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## Warrant for Annual Meeting

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### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Boston Quali-  
fied to Vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house  
in said Town on Tuesday the ninth day of March next,  
at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the follow-  
ing subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers and  
agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of mon-  
ey as may be necessary for the support of schools, main-  
tenance of the poor, for repairing roads and bridges,  
for Memorial day and for all other necessary town  
charges.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will  
vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Whipple  
Free Library (the Town Library) or act in relation  
thereto.

Article 4. To see what action the town will take in  
relation to insurance on the books, appurtenances and  
fixtures of the Town Library (The Whipple Free Li-  
brary) to raise and appropriate money for the same or  
act in relation thereto.

Article 5. To see what action the Town will take  
for the future disposition of the Town Library (The  
Whipple Free Library) to raise and appropriate money  
for the same or act in relation thereto.



Article 6. To see if the Town will do anything in regard to Public health nursing, raise and appropriate money for the same or act in relation thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money to meet the necessary expenses of the Town.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Chemical Automobile Truck for the Fire Department, raise and appropriate money for the same or act in relation thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the purpose of Cooperating with the State and Federal Government in control of the White Pine blister rust or act in relation thereto.

Article 10. To see what action the Town will take in regard to a water system for the Town, raise and appropriate money for the same or act in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see what action the Town will take in regard to junk Licenses.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money to grade around the Soldiers Monument after it is set.

# WHIPPLE FREE LIBRARY

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## REPORT OF TRUSTEES

By request of the Free Public Library Commission of New Hampshire, the Trustees of the Whipple Free Library (the Town Library) present their Annual Report for the year ending January 31st, 1920, in the following form:

The administration of the Library from the beginning of the fiscal year (February 1st, 1919) until November 22nd, 1919 was in a normal condition and little of interest transpired during that interval. Each Sunday, Wednesday and Saturday the Library was open during the regular hours, the Librarian was on duty and books were exchanged in the customary manner.

Ever since the Town has been in possession of the Library the Library has occupied a room on the ground floor of the Store Building of the J. R. Whipple Company located on the central square of the village. Through the courtesy of the J. R. Whipple Company this library room has been heated and lighted by the Whipple Company and no rental has been charged for its occupancy. The Town is fully appreciative of and grateful for this generosity on the part of the J. R. Whipple Company and hereby wishes to acknowledge their appreciation.

During the month of November the interests of the Whipple Company in this town were sold, new owners assumed control of the property and the relations with the Whipple Company in regard to the free heating, lighting and rental ceased.

The new owner of the building in which the Library is located requested the Trustees to meet him to further arrange matters to suit the changed conditions. On November 24th, 1919, the chairman of the Trustees waited upon

Mr. Fred Gilman at his office at the "Farm." The result of this interview, which was of an informal nature, was that Mr. Gilman, with marked generosity, offered the Trustees the use of the Library room rent free as long as he was owner of the building or until such time as he should notify them of any change. (No definite time was stipulated as he said that he should sell the property at the earliest opportunity.) We are at present enjoying Mr. Gilman's generosity and take this opportunity to publicly acknowledge his kind act.

From November 24, 1919 until the present time has been a rather unsettled and uncertain period, owing to the radical changes in local conditions due to the segregation of the Whipple property and the readjustment. From the fact that at any moment the building in which the library is now located may be sold, we are in a state of uncertainty as to future action in the use of library appropriation. Minor matters have occurred to intensify this uncertainty, for example, the new heating apparatus was not adjusted so that the Library could be heated on Saturday, January 3, 1920 and we were forced to close the Library at 3.30 P. M. on that date (this is, we believe, the only time the Library has been closed even for part of one day since it has been the Town Library). Wood has been purchased, the heating system improved and we now hope for normal or semi-normal conditions. We regret that circumstances forced us to close the door even for a few hours on January 3rd. We must all have patience in these times of readjustment and bear with one another for our mutual good.

