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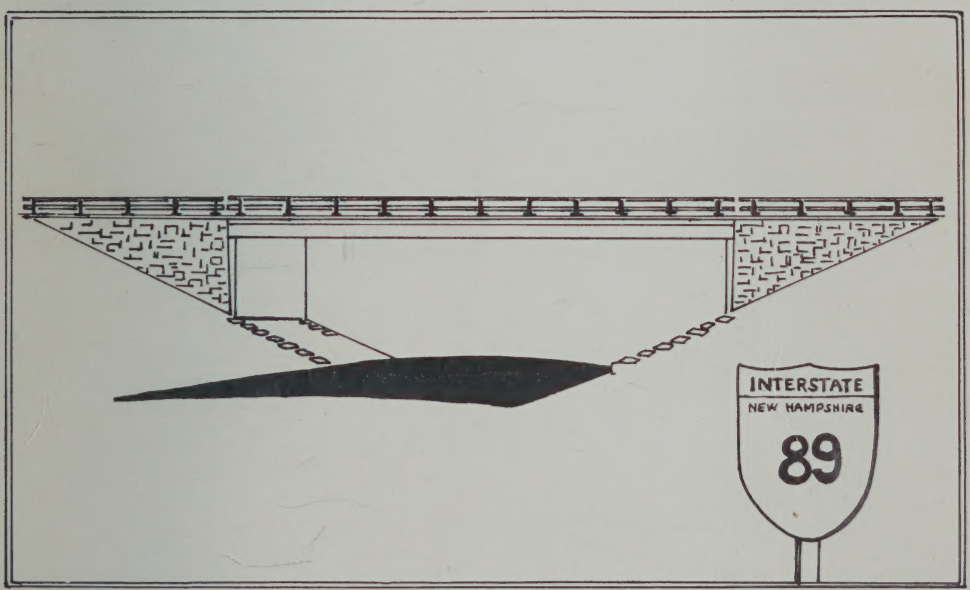

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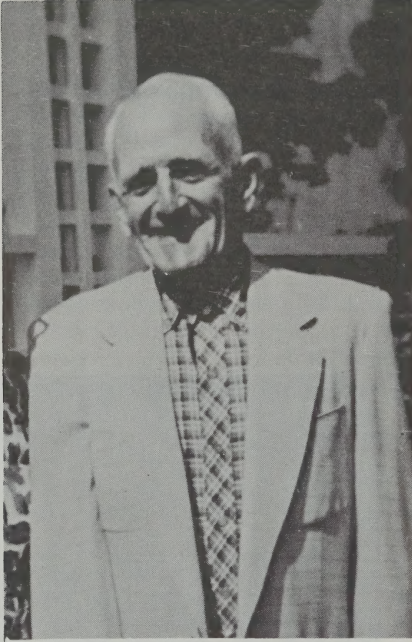

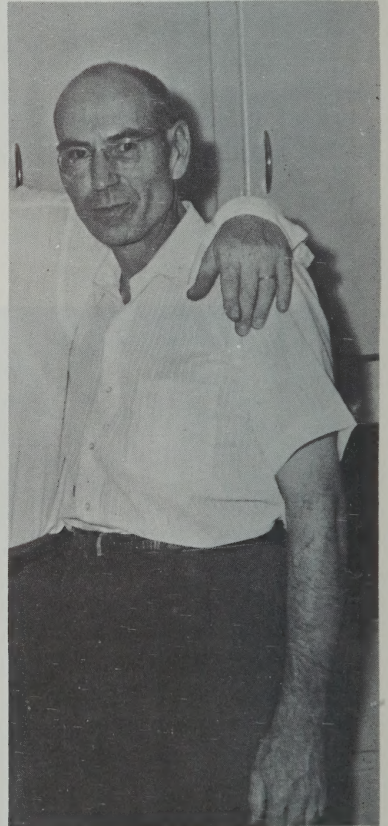

NOTES FROM THE SELECTMEN

The cover of our 1967 Town Report features a drawing of one of the bridges that overpasses Interstate 89. The question still unanswered, of what effect 89 will have on the development of New London, has been the topic of much discussion for several years. Now that it is completed to our Town, the next few years should give us an indication of what is to happen to our economy.

