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REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Parents and Citizens of the Town of Troy :

Your Committee of schools herewith respectfully submit for your consideration the regular financial and statistical reports for the year and desire to call your attention to a brief consideration of the work and needs of the several schools.

In general we would say that the year has been a satisfactory one in all the schools and a very commendable progress noted on the part of most of the scholars.

Sickness has interfered seriously with one of our schools, but on the whole there has been no more trouble from this source than usual.

All of our teachers have done good, earnest work, and if there has been lack of progress on the part of any of the pupils it is due almost entirely to the neglect or inattention of such pupils. Any who desire to learn, and are willing to work, can in our schools lay the foundation of a good education.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

This school has been under the charge of Miss M. Alice Jones the entire year, whose good work the two terms of the preceding year it was the pleasure of your Committee to commend in their last report.

The school has continued in its steady and successful work and the pupils show the result of it. The advantage in having the same teacher through the year has aided in systematizing the work and study and the best possible results have been attained. We note a continuance of the same orderly conduct we commended last year, and a good progress in all the branches of study, conspicuously in composition and declamation.

In this, our highest grade school, it is exceedingly important that every possible advantage be given our young people,

many of whom terminate their studies with this school, and we congratulate the parents that such an opportunity for learning has been granted the children during the past year.

The whole number of weeks of school has been 30, divided into 3 equal terms. Number not absent by terms: 1st term, 7; 2d term, 7; 3d term, 7. One pupil has a perfect record for the year, and constitutes the Roll of Honor:

Master HARRY HALE,

whom we would congratulate for his faithful and prompt attendance. The number of visits by the Committee has been 8, by other friends, 67. Instances of tardiness during the year, 38; of these 27 were by one scholar, and your Committee confess to a neglect of duty in allowing such a scholar the privileges of the school.

NORTH PRIMARY.

This school has been taught the entire year by Miss Minnie A. Lamson, this being her second year in this school. Under the efficient management of this teacher the school has made excellent progress and has made a fine showing in its scholarship and deportment. The Spring and Fall terms were very successful. The Winter term was broken into by the sad case of scarlet fever that carried from this circle of little ones a bright young life to an untimely grave. No further sickness was developed, and after an intermission of two weeks, the school was resumed with a diminished number; closing with the other schools, February 5; covering a term of 8 weeks. The whole number of weeks of school has been 28; scholars not absent or tardy during one term are: 1st term, 14; 2d term, 16; 3d term, 5. There are 3 scholars who have a clean record for the year and constitute the Roll of Honor. They are:

ANNA A. STARKEY,
NELLIE SMITH.

Instances of tardiness for the entire year are only 6, and we congratulate teacher and parents on this good record. Number of visits by Committee has been 8, by others, 99.

SOUTH PRIMARY SCHOOL.

This school has been taught by Miss Loretta J. Brown, during the Spring and Fall terms, and by Miss Eva M. Fisher, of Fitzwilliam, during the Winter term. The number of weeks kept has been 30; number of scholars not absent or tardy during a term: 1st term, 2; 2d term, 7; 3d term, 0; instances of tardiness, 85. Your Committee recognizes the difficulties that the teachers of this school have had to meet. The indifference and utter lack of interest on the part of many of the parents whose children attend this school account in the main for this irregular attendance and these many instances of tardiness. Those scholars who attended regularly show the results of the good work done by these teachers. We commend in particular the work of the Winter term under Miss Fisher. The examination at the end of this term was the best we ever saw in this school.

EAST HILL SCHOOL.

There have been 2 terms of 10 weeks each in this school. The Spring term was taught by Miss Eleda E. Hutt; the Fall term by Miss Mertie M. Platts. We report a good measure of successful work in this little school. The average number attending has been only 6; pupils not absent: 1st term, 2; 2d term, 1; instances of tardiness, 2.

WEST HILL SCHOOL.

There have been 2 terms of this school; a Spring term of 10 weeks, taught by Miss Emma L. Hutchins, and a Fall term of 12 weeks, taught by Miss Maud B. Adams. The school has made commendable progress under both teachers. The average number of scholars was 10; pupils not absent during a term; 1st term, 3; 2d term, 4. For the year the following have not been absent or tardy, and constitute the Roll of Honor:

Instances of tardiness for the year, 3.

MERRIFIELD SCHOOL.

There have been 2 terms of this school; a Spring term of 10

weeks, taught by Miss Maud B. Adams, and a Fall term of 10 weeks, taught by Miss Effie L. Merrifield. Whole number registered in school has been 13; average attendance, 5; pupils not absent or tardy a term: 1st term, 5; 2d term, 4. For the year the following pupils have a clean record, and constitute the Roll of Honor:

We report a good year of work and study; constant and prompt attendance.

In conclusion we desire to urge parents and citizens to a greater interest in our schools. We regret to report a diminished interest on the part of our citizens which is inevitably reflected in our schools in the way of irregular attendance and lack of application. Busy as we parents and citizens may be in our daily pursuits, it is our duty to take time to interest ourselves in our schools to a greater degree than we have done. While your Committee have found many things to praise in the attainments and efficiency of our schools, we beg to remind you that, judged by modern standards, our schools are far in the rear. It is not the fault of our teachers—we doubt if ever the town had better ones. The defect lies in our system, or rather, lack of it. We spend money enough. Were this money applied in the right way, far better results would follow. The subject of a new school building, to which we referred last year, is pressing itself more and more to the front. With our three village schools together in one building, a well regulated, systematic course of study could be arranged. Good work can never be done by one teacher in a school whose course of study covers the whole range from the alphabet through common fractions, as is the case with our Primary schools under the present arrangements. The Primary department should be confined to primary work and a Secondary school take the present advanced primary studies. When a new school house is built this can be arranged, and our schools brought up to the standard of some of our neighboring towns. To this end we urge all our parents and citizens to assist in

stirring up public opinion to advance the standard of education and to make the next large expenditure to be for our schools.

The town has manifested a public spirit in developing its fire department—now let us as soon as practicable exhibit a similar spirit to advance our schools to the modern standard that we find in all wide awake and progressive communities.

FIREWARDS' REPORT.

The Firewards submit the following report for the year ending March 1, 1892 :

Two alarms have been given during the year. April 28, for a fire at a railroad wreck near the depot. July 6th the department was called to a railroad wreck near the old Pottery, as a matter of precaution.

There has been added to the department during the year, a Steamer at a cost of \$1,800.00 ; a Heater for the engine room at a cost of \$75.00 ; 400 feet of Hose at a cost of \$200.00. The engine room has been repaired at a cost of nearly \$150.00 ; two cisterns were repaired at a cost of \$56.07. The other expenses of the department are shown in the Selectmen's report.

While these expenditures seem large at first sight, yet the benefits that will be received by having the Steamer will more than pay for the same. The people in the fire district of the village will receive a four year term on their insurance instead of three years as formerly.

To properly handle the hose, a hose wagon is needed, and it is the earnest wish of the Firewards that suitable action will be taken at the coming town meeting looking to that end.

The town has, as far as it goes, a fire department that is a credit to it, and the people should give the same their hearty support.
