



WARRANT.

State of New Hampshire.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Rumney, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

3. To choose a delegate to the Constitutional Convention, to be held in June, 1918.

4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways, in addition to the amount required by law.

5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the public library.

6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the common.

7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

8. To see if the town will vote to have the inventory blanks distributed at the time of taking the appraisal of property.

9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to secure State Aid for construction of State Aid road.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to secure State Aid for maintenance of State Aid road.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$982.50 to secure from the state \$1,473.75, for trunk line construction.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400.00 to secure from the state \$400.00 for Trunk Line maintenance.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum necessary to receive Federal and State Aid in preventing the spread of the disease known as white pine blister rust.

15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the road agent, or selectmen, to buy a new road machine and snow roller, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be expended by the Cemetery Association, for the care of the cemeteries in town.

17. To see if the town will vote to instruct the road agent to provide shelter for road machine and rollers.

18. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

19. To see what action the town will take in regard to money raised in 1917 for Old Home Day.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to aid in Red Cross work.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

The school report this year will differ from that of previous reports, as the Session Laws of 1917, Chap. 122, Sec. 1, states: "The fiscal year of town and special districts beginning Feb. 16, 1917, shall end August 31, 1918, and thereafter the fiscal and the scholastic year shall end August 31, annually", hence, the annual financial report of 1917-1918 will be in the Town Report of 1919, as the school year does not close until August 31, 1918, and it cannot be made before that date.

For the school year ending July 15, 1917, the percentage of attendance was .97 plus, for which we drew from the state the sum of \$170.00. It pays to see that our children attend school every day.

The year's work has been according to the N. H. Program, with necessary modifications.

We have been exceedingly fortunate in retaining the same teachers throughout the year, who by their untiring efforts have maintained a high standard of work in our schools.

Fourteen pupils from Rumney are attending Plymouth High school and one pupil attending N. H. L. I. Of the twenty pupils who were graduated last June, from the eighth grade, eight entered the High school with an average passing mark of 80 per cent., several receiving a passing mark of 90 per cent., which speaks well of our Rumney schools.

The Quincy school house has been shingled and needed repairs made on all the school buildings.

There should be a new furnace installed in the Depot school house, as the one there now is beyond re-

pair.

The cost of transporting pupils from Stinson Lake District was so expensive it was thought advisable to have a school in that district. There are nine pupils this winter and several younger children old enough to enter school in the spring.

At Bethesda Home the school is doing excellent work under the instruction of Miss Elizabeth Post. There are twenty-five pupils at the present time.

The prices of school supplies, including fuel, have advanced from 50 to 100 per cent.

We recommend, as to appropriations for the ensuing year, the sums of \$15.00 for flags; \$800.00 for High school tuitions; \$250.00 for books and supplies; \$200.00 for salaries of district officers.

In closing, we thank the parents, teachers, and pupils for the many courtesies shown us during the year.