Much praise should be given to those involved in the construction not only of Route 89 but also the extension of Route 11 to the new interchange, in that there were no major accidents. With the many trucks and other large pieces of equipment involved, it was a prime concern. This year will see the completion through New London and then a return to normal on our highways.

One of the more controversial events was the decision of the Selectmen to discontinue the plowing of all private roads and driveways. We felt this time should be spent maintaining our roads for safe travel. A petition requesting a Special Town Meeting for a vote on this issue, was signed by several townspeople and presented to the Selectmen. A Town Meeting was held and it was voted to continue to plow driveways for a charge, after the town roads were plowed and sanded. This had not previously been done. It may be of interest to know that we were plowing approximately two hundred and forty (240) driveways before this year and now we have eight (8) to plow.

We established a graveyard for junk automobiles this year, and served notice on all known violators that they would have to dispose of such cars to comply with the law. Because of the early snows, everyone was granted a reprieve for the winter months.

This year the Selectmen of Sutton and New London perambulated the Sutton-New London town lines. This is an event that takes place every seven years by law.

Over four miles of new roads were accepted by the Selectmen after public hearings on the same. This is by far the greatest amount of highways accepted in any one year.

The Kearsarge Telephone Company began what we hope is to be a trend by utilities — burying the telephone cable down Pleasant and Main Streets to their new building. We are looking forward to the time when all utility lines on Main Street can be underground.

In the year 1967, we issued 73 building permits as follows:

- 29 new buildings
- 7 garages
- 5 miscellaneous
- 9 signs
- 19 additions and alterations
- 4 re-locations

Our permits for new buildings were down approximately 17% from 1966. It will be interesting to see what course this takes in 1968 with the availability of Interstate 89.

Although 1967 for New London was not too eventful, we are looking ahead to 1968 with great expectations. Interstate 89 will be completed through New London. The Master Plan that is being done by the Hans Klunder Associates of Hanover is expected to be completed. We should know of our school buildings program and last but not least, the New London sewer we hope will be improved in the amount of one hundred and ten thousand (\$110,000.00) dollars. Of this amount, forty thousand (40,000.00) dollars is to be a direct grant from the State of New Hampshire.

We wish at this time to thank all elected and appointed boards and officials who have given so fully of their time to help make New London a better place in which to live.

You are hereby notified to meet at the New London High School Auditorium in said New London on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, 1968, at three o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Note — By law, the Meeting must open before voting starts. Therefore, the Meeting and Polls will open at 3:00 P.M. for the consideration of Article 1.

At 3:30 the Meeting will recess but the Polls will remain open.

The Meeting will reconvene at 7:30 P.M.

Polls will close at 8:00 P.M.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. This sum to include:

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand (\$3,000) dollars for the study of a sewerage system in the Birch Acres and Seaman's Acres area.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand (\$3,000) dollars for the study of a sewerage system in the Elkins area.

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy thousand (\$70,000) dollars for the purpose of improving the New London Sewerage system, as directed by the State Water Pollution Commission; and to raise said sum by authorizing the Selectmen to borrow the same in the name of the Town by the issuance of serial notes or bonds, as provided in Chapter 72, Revised Laws, as amended, and for this purpose, to authorize the Selectmen to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest of such notes or bonds and to provide for the sale of the same; and to see if the Town will pay 25% of the yearly cost of the bond.

