WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect a Selectman for three years and to choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for highways and appropriate money for the same.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and breaking snow for the ensuing year.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairing and building bridges.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2800.00 for maintenance of Trunk Lines.

7. To see if the town will vote to accept State and Federal Aid for reconstruction of East Side Trunk Line.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for upkeep of fair grounds.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for improvement of Great Hill Road.

10. To see what action the town will take relating to fire protection.

11. To see what action the town will take relating to breaking snow on town roads.

12. To see if the town will vote to build a sidewalk from South Tamworth Industries Inc. Toy Factory to Ernest L. Mason's store.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise \$25.00 for upkeep of Village Green, so called.

14. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and appropriate money for same.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day observance.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for the support of town library.

17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise the taxable property.

18. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from main highway to former residence of Charles Durrill.

19. To see if the town will vote to discontinue new highway, so-called, leading from highway at foot of Samuel Jackson hill, by residence of Robert J. Armstrong to junction of old highway.

20. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Tamworth:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report as superintendent of schools.

Our school record for the year endng June 30, 1927 showed an average attendance of 135, an average membership of 141 and a percent of 95. If every pupil would attend as faithfully as the majority do, we could have a percent of 97. For instance Great Hill had 99.6 percent, Chocorua had 98 percent, Whittier had 98.4 percent, Downs, 96.8 percent, and Pequaket 96 percent.

There are ten teachers in the employ of the district:

Beatrice I. Marston at Pequaket has 10 pupils Ethel M. Gilman at Great Hill has 6 pupils Lula M. Ball at South Tamworth has 22 pupils Grace E. Shannon at Downs has 10 pupils Minnie E. Gerry at Whittier has 14 pupils Edith M. Gilman at Bennett's Corner has 10 pupils Elsa I. Thunberg at the Primary School has 23 pupils Edwin A. Blackey at the Grammar School has 14 pupils Myra F. Rourke at Chocorua has 19 pupils Ruth E. Pingree at the High School has 13 pupils

I plead for the third time that there may be a special teacher of drawing and music and also a school nurse to follow up the work of medical inspection. Last year four of the six towns in this supervisory district had dental clinics and one town had a toxin anti-toxin clinic. In getting results the nurse is a very important factor.

ANNUAL REPORTS

High School

The high school is still under the care of Miss Ruth E. Fingree. Last June a class of five fine girls finished the two years' work and every one went on to other schools to finish the course. Ethel Elliott went to Kennett High in Conway. Marian Trask and Ethel Mason went to Brewster Academy at Wolfeboro. Leah Grace and Dorothea Ward entered Madison High

School. There should be a good class to enter next fall. Citizens of Tamworth may feel that money is well spent in supporting the high school.

School Property

Good work has been done on the school property this year.

With income from the trust fund, Chocorua building has been enlarged to include a room for special activities, uch as sewing and manual training. The school di tret in talled chemical toilets at the school and covered the building with roofing.

Pequaket yard was graded, greatly improving the play ground._

Great Hill and Center schools were painted inside.

South Tamworth and Whittier were painted inside and at the latter school the yard was graded.

Revarnishing the furniture in each school has come to be a yearly procedure, and helps very much in keeping it from defacement and destruction.

During the coming year, I recommend that heaters be provided for Chocorua and Whittier: that Chocorua yard be graded; that chimneys at Chocorua and Bennett's Corner be relaid; that Downs be covered with roofing and be painted inside; that a cement floor be laid in the basement at the Center building.

Trained Teachers

Two young ladies from Tamworth graduated from Plymouth Normal School last June—Edith Gilman and Carrie Scammon. They are now teaching, Miss Gilman in this town. It is stimulating to see fruits of labor. These young ladies will have a splendid opportunity to be of service in the world. Another young lady, Frances Thompson, is taking a four-year course at Keene Normal.

It is interesting to note that both normal schools now offer four-year courses, fitting teachers for high school work as well as elementary.

We expect more Tamworth girls will enter normal school next fall.

The schools of New Hampshire are making progress. The actual number of days of school is lengthening. Trained teachers are available. Character education, as well as intellectual training, is being emphasized. We need citizens of strong noble character. In good schools we need prompt and regular attendance, good teaching and a full year of unbroken sessions. Let each one boost the schools.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the school board, teachers, pupils and citizens for cordial support.
