

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsboro in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for lighting the Streets with Electricity.
- 6. To see what action the Town will take with regard to State Aid construction, State Aid maintenance and Trunk Line Maintenance.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take to suppress the Gypsy Moth.

- 8. To see what action the Town will take to suppress the White Pine Blister.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts and legacies given to the Town by different individuals, the income to be used for the care of cemetery lots.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to refund or issue other notes or bonds in place of notes coming due April 12th, 1923.
- 11. To bring in your ballots upon the question as to whether the amendment proposed by the convention to revise the Constitution shall be approved.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from Favor Farm to the Gillis Hill road.
- 13. To see what action the Town will take with regard to purchasing the Samuel Newton Estate as recommended by the State Board of Health and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$225.00 from Mary B. Jameson, the interest to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the John D. Butler and Moody Butler lots in Sunnyside Cemetery, the same to be known as the John D. Butler fund.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Schood Board of Bennington:—

Herewith is submitted for your consideration my fourth annual report on the condition and progress of your schools.

#### Teachers

In the Primary and Intermediate schools we have the same teachers as heretofore. For the Grammar school Mr. Raymond Holden was secured. All are doing excellent work, and good results are apparent in the steady progress of the children.

#### The Work in General

Mention has been made in previous reports of the aims we have in mind in the different school subjects; namely, to give a thorough grounding in all the fundamental subjects of the elementary school, while, at the same time, attempting to bring out and develop those other qualities in the child that are so essential in the type of citizenship which we all desire to see and which are so necessary if the future generations are to carry out and develop the work of the past. In this aim, I believe, we are having a fair measure of success.

The drill in the fundamental operation in arithmetic is being continued. This work is aimed to produce accuracy and a certain degree of rapidity in these operations. In the fourth, fifth and sixth grades the Courtis Practice Tests are used almost daily.

A definite method of teaching spelling is being carried out this year, with a special list of words for each grade. This provides for frequent reviews, and for emphasis on the study of words that the pupil does not know how to spell. The results so far are good. If this method proves successful each child should be provided with the text book next year.

While we have no supervisor in music and drawing excellent work is being done in these subjects by the regular teachers. Miss Cilly takes the Primary room in music, while Miss Cashion takes the fourth grade geography for Miss Cilly. The work in drawing and construction would rank with many schools that have a special teacher for this. Mr. Holden is doing considerable work in drawing with his grades.

#### Health Work

The medical examination held in the spring disclosed the following. The first column is the report for last spring, the second for the year previons.

Comparing the two years it is seen that while in some cases the number of defects was less last year, in other cases the number increased. In the total number of de-

fects found, this year shows a decrease of 72 from the total of the year before. Forty-one were reported by the examining physician as having secured treatment.

Notices are sent to the parents of children who are discovered having defects. The notices are for the purpose of calling the parents' attention to the fact that their children are suffering from a handicap in their school progress, as well as in their physical development, which ought to be remedied, if possible, and in the great majority of cases a remedy is easily available. It is not fair to the child, in competition with other children, to allow the defects to continue without taking any steps to remedy them. It is hoped that when parents receive the notices from the physician in the spring when the examination is made that they will consider them as important and take steps to remedy the condition called to their attention.

## Repairs

During the summer some neeled repairs were attended to. All three rooms were painted on the inside. This, certainly, has added much to the appearance of the rooms, and has made them much more cheerful. The blackboards have been repaired, and new ones secured where necessary; and new window shades purchased where needed. These things have all added much to the general appearance of the buildings, and, I am sure, have been greatly appreciated by pupils and teachers.

#### Attendance

The statistical table for the year ending June, 1922, is appended. The per cent of attendance last year was 94. This is better by one per cent than the year previous. The number of tardiness was 79, this being fewer by 90 than during the year before. This is a good report, and we hope to equal or better it this year. It will be possible to do this unless sickness should interfere greatly with regular attendance. During the fall months of this year the attendance was excellent.

## Age to Enter School

At what age is it best for children to enter school? This is a question that would probably evoke a variety of replies from the people. In many communities there is a tendency to send children to school before they are of sufficient maturity to profit by the procedure in the ordinary school. In several instances here we have had children entering before they are five. This, manifestly, is too young. Children at that age ought not, under any consideration, to be confined in a school room. They need the freedom of the out doors in order to develop physically. At this age their minds are not mature enough to profit by school instruction. The law places the compulsory school age at eight years. This is probably nearer the age when the child can properly benefit from the work of the school. It is my belief that no child should enter school under six years of age. It has been proved that the ordinary child, entering school at this age, will progress just as rapidly through the grades, and be ready for High School just as soon as he would had he entered earlier. Besides this a child entering school at too early an age is, ordinarily, a drag upon the rest of his class, and takes up the time of the teacher which could be used otherwise to better advantage. With these facts in view it would seem advisable to have a regulation to the effect that the age at which children could enter school should be, at least, six years, or that the child become six, say, one month after the opening of school in September.

In closing may I express my gratitude to all who have helped to make the work of the schools successful during the past year, and to the teachers for the faithfulness and enthusiasm which has produced such good results.