(Please be advised that the Town, in taking this action, is relying on the ultimate availability of the \$40,000 appropriated for the purpose by the 1965 Legislature pursuant to Chapter 235:1, Laws of 1965. Such reliance is based on the Commission's vote on January 12, 1968, to commit the \$40,000 if the Town acquired the necessary land for the pilot plant facilities. Very truly yours, Wesley B. 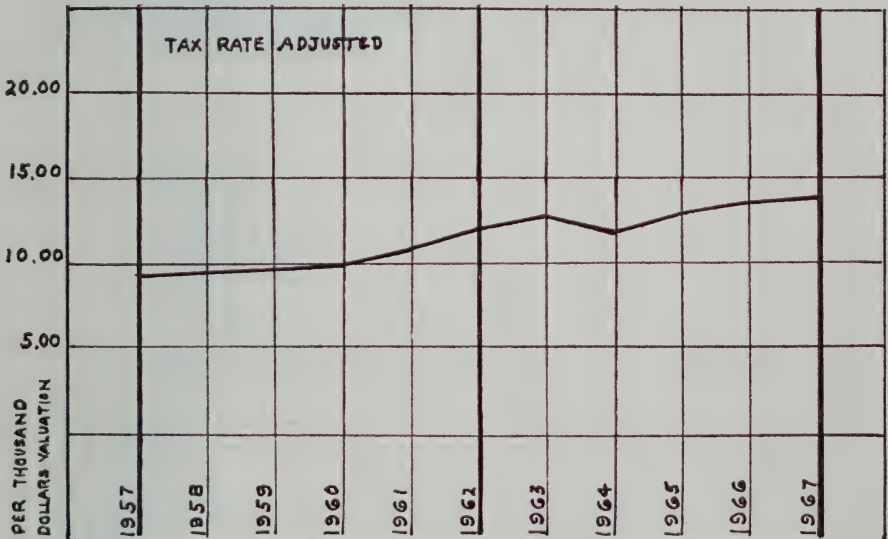
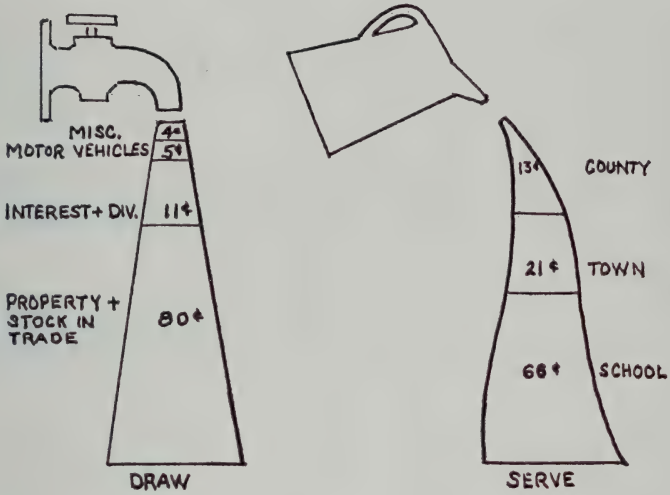

REPORT OF THE TRUST FUNDS OF THE TOWN OF NEW LONDON, N. H.

1967 was another year of steady income growth for the Town's Trust Funds. Income from Cemetery Funds increased by 4.95%, Library Funds by 5.15% and Miscellaneous Funds by 5.17%. We have maintained a slight edge over the continuing erosion of the purchasing power of the dollar.

It may be of interest to note that the income from our largest single Fund, the Jane A. Tracy Library Fund, created in 1951, has increased by 80% in the 16 years of its existence. In the past a conservatively invested trust has kept pace with the inroads in inflation. Whether this will prove to be true in the future only time will tell.

ANNUAL REPORT

This year, 1967, has seen several new plans and renovations developing at your library, which continues to be an active and diligent force in our community.

The circulation records have increased as follows:

Total number of visitors during 1967 was 10,281.

Our borrower's register has been increased, also, by the addition of 100 adults and 48 children. Many of these adults were summer visitors to our town.

To supplement our book stack and to answer special requests, we have borrowed: from the State Extension Service, 715 books, 5 magazines, 1 recording and 2 microfilm articles; on interlibrary loan, 2 books. We have answered special needs for information with 429 pamphlets, magazines and pictures.

The library has followed past procedures with the loan of 3,782 books to the New London Central School; 44 to Wilmot schools; 18 to a teacher taking a special children's literature course; 5 to the New London Baptist Church; 70 to the Kindergartens; 10 to Springfield School; 61 to Bardselle's Nursing Home, and 4 to Interlibrary loan.

In spite of increased cost of books, the library has purchased 221 adult books and 132 juvenile books. The discount given by the State Library cooperative buying classes has

been a real asset in this matter. We have received 2 gift shipments of recordings from the Columbia Record Company which are being processed for circulation to everyone. Our generous friends have presented 56 gift books to the library. All 51 magazines are ready to circulate from our reading room and 5 newspapers are read by our patrons each day, as well as the children's magazines.

