Town Plan, we will request that the Budget Committee include an item of two hundred dollars for consultancy fees in addition to the Board's regular operational expense item.

In closing this Report, the Board would resort to the example of the Town's own regrettable and frustrating experience during the past year to emphasize further the need for a Town Plan. This experience was that involved with the execution of the plans offered by the Board, and voted affirmatively in Town Meeting, pertinent to the operation of the beach at Crystal Lake. Due to a lack of experience on the part first, admittedly, of the Planning Board itself (a more detailed recommendation as to the pin-pointing of authority in the execution of the plan would have framed things more definitely), on the part of the Selectmen and that of the duly appointed Park Commission, tended to foredoom the venture to failure. To state the matter briefly, the physical improvements made by the covering of new sand made the beach more comfortable, and consequently more inviting, to a greater than ever number of patrons, without any provision being made for increased or improved control of the premises, and without taking measures to make the activity self-supporting financially as was originally recommended. This was due to, we submit, an almost complete lack of communication between those con-

cerned, a faulty interpretation of the pertinent article voted, and a slipshod, hasty, inexplicit delegation of authority to administer, one which afforded latitude for exercise of personal and individual judgment and decision tantamount to obstructionism.

A Town Plan based carefully upon a purposeful scrutiny of and adherence to the legislative, executive and administrative practices of the Town's traditional operational structure, would have anticipated the circumstances which permitted such a waste of time and effort as was involved here. Financially, despite the fact that the unspent Town tax money appropriated for this purpose will revert and thus go to reduce next year's tax rate, the Town did lose such Federal and State matching funds as were available for the self-improvement project.

The real embarrassment, however, in which all townspeople must share, is the ignominy of having missed the boat by not grasping the opportunity inherent in the plan. We did not prove to the cynical eyes watching us that Eaton could show the way to what a village, even as small as this, can do when it decides it is going to embark on a program of self-help; that it is going to vest itself with the communal dignity reflected in civic responsibility.

NOTES ON CURRENT HISTORY — 1969

At town meeting March 12, 1968, the budget as presented by the Budget Committee was accepted, allowing for an increase in the salaries of the town treasurer and the town clerk of \$50 annually.

The selectmen were authorized to acquire from the State of New Hampshire the property known as the Hatch Reservation and the Public Beach on Crystal Lake, and to appoint a Park Commission.

The town voted to appropriate \$4,350 to defray the expenses of town parks and to accept any funds that may become available for the construction and maintenance of town parks.

The town voted that "no new building or structure shall be erected or placed in the town prior to the granting of a building permit by the Board of Selectmen." The selectmen were authorized to delegate the Planning Board to act as a review board with regard to building permits.

The town appropriated \$2,500 for a new four-wheel drive truck; \$2,000 to replank the bridge at the head of Conway Lake; \$1,500 to resurface the paved roads of the town.

The town voted to elect the town clerk, the treasurer and the tax collector for three-year terms.

The town voted not to close the Snow Road so-called.

The early part of the meeting was televised by a crew from CBS News and a brief shot of the proceedings was seen on the evening telecast.

TOWN RECORDS

All 600 copies of "The Early Days of Eaton" have been sold. With some of the proceeds, a Xerox is being made of the entire Volume 1 of the town records covering the period 1765 through 1821. The original of this volume is in such bad shape that it could not be rebound. With the completion of this project, the town vault will contain a complete usable record of town meetings, inventories, petitions for roads and schools, records of discontinuance or closing of old roads and surveys for new or changed roads, some vital statistics and other legal and historical material from the first town meeting in 1785 to the town meeting of 1914 inclusive. Records of later meetings are with the town clerk. The vault also contains transcriptions of the meetings of 1967 and 1968 taken from the tape recordings of those meetings.

TOWN SEAL

For many years the official town seal required on legal documents bore the wrong date for the incorporation of the town — 1760 instead of 1766. It is thought that, at some time in the past, the existing seal had to be replaced and at this time the error was made. A new seal made by Louis Feron incorporating the design made by Beulah White Bailey for the 1966 Bicentennial commemoration and having the proper date, is now in current use. — K. H.

PARK COMMISSION REPORT

The Park Commission recommends a minimum of expenditure and regulation in connection with the Town Beach. The townspeople make little use of the beach and we question the advisability of our going into the entertainment business for the benefit of non-residents.

It was the Commission's original intent to carry out the proposals of the Planning Board, but we immediately ran into trouble. First — the Highway Department reserved thirty-three feet from the center lines of the two roads and they objected for safety reasons to the removal of the present guard fence. This meant that an industrial fence, which would allow adequate beach area and a large enough parking area to support the project, was not practicable. Second — the Hatch Reservation was not transferred to the town, so that we could not proceed with the toilet which would be essential if we were to charge admission. Actual procedure was to remove the black-top, put on additional sand and then observe what went on. During the period from July 8 on, over one hundred visits were made to the beach by the commission.

This led to certain conclusions. First — the people who used the beach were largely women and children, were well-behaved and orderly, and left little litter. Second — the cans, bottles, and other debris on the beach came from beer parties in the evenings. Some of these were orderly and attempted to confine their mess to the garbage cans, but there were also acts of vandalism. Two cans were dumped and left in the middle of the Brownfield Road, several signs were ripped off, and on one occasion a number of beer bottles were so badly crushed that it took two people an hour and a half to pick up the pieces. Third — the overflowing garbage cans came from people disposing of their household garbage and refuse instead of taking it to the Conway dump. Fourth — a fence around the beach would virtually destroy the view across the lake to the Little White Church, which has always been the town trademark, and it seems inconsistent to spoil this view permanently with a structure used only three months out of the year. Fifth — over 60% of the cars at the beach bore out of state licenses. Very few people from Eaton used the beach at all. Hence the question of what the town is doing in the entertainment business for non-taxpayers.

The beach is there, however, and there should be no objection to its being used, as long as the charges to the town are kept to a minimum. Since people using the beach for swimming are not troublesome and the difficulties arise from later hour activities, we feel that attention should be directed toward those areas.

We propose, therefore, the passage of ordinances shutting the beach down in the early evening and banning the use of the area as a dumping ground. These regulations would be enforced by deputies patrolling the location periodically to stop the troubles as they are created, instead of penalizing the swimmers who cause little trouble.

There has been evidence on one or two occasions that the part of the water included in the town beach (not Waukeela) has had a bacteria count above desirable. We would limit the number of cars parking by installing concrete curbs which would also keep the cars off the beach. Parking on the roads is now against the law and this regulation would be enforced.
