To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madison, Qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town on Tuesday, March 13, 1928, to act upon the following subjects:

12. For White Pine Blister Rust Control.
13. For the Boulder Road.
14. For Old Home Week.
15. For addition to Fire Station to house Tractor and snow plow.
16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire not exceeding five thousand dollars on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.
17. To fix town officers salaries.
18. To see what action the town will take in regard to Mr. Salter's road and what sum of money to appropriate, if any.
19. To discontinue Gove Hill road from the School house to the turn of road leading to Mr. Meader's place.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Madison:

I herewith submit my seventh annual report as superintendent of schools, it being the fifteenth in the series of such reports.

We are employing trained teachers for our schools. We are sending girls to Normal School to become trained teachers. Last September four graduates of Madison High School began teaching; having finished the work at Plymouth Normal School. Three of these are located in this supervisory district. Frances Thompson is taking a four-year course in Keene Normal School. Sarah Chamberlain and Paul Bickford will be our first college graduates, finishing in June at Boston University and N. H. University. Esther Gilman is taking a course in McIntosh Business College.

The large number of splendid little children at Silver Lake and Madison Corner create a real problem in school administration. The schools at both these places are too large for accomplishing the best results. Some plan should be adopted either of organizing another school or of providing helping teachers. The first method would call for another room and a regular teacher. The second would call for two helping teachers.

Teachers

There are six regular teachers in the employ of the district. A cadet teacher, also, from the University of New Hampshire, teaches French in the high school.

High School—V. E. Pearlstein, Headmaster; L. May

Quimby, Assistant; Robert J. Matthew, cadet at present.

Elementary—Beatrice Simpson, Mason School, 9 pupils; Beatrice M. Harmon, Nickerson School, 17 pupils; Mary A. Hughes, Madison Corner, 36 pupils; Lena Green, Silver Lake, 35 pupils.

I renew my wish of last year that provision might be made for a special teacher of music and drawing.

Medical Inspection

We are fortunate in again having the school nurse, Miss Marjorie Buswell. Madison, Effingham and Freedom each had special dental clinics last spring where children were treated. The late Dr. Gilman of Pittsfield did the work. An appropriation of \$25 from the Red Cross was much appreciated. I wish to urge parents to make use of such clinical opportunities as are offered. I hope we can have another dental clinic next spring.

I also wish to strongly urge the Toxin Anti-toxin clinic. This gives a harmless treatment as a preventative of the much dreaded disease of diphtheria. Please consider this matter, seek advice from your family physician and be ready to act. The Silver Lake Woman's Club has already voted support for work of this kind.

Every child has the right to health of body and physical strength for the struggle of life.

Repairs

During this year the Madison Corner Schoolhouse has been painted inside. The laboratory and recitation room at the high school were repainted and new curtains hung. The Silver Lake schoolhouse was painted outside and the desk tops refinished. Six new

adjustable primary chair-desks were installed at Nickerson School. All the rooms were cleaned and furniture varnished.

For next year new steps should be placed at Nickerson, the Madison Corner and high school painted outside and the high school basement improved. I would recommend that chemical toilets be installed at Madison Corner.

High School

The Lincoln medal was won by Ruth Fortier in 1927 and by Leah Grace in 1928.

The Silver Lake Woman's Club is still sponsoring the public speaking contest. This is much appreciated. In 1927 the prizes were won as follows

The high school has a spirit of earnest endeavor. The teachers work hard. Our graduates are succeeding in advanced schools. From the class of 1927, Pearl Granville is making good in New Hampshire University. The athletic team is carefully directed by Headmaster Pearlstein. The English Club is doing good work. The Madisonian is a credit to the school, being

able to pay its own way through the thrifty direction of Miss Quimby. Citizens should be proud of the work and product of this school.

The average cost per pupil in the elementary schools of the state in 1926-27 was \$73.84 and in the high school \$142.26. In Madison it was \$64.54 in the former and \$116.03 in the latter.

Our schools for the year ending June 30, 1927 showed an average attendance of 118, and an average membership of 125. The total enrollment was 137. The per cent of attendance was 94.

The schools of New Hampshire are moving ahead. Trained teachers are available. The normal schools now offer four-year curricula, preparing for high school work as well as elementary.

