### WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chichester in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said Chichester on Tuesday, the 8<sup>th</sup> day of March next at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuring. (Ballot)
- 2. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 (known as SB 2) to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Town of Chichester on the second Tuesday of March? (Ballot)(By Petition)
- **3.** Are in favor of creating a Commercial Village to promote a change in development patterns in the area and create an attractive center for retail, service and commercial opportunities. (Ballot)
- 4. Are you in favor of deleting Section P. Wetlands, from Article III, General Provisions in the its entirety, and add the following: Buffers to streams and ponds shall be 100 feet; buffers to wetlands greater than 0.25 acre, including the area of contiguous wetland on adjacent parcels, shall be 100 feet; buffers to wetlands less than 0.25 acre, including the area of contiguous wetland on adjacent parcels shall be 50 feet. (Ballot)
- 5. Are you in favor of making changes to the growth management section L. (Ballot)
- 6. Are you in favor of deleting Section P. Wetlands, from Article III, General Provisions of the Town of Chichester Zoning Ordinance. (Ballot)(By Petition)

Article 7 through 16 will be considered at the second session of the Annual Town Meeting on Saturday, March 12, 2005 beginning at 10 o'clock in the forenoon at the Chichester Central School.

7. Shall the town adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28 II and IV, for an optional veterans tax credit of \$500.00 on residential property and replace the standard veterans tax credit? (By Petition)

- 8. # SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The last year was again a year of changes for the administrative personnel of the Selectmen's Office. After the departure of Jamie Pike in May, who held the position of Office Assistant for several months and who had done an exceptional job, the Selectmen chose, from a group of several very qualified candidates, Erin Hamer, from Alton, to fill the position of Office Assistant. Erin has experience in the accounting field and this has turned out to be a very positive move and we continue to enjoy the excellent job being done by Erin.

In August, however, we were disappointed to have to loose Lisa Stevens, our Town Administrator, due to personal family needs at home. Lisa had brought an unparalleled level of municipal knowledge, experience, and professionalism to the Chichester Selectmen's Office. Loosing Lisa in the middle of the year brought on formidable challenges. None-the-less, following an interview process we have hired Patty Wooster, from Penacook, as our new Administrative Assistant. Patty graduated from Monmouth University with a Bachelors Degree in Political Science. Patty comes with paralegal, public relations, and administrative experience and she has proven to be very motivated in gaining municipal experience. Please stop by the Town Offices to meet and welcome Erin and Patty to our Chichester community.

The Selectmen have chosen a new Town assessor following a careful review and consideration of several proposals. The new assessing firm is Nyberg and Purvis, who will begin the first year of the 5-year cyclical reevaluations of properties in Chichester. We have put high expectations on the new assessing firm that they shall be most attentive to our citizens' needs and requests.

The Town received some unanticipated, and very welcome, revenue this last year from the sale of property, which had been deeded to the Town for back taxes. The revenue generated was approximately \$95,000 dollars, which was used by the Selectmen to help offset taxes this year.

The Conservation Commission, in consultation with the Selectmen's office, has been investigating the acquisition of additional conservation lands abutting the Sanborn-Cray conservation property that partially surrounds the 22-acre Marsh Pond, which is located behind the Fire Department/Police Department building and also behind Town Hall. In addition, the dam at the outlet of Marsh Pond, half-of-which is located on Town property, partially failed last fall and has become a potential liability for the Town. The dam will need to be either reconstructed or removed as pending an order of the N.H. Department of Environmental Services.

The Town, through the Planning Board, contracted last year with the Central N.H. Regional Planning Commission to conduct a Rte. 4 Corridor Study, which was completed last March. This report was in response to concerns over motorist safety and congestion on U S Rte. 4 in Chichester. The results of the comprehensive study was the identification of the causes for concerns, the development of short and long term solutions, and providing Chichester's input to the N.H. Department of Transportation's planned improvements to the Main St./Horse Corner/US Rte. 4 intersection. The major reconstruction project planned for the Main Street/US Rte. 4 intersection is scheduled to begin this June or July.

