

I have orders from the Selectmen for all the above payments.

Abatements are for non-resident persons, over-taxation, water troughs, and an abatement of \$68.08 of the Conn. River Lumber Co. tax of 1887.

There has been about the same amount expended on highways and bridges as last year, which with the improvement on our bridges make a good showing.

Only a part of the town officers' bills belong to this year's account, though paid since Feb. 15, 1895.

Which leaves a surplus due the town at this date, February 15th, 1895, after paying all indebtedness, of \$1,067.87.

There has been raised in the past four years \$8,000 to pay interest on town debt and meet the \$9,000 in bonds due July 1st, 1895. There has been paid to date in the past four years, \$1,536 for coupons or interest on bonds and for one \$100 bond.

The money in the treasury is now sufficient to meet the bonds becoming due July 1st, 1895, and will be ready to

pay them, leaving a surplus on hand of \$1,067.87, to pay bills with as they become due, which makes a good showing of the economy of the selectmen for the past four years.

There have been 194 volumes added to the library the past year, making a total of 296 volumes now in the library.

The circulation for the year was 1010 volumes. Greatest number taken out any one week was 34 volumes, least number taken out was 6 volumes; average circulation was 20 volumes per week.

There was a distributing agency started at Swiftwater, May 19, 1894. There are 20 volumes in Swiftwater at the present time.

The \$16 left in the hands of the trustees will be expended for a book-case, insurance on books, catalogue of library, and whatever necessary expense occurs, and the balance will be expended in books.

We would recommend that the town vote to raise \$50, or more, to buy books with, this coming spring. All of which is respectfully submitted.