A good school needs a trained teacher, prompt and

regular attendance, and a full year of unbroken sessions. Let us keep these points in mind.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the school board, teachers, pupils and citizens for loyal interest and cordial support.

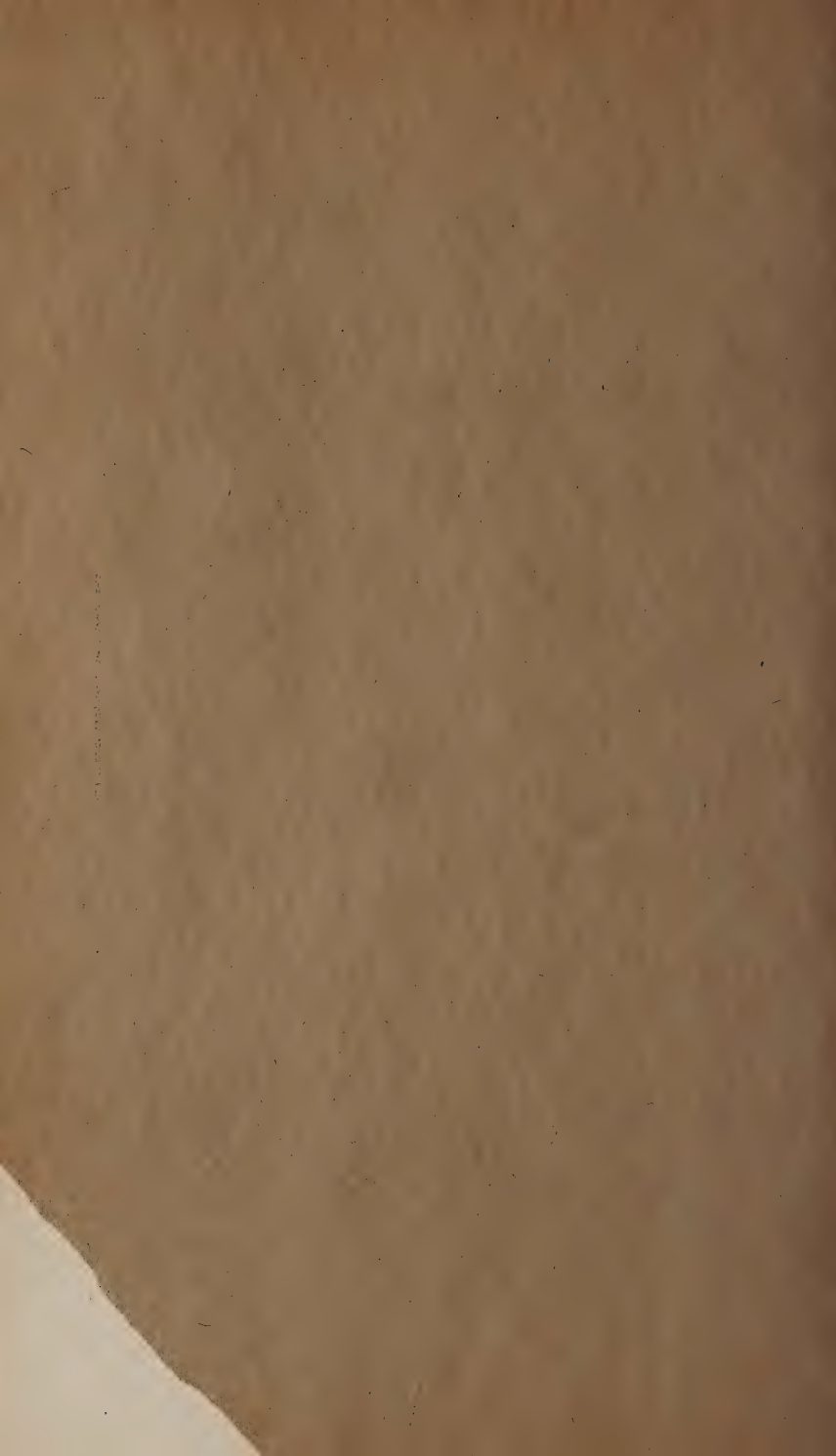