The engineering firm of CLD Consulting Engineers was selected by the Selectmen, in consultation with the Road Agent, to carry out the design engineering and construction oversight for the reconstruction of the Webster Mills Bridge over Sanborn Brook. The project is currently estimated to cost approximately \$650,000 that will be funded by 80% State Bridge Aid funds, and 20% Town funds. The project is schedule for construction for year 2006

The Selectmen, who are charged with the responsibility as the Town's code enforcement officers, spend a considerable amount of time dealing with issues concerning zoning ordinance violations. Over the last year the Selectmen, in concert with a very active and helpful group, the Citizens Concerned With Outdoor Lighting, have worked to educate and ensure that existing and newly proposed local businesses are adhering to the newly adopted (March 2004) outdoor lighting ordinance and we have had success in eliminating some excessive lighting along Route 4.

Of special note for all Townspeople is the resignation of John Prickett as Chichester's Fire Chief. John's resignation was a result of his promotion to Director of Emergency Services at the Lakes Region General Hospital which has increased his job responsibilities tremendously. John deserves the Town's great appreciation and many thanks for a job very well done over the last years!! The Selectmen, upon unanimous recommendation of the members of the fire department, have appointed Mike Paviglio as Chichester's new Fire Chief. Already Mike has assumed his new role in a very conscientious and professional manner.

The Board of Selectmen wishes to publicly recognize and personally thank all the members of the numerous Committees, Boards, Commissions and other groups for volunteering their time. Your efforts are greatly appreciated and only serve to ensure that Chichester continues to be a great community to call home. Certainly we must not forget our Town employees who do a great job day in and day out! Sincere thanks to all!!

#### Annual Report of the Planning Board

As usual this year has been another busy year for the Planning Board. We have met for many Discussions, Design reviews and Public hearings (breakdown of those numbers will follow). We have also been very busy with updating the Master Plan, revisiting the Growth Management ordinance as well as working on projects such as the Route 4 Corridor. This study was done in conjunction with NH DOT and Central Regional Planning. The study is now complete and there is a copy available at the town office as well as the Library if you would care to read it.

The Board has had a variety of consultations with the Conservation Commission, the towns Building Inspector, Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) on the Transportation Model and Demographics as they relate to the Route 93 widening project and the impact that will have on Chichester. We have also consulted with CNHRPC on other projects such as the Wetlands ordinance revision, the Commercial Village District and other small changes to the zoning ordinances, which will be brought to town, vote this year.

Perhaps some of the most important work done by the Planning Board each year is the review the Zoning and bring to the town changes that reflect areas that may be problematic for the Town, a particular Town department, the Planning Board, developers

or that may reflect changes in the State Statutes that govern zoning. This year we have worked quite diligently on some revisions to the Wetlands zoning because we did experience some problems over the last year with regards to setbacks, access and permitted uses. The zoning question brought to vote by the Planning board will remedy those problems and hopefully you all voted in favor for it rather than the alternative brought by petition to do away the this section of the zoning in it's entirety. The other zoning question brought to the town has to do with the Commercial Village District. This is a recommendation of the Rt. 4 Corridor study and will establish a new district in our commercial area along Rt. 4 from approximately King Rd. to just before the Hillcrest Campground. The purpose of this new district will be to help calm the traffic traveling through Chichester by establishing a Village Zone where we will have mixed use development (business and residential use), similar architectural design of the buildings to help to establish a Village feel; sidewalks and more business development which will attract customers that will visit these establishments for a longer length of time (ie. Doctor's offices, retail and residential uses, professional offices, movies, meeting places, etc.). This new zone will only affect this area in Chichester's commercial district, all the rest of the commercial zone will remain the same and will fall under the existing zoning ordinances. This new Village District will give us an exciting opportunity develop this intersection of Rt. 4 and Main Street / Horse Corner Rd. in such a way as to calm traffic and establish a Business / Village identity for the town. The Planning Board hopes that you will support this zoning change as well.

This report gives you some idea of the scope of the busy year that the Planning Board has had in 2004.

In addition to the local services described above, in 2004 the CNHRPC provided the following services to Chichester as part of regional activities:

- Held training sessions related to Planning Board process and development review procedures.
- Coordinated meetings of the CNHRPC Regional Resource Conservation Committee (R2C2). The R2C2 seeks to bring representatives of each of the region's communities together to work on conservation issues that affect the overall region.

