

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for lighting the Streets with Electricity.
- 6. To see what action the Town will take with regard to State Aid Construction, State Aid Maintenance and Trunk Line Maintenance.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take toward buying two hundred feet of Fire Hose.

- 8. To see what action the Town will take to suppress the White Pine Blister.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts and legacies given to the Town by different individuals, the income to be used for the care of cemetery lots.
- 10 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from Favor farm to Gillis Hill road.
- 11. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Evergreen Cemetery.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Road Machine and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 13. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-Large, Alternate Delegates-at-Large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democrat and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Bennington:

Herewith is submitted for your consideration my fifth annual report on the condition of your schools and the work done therein.

#### Teachers

As has been the case for a number of years the only change in the teaching force occurred in the grammar room. Miss Guptill was secured for the position. The work of all the teachers is very satisfactory, indeed. They are enthusiastic and skillful, and the progress of the pupils is marked.

#### Some Special Features

I am quite confident that, all things considered, the work done in the schools of Bennington will compare very favorably with that done in many a larger place. In many sections the idea has become so prevalent that the schools are neglecting the so called fundamental subjects, and that the children are coming out of our schools without being able to read, write, and cipher, as the saying is, and that the children of the present time are far below the children of former years in their ability to handle these subjects. I have never seen or heard of any proof to substantiate these statements. Whatever proof we have points in the other direction, namely, that these subjects are being better taught than ever before. Such statements are often made with little or no actual knowledge of the real work of the schools. In fact, the less we know of the actual workings of any organization the more certain are we that we can qualify as competent critics of that organization.

I am sure that the so called fundamental subjects are not being neglected in any measure in the schools of Bennington. In fact, more emphasis is being put upon them and they are being better taught than ever before, and, at the same time, proper attention is being given to many of the phases of education that have come into the curriculum within the past few years.

In January a test in spelling was given to all the grades in this supervisory union, each grade being given fifty words that had made up a part of the list of words studied since September. As the lists of words for each grade are uniform in all the schools a comparison could fairly be made. The schools of Bennington as a whole attained an average of 84.5%.

In the early part of the winter tests in spelling and arithmetic were sent out by the state department to be given to all eighth grade children in the state. In the spelling test an average of 74% would have been creditable. Our eighth grade attained an average of over 80%. The arithmetic test was the same that was given in Springfield, Mass., in 1846, to a group of ninth grade children, what would correspond in our school system to the first year in High School. This same test was given to our eighth grade. In Springfield an average of 29% was attained. Our eighth grade average was around 65%. Certainly spelling and arithmetic are being as well taught in Bennington in 1924 as they were in Springfield in 1846.

A new system of writing was adopted this year called the Houston system, one that is being used extensively over the New England states, and the one that is in use in our Normal Schools. While it has hardly been in use long enough to measure definitely the results as yet as a whole, I am positive that the results are going to be very satisfactory. Marked improvement is already noticeable in many individual cases. The aim of this system is not to produce fancy penmanship but to develop an easy legible style of handwriting.

Reading, perhaps the most important of the school subjects, especially in the lower grades, is being continued in all the grades, with special emphasis on silent reading. The purpose of this silent reading is to teach the children to get the thought from the printed page. Many children can read words, but do not get the thought from what they read. The purpose of the systematic teaching of silent reading is to correct this.

A music teacher has been employed this year, Mrs. Putnam, of Hancock, a teacher of experience, having been secured for the position. This enables all the grades in the schools to benefit from the teaching of music. Much interest in the subject is being developed among the children, and very satisfactory results are being secured. Music instruction in the schools is no longer considered as one of the "frills," but has established itself as one of the very important subjects.

#### Attendance

There were enrolled in the three schools last year 75 different pupils, the average membership was 72.7, the average attendance 67.9, and the per cent of attendance 93.4. This was the per cent attained by the state as a whole, and is very good considering the severity of last winter. Thirty-one cases of tardiness were reported. This is an average of only .4 based on the average membership.

#### Finances

A simple analysis of the school finances may be of interest to the voters of the district. From the financial report we see that the total expenditure for schools for the year 1923-24 was \$5853.60. Of this amount 45.6% was expended for teachers' salaries. The percent for the state as a whole for this item was about 60%. Operating

expenses, including janitor salary, fuel, water, light and janitor supplies and repairs required 14.3%. Administration, including salaries of district officers, superintendent's salary, truant officer and school census, etc., took 3.6%. Transportation, high and elementary tuition, medical inspection took 27.5%. These are the main items of expense.

The expenditure per pupil in the elementary grades last year was \$63.31. The average over the state was \$63.07. Thus we see that we are running very close to the state average in most respects.

### Conclusion

Several activities of public interest have been given by the schools. Two plays were given by the grammar school to help defray the expenses of their graduation. The third grade held exercises in June to celebrate their entrance into the intermediate room. During the late fall a session of the schools was held in the evening in order to give parents, who are unable to visit school during the day an opportunity to observe what we are attempting to do in the different school subjects. This proved to be very instructive and interesting.

To all who, by their interest and cooperation have helped to make the school a success, may I express my hearty appreciation.

Since the closing of the books Jan. 31st, some of this has been paid.

The citizens of the Town should take into consideration the fact that no department of the Town has been charged any water rent, viz., Hydrants \$250.00, Town Hall \$25.00, Watering Trough \$10.00, Cemeteries \$20.00, Schools \$25.00, making a total of \$330.00, and which would have been considerably more as the rates were to have been advanced.

In order to go on record we wish to print the following rules:

That owners of property are liable to the full extent of the water rent.

That the Town makes no repairs outside of the mains other than that connected to town property or which is town property.

That the Collector is charged with the collection of all water rents promptly and quarterly, and all parties are requested to co-operate and pay same within a reasonable time after bills are submitted. If your water is shut off because you are several quartersinarrears and you have to pay for letting it on again, you will be required to pay in advance.


The first bond for \$1,000.00 and due next April, has been paid out of the Town Treasury.
