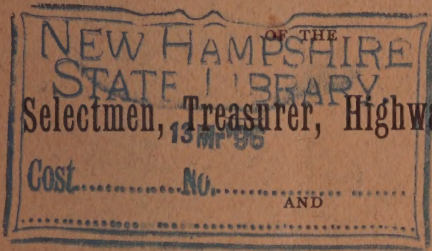

Report of Trustees of Library.

The past year has been one of universal prosperity for the Library in many ways. Money has been received, books given, and it has received a large patronage from the reading public.

Fifteen hundred and ninety-five books were taken out during the library year, which was unusually short, with an average of nineteen books to each person.

One hundred and fifty new books have been placed on the shelves, of which eighty-four are books of reference, ~~four~~ from the bequest of Mrs. Millard, twenty-one from the proceeds of the entertainment given by Mrs. Randlett and others, one from the Nelson Ordway fund, fifteen given by Mrs. Pike and Mr. Garland, and one given by Henry Eastman. Your attention is called to the gift of twenty books last year from Mrs. E. Coker, which was overlooked in the report.

The bequest of Mrs. Millard mentioned in report of 1894, has at last been received and Chairman Garland, of the Selectmen's Board, ~~desires~~ ^{desires} credit for obtaining it without cost to the town.

The Gordon fund has been received and placed at interest for the use of the Library.

The Library was closed in the spring for six weeks on account of scarlet fever, and at the end of the library year for one week, thus making the year unusually short.

Your attention is again called to the small room in which the Library is placed. Many of the new reference books are large and valuable, and there is no place for them on the shelves or room for them to be referred to.

School Report.

Again have the schools of the town completed what we believe to be a successful school year.

The people of our town have reason to be proud of their liberal appropriations made for school purposes, enabling the school board to continue the schools for a period of 36 weeks, and to pay what is considered as excellent wages to the teachers, and to lay out a considerable sum to keep in good repair school buildings and their surroundings.

During the present year the contract made five years ago with various book firms for school book supplies expired.

The law allows school boards to provide for the introduction and exchange of at least one set of textbooks annually, after such books have been in use for five years. Within the last 10 years great advancement has been made in the art of producing good school textbooks. It is a good thing for the schools of a town to have the best available books in the market. There is no doubt that nearly all the books in our schools could be replaced by better books now in the market. But the school board, availing themselves of the opportunity afforded by the law of expiring contracts, have introduced "The New Franklin Readers" in place of the "Normal Readers," in use for the last five years. The expense attending such exchange and introduction was not so great as might be supposed at first thought. The "Normal Readers" had be-

come nearly all worn out through constant use. Books can be introduced at much lower than regular cost prices. Hence we consider that no more was paid out for them than would have been necessary to replace the disused ones with new ones. The schools have been also supplied this year with Wentworth's illustrated primary mental arithmetics. Such a book seemed necessary. A set of charts, designed to teach patriotism, and to give some elementary knowledge of government in town, city, county, state and nation, has been furnished each school.

The law also requires that a set of books on physiology be furnished each class studying this subject in the various schools. Probably another year the board will furnish such books.

The board wish to express their satisfaction at the efficient oversight given the schools by Miss S. O. Brickett during a large part of the last year, and to express their regret that circumstances made it necessary for her to resign from the board. It is not often that a country town obtains the services of such an expert in the art of teaching and of one who has such a keen insight into the needs of the school room and of what constitutes a good teacher. The present good condition of the schools and the good work that has been done reflect credit upon her who has devoted so much time and thought to the advance of the schools of Hampstead. We would respectfully call the attention of the voters of our town to the fact that school houses Nos. 2 and 3 need very much new seats and desks. Those now in use are in very bad condition, and are a detriment to the health and comfort of the pupils, and a disgrace to a town that prides itself upon its generous provision for the needs of its children. We trust

they may be replaced at an early date with modern, up-to-date furniture. Lastly, we have no doubt but that the efficiency of our schools could be vastly increased under a good system of thorough supervision. We hope the time will come when legal conditions shall render it possible for contiguous school districts to employ some competent person to look after the interests of the schools in the way of securing uniformity in work outlined and performed, and in helping teachers, by suggestions and example, to do more efficient service.

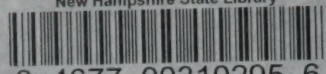