During the year there have been no additions or improvements to building or equipment. Circulation is unchanged. Nothing has been done in rearrangement, classification or cataloguing of books. We have not installed a charging system (our only charging system is in "fines"). No new work has been undertaken during the year. The only exhibits have been "posters." Of



notable gifts received and for which we wish to extend thanks to the givers we would mention, a German Helmet (war) from Mr. Joseph H. Rockingham, chairman of Fourth Liberty Loan drive; eight (8) books from Mrs. B. J. Lang; one (1) book from Mr. E. E. Reed; one (1) book from Mr Henry H. Brooks; two (2) books from Mrs. Claude M. Hart; one (1) book from Mr. W. L. Shaw. There have been no changes in the staff. Special needs are many, the more important however are recataloguing the books and the publication of new catalogues. Relative to the latter we would say that it is today rather costly to get out new catalogues for distribution to the users of the Library, and we are therefore undecided as to the best plan for so doing. It has been suggested that we make a minimum charge (to cover cost) for each catalogue issued, but no definite decision has been arrived at. Relative to request for a larger appropriation for maintenance for the fiscal year, again, owing to the uncertain conditions at this time, we have no idea what amount to ask for. We must leave it for your consideration at Town Meeting.

We desire to express our thanks and appreciation to our Librarian, Miss Elsie G. Warren, for her work during the year. To Mrs. Bennett we wish to extend a word of thanks to her attention to her duties.

May we all express our interest in our Library and its future development by definite and satisfactory action at Town Meeting upon the Articles relating to the Library. It is **your** Library, let us all make it an honored institution in our Town.

## A WORD OF APPEAL

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The uncertainty alluded to in our report is not conducive to advancement, nor with it is it possible to maintain matters in a normal condition.

The present condition cannot and will not last indefinitely and a grave question presents itself to the citizens of this town.

### WHAT SHALL WE DO WITH OUR LIBRARY?

A Library to accomplish its function must be maintained in the highest degree of efficiency; to be efficient its funds must be applied to constructive uses; its personnel must apply themselves to the regular library work. The funds must be distributed with regularity and in the channels of **library** work and not have to be withheld for "emergencies." To continue as we have been obliged to since November, 1919, means retrogression.

### WHAT SHALL WE DO WITH OUR LIBRARY?

Let us house it first of all, and house it properly. Shall we house it in a building constructed for the purpose? Shall we house it elsewhere? Let us have it **somewhere**,—somewhere where we will have a definite abiding place and not be obliged to exist from day to day and hour to hour.

We must decide this question at Town Meeting. Let everyone come to that meeting with some definite plan or suggestion in their mind.

As Health Officer of the town of New Boston I submit the following report for the year 1919.

Five cases of contagious disease have been reported to me as follows: three of Scarlet Fever, one Diphtheria and one whooping cough. All of the patients recovered in due time.

We have had a number of cases of influenza during the year but as the doctors have not reported them I have made no record. I can only say that none of them were fatal. A complaint of head lice in the schools was easily and as far as I know satisfactorily taken care of.

I have had no complaint this year from sink drains, cessspools or closets, but again I am going to ask the people to keep them clean and use disinfectant, that we may avoid disease and trouble coming from this source.

As Cleanliness is Godliness, let us endeavor to keep clean.

Article 5. Voted: to authorize the selectmen to hire money to meet the necessary expenses of the town.

Junk Licenses

Article 6. Voted: to leave the matter to the selectmen and protect those buying licenses.

Electric Light

Article 7. Voted: To leave the matter to the selectmen.

Soldiers' Memorial

Article 8. Voted: that we reconsider and rescind the vote taken two years ago in regard to a Soldiers' Memorial. Voted: that we erect a Soldiers' Monument with the legacy of Dea. Eben Dodge and with such other money as can be procured. Voted: that we erect the monument in the triangle in front of Dr. Charles A. Weaver's residence. Voted: that a committee of five be appointed to procure and erect the monument. Voted: that the selectmen, Eugene A. Edwards, Orren S. Waldo and Charles W. Blanchard with Ernest A. Bartlett and Charles W. P. Read be that committee.

Insurance on Town House.