The program of visiting the elementary grades each Monday has been followed through during the school year with more than 500 books loaned to the school children. These books act as supplementary reading for the younger grade pupils.

The library board and staff gratefully acknowledge the generous gift of the following books on gardening from the New London Garden Club: "Wildflowers in Color" by Stupka; "It's Your Community" by Raymore; "Familiar Trees of America" by Grimm, and "Garden Guide" by De La Mare. These books will be of interest and help to anyone planning a new garden or improving their present one. We appreciate the continuing interest of the Garden Club in keeping our gardens attractive.

The New London Service Organization has contributed 4 books to the military bookshelf this year: "Before the Colors Fade" by Ayer; "Corregidor, the saga of a Fortress" by Belote; "USS Mudskipper" by Hard, and "Currahee" by Burgett. This shelf of personal war reminiscence is well read and quite popular with men and older boys.

Special projects planned and carried out by the library board and staff have been: a large clock purchased and installed in the Children's Room--as there was none on the second floor and students had to come downstairs for the time; the garden fence next to Main Street has been given a fresh coat of aluminum paint; the outside street signs have been repainted; first and second leaf spraying has been done by Amalia Tree Surgeons in an attempt to save our remaining maples and elms, and the Garden Club has gone forward with

further landscaping of the eastern corner of the garden--for which the library is most grateful.

Special meetings held in the library have included the library board, Durabind Company, New London Service Organization, the Woman's Club, New London Grange Committee, Garden Club, Legion Auxiliary, Vacation Reading Club, Southwest Advisory Book Buying Class, and Library Week Committee.

In August the resignation of Mrs. Velma Champion as assistant librarian was accepted with regret by the Board of Trustees. Mrs. Champion has been a member of the library staff for more than 17 years. Mrs. Catherine Lambert replaced Mrs. Champion and is proving to be a most capable assistant.

National Library Week was observed in April with an exhibition, "The World in Stamps". The public was invited to attend Open House during the evening of the first day

Two most interesting displays, a crewel and needlework and to the main exhibit for the rest of the week.

exhibit by Mrs. Philip Parker and Mrs. Edward Todd, and oil paintings by Mrs. Dorothy Dey Howard, were shown during the summer months.

The Vacation Reading Club, directed by Mrs. Loring Grimes, was a resounding success through the months of July and August, with 40 children completing the course. Prizes and awards were presented to the winners at the annual party in August. The club was entertained by a real Abenaki Indian, Mr. Gerald Morin, of Nashua.

Children's National Book Week took place in November with the grade schools from Wilmot, Springfield and New London as special visitors. The library had more than 450 visitors during the week's display of new adult and children's books. The movie, "Beaver Valley" was shown to all.

In November, 20 librarians and trustees met at the library with the state consultants to examine and place orders for new books on display. Refreshments and coffee were served by the host library.

As the Christmas season approaches, our Christmas lights shine out inviting our friends and neighbors to come in and browse among our books.

MUNICIPAL COURT

During 1967 the New London Municipal Court heard 133 cases, 123 of these being misdemeanors, the remaining 10 being small claims. Total Court receipts were \$1,855.00. Of this amount, \$264.00 was paid over to the State of New Hampshire; \$88.25 was disbursed for Court expense; and \$1,493.30 was paid to the Town Treasurer. The volume of Court business was significantly larger in 1967 than in the previous year.

It has always been the desire of the New London Municipal Court to manifest a sense of individual consideration for

each case that comes before it. Without this effort, justice in the end will be defeated. A recent editorial in the *New York Times* criticized court procedures of that city in these words: "Hundreds of cases are rushed through with machine-gun speed." This is not the practice in the New London Court. Each case is treated on its merits; time is given to the accused person to plead in any way he desires; and, in accordance with present practice in the United States, an offer of legal assistance is made.

In 1967 there were several special sessions of the Court held at non-scheduled hours, to meet the needs of those who could not come at the regular time; and a number of out-of-state defendants, who wished to plead guilty, were permitted to do so, and to pay their fines by mail. Many letters from persons brought before the Court have indicated their appreciation of our police officers and their prevailing courtesy in issuing summons or making arrests.

