To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wilmot in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Wilmot on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Memorial purposes.

4. To see if the Town will accept State Aid Maintenance for the 4th N. H. Turnpike, so called, raise and appropriate the money necessary for the purpose.

5. To see if the Town will accept State Aid Maintenance for the Sunapee Lake Trunk Line, so called, raise and appropriate the money necessary for the purpose.

6. To see if the Town will accept State Aid Construction for the 4th N. H. Turnpike, so called, raise and appropriate the money necessary for the purpose.

7. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town highways.

8. To see if the Town will ratify the action of the Selectmen, in the disposal of the Patten place.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate any money for Old Home Day.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917, on a section of the Mascoma road, so called, and appropriate, or set aside from the amount raised for highway work, the sum of \$100 for this purpose.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Wilmot:

The purpose of this report is to give information concerning the present conditions and special needs of your schools.

The average qualifications of your teachers have been only slightly raised in the last two years. We have several resident teachers doing good work at lower salaries than would be demanded by strangers. The work of these teachers would be improved by their attendance at one of our summer normal sessions. The requirement that high school graduates shall take a summer course of six weeks before beginning to teach is an advantage to our smaller rural schools. The written contract between school board and teacher tends toward fewer changes during the school year.

An attempt is being made to grade the pupils in all schools in order that better work may be done. Standard tests are being given, which show the proficiency attained in reading, spelling, writing, arithmetic, and geography, and in some schools intelligence tests are also given to determine the children's natural ability.

A large number of geographies, histories, English books, and dictionaries has been lent us by the Kearsarge School of Practice, thus helping on our book bills and enabling us to buy much needed material for supplementary reading and civics. The geographical and political changes resulting from the World War make it necessary to introduce up-to-date geographies and histories as rapidly as money is available. The sets of maps provided many years ago for the Center and Flat schools have given admirable service and are still in good

condition although some of these, especially Europe, are not of great value today. New wall maps are needed in every school.

Some of our high school students are doing excellent work; others are falling down in some of their courses. It is not our intention to pass any from the eighth grade who are not prepared to do good work in high school or academy. Our elementary schools are the proper place for every child until he has acquired what the elementary school can give. In some cases parents are anxious to push their children on into high school. In certain cases, where children are very mature and would seem out of place to remain longer in the elementary school it is to their advantage to go on, even though not fully prepared.

The physical examination made last year by Mrs. Heyer showed the following:

Notices were sent to all parents whose children were in need of treatment. A few cases have been cared for. There is a deplorable number neglected.

In many schools throughout the state hot lunches are prepared at the school at the noon hour, to the improvement of the children's health and of their school work. The plan is in general not to provide an entire lunch, but hot cocoa, soup, or some other simple dish to supplement what is brought from home. The effect upon morals and manners is as evident as upon health. It makes the noon meal more like a family gathering than the former noisy, often boisterous, and too hurried lunch period. The teachers being at the schoolhouse during the entire noon hour is another move toward more wholesome school conditions.

The per cent of attendance in our school district last year was ninety, which indicates one tenth of our school money wasted. In the previous year the per cent was but eighty-nine. Many of the absences could be avoided if parents realized the importance of regular attendance. When children are allowed to stay at home for trivial excuses the loss is not only to themselves but to the entire school. A child often absent becomes backward and discouraged. The blame for this condition is too often laid upon the teacher.

In school buildings there have been some improvements to meet the standards set throughout the state. Windows have been added in the Center, Flat, and North Road buildings, and new toilets at the North Road and the Mountain. The barbed wire fence adjoining the school yard at the Mountain has been replaced by plain wire, thus removing a long-standing menace. This was not an expense to the district but to the property owner. The smaller school rooms are now in very good condition except that the walls need refinishing, for sanitary

reasons as well as for a better appearance. More important improvements are needed at the Center and the Flat, where the floors are in poor condition, being very loose, and in some places worn through, making them dangerously cold in winter, and dangerously dusty at all times. The stove at the Center is worn out and should be replaced by one of a more practical school-room type. If it could be placed on the cold side of the room and jacketed a much more even temperature could be maintained with considerable saving of fuel. The heating of the Flat schoolroom is a large expense, which could be reduced by moving the stove already there to the back of the room and jacketing it. Reducing the size of this room to the need of the present number of pupils would be a further economy and improvement. The walls of both these rooms need refinishing, as the plaster is broken and discolored.

Not less important than the matters already mentioned is that of proper seats. A large number of children are obliged to sit in seats so high that they cannot rest their feet upon the floor, and some cannot even touch the floor. The teachers try to correct this by providing boxes or blocks of wood for foot rests. This is only a make-shift as the children are still strained or cramped in trying to adjust themselves to both seat and desk. I believe that one conspicuous curvature of the spine has resulted at the Center from this bad seating arrangement. That other children may not be permanently injured in this way the present seats should be changed for those of an adjustable type.

The purpose of our present equalization law is to give the children of Wilmot and other small towns school privileges as nearly as possible like those of larger and wealthier districts. Under this law you receive this year \$2,537.51 toward the support of your elementary schools,

and will receive a like amount next year. Your allotment is increased at the same time that that of other towns in this Union is cut off entirely. We want the children of Wilmot to have as good schools as the children of any other town, and we want their surroundings to be such as will make them strong and healthy. The children are your children, the schools are your schools.

Your Superintendent welcomes every opportunity to cooperate with you for the welfare of your future citizens.
