REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

To the parents and citizens of the town of Troy :

In compliance with the requirements of the statute, your School Board submit their annual report of the condition of your schools and the progress made in school work, and would ask your careful attention to the remarks and suggestions therein contained.

The pupils have numbered 212—96 boys and 116 girls. They have been gathered into six schools as usual, three in the village and three outside. The number of different pupils in the village schools was 165—73 boys and 92 girls. The number outside, 47—23 boys and 24 girls.

They have been instructed by 8 different teachers, 3 of whom have been residents of the town. The work has been carried on without special hindrance, and all the teachers have been in a measure successful, and very good progress has been noted on the part of most of the scholars.

Probably three-fourths of the scholars never go beyond the common school, and how important it is then that our children should make the most of the advantages afforded them ; for when their school days are ended and they pass therefrom and enter upon the active duties of life, their chief regret will be that they had not better improved their time, for the branches required to be taught in our common schools are those necessary for the every-day business and conduct of life.

Every person with a good common school education is something more than a mere "hewer of wood and drawer of water" as against those without it.

The greatest hindrance to the success of any school is the instances of tardiness and absenteeism reported, and is an evil which parents are slow to recognize. During the past year the number of half-day absences reported by the teachers has

been 3,323. Some of these absences were excusable on account of sickness, especially in the North Primary and Grammar schools. This is a large evil and should be abated. The fault lies somewhere and should be remedied at once. We believe parents are mainly responsible for this state of things. We do not think it could all be avoided, but with a little effort and careful attention much of it could be avoided.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

This school has been under the instruction of Miss M. Alice Jones, who taught the preceding year. Miss Jones is a good teacher and those who remained under her charge made very satisfactory progress. Good deportment was noted, and the readiness and correctness of the answers given at the closing examinations showed the scholars understood well what they had been over.

The whole number of weeks of school has been 30, divided into 3 equal terms. The number of visits by the School Board has been 9, by parents 7, by others 34. Number not absent or tardy by terms: 1st term 5, 2d term 6, 3d term, 4. We are sorry to note that in this our highest grade school, no one scholar has a record of perfect attendance for the year. Instances of tardiness during the year, 12; a much better record than last year. During the last term sickness caused by the measles broke the record of attendance with many.

NORTH PRIMARY.

This school was taught during the summer term by Miss M. P. Woodbury of Danvers, Mass. Miss Woodbury was well qualified for a teacher, graduate of a normal school, but without experience. She labored hard and earnestly, and tried to do her best for the good of the school, and some of the pupils learned well, but having so large a school and without experience in government, she failed to maintain good order and discipline, the first law for a successful school, and it was therefore deemed best to employ another teacher.

The two last terms were under the instruction of Miss Minnie J. Cameron of Keene, who came well recommended, and who proved an efficient and able teacher, soon bringing order

out of chaos. The school was soon brought under good discipline, and good order and deportment was the rule. All the pupils did well. The attendance of the last term was seriously interrupted by measles, which became epidemic, leaving at one time only about 18 scholars. Number of visits by the School Board 9, by parents 37, by others 37. Number not absent by terms: 1st term, 1; 2d term, 17; 3d term, 7. Instances of tardiness reported, 58. No scholar has a record of perfect attendance for the year.

SOUTH PRIMARY.

Miss Eva M. Fisher of Fitzwilliam taught this school during the year, and excellent progress was made. All the pupils at the closing examinations did themselves and teacher much credit. Number of visits by School Board, 7; by parents, 35; by others, 23. Number not absent or tardy by terms: 1st term, 10; 2d term, 12; 3d term, 3. Instances of tardiness reported, 51.

EAST HILL.

The two terms of this school were under the instruction of Miss Maud B. Adams of Jaffrey. This was the smallest school in town. Good progress was made in all studies. Number of visits by School Board, 5; by parents, 5; by others, 33. Number who have not been absent: 1st term, 1; 2d term, 2. Instances of tardiness reported, 5.

WEST HILL.

There were two terms of 10 weeks each in this school, both taught by Miss Loretta J. Brown. Good deportment was observed, the pupils seemed to be interested in their work and in sympathy with their teacher, and all did well, making a steady advance in all their studies. Number of visits by the School Board, 4; by parents, 18; by others, 20. Number not absent, 1st term, 5; 2d term, 2. Instances of tardiness reported, 28.

MERRIFIELD SCHOOL.

The first term was taught by Miss Belle Corey, the second by Miss Effie L. Merrifield. Fair progress was made. Number of visits by the School Board, 4; by parents, 8; by others,

33. Instances of tardiness reported, 3. None for the last term.

And in conclusion we would again call your attention to an important question, that of a new building for our village schools.

The time is fast approaching, if it is not already here, when better and more commodious accommodations must be furnished. The two primary school buildings are getting out of repair and will soon need considerable expended upon them to make them what they should be. More than this, the number of pupils has increased so that they are already crowded, the North Primary having at one time during the year 59 pupils, a number considerably larger than can be seated.

Every one is willing to acknowledge that the room used for the Grammar school is not suitable, being poorly lighted and not in a good situation, and it seems that a modern building, in which all the schools can be combined, is a necessity. The scholars could be better classified and arranged. What can we expect of a teacher who has 50 or 60 pupils in more than half as many classes, from those just learning their letters to those in common fractions?

The whole of the town house is needed for town purposes; better quarters for the use of the Selectmen, a better place in which to keep its safe, and soon a suitable place for its library. We hope some action may be taken upon this matter.

No changes in text books have been made the past year, but some are contemplated during the ensuing year. With the free text books and school supplies has come a new condition of matters. The pupil is entrusted with the use and care of prop-

erty not his own. The books he studies, the slates, pens, pencils, ink and the paper on which he works his problems are the property of the town, and a lesson of economy in the use of them would make quite a saving in this expense. We do not mean that undue waste or improper care has been the rule, but with their free use pupils are liable to become wasteful unless teachers and parents remind them of it.