It is believed that there is need of a municipal court here in New London, and, as the community grows, every effort will be made to have the Court grow with it.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

With the addition of the third full-time officer last year, we have better coverage, and have been able to more efficiently handle all matters that come to our attention. The most pronounced difference is apparent in the number of motor vehicle stops made during the year from January 1, 1967 through December 31, 1967.

This department stopped 619 vehicles, 340 more than

1966; your department covered 34 accidents, 19 more than 1966; assisted other departments 23 times, 9 more than 1966; participated in 13 try and locates, 6 more than 1966.

In addition we aided 66 persons this past year in many categories from giving directions to locating people vacationing in this area. These did not include the weddings and funerals at which we were asked to assist.

We also have a door property check program in which 4,878 pieces of property were checked and 82 places found open.

Your department averages 591 hours worked per month with the special officers assisting with 197 hours this past year. Special officers are used for such activities as Hospital Day, the Memorial Day parade and other events where the use of the regular officer would deprive the town of his normal duties or to supplement the regular officer on those details where a greater than normal need for control is required.

This past year your department attended seminars at St. Anslems College in Manchester on the following subjects: Search and Seizure, Law and the Drug Problem, Recent N. H. Legislature primarily Burglary-Immunity and Perjury and Organized Crime.

In cooperation with the school we had a representative of the Federal Drug Abuse Agency talk to interested persons on the more prevalent drugs now being used illegally.

Again, I wish to extend much thanks for the assistance of the other departments as the Office of the Selectmen, Civil Defense, Fire Department and to the residents of New London who have helped us with their suggestions, and particularly to the alert couple whose early notice enabled the police to apprehend four subjects who had entered a building illegally and who were stopped on their way out of the state.

5. Be sure matches and smoking material are dead out when we discard them.
6. Set a good example for others in fire prevention.

EMERGENCY INFORMATION FROM NEW HAMPSHIRE CIVIL DEFENSE:

"During a period of growing international tension, all normal methods of communication — such as newspapers, radio, television, publications — will be used to get civil defense information to the people.

"In a civil defense emergency, tune your AM

radio to a station in or close to New London that is broadcasting information on the emergency situation.”

Your local emergency information for New London will come over nearby radio stations.

REPORT OF THE TOWN HEALTH OFFICER

Although it has been many years since most of us have seen a red quarantine card tacked on a house, and we no longer live in fear of premature death from such diseases as smallpox, diphtheria, polio, etc.; nevertheless, there are diseases yet to be conquered and still much to be done by each of us individually, by the community, and by the State and Federal Governments in our efforts to control those diseases still menacing society.

What, then, can be done to protect us from disease and to promote a healthful environment in our town? As individuals, we can protect ourselves and the community by immunization of our children and booster doses for all of us at recommended intervals. We should avail ourselves of the free T.B. prevention tests and X-rays and the special immunization clinics. (When was the last time you had a diphtheria booster, a tetanus booster or a T.B. test?) We can protect our pets and our community by having our dogs immunized against rabies and booster doses at least every three years in accordance with town and state laws. We can keep typhoid fever, dysentery, and infectious hepatitis organisms out of our lakes and streams by maintaining efficient septic systems and an adequate sewerage system. The use

of soap instead of detergents will help to keep our drainage fields efficient and our surface waters free of foam and chemical residue. We can support local and state programs designed to promote a pleasant and healthful environment. We can support this action now while it's preventive instead of later when it becomes restorative.

POLLUTION CONTROL PROGRAM REPORT:

Since 1962 the water testing program has been developing to include most streams, brooks, and lakes in the town. During this time there has been a slightly increasing overall coliform count average in Little Lake Sunapee and Pleasant Lake. The August 1962 averages from 12 sampling points on each lake were as follows: Little Lake Sunapee 3, Pleasant Lake 4.75. In August 1967 these had risen to 20 and 21 respectively, on the two lakes. Lake Sunapee bordering on New London during the same period decreased from 13 to 7, although the whole lake was experiencing an increasing average count. All these counts place our lakes (including Messer Pond with a 1967 average of 15) well within the 50 coliform organisms per 100 ml., Class A water category. During the 1967 survey, a specific source of pollution was found to be contributing to each of Little Lake Sunapee and Pleasant Lake. Individuals involved have been informed and the situations remedied.

