STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next at Nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect a Selectman for a term of three years and to choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for highways and appropriate money for the same.

4. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for bridges and appropriate money for the same.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairing highways and breaking snow for the ensuing year.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairing and building bridges.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise \$3,000.00 for maintenance of trunk lines.

8. To see if the town will vote to accept State and Federal Aid for reconstruction of East Side Trunk Line.

9. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to procure a snow plow equipment, either by purchase or hire, for the breaking of the roads of snow, either by raising money or by the credit of the town.

10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for a Community Nurse.

11. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and appropriate money for same.

12. To see if the town will vote to make Tamworth Fair a Town Fair and appropriate money for same.

13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day observance.
15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of the Laconia Hospital.
16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for the support of town library.
17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise the taxable property.
18. To see what wages the town will vote to pay for labor on highways.
19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Tamworth:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

Our school record for the year ending June 30, 1926 showed an average attendance of 147, an average membership of 154 and a percent of 95. This is encouraging as the percent last year was 91.

There are ten teachers in the employ of the district:

Beatrice I. Marston at Pequaket has 9 pupils.
Ethel M. Gilman at Great Hill has 5 pupils.
Lula M. Ball at South Tamworth has 23 pupils.
Grace E. Shannon at Downs has 11 pupils.
Edwin A. Blackey at Whittier has 19 pupils.
Amanda C. Sutherland at Bennett's Corner has 8 pupils.
Elsa I. Thunberg at the Primary School has 21 pupils.
Gladys C. Evans at the Grammar School has 12 pupils.
Myra F. Rourke at Chocorua has 17 pupils.
Ruth E. Pingree at the High School has 16 pupils.

I renew my wish of last year that there might be a special teacher of drawing and music and also a school nurse to follow up the work of the medical inspection.

High School

The continued success of our high school is very encouraging. It has held its enrollment this year better than ever before. Last June a class finished the two years' work. Alice Whiting, Lloyd Stevens, Doris

Fortier and Elizabeth Chamberlain entered the third year at Madison High School. Ruth Fortier expects to graduate from Madison in June.

The state high school agent spoke well of Tamworth High School, stating that the teaching was good, the pupils courteous and well behaved with a good working spirit and the building in good condition.

Tamworth should be proud of its high school and the pluck of the boys and girls, some of whom come five miles.

School Property

Good work has been done on the school property during the past year.

Bennett's Corner yard was graded and the room painted inside.

At Whittier the seats were reset and the toilets painted inside.

At Chocorua the room was painted inside and the house outside.

At Pequaket a new floor was laid and slate blackboards installed.

At Tamworth Village the halls were redressed and electric lights installed. For the latter, the schools raised money to pay half the expense. The yard was graded and a cement walk laid from the street.

Great Hill was painted outside.

At South Tamworth a new ventilating heater was installed which is giving excellent satisfaction.

During the coming year, attention should be given to the following: Inside ceiling and painting inside at Great Hill; playgrounds at Pequaket and Chocorua; chemicals and heater at Chocorua; painting inside at South Tamworth and Whittier.

Per Pupil Cost

The median cost per pupil of average membership in the state is \$78.94 in the elementary schools and \$130.53 in the high schools. In Tamworth the former is \$78 and the latter is \$132.99.

Trained Teachers

Tamworth has three young ladies studying in Normal School—Edith Gilman, Carrie Scammon and Frances Thompson. The first two graduate in June from Plymouth.

The time has come in New Hampshire when there is a trained teacher for every school. Normal School enrollment is now four times what it was ten years ago. The pupils generally attend faithfully when a trained teacher is in charge.

With a trained teacher and a learning pupil, the value of the school depends upon the length of the learning period in hours, days and weeks. It means that there must be daily unbroken school sessions.

Some districts are now having a year of 360 actual half days. Eleven districts in the state last year had 360 to 368 half days. Twelve districts had 354 to 359 half days. Tamworth had 352 half days.

Every school in New Hampshire had at least 36 weeks last year, while in 1919 scores of towns had a school year of only 30 weeks or less. Probably no other state in the Union can boast of every child having an opportunity to attend school 36 weeks during the year.

In conclusion I wish to thank the school board, teachers, pupils and citizens for cordial support.