- Organized and hosted meetings of the CNHRPC Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC).
- Continued the update and expansion of the regional transportation model. The transportation
  model will be an integral component of the I-93 Bow to Concord Transportation Planning Study.
- Provided assistance to municipalities, groups and interested individuals regarding the Transportation Enhancements (TE) and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) programs.

- Provided continuing technical assistance to the Upper Merrimack River Local Advisory Committee and the Contoocook North Branch Local Advisory Committee.

As you know, 2004 was a challenging year for the Police Department as Chief Clarke was deployed in Iraq. With Chief Clarke's absence, the Police Department was down a full time employee until the end of April. At the end of April, the Town hired Scott Corbett as the Town's newest full time officer. Since hiring Officer Corbett, he has completed a lot of training and we could not really use him in a full time capacity until he graduated the New Hampshire Police Academy in November 2004. Since Officer Corbett has been on the road, he has done a great job and I feel he is a good addition to the police department. During Officer Corbett's training, the Police Department had to rely on our seven part time officers and myself. Without the part time officers, the Police Department would not have been able to function as smoothly as it did. I want to thank all the officers for doing a great job and working so many hours to protect the Town.

On behalf of the Chichester Police Association, I want to thank all the people who supported us at the Chichester Police Association dunking booth at Old Home Day. I was surprised by the turn out considering the rainy weather. It just goes to show Chichester residences are proud of their Town and will show up to events rain or shine (or in the case of 2004 Old Home Day down pour).

On another note, I want to remind all residents that have burglar alarms in their residence to register them with the Police Department. If the alarms are registered it makes for a quicker response and easier to locate a key holder in case of an emergency. I also want to remind residents to register their dog(s) with the Town Clerk. Registration makes it easier and quicker to locate the owner and return the dog(s) safely.

I am also asking all residents to get to know their neighbors and neighborhoods. This makes the Town a safer place to live and if anything looks suspicious call the police. This is especially true during weekdays when people are at work as this is the most frequent time of daytime burglaries. With your help, we can protect the rural parts of Town and stop any would be thieves.

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself to you as your new Fire Chief. I have been in the fire/rescue service for over 20 years, serving as a firefighter/EMT through the rank of Deputy Chief. On January 1, 2005 Chief John Prickett stepped down from the position because of a significant promotion in his full time job. John Prickett has been a member of the Chichester Fire/Rescue for over 25 years and served as Fire Chief for the past 5 years. He has not left the fire service, but remains a valuable dedicated member holding the rank of Deputy Chief. Congratulations to John and good luck in your new position.

The Chichester Fire-Rescue, a group of very dedicated individuals, responded to 400 calls for service in 2004. They leave their families and friends at a moment's notice at all times of the day and evening. In addition to responding to calls for service, they attend a scheduled training every Monday evening to sharpen their skills and keep the necessary equipment ready for service. Keep in mind that they do all this in addition to working a full time job to support their families.

Your Fire Department provides Fire Protection, Rescue and Emergency Medical Services with 34 dedicated members. These people are trained at various levels, 18 of which are NH Certified Fire Fighters, 23 being Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technicians; 16 to the Basic level, 5 to the Intermediate level 2 to the Paramedic level. It should also be noted that 2 members are working on their Fire Fighter Certification, 7 are working toward the EMT Basic level and 1 on the EMT Paramedic level.

Membership rolls are higher than they have been for many years. However, please do not let these numbers deceive you. We only have a couple of members who are either home or work close enough to respond on weekdays. As a matter of fact, we had 6 daytime calls in 2005 that no-one from the Chichester Fire-Rescue responded, one of which was a structure fire. The need has come for you to consider putting on full time personnel. We will be putting together a committee in 2005 to explore this possibility for the 2006 Warrant. Please contact myself or the Selectmen office if you would like to participate on the committee.