The presence of foam on Pleasant Lake last August was thoroughly investigated and no indication of detergent was determined. Unusual wind conditions together with normal organic contents of the water were implicated.

Within the limits of budgetary allowances, it is planned to continue and extend the testing program in 1968.

The new State law requiring all septic systems being built or rebuilt within 1,000 feet of any surface water including brooks to have plans and specifications together with percolation test results, submitted to the State of New Hamp-

shire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, should do much to protect our waters from future pollution.

With the present near-volunteer status of most town officers it is impossible for your health officer to inspect the whole town. However, any suspected areas of pollution will be investigated on notification to me. Your help is needed.

INFORMATION BOOTH

The New London Information Booth was open from July 8th to September 2nd, making a total of eight weeks and one day. Mrs. Harold Messer opened on July 8th and continued full time until July 28th, when Mrs. Oscar Colburn agreed to take charge of the booth.

The hours were from nine to five, six days a week. Mrs. Colburn worked from 9 A.M. to 1 P.M. Miss Hilda Carpenter assisted at the booth five days a week from 1 P.M. to 5 P.M. Mrs. Lucy Brook substituted on Saturday afternoons. Mrs. Colburn sent weekly reports to the State Division of Economic Development.

Our visitors were from 30 states, the District of Columbia and 3 Canadian Provinces. We also had visitors from England and Scotland.

We had many inquiries for camping grounds and some scientists from Gordon Research at Colby Junior College, camped out with their families. We listed 1,081 cars with 2,657 passengers. There were 426 pedestrians, 3 motor bikes, and 58 phone calls. I believe the decrease in number of cars

was due to Expo '67, as New London was not on the main route to Montreal. We also believe families with children are camping out more and more as we noticed many, many cars had only two passengers.

The Nature Trail Program proved to be very popular. People were interested in the history of New London and we had many requests for a map of the town showing streets, etc. The map of Sunapee Lake Area was much in demand.

We found working at the Information Booth interesting and people are most courteous and happy as they receive assistance. It certainly presents a challenge and taxes one's ingenuity, but it was very enjoyable.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Last year's Town Report stated that negotiations were in progress to acquire the development rights to the Morgan Pasture property in the northern part of town. We are pleased to report that this transaction has been completed and that approximately 685 acres along the Wilmot town line are now dedicated to conservation.

The Town had previously acquired a small piece of land on Pleasant Street separating the commercial and residential areas. This parcel along with the Morgan Pasture land constitute the extent of land held by the Town as part of our conservation program. Other areas however, are being studied in order to preserve a reasonable amount of undeveloped land for the use of this as well as future generations. We have been working with Hans Klunder Associates in connec-

tion with their study of the Town and feel that the completion of the Master Plan will better show the needs of good conservation. Mr. Klunder has a good understanding of conservation and we are sure that the plan will be worth while.

We look forward in 1968 to a greater interest on the part of the townspeople in the furtherance of conservation within our boundaries.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

During the year 1967, the Board has been actively in three principal concerns: subdivision proposals, changes in Land Subdivision Control Regulations, and the Master Plan study. In addition, the Board has handled several minor matters and engaged in conferences with town and state officials regarding matters of interest to zoning and planning. A special concern has been the problem of sewage disposal.

With respect to subdivisions, the Board has considered fourteen different proposals. Seven of these involved subdivisions of three lots or less. Of these, the Board granted final approval to subdivisions proposed by Cristine Cricenti, Carl Duffett, Johnson-Magoon, Harold Messer and E. J. Poor. The Board denied temporary approval to the proposed subdivision of Loring Grimes and denied final approval to that of M. R. M. Dale (January 22, 1968). The Board also received seven proposals involving subdivisions of more than three lots and granted final approval to those submitted by

Henry Homan, Sr., Gerald Prescott, two by Slope 'n Shore (Phase III and amended Phase II), and Henry Stanley. The Board also granted temporary approval to the proposal of Elmer Buzzell, but the petitioner proceeded no further. Again, Mr. Gail Smith withdrew his proposal after consideration by the Board. In all, the Board has approved 58 lots in 1967.