Article 9. Voted: to re-insure the town house and to increase the amount of policy to Six Thousand dollars, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees

Article 10. Voted: to accept and adopt the reports as printed. Voted: that Clerk's record of annual meeting be printed. Voted: not to have any advertisements in printed report.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

---

To the Selectmen of New Boston and the Inhabitants of the School District:

The School Board of the District of New Boston N. H., respectfully submit the following report for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1919:

Under the new school law, and conforming to general recommendations from the State Board, we propose to make such improvements in our school houses as will insure approval for this year at least. To this end we are asking for the sum of \$700.00. This at first glance may seem excessive, but as we have explained before, our policy for the last few years has been to repair as thoroughly as our appropriation would permit one school house each year, and No. 13 is an example of this plan. This year we purpose to work on No. 16, bringing the lighting scheme to standard requirements; installing a Kaustine toilet; and renovating the interior. But we also find we must shingle No. 2 house, paint woodwork and whiten ceiling and jacket stove at No. 15, and freshen up the inside of No. 5. All these repairs necessary to pass state inspection. And considering the high cost of labor and materials we feel we cannot do the work on less than the amount asked for.

Credit should be given our superintendent for the good and faithful work he has done this year and we are glad to report good progress in all departments of our school work and especially in our High School, under the efficient management of Principal Reed and his able assistant, Miss Robinson. We find a fine spirit of co-operation not only between pupils and teachers, but among parents and friends as well, and this we feel is an ideal condition for a successful school.

New Boston deserves great credit for the splendid



way in which it supports its High School, and we hope they will feel as we do, that the results justify the outlay. We are sorry we have no graduating class this year, but the members have dropped out one by one until there are none left. But we hope to show you at the end of the year that the New Boston High School is very much alive and on its job.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

Goffstown, N. H., Feb. 2, 1920.

To the School Board and Citizens of New Boston:

I have the honor to submit my third annual report. I invite your attention to the statistical table which gives facts and figures which you ought to peruse. The attendance for the last school year was low, but the excuse, behind which we hide, is the influenza. The number of tardy marks, however, cannot be honestly laid to this fact.

I am pleased to note that on the list of approved high schools that the name of New Boston High School appears without any defect being checked against it, and its standard is not one whit lower this year.

I refrain from further comment, reserving what space I feel justified in taking in your town report for a brief analysis of some of the features of the new, forward looking, school law for new Hampshire. I cannot analyze it in full but the law is expected to equalize opportunities for every child in New Hampshire because the "school board of every district shall provide standard elementary schools" and a standard school is thus defined by the law: (1) "Maintained for at least thirty six weeks in each year, (2) in a suitable and sanitary building, (3) equipped with approved furniture, books, maps and other necessary appliances, (4) taught by an approved teacher, (5) directed and supervised by an approved superintendent, (6) with suitable provision for the care of the health and physical welfare of all pupils."

(1.) A "suitable and sanitary building" is one which "shall be lighted from the left and rear. The ratio of the window area to the oor area shall be not less than one to five." (Not a building in town fully meets the require-

ments as regards light.) Equipment for heating such a building "must be adequate to furnish a minimum temperature of 68 degrees and ventilation without direct drafts." (With the exception of schools No. 2, No. 4 and No. 16, this provision is pretty well met. The drafts in some schools need adjustment before the best results can be obtained.) "Floors must be in good condition and swept with some dustlaying compound or oiled. Walls must be in good condition and of some light color. Papered walls have only temporary approval." "Toilets must be decent and in sanitary condition. They must be located in buildings free from obscene markings and furnishing proper privacy. The vaults must be fly proof and properly ventilated, etc." (To bring all of our schools to fully meet the toilet requirements will necessitate a larger outlay for repairs than any other requirement.) "Water for drinking purposes must be provided in properly covered receptacles with faucet or bubbler. Facilities for washing hands must be provided. Common towels and drinking cups are prohibited by regulations of the State Board of Health."

Commenting on the above requirements Commissioner Butterfield remarks: "The list of minimum requirements for temporary approval is intended to cover only such changes as are required to make school houses decent and safe for children."

