## SCHOOL REPORT.

---

### *Fellow-Citizens:*

In compliance with the requirements of the statutes, we hereby submit our annual report, and ask your careful attention to the following remarks :

Our schools, we are glad to say, as a whole, have been prosperous and successful. We do not say perfect, for it takes many good points to make a perfect school. Of course, much depends upon the selection of teachers. We exercised our best judgment in this direction at the beginning of the year. We contend that a good teacher a few weeks employed is far better than a poor teacher many weeks. With only one exception a very pleasant relationship has existed between scholars and teachers, and where this unpleasantness occurred, we believe, the cause was with those outside the school-room. As a rule, the disturbances in our country schools are not caused by pupils or teachers, but by those outside the school.

We can but notice the difference in the work of the teachers, and the amount of progress made in a school where all the parents are interested in the school and sustain the teacher, and one that is the reverse.

One great hindrance to the prosperity of our schools is irregular attendance. We would not expect a person in business who gives one day to work and the next day to pleasure to be successful ; no more can you expect a child who goes to school one day and stays at home the next to profit as much as a pupil who attends school every day.

In conclusion let us say, there should be an awakening in the minds of the parents—a deeper interest in the prosperity

of our schools. The interest in the minds of the children will be in proportion to the interest we exert ourselves. We would recommend frequent visits by parents, and at the closing exercises of each school all who can should attend, and let the scholars see we are interested in their welfare. The coming year we hope all parents will take more interest than ever they have before, and by their coöperation with the teachers make our schools more successful than ever before.