As far as the major equipment goes: The newest truck, Engine 3, is serving us well and should have no problem lasting the 20 years planned. Engine 2 is showing signs of wear and has had a couple of major repairs already and will need to have some rust repaired in the near future. It however should last the 20 years anticipated life due to be replaced in 2008. Tank 1 was due to be

replaced this year as it is quite tired and worn out. It was decided to wait another year due to the lack of funds in capital reserve. We will most likely propose to replace this truck with a used Tank Truck on the 2006 warrant. Ambulance 1 was purchased in 2000 and has proven to be a very good truck; it should serve us the anticipated 8 year first due life. Ambulance 3 was donated to us in 2000 and continues to serve us well as a back-up Ambulance. **Chichester Fire-Rescue**

The heavy rescue that we purchased used in 2004 has proven to be quite a find. This truck continues to serve us well and will for many years. The Forestry pick-up truck and utility vehicle are working fine and should continue to do so for many more years.

Millican's Nursery donated a used Kawasaki Mule ATV to us this year. It will be used for forest fire, woods rescue and made available to the Police Department if needed. # **2004 ANNUAL REPORT TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS**

The following report is prepared for the Capital Area Fire Compact's Board of Directors as a general summary of activities for the calendar year 2004. This report is also forwarded to the governing bodies of the Compact's member communities for informational purposes.

We welcomed the Town of Deering Fire Department as a new member to the Capital Area Fire Compact in June. Deering provides fire and rescue service to its community under the direction of Fire Chief Arnold Anderson. Upon completion of communications equipment conversions, dispatch service began on October 5, 2004.

With the addition of Deering, the Compact now provides service to nineteen member communities encompassing 675 square miles of area with a resident population of 109,870. Mutual aid response is given to and received from several other communities and mutual aid districts. Delivery of emergency service varies daily by community, based on tourism, special events, weather, and commercial activity.

Fire and Emergency Medical dispatch service is provided by the City of Concord Fire Department's Communications Center with six full-time dispatchers under the direction of dispatch supervisor Captain Ernest Petrin. All dispatchers participate in telecommunications training courses. Dispatched incidents in 2004 increased to 16,107, approximately 6.5% above the previous year. A detailed report by community is attached.

Due to increased call volume and activity in dispatch, the Compact with the City of Concord have reviewed staffing requirements in Fire Alarm. Current authorized staffing in 2004 is one Dispatcher Supervisor and six shift schedule Dispatchers. We have recognized for some time that staffing would need to be addressed. The Board of Directors in October 2004 unanimously agreed to support the addition of two dispatchers in 2005 to provide two dispatchers on duty at all times.

A major improvement to the communications link between the Fire Alarm dispatch center and one of our main transmitters at Mt. Kearsarge was completed in the Fall of 2004. We have been able to tie in to the State microwave link that provides a high quality and redundant communications channel. The quality and clarity of the signal is much improved with greater reliability.

The Chief Coordinator responded to 134 mutual aid incidents in 2004, and handles the administrative functions of the Compact. He continues to participate on several state and regional committees that affect mutual aid operations. As an active member of the NH First Responder Radio Interoperability Committee, I can report that all Compact Departments have or will receive new digital mobile radios for their fire apparatus and emergency ambulances through the Homeland Security funding initiative, at little or no direct local cost. The second phase of the program will address portable communications. All communities in New Hampshire are receiving digital communications equipment for Fire and Emergency Medical Services that will provide radio interoperability capability with other public safety agencies.

The Compact 2004 operating budget was \$ 600,578. All Compact operations, including the Chief Coordinator's position, office, command vehicle, and dispatch services are provided through this budget. Funding by the member communities is based on a combination of property values and population. We actively pursue any grant funding.

The Compact Training Committee chaired by Assistant Chief Dick Pistey, with members Deputy Chief Mike Paveglio and Deputy Chief Shawn Mitchell assisted all departments in hosting at least one mutual aid training exercise during the year. Mutual aid drills involve several departments and test the system capabilities in fire suppression,

emergency medical, mass casualty, hazardous materials, incident management, and personnel safety. We thank the Training Committee for their continuing support to the Compact.

The Central New Hampshire HazMat Team, comprised of all Capital Area and Lakes Region members continues to train bi-weekly and responds to 54 communities in our combined coverage area. The team operates with three response units and will welcome personnel interested in joining, training, and operating with the team. Funding has been approved through a Homeland Security grant for a "new" Hazmat response vehicle to replace a used 1989 unit and will be delivered in early 2005. We extend our thanks and appreciation to all team members for their willingness to respond to these emergencies. We also receive some grant funds for education, training, and to support data collection of hazardous materials inventories reported by facilities in our operating area.