(3.) Much of the furniture in New Boston cannot receive anything but temporary approval. The seats and desks at the village school should have long ago been replaced by modern furniture. Books, maps and other appliances have been reasonably well furnished. (4.) An approved teacher in one who holds a "permit," "license" or "certificate" from the State Board of Education, and such teacher must serve under contract. No longer can graduates of a high school or other person with little or no education, teach in New Hampshire. Any high school

graduate must attend at least one summer school session before she can obtain a permit. We are employing no teacher who does not hold a license or a certificate.

(5.) Your district has been so long under supervision that the duties of a superintendent ought to be pretty well known. Sufficient to state in passing, that he is nominated at a joint meeting of the school boards of the districts forming the union, (in this case Goffstown Independent, Goffstown Town, Bedford and New Boston school districts form supervisory union No. 19,) and elected by the State Board of Education. Thus he is a State officer, and as such is held responsible for the enforcement of the school laws and the regulations of the State Board of Education.

(6.) Under this qualification your medical inspection has been established, and owing to the generosity of the New Boston Branch of the Manchester Chapter of the Red Cross, it has cost the district almost nothing, and its good results are going to be beyond measure.

The finances for the schools are thus provided: "The selectmen in each town shall assess an annual tax of three dollars and fifty cents on each thousand dollars of the value of the ratable estate taxable therein" and "the school board of each district in its annual report shall state in detail the additional sums of money, if any, which will be required during the ensuing fiscal year for the support of the public schools, for the purchase of textbooks, scholars supplies, flags and appurtenances, and for the payment of the tuition of the pupils in the district in high schools and academies, and for the payment of all other statutory obligations of the district. The selectmen of the town in their next annual assessment shall assess upon the taxable property of the district a sum sufficient to meet the obligations above enumerated, with such alterations thereof as may be voted by the district, and when collected shall pay the same over to the district treasurer." In any district in which the

money produced by a tax of five dollars on a thousand dollars of the valuation of the ratable estates in the district is insufficient to maintain the required elementary and special schools, and to purchase the required textbooks, scholars' supplies, flags and appurtenances, the state shall provide the balance of the money necessary from the the money appropriated for that purpose by the provision of this act." In other words the district must raise money enough in addition to the \$3.50 tax to maintain standard schools, or vote to raise \$5.00 on a thousand dollars of valuation. The purpose, therefore, of the budget published elsewhere by your school board is to show whether or not it is advisable for the voters to raise \$5.00 on a thousand or vote to raise the sum asked for by the school board. At your last meeting you voted to raise the former, and although the exact figures are not available at the time of writing this report, your school board anticipates receiving a substantial sum from such state aid.

Comment might be made upon the section calling for the education and Americanization of all illiterates, but space does not permit, and these sections have no direct bearing on the schools of New Boston, although they constitute some of the most essential features of the law.

Some comment must be made, however, on the question of competent teachers. In the securing and retaining of teachers our town has been more fortunate than many districts in the state, and indeed New Hampshire has been more fortunate than many of the states, as witness the statements of State Superintendent Thomas of Maine in the Boston Herald of December 28 last,\* and the proclamations of the governors of New Jersey and Ohio to their people. So fortunate, in fact have we been, that many citizens do not yet realize that there has been, is, and will continue to be a shortage of teachers until we make compensation and living conditions sufficiently attractive to retain competent teachers and

to induce others to train for the work. This we are not doing and the following facts secured by the State Board of Education of your own state ought to bring this forcibly to your minds and as Chairman Streeter says\*\* "Unless our public schools can be provided with competent teachers, we may as well voluntarily petition ourselves into educational bankruptcy. Schools and schoolhouses without teachers need no administration."

Statistics from 203 districts of the state show the average wage of their 788 teachers in mixed schools (like our own) to be \$532.00, this for 1919-20, not before the war. "Compare the foregoing wages paid the women to whom we entrust the care and development of the minds of our children during the tenderest years of educational growth with the average annual wages paid to women employees in the ordinary work of the largest cotton mill in this state for the years 1913 and 1919." In 1913 for a 58-hour week and in 1919 for a 48-hour week.

