REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES.

The trustees of the Pittsfield Public Library respectfully submit this their annual report for the year ending February 15, 1912:

The general work of the library has continued through the year much in the same manner as in previous years.

It is a pleasure to note that there has been no less interest on the part of the general public to avail of the privileges of the institution. If the record of circulation is to be taken as evidence thereof, it has increased.

The withdrawals of books for 1911 was 16,002, being 1,034 more books than was ever withdrawn in any one year.

The largest circulation for one month was in March, with a record of withdrawals of 1,607 volumes.

The largest withdrawals for one day was on Saturday, March 18, when 200 books were loaned.

The average daily circulation for the 153 days the library was open was 104+.

ACCESSION OF BOOKS.

Three hundred and twenty-two have been added by purchase, exchange and gifts. Ten books were exchanged for an equal number with Epsom library, forty-two were donated, and the remainder were purchased from town appropriation, and with funds contributed by those interested in the library.

The following indicates the donors: F. D. Osgood, Arthur Towle, Mrs. G. F. Mitchell, A. E. Atwood, Mrs.

F. D. Clough, D. M. Niles, John Sweet, State of New Hampshire, and Funk & Wagnal Co.

The official management hereby express their thanks to the above persons and to those who have contributed money for the purchase of books.

BORROWING BOOKS.

Attention is again called to the opportunity for any person to obtain books that are not to be found on the shelves of the institution. On request to the librarian or assistant for such books an effort will be promptly made to borrow them from a larger library if patrons so desire and are willing to bear the small expense of postage or express charges. Teachers and pupils of the public schools are exempt from the above charges, as such are paid from school funds.

Sixty books have been borrowed during the past year. They were obtained from the State Library, public library of Concord and the public library of the city of Boston, Mass.

It is a privilege that brings the resources of the larger libraries within the reach of all at a trifling expense, and it is hoped that a still more general use of the privilege may be made.

MAGAZINES.

The use of magazines and periodicals is a very important addition to the literature of the library both for reference work and general reading. One thousand and eleven unbound magazines were loaned and more than one hundred in bound form.

Some changes have been made in the list for the present year and the following will be found upon the reading tables:

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board of Pittsfield:

I have the privilege of submitting to you, and through you to the citizens of Pittsfield, my second annual report. This is the eleventh in the series of similar reports. In this report I shall briefly review the school year and shall make certain suggestions which I hope may be thought worthy of further consideration.

School work, like work of any kind that aims to be progressive, has not only its encouraging features but also its discouraging features; it has its ups and it has its downs. Progress is never a steady movement forward. A moment's thought will convince us of the futility of expecting this. However, I am very sure that we may truthfully say that the resultant of the ups and downs of the past year has been an upward movement.

But one change has taken place in the teaching force in the village schools. At the opening of the school year in September, Miss Grace E. Marden, of Short Falls, succeeded Miss Iva Fletcher at the grammar building, grades 3 and 4. Miss Marden is a graduate of Plymouth Normal School and has had successful experience in Wolfboro, Dover, and elsewhere. She has already proved herself efficient and well adapted to the work here with us.

At Jenness Pond, Miss Carlotta Huse, of Barnstead, taught the spring term and was succeeded in the fall by Miss Caroline W. Ryan, of Ashburnham, Mass. This school continues small. At present there are five enrolled. A really live and efficient school is hardly possible with numbers so few. Plans were made in the fall to transport these children some two miles and a half to

Northwood Narrows, but the arrangement not proving satisfactory to those immediately concerned the scheme was abandoned.

Miss Ruth Edmands resigned in June at Upper City after two years of successful service, and was succeeded by Miss Rachel Osborne, who was a member of last year's graduating class at our high school. Miss Osborne has taken hold of the work courageously and with determination, and has done exceptionally well for an inexperienced teacher:

The obtaining and the retaining of an efficient corps of teachers are no easy problems even for the larger places with means less limited. The skilled workmen are always in demand, whatever the line of work. We are necessarily paying larger salaries than we were two years ago. However, I am of the opinion that our teachers will compare favorably in efficiency, earnestness of purpose, and character, with those in places much larger.

The plan adopted last year of transporting the children from South Pittsfield to the village schools has been continued. From an educational standpoint there can be no question as to the wisdom of the present arrangement. The educational advantages which can be offered these children at the village are vastly superior to what could be given them in a small mixed school of eight or nine. Mere numbers breed enthusiasm and spirit. The small mixed school of to-day can seldom have that wholesome rivalry which I suspect was one of the glories and virtues of the country school of fifty years ago with its enrollment of sixty or seventy pupils.

