THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.]

To the inhabitants of the town of Hopkinton, in the county of Merrimack, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Hopkinton, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges, in addition to the sum required by law, and appropriate the same.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools, in addition to the sum required by law, and appropriate the same.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Hopkinton Free Public Library, and appropriate the same.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day, and appropriate the same.

7. To see if the town will vote to dispense with a liquor agent.
8. To hear and act upon the reports of town officers, library trustees, and committees.
9. To see if the town will vote to purchase a new road machine and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.
10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars or such a part thereof as may be required to construct a sewer from the high school lot to the Wilson sewer (so called) in Contocook, provided the present cesspool proves insufficient to take the sewerage from the high school building.
11. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to furnish a map of the highways of the town of Hopkinton as provided in chapter 133 of the laws of the state of New Hampshire passed at the January session, 1903, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.
12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the celebration of Old Home Week.
13. To see if the town will vote to permit the library trustees, if opportunities present, to make exchanges of the "Life and Times in Hopkinton" for other town histories for library uses when in their judgment the same may appear to them practicable, on as fair and equitable basis of exchange as possible, not exceeding fifteen volumes each for the Hopkinton and Contocook branches, unless by later consideration and vote thereon.

14. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent. on all taxes paid on or before June 15th, 1904.
15. To hear and transact all other business that may properly come before the meeting.

GENERAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

During the last year important changes have been made in the school system of Hopkinton. At the last annual school meeting, it was voted that the village school be divided into two parts, a primary and a grammar school, and the sum of one thousand dollars was raised and appropriated for the purpose of putting the building in condition to meet the requirements of these schools. This action, taken with the full understanding that there were not, in what might be called the "village district," enough scholars to make such action necessary, seemed to indicate that the district was ready to follow the example of more progressive communities and the advice of our superintendent of public instruction, by conveying scholars from some of the small and poorly equipped schools to larger ones, properly graded, and taught by better paid (and consequently in most cases more competent) teachers. In this way prominent educators now believe the children can receive better instruction with the same expenditure; so, after the building had been made ready, and when the fall term of school was about to begin, following the supposed wish of the district, the school board closed schools at Putney Hill, Beech Hill, and South Road, conveying the scholars to the village.

In some instances parents living in outside districts asked to be allowed to send their children to the village schools. This was the case on Beech Hill, where two families, from which came about half of the Beech Hill school, wanted to send to the Village. To refuse would have been to do the children an injustice, and if they went

to the Village, not enough scholars would remain for a profitable school on the Hill.

Excellent work has been done in the Hopkinton Primary school during the last two terms. The same cannot be said of the Grammar school, largely because the teachers, though highly recommended, and the best available at the time, have not proven themselves suitable for the position. The winter term ended two weeks earlier than was intended, because the work being done was not satisfactory. Doubtless a good teacher will be found for the next year, when two weeks lost this winter and one at the beginning of the fall term (because the building was not ready) will be "made up."

Last fall the school at Tyler's was discontinued, and the scholars, with those from Blackwater (where there has not been a school for some years), have since been conveyed to Contoocook. At the beginning of the winter term, because the Emerson Hill school was so small, it was closed, and the pupils were carried to West Hopkinton.

At the last annual school meeting, provision was also made for erecting and equipping, at Contoocook, a suitable building for primary, grammar, and high schools, and for establishing and maintaining at that place a high school. Through hard work on the part of those remaining after nearly half of the members of the building committee had resigned, the building was ready for use last September. Its two lower rooms were furnished with seats and desks taken from the primary and grammar schoolhouses, and from several other unused schoolhouses about town. These were refinished, and answered the purpose nearly as well as new ones. This was done without thought of injustice to any one, so that a needless amount of the district's money might not be invested in unused furniture; that the money appropriated for building and equipment could be used to better advantage than

in the buying of furniture that was not needed ; and that, if there should be a part of the appropriation remaining after the completion of building and equipment, it might, if the district saw fit, be used for general school purposes, thus making a further appropriation this year unnecessary. The furniture was not removed from any building in which a school was likely to be opened in the near future. Of course if, at any time, a school was to be held in one of these buildings, it would be at once refurnished, probably with new desks. It was simply transferring school property from parts of the town district where it was no longer needed, to another part where it would be of great use.

After the refusal of the district, at the special meeting of August 29, to appropriate money for the maintenance of the high school, it was found, on consulting competent authority, that, after the vote of last spring, this school must be maintained, and the expenses paid from the general school fund, even though all the other schools had to be greatly shortened in order to make this possible ; but, with the addition of the money obtained from the sale of schoolhouses at North and South Contoocook and Gage Hill, we have been able to have the same number of weeks of school as last year, and support the high school beside. For very evident reasons the bills for books and supplies have been heavier than usual during the last year.

We have some reason to take pride in our high school, which opened September 14, with almost thirty scholars, nearly all of whom are still in their places and doing good work. This school having been approved by State Superintendent Folsom, Hopkinton does not now have to pay tuition of its pupils attending schools in other places. We were fortunate in securing the services of a thoroughly competent man, Mr. Elmer E. Sawyer of Tewksbury, Mass., as principal, and his assistant, Miss Jennie F. Emerson, also fills her place well. To Mr. Sawyer especial thanks are due for his generous use of time and ability, in helping to get the school started on a proper basis.
