## Warrant for Annual Meeting

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of Mont Vernon in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next (1932), at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to pay the tuition of the town scholars going to Stearns School.

## Report of Firewards

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Once more, our town has been extremely fortunate in its fire losses. During the past year the Fire Department has received only nine calls; three for brush fires and six for fires at dwellings. These fires have resulted in no loss of valuable property.

The fire fighting equipment has been improved by the purchase of additional hose. Our program for this year is to increase our hose supply to 2000 feet of 1½ inch rubber lined hose. Five manual forest-fire pumps were purchased during the year and have proven a very effective weapon for combating this type of fire.

Hoping that our citizens will continue to use the same care in avoiding fires as has been evident this year, we respectfully submit this brief report.

## Daland Memorial Library

The following report of the Daland Memorial Library for the year ending February 1, 1932, is presented by the librarian:

The wide-spread depression has been felt in the library as elsewhere, and there has been added only 160 volumes to the shelves, while in 1930 we received 230. However, these have enabled us to keep fairly in touch with much of the best of the new fiction, also some of the new autobiographies and travel.

We gratefully received ten dollars from the Wednesday Club for books, also books from the following friends: Mr. Cecil Bancroft, Mrs. Amy Hubbard Abbott, Mrs. Philip Thayer, Miss Sarah Wister, Philip Thayer, Jr., Jean Thayer and Hazel Morgan.

The output of books has increased from 3852 in 1930 to 4512 in 1931. Mont Vernon library still leads as distributing more books than in any town of its size in the state.

The discarded books, too dilapidated for repair, numbers only sixty volumes.

The reading table has fewer magazines and papers than formerly. We have Harper's, World's Work, Good Housekeeping, Ladies' Home Journal, Woman's Home Companion, The Literary Digest, American, World Tomorrow, Country Gentleman, American Boy, St. Nicholas, Red Cross Magazine and Milford Cabinet.

Through the interest of the Wednesday Club, the library has sent as usual a box of duplicate books to Concord, N. H., for the rural libraries, and to Boston for the Merchant Marine Service. As no way has been found to send the magazines for 1931 to the hospitals, they have been given to anyone in town who would take them.

The library has added a new and up-to-date Encyclopedia with loose leaves to be added until 1950. This was much needed, as the one discarded ended in 1888.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Mont Vernon:

I herewith submit my thirteenth report which is the fifteenth in the series of such reports.

### Supervisory Union No. 40

There has been no change in organization; full details were given in last year's report.

### Teachers

Miss Florence Kidder, now Mrs. George Blood, resigned in June 1931 as teacher at the village school after three years of faithful and efficient service.

The vacancy was filled by the appointment of Miss Helen C. Draper of Quincy, New Hampshire. Miss Draper comes to us after several years' experience in Rumney, Ashland and Weare. In addition to teaching Grades I-VI she is paid for noon-hour supervision as was the teacher last year.

### Buildings and Grounds

Since last year nothing has been done in regard to outlying one-room buildings, namely, East, West or South. They are rapidly deteriorating and should be disposed of without delay.

The Village building is in good condition, as are the grounds and play equipment. The only needs are all of minor importance. They include repairs to hall floor, a new outside door, and a rack for pupils' rubbers. All of these can be taken care of without special appropriation.

### Organization of Schools

No change in assignment of grades has been made. All pupils in Grades I-VI attend the Village school, while those in Grade VII and VIII go to Milford as they have done in years past. This plan has resulted in better instructional facilities than the former plan of two rooms at the Village. Practically all parents of pupils who go to Milford approve the arrangement and desire its continuance.

### Transportation and Costs

Of course, considerable transportation is involved; in fact, this item is by far the largest of any in the school budget. Such a situation has arisen

partly by the vote passed at the annual meeting in 1928 by which the recommended budget for 1928-1929 was largely increased, the intention being to provide transportation for practically all children in town even though they live less than two miles from school.

This plan has been continued by the School Board every year since and is so included in the School Board's budget for 1932-1933 as printed elsewhere in this report.

Transportation of pupils to Milford has not caused any material change in the total budget, as the cost of maintaining another room at the village would about equal the transportation and tuition at Milford.

### **Special Activities**

In November Education Week was observed. This was sponsored by the National Education Association, American Legion, and the Federal Bureau of Education. Our program included talks to the children by School Board members, Headmaster Morgan of Milford, Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Fred Wadleigh of Milford representing the Civic Club, and Seniors from Amherst High School. Grade VI spent one afternoon visiting Amherst schools. Another afternoon Miss Draper visited at Milford while Miss Jenkins of Amherst conducted the school.

Another very special feature this year is the George Washington Bi-centennial Celebration. Pupils in school will make a special study of Washington and will prepare a George Washington entertainment.

The National Education Association has a winter meeting each February. This will be at Washington, D. C., this year, and will, of course, emphasize very greatly the life and work of George Washington.

In conclusion a quotation from the January

Journal of the National Education Association is most fitting: "To interpret the school to parents and citizens is as much a part of the teacher's work as the instruction of children. Our schools belong to the people; they will go as far and no farther than the people wish; child guidance is a joint task of parent and teacher. Every officer in the school system is an interpreter, but the teacher can do more than anyone else. The teacher is linked to the parent by a common personal interest—the child for whose welfare both are responsible. The ideal, CHILDREN FIRST, demands that the schools be kept at their best and still further improved."

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To Mr. Harold C. Bales, Superintendent of Schools,  
Mont Vernon, N. H.:

The following is my fifth report of the health work in the Mont Vernon school, it being the twelfth year of this work.

The annual medical inspection was made in September 1931, by Dr. Burns, the Nurse assisting. A tabulated account of the inspection will be given on another page.

The eye and ear tests have not yet been completed.

Ten visits were made to the school, at which time classroom inspections and health talks have been given.

Four children have been brought to Milford for correction of defective teeth and two have been taken to physicians for medical treatment.

The only communicable disease among the pupils has been measles and one case of impetigo.

This year I think it will be possible for the pupils, whose parents are willing, to be immunized against diphtheria with Toxin-anti-toxin at a clinic to be held in the near future.

At this time I wish to express my appreciation to the school officials, teachers, pupils and parents for their cooperation during the past year.
