1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be deemed necessary to defray Town expenses for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.
3. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor and all other officers and committees.
4. To appropriate money for Schools.
5. To appropriate money for Library.
6. To appropriate money for Memorial Day.
7. To see if the Town will vote to abate the taxes of any who may apply.
8. To see if the Town will appropriate money for the High School Laboratories.
9. To see if the Town will accept a Legacy from the Estate of Jessie A. Hardy, to keep his burial lot in repair.
10. To see if the Town will vote to procure a snow roller.
11. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue any or all of the following roads :  
First. The one known as "the old pound road";  
Second. The one from Charles Woodin's to Crusoe's old place;  
Third. The one from Noah Hardy's to Duncklee's mill.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

---

The progress in school work during the past year has been marked by the customary success and there are few changes to be reported.

We were fortunate in securing the services of F. W. Dudley, a former principal of the High School, for the same position again.

Rhetoricals have been introduced and an effort is being made to raise the standard of the School. A class of eight was graduated in June. Through the efforts of the members and alumni a piano was obtained for the High Schoolroom in the early fall.

More than the usual amount has been expended for repairs, but only work that was imperatively needed has been done. Several of the Blackboards at No. 1 have been completely rebuilt.

The schoolhouse at Patches Corner has been improved by shingling, rebuilding of piazza and painting, and Districts 4, 8 and 10 are still having union sessions there.

It was thought best in the fall to reopen school in No. 6 and also at No. 3, the scholars from No. 11 being accomodated at No. 3. We intend that the outlying schools shall have the same number of weeks as the village primary, so that pupils of the same grades may have the same amount of schooling per year.

We are glad to note that interest in the schools seems to be awakening and confidently expect further advancement in the future.