With respect to Land Subdivision Control Regulations, the Board proposed and adopted amendments to Sections 4-A and 4-D, effective July 1, 1967. The amendment to 4-A effectively brought all subdivisions of land under the supervision of the Board. The amendment to 4-D corrected a troublesome loophole in the regulations which in the past had caused considerable misinterpretation. Basically both amendments updated New London's regulations to conform with State statutes.

By a vote of 73 to 61 on an amendment to Article 11 at the 1967 Town Meeting, the Town instructed its Planning Board not to seek federal funds for a Master Plan but to utilize the entire \$9,000 appropriated in direct contract with a professional planner. Pursuant to this vote, the Board engaged Hans Klunder & Associates to draw up a proposal for services within the limit of the appropriated funds. In June, 1967, the Board signed a contract for \$8,700 with the aforementioned firm. In order to gain additional services, the Board, largely by means of volunteer help, conducted the population profile at a saving of several hundred dollars. This task has now been completed. Present expectations are that a proposal for a Master Plan will be ready this fall for consideration by the voters.

As a final note, the Board has enjoyed a stability among its members despite a heavy work load. With only one resignation, because of leaving the town, it has been possible to define the work load in such a way as to maintain a reasonable level of efficiency.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment held open hearings on the following appeals:

On March 28, 1967, William Faccone asked for a variance to Article VI, Section A, of the Zoning Ordinance. He asked to use County Road, rather than Newport Road, for the entrance and exit to his store. His request was granted.

On April 20th, Stanley Wenmark requested a special exception to Article VI, Section A. He asked to convert the barn on his property on Seamans Road into a private dwelling. His request was granted.

On May 2nd, Arthur S. Little, Jr., agent for the Kearsarge Telephone Company, requested a variance to Article III, Section D. He wanted permission to place a sign on the telephone building on Main Street which would be larger than the size allowed by the Zoning Ordinance. His request was denied.

Hearings were held on May 23rd, and June 29th, for the contractors who are constructing I89 and the new intersection of Routes 11 and 114. They asked for a variance to Article III, Section C, in order to maintain field offices in trailers. Permission was granted. These trailers are at the intersections of I89 and King Hill Road, Bog Road, County Road and Route 11. They are temporary and will be removed as soon as the road is completed.

On May 23rd, Carlton Bradford asked for a variance to Article V, Section F. He wanted to build a garage closer to his front lot line than the required footage. The variance was denied.

On May 23rd, Lena Peck asked for a special exception to Article IX, Section C. She asked to make a fourth apartment unit in her house on Seaman's Road. The special ex-

ception was granted.

On May 29th, Emily Magoon and Edward Johnson requested a variance to Article IV, Section B. They wanted permission to divide their land on Lake Sunapee (286 frontage on the lake) into two lots with 143' frontage on the lake. This was granted with the provision that all other requirements of the Land Subdivision Control Regulations be met.

On June 29th, Arthur and Ruth Prescott asked for a special exception to Article IX, Section C. They proposed to build motel units at the Gray House on Crockett's Corner. Because there were no site plans, and because of the residential growth in this area, the exception was denied.

On August 3rd, Christian Bottinger, agent for Camp Wallula, Inc., requested a special exception to Article IX, Section C. He wished to add one room to one of his house-keeping cottages at Little Lake Sunapee. The request was granted.

On October 26th, William F. Kidder requested a permit to build a storage building on Pleasant Street. Because this building would be Commercial and on Rural-Agricultural land, he also asked for a special exception to Article IX, Sections B and E. His request was granted, with the provision that it conform to the lot lines of the rural-agricultural zone.

On November 4th, Richard E. Mann, Jr., agent for Slope 'n Shore, Inc., asked for a special exception to Article IX, Section C. He wanted to enlarge the exterior of his kitchen in order to put in a fire wall between the main building and the cooking units. This property is on Pleasant Street. The exception was granted.

On January 5, 1968, Alma and Frank Cutler asked for a variance to Article IV, Section B. The Cutlers wanted to change the lot lines of two lots on Lamson Lane. The appeal was granted.

On January 5th, William and Anna Greene asked for a special exception to Article IX, Section D. They wanted permission to have a license for a junk yard, in order to keep several old cars on their property. The land is on Columbus Avenue and Burpee Hill Road. The request was denied.