Our attendance has improved over last year in point of regularity. The per cent. of attendance is high. There have been, however, many more tardinesses than would seem at all necessary. Among other things the schools ought to help inculcate habits of punctuality and promptness. I dare say that to many a parent for a child to be

“just a little late” seems a very small matter and not worth making a fuss about. In itself it is a small matter. But for a child to form a habit which will be a hindrance to him through life is a large and serious matter.

The enrollment of pupils shows no material change in numbers from last year. February 1 the enrollment by buildings was as follows: High, 57; Memorial, 81; Grammar, 153; Brick, 26; Upper City, 12; Jenness Pond, 5; total, 334. No room is now overcrowded. The enrollment by grades in the village schools is as follows: I, 47; II, 53; III, 23; IV, 35; V, 20; VI, 30; VII, 21; VIII, 29. A study of these figures shows that of the 258 pupils in the grades 100, or nearly 40 per cent., are in Grades I and II. This is, perhaps, not an exceptional condition. Experience shows that the greatest retardation of pupils comes in the first grades. There are several reasons for this. During the first year or two of school life children attend much less regularly than later. It is not an uncommon thing for children to be kept out for weeks at a time or even for a whole term. Naturally they are unable to do the year's work and are left behind. Again some children are slow in adjusting themselves to the entirely novel conditions of the schoolroom. It often takes a good part of a year to get started. The result is they are behind at the end of the year. This condition is improved very much by the kindergarten. We admit children to the first grade at the age of six. If we had a kindergarten that they could enter at five I believe we should have very much less retardation in Grade I.

The abnormally large number in our second grade is in part due to the fact that very few promotions were made from the first grade in June, 1910. This last June a very much better showing was made.

Seventeen pupils successfully completed the work of the eighth grade in June and were entitled to admission to the

high school. Of this number thirteen entered our high school, two entered New Hampton, and two dropped out of school life entirely. Eighty-eight per cent. of those completing the grammar school course entered a high school. The notion is more or less prevalent that there is a large dropping out of pupils between the grammar school and the high school. Such is certainly not the case with us, for last year was no exception. A study of what data we have seems to indicate that a very much larger number drop out from the fourth to the sixth grade than at the end of the eighth grade, and that if we can keep boys and girls in school through the sixth grade there is a strong likelihood of their entering the high school. The problem of holding them through the course is a serious one. Statistics show that considerably less than 40 per cent. of those that enter remain to complete the course.

The numbers in the high school are practically the same as last year. At this writing there are 20 freshmen, 14 sophomores, 16 juniors, 3 seniors, and 1 post-graduate, a total of 57. The present freshman class is exceptional in that fourteen of its twenty members are boys. This class was well fitted and ought to give a good account of itself.

In my last report I spoke of the need of a set of encyclopedia for this school. This need has been met by the purchase of a set of the New International. This school now has a good equipment of reference books and a good assortment of books of history and general literature.

Principal Smith has arranged for a series of talks to be given to the school on live, practical subjects by representative citizens. Talks have already been given by Mr. E. A. Lane and Rev. Mr. Getchell. Others will follow. The plan is a practical one and ought to prove helpful. Whatever we can do to bring into closer relations the school and the everyday, practical life of the community should be mutually helpful.

An attempt is being made by the English department of Dartmouth College to arouse an interest in debating among the secondary schools of New Hampshire. A debating league of sixteen high schools has been formed. The Pittsfield High School has joined this league. On the evening of March 1 a team of three—namely, Carl Brandt, Martin Sanborn and John Chesley—representing our school, will debate with a similar team representing the Franklin High School on the question of the advisability of equal suffrage for women in this state. The debate will be held at Franklin. Before this report is read the result of the debate will be known. Whatever the outcome it will be a good experience for the boys.

There is a well-defined tendency in New Hampshire and elsewhere to introduce into the high school so-called practical courses. There has been a feeling more or less widespread that the boys and girls were not getting everything out of their high school courses that might rightfully be expected, that many of the subjects of study were not of a practical nature and were not of service in fitting boys and girls for the real work of life. Twenty years ago were introduced the commercial courses. We now have courses in domestic science, including sewing, cooking, and general housekeeping, courses in mechanic arts, in agriculture, etc. These courses have been introduced to meet a persistent demand and what was thought to be a real need. I have already noted the fact that not nearly half of those who enter our high school complete the course. I venture to raise the question whether it is possible or feasible to enrich the courses offered along practical lines, without in any sense making a radical move.

