# Tentative Warrant

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## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madison, Qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 12, 1929, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers.
- 2 To see if the Town will vote to put the maintenance of summer highways in charge of one surveyor instead of three.
- 3 To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Town Officers' Salaries.
- 4 To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Town Officers expenses.
- 5 To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Town Hall Expenses.
- 6 To see what action the Town will take in regard to the support of the poor and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 7 To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to repairing the Branch Bridge, so called, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 8 To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Bathing Beach so-called, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 9 To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for summer highways and bridges.
- 10 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for breaking roads for 1928-1929.

- 11 For Town Library.
- 12 For Street Lighting.
- 13 For Memorial Day.
- 14 For Fire Department.
- 15 For State Aid Maintenance.
- 16 For Trunk Line Maintenance.
- 17 For State Aid Construction.
- 18 For White Pine Blister Rust Control.
- 19 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire not exceeding five thousand dollars on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 20 To fix Town Officers' Salaries.
- 21 To see what action the town will take in regard to Mr. Salter's road and what sum of money to appropriate, if any.
- 22 To see if the Town will vote to buy a snow scraper for use with a truck, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Through the kind generosity of Mrs. H. H. Shepard, Mrs. C. Dana Webster, and Mr. Arthur W. Cate, all Grandchildren of Col. John March, a former resident and leading citizen of this Town, we have been presented with a very fine portrait, to be kept in some public place.

For the benefit of those who do not remember Col. March, the following is a brief biography:—

Col. John March (of Portsmouth, Greenland, and Eaton, N. H.) was born in England, March 1771 and died in Madison, N. H., Sept. 19, 1831.

He married Abigail Hodgdon at Greenland, Feb. 22, 1778.

Col. March came to America when eight years old, 1779, with an older brother.

He was made Colonel in the war of 1812.

There were eight children.

Abigail M. H. married Atkinson; Mary Ann married Abram Colby; Caroline married Churchill Langdon; Eliza Ann married Whittaker, later Sam Allard; Mittie Sherburne married Artenas Harmon, George Washington; Sarah Ann married Horatio Neal Cate.

The town records of Eaton show that Col. March first held office in 1802 when he was elected Moderator.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Madison:

I herewith submit my eighth annual report as

superintendent of schools, it being the sixteenth in the series of such reports.

The Schools have been provided with one additional regular teacher. To relieve the congestion at Silver Lake and Madison Corner, the seventh and eighth grades were placed in the high school building. A regular teacher was then hired to take care of these grades and also teach the French classes in the high school, replacing the cadet teacher formerly employed. This plan is recommended for another year.

The teachers employed are as follows:

High School: Vere E. Pearlstein, Headmaster  
(University of N. H.)

Grammar Grades, Helene Wheeler

Nickerson, Leola Smith (Plymouth Normal)

Mason, Lucia Morrill (Plymouth Normal)

There should be a special teacher of music and drawing.

### **Medical Inspection**

Miss Marjorie Buswell has been succeeded by Miss Harriet Curren as school nurse. A splendid work was done when the Silver Lake Woman's Club sponsored and financed the treatment of school and pre-school children with Toxin Anti-toxin to prevent diphtheria. Practically every school child was immunized. The giving of the Schick test last fall found only one or two whose treatment was ineffective. This is a fine record.

We feel especially grateful to Dr. H. M. Wiggin, the administering physician.

A dental clinic was held last spring, directed by Miss Buswell and backed financially by the Red Cross. Thirty were treated in one and one-half days.

More use should be made of these clinics by those whose children need dental treatment. Miss Curren will ably carry on the good work this year. Miss Curren's fall inspection finds most of the troubles are with teeth, tonsils and adenoids.

### **Repairs and Improvements**

During this year the High School building has been painted outside and the basement improved. Madison Corner building has been painted outside. Furniture in all the schools has been varnished. Chairs were provided for the Grammar grades in the high school for recitations in the laboratory.

For next year cement steps should be provided at Nickerson, and half the roof covered. The outside should have a coat of paint.

At Madison Corner the roof should be covered and the chimney topped.

At Mason the chimney should be topped and the underpinning reset.

Our schools for the year ending June 30, 1928 showed an average attendance of 122, and an average membership of 126. The total enrollment was 133. The percent attendance was 96%.

### **High School**

The high school is progressing well. From last year's graduates we sent three girls to Plymouth Normal School and one to Bates College. All are doing well. From the class of 1927 Harriet Meloon entered

New Hampshire University last fall and is doing good work; and Charlie Crabtree is taking a course in the General Electric Co. School.

The Athletic team is carefully guided by Headmaster Pearlstein. Much drill is being given on the Fundamentals. The Madsonian and English Club are a credit to the school. Our class in United States Constitutional History last year stood among the best in the state especially in the amount of supplementary reading done by the pupils. On this we had special commendation. It will thus be seen that the splendid library of reference books has not been provided in vain.

The week-end commencement tried out last June for the first time, proved a happy success.

Citizens have reason to be proud of this school.

Nickerson: Glen Harmon, Melvin Harmon, Gladys Granville. Mason: Edgar Bickford, Doris Bickford, Marjorie Bickford, Beryl Bickford. Silver Lake: June Chick, Vesta Shackford.

At the time of the World War, one man in every six examined was found physically unfit. One man in every four drafted was lacking in ability to read and write. After learning this, the nation set out to give each child a schooling that would make him physically fit and qualify him with education for the duties of life. We are still working toward that goal. As a nation we have not fully arrived.

The school aims are seven:

1. Sound Health
2. Worthy Home Membership
3. Mastery of the three R's
4. Good Citizenship
5. Vocational Efficiency
6. Wise Use of Leisure
7. Training in Good Character

The nation spends for schools \$2,255,251,327.

The nation spends for tobacco, soft drinks, ice cream, candy, chewing gum, theatres, movies and similar amusements, jewelry, perfumes and cosmetics, sporting goods, toys, etc., \$6,239,860,000. For these luxuries we pay about three times as much as for schools. Can we afford to pay more for luxuries than for schools?

Money invested in education brings handsome economic returns to states and communities. If the right schooling raises the earning power 10%, then 10% of our total annual income is nine billion dollars—more than three times as much as we yearly pay for public schools and colleges of all types. Herbert Hoover lists education and scientific research as first among the factors which are responsible for the nation's high economic position.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation for loyal cooperation and interest.