"You will note that they are now receiving almost twice as much as more than one third of our entire body of elementary school teachers." Girls in domestic service in New Hampshire are receiving, including board, \$760 to \$884 as an annual wage. Is it any wonder that teachers are "restless." You may complain that the outlay for your schools is large but it must be very plain that the outlay cannot be reduced by hiring "cheaper teachers." "There ain't no such animal."

I cannot close this report without paying tribute to your hardworking school board. Under the new law you have felt, perhaps, that their office was superfluous



but you can rest assured that if this year is a fair sample that they will more than earn their salaries.

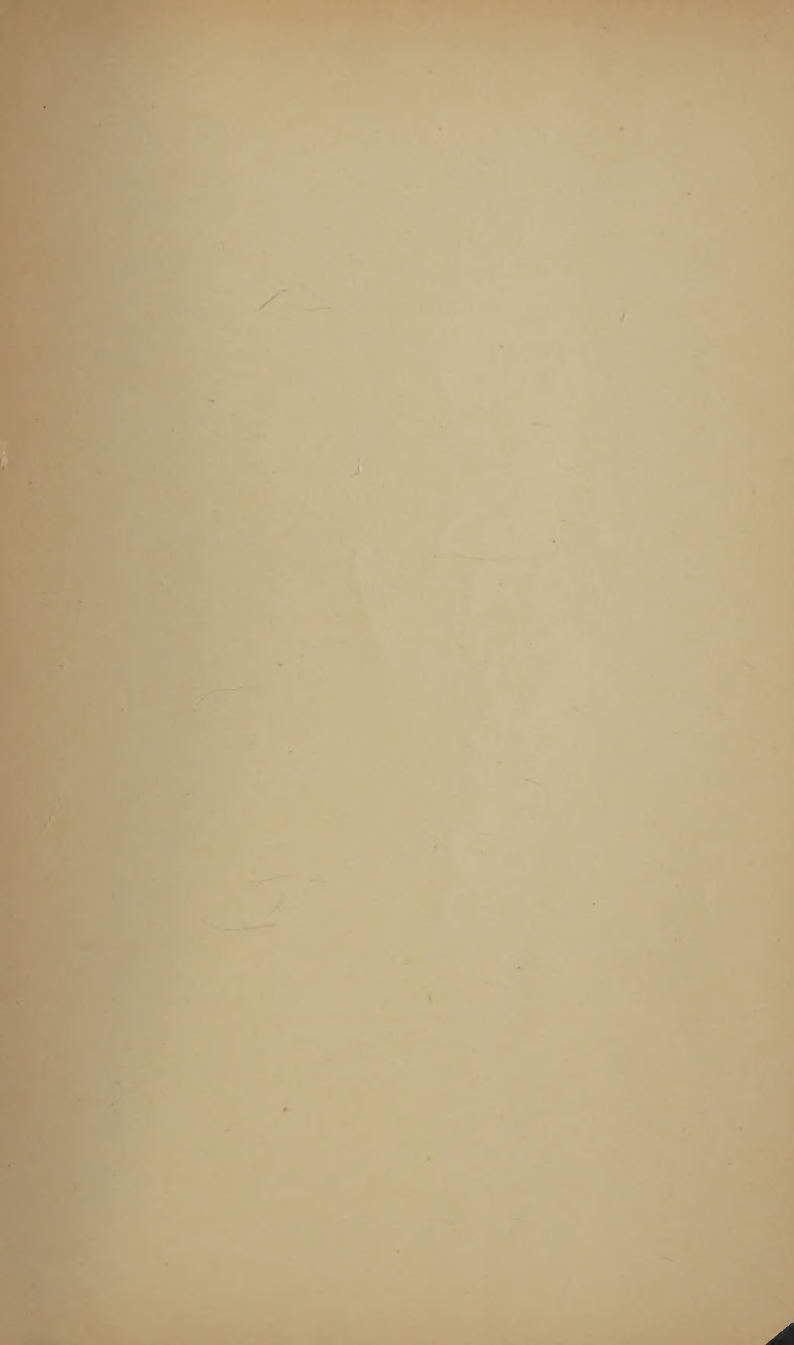