ANNUAL REPORT

September 31, 1967, completed the 49th year of the New London Hospital and the 9th year in its present location. As we are now in our 50th year, a 50th Anniversary Year Committee, with Dr. J. Duane Squires as Chairman, has planned a number of events to be held during the year to make the public more aware of the Hospital and its history.

The Administrator, Mrs. Rachel Sargent, reported that occupancy of the Hospital was higher than ever before and the laboratory and the X-ray departments both showed increased service.

A memorial resolution to Eliot B. Foote, long-time director and former president, was incorporated in our records. Mrs. Henry Lyons' loss to the Board as a Summer Residents Representative will also be great and was so noted.

The Colby Junior College third year students, with their advisor Miss Irving, attended our April meeting which included a tour of the B. J. Baker Memorial Laboratory which they help support.

Salary increases which put us at the average pay schedule in New Hampshire for nurses, technicians, administration, housekeeping, etc., were made retroactive to March 1, 1967. Also a tax sheltered pension plan was instituted with the Hospital and the employee contributing.

Our annual Hospital Day was most successful under the chairmanship of James D. Brown, with Austin Gibson as Assistant Chairman. The Hospital is very grateful to Mr. Brown and all who worked to make this our greatest Hospital Day with a net of \$19,554.00.

The Summer Residents Committee had a successful solicitation of their membership and many tickets were sold for the Bride Doll, reported Mrs. Deland. Equipment to be bought with this money includes a Coleman Spectrophotometer, a planimeter, a pulmonary function recorder and a reserve fund for an image intensifier for the X-ray machine.

The Hospital sold land on the corner of Newport Road and County Road, next to the New London Medical Center, to William Faccone and he has built a Drug Store.

NEW LONDON GARDEN CLUB REPORT

The New London Garden Club, organized in October, 1928, "to stimulate the knowledge and love of gardening, to aid in the protection and perpetuation of desirable native plants and birds, to further civic beautification and improvement, and to cooperate with other agencies interested in these objectives," has been in operation for the last 40 years and has grown to a full complement of 125 members. This is our first report to the Town of New London

Routine community-service-type activities include the care of hospital patients' flowers; operation of a flower booth on Hospital Day for the benefit of the Hospital; sponsorship of scholarships to Conservation Camp at Bear Brook, New Hampshire; a junior gardening program; and making and contributing Christmas decorations for all public buildings.

Approximately ten years ago club members became increasingly aware of a need to create more widespread interest in the overall appearance of the town. Limited funds made it necessary to complete one project at a time.

The initial endeavor resulted in foundation plantings at the Town Hall, followed the next year by landscaping around the Central School (a joint effort with school officials and funds). The Library, next in line, involved major expenditures and was accomplished in three summers. The overgrown existing shrubbery was replaced with appropriate full-size specimens.

Club members then took the initiative in enlisting the interest of the Selectmen — and Town funds to share the cost — so that Bucklin Beach could be landscaped in a manner that eventually will afford more privacy for the bathers.

After the Historical Society moved the Scytheville House to its present location, it was possible for the Club to make arrangements and pay the expenses for surfacing, conditioning, planting grass seed around the building, and re-laying

the stone wall. The actual work was done by the Town highway department.

The Information Booth was moved to its present location and the plantings around it likewise were supervised by members and paid for from Garden Club funds.

During all the years the Club has sponsored and members have maintained projects such as the King Ridge Nature Trail, Elkins Park, Norris Corner, and Crockett's Corner.

With the assistance of the State Planning and Development Commission, the Crockett's Corner project assumed a new dimension last summer. Following completion of the intersection and relocation of the memorial boulder, the Club authorized extension of the landscaping to include 11 andorra compacta junipers with a heavy bark mulch. It has enhanced the approach to New London, and it is expected that the beauty and significance of the area will increase with the passing years. It is hoped that it will inspire future civic-minded citizens to create similar areas within the town.

Our constant plea is for the exertion of every influence to ascertain that each new area developed create a charm of its own. Garden Club landscape personnel are ready and willing to be of assistance, and it will inure to the benefit of the entire community to preserve our New England rural atmosphere which is still one of our most valuable assets.

Although it tells only part of the story, all this adds up to a constructive, comprehensive effort to fulfill the purpose established by our predecessors 40 years ago.
