

#### WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Webster, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$874.50 to secure State Highway construction or \$423.82 for Class V Construction.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of highways and bridges.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for plowing and sanding roads in winter.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling town roads.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for relief of the town poor.

- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay serial note.
- 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town library.
- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of interest.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to cooperate with the state in control of White Pine Blister Rust, using town labor.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to give a discount of 2 per cent on 1939 taxes, paid on or before August 1, 1939.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen the right to borrow money in anticipation of 1939 taxes.
- 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to buy insurance for town help.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for fire protection.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The difference between appropriations and expenditures in some items on this sheet were due to abnormal conditions of

the past year. With the permission of the State Highway Dpartment the T.R.A. money was used to cover part of the Flood damage. We also deemed it advisable to spend the balanceof the Oiling and used it for Flood damage. The Town relief expense was less, due to the New Settlement law, under which several cases were taken over by the County. The balance left from the S.A.C. appropriation was due to accepting T.R.A. after the completion of the State Aid on Battle Street.

The statistical table shows that the district maintained its schools the full 360 half-days required, an increase of 12 over the previous year. There has been a slight decrease in the average attendance of the district. The percent of attendance remains about the same. The amount of tardiness per pupil is high and effort should be made to correct it. The total number of pupils registered in the district was 50. Nine high school pupils and two elementary, attend schools outside the district. This totals 61 pupils residing in the district and attending public schools.

In addition to the usual amount allowed in the budget for the maintenance of school buildings next year, provision should be made for the installation of another septic toilet at Putney Hill school. The old chemical toilet there is past repairing for more than this year. We shall be glad to see it go for it has always been unsatisfactory and costly to maintain. On the contrary the new type of septic toilet now in use for more than a year in the schools of the district has proven to be odorless, and involves no cost of maintenance except a small amount of water daily. To date both of the septic toilets in use in this district have resisted freezing.

In general the pupils of the schools made good progress in their studies during the year with the assistance of the teachers and other school officials.