The general routine work of the schoolroom has been carried on with a reasonable degree of success. I feel that we have not marked time but have made actual progress. We are giving more time to reading in the

lower grades and getting very much better results. Particularly good work is being done in the first and second grades. We have been working with our new system of penmanship with encouraging results.

Memorial Day and Health Day were observed in the schools by special exercises. On the latter day Dr. Carr very kindly spoke to the children of the Memorial and Grammar schools, and Dr. Johnson and Frank S. Jenkins, representing the board of health, spoke at the high school. It is certainly the function of the school to emphasize in every way possible the value of good health and to teach "by precept and example" how it may be obtained and retained. In this connection I would suggest the need of equipping the schools with sanitary drinking appliances to displace the decidedly unsanitary common drinking cup which is now in general use except in the corridor of the Memorial building.

The relation between good health and progress in school is generally recognized. The child who has adenoid growths, or defective hearing, or defective sight, is handicapped. Very much of the retardation in school is due to such conditions. It very often happens that the defect is unknown to the parent. The excellent work which is being done in many places through school medical inspection in discovering and remedying such defects is generally known. I believe we have conditions here which could be greatly benefited if we had some simple form of medical inspection.

A year ago I suggested the need of manual training in our schools. I desire again to emphasize that need. I believe it to be the great need. The educative as well as practical value of manual training has been proved beyond a doubt. I will not again discuss the advantages to the boys if they could spend a couple of hours a week in manual work properly directed. I think they are manifest to us all. Certainly the girls could spend an hour a

week in no more practical or profitable way than in learning to sew. Some one may object with the statement that the home ought to do this. I suspect that the home ought to do many things that it does not. It may be that it ought to teach the girls to be proficient with the needle, as a matter of fact it does not, as a rule. I believe it perfectly feasible to make a modest beginning next year in this special work and without any considerable expenditure.

It has often been said that in order to have ideal schools we must have ideal parents, ideal children, ideal teachers, an ideal superintendent, and ideal equipment and physical conditions. I do not presume that all or any of these ideals have or can become realities. However, it is the business of us all to see to it that everything possible is done which will help to bring us nearer these ideals.

SCHOOL REPORT.

To the School District of Pittsfield:

The following report of the expenditures of the school board for the year ending February 15, 1912, is hereby submitted:

The appropriation made at our last meeting was \$7,050, \$450 less than the appropriation the year before. We, nevertheless, have felt obliged to make many needed repairs at our schoolhouses, especially at the Grammar School building. In room No. 3, taught by Mrs. Ada E. Clark, we have installed forty-eight new adjustable desks and seats at a cost of \$188; these desks and seats are similar to those in Memorial building; this was necessary on account of the removal of the seventh and eighth grades to that building.

New slate blackboards have supplanted many of the old worn and out of date wooden boards at the grammar and brick primary, costing about \$111.

We have put on a steel ceiling in room No. 4 at an expense of one hundred and four dollars, and it will be soon necessary to treat the ceilings of the other three rooms in like manner.

The interior of the building has been thoroughly cleaned. Varnished walls and ceilings murescoed and whitened at a cost of nearly two hundred and fifty dollars. About forty dollars expended in plumbing and repairs in the basements.

At the Memorial building painting and repairs have cost forty dollars.

At the brick primary the room has been papered, painted and curtained; also a new stove has been purchased, the whole costing about forty-three dollars. There should be a door cut through the end of the building con-

necting the schoolroom with the shed to allow the scholars access in cold or stormy weather. It is also hoped that our board of selectmen will put in a sewer this spring and connect it with the schoolhouse.

The schoolhouses at the Upper City and at Jenness Pond will need repairing this coming season.

A suitable and substantial wire fence to place between the Memorial building lot and land of Mrs. Nellie Lougee, has been purchased and will be placed in position as soon as the ground will permit.

Schools have been in session at the Upper City and also at Jenness Pond the past year. There being no school at South Pittsfield, it has been necessary to furnish transportation to the children of that district to our village school. This has cost two hundred and ninety-one dollars, or an average of eight dollars and fifty-six cents per week. This amount would hire a good teacher at seven dollars per week and the balance would nearly if not quite pay the expenses of heating and repairing the schoolhouse. We have also been obliged to pay the janitors of our rural schools increased wages. Transportation rates are higher, so that we have paid for transportation alone five hundred and fifty-six dollars. The salaries of two of our teachers have been increased.

I have called your attention to the repairs which are needed this coming year. We have one more note of five hundred dollars and interest to be paid this year.

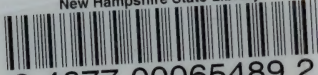