We encourage all departments to send representatives and actively participate in all Compact meetings. Your input is needed on all issues and your members need to be informed of Compact activities and planning.

### Annual Report from the Road Agent

I would like to thank all the people in the Town of Chichester that supported my suggestion to purchase two new trucks. These trucks have proven to be very useful and have helped me serve the public better. One of my top priorities is to provide monthly maintenance and upkeep on these trucks. I believe that these trucks will save the Town money. The Road Department appreciates your support for the purchase of these trucks.

This summer, Hutchinson Road received upgrades. The Road Department installed new culverts, ditches, embankments and a layer of crushed asphalt. The Road Department plans to continue with these improvements this summer.

Ditching and new culverts filled with crushed rock were installed on West Road and Staniels Road to eliminate washouts.

As you are aware, heavy flooding occurred on Cross Road this year. The Road Department plans on working on the ditches. Grading and gravel were added to the dirt roads, but due to heavy rains this year, there have been problems with potholes. The Road Department will be working on these problems.

An additional 430 feet of Back Road was accepted by the Town and will now be maintained by the Road Department. Improvements were done on the remaining 400 feet of Lover's Lane. These improvements were done for safety reasons, allowing emergency vehicles better access and the road will be easier to plow and maintain.

The goals for this year are to shim, pave Staniels Road, and rebuild Center Road. We are in the process of rebuilding the bridge on Webster Mills Road. The bridge is being engineered and is scheduled to be finished in the summer of 2006.

Again, The Road Department thanks the residents of Chichester for their continued support.

## Annual Report Of Building Official

The 2004 Permit activity for Single Family Dwellings was limited to twelve (12) Permits due to the growth ordinance. Following is a four (4) year comparison:

 29 in 2001
 16 in 2002
 12 in 2003
 13 in 2004

In 2004, there were a grand total of 91 varied Building Permits issued. The breakdown is as follows:

- 13 Single Family Dwellings
- 27 Dwelling Renovations & Additions
- 1 Commercial Buildings
- 0 Mobile Homes
- 21 Garages, Barns, Sheds
- 5 Commercial Additions & Renovations
- 24 Other, (Pools, Siding, Fencing)

There were other inspections done, which were not related to permits issued for this year or other previously issued permits.

Building Permit Forms are available in the lobby of the Town Offices or by contacting the Building Inspector. Acquiring a blank Building Permit Form prior to contacting the Building Inspector assures that you will come ready with the required information. A Building Permit cannot be issued for a new family home or new commercial construction without an approved waste disposal "septic" system from the State of New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control division and a driveway design approval from the Town Road Agent.

The Town's current Building Codes are the current ICC Building and Fire Prevention codes, the 1988 Life Safety Code (a copy is available for review at the Town Library). State law also requires that all new structures as well as structures which are being improved to more than 50% of their assessed value be in compliance with the NH State Energy code. The addition of bed or bathrooms may also require your septic system to be reviewed.

The Building Inspector is available almost any time; if you have any questions regarding work being done or you need an inspection do not hesitate to call. If hiring contractors you should not hesitate to check their credentials or references.

There is currently an Impact Fee required in some categories. A copy of the Impact Fee Schedule is available at the Town Office or may be requested from the Building Inspector by calling (603) 798-4350. ### **Annual Report of Parks and Recreation Commission**

The Parks and Recreation Commission successfully oversaw the completion of the several projects last year that were proposed in the 2004 Town Warrant and approved at Town Meeting.

The substantial damages to the Carpenter Park Pavilion by a lightning strike were repaired by Tepper Construction Co. in time for its use for Old Home Day in August. It should be recognized that since the Pavilion was constructed in 2001 it has become a tremendous asset to Carpenter Park and is used extensively during the heavy recreational seasons by visitors to the Park, athletic teams and their families and friends, and of-course it has become the unofficial "dinning room" for Townspeople who have gathered for Old Home Day to enjoy the bean hole supper. The lightning strike also damaged, beyond repair, the artesian well supporting the Snack Shack and the Park's irrigation. Late last year a new well was drilled, by Taskers Well Company, and will be ready for use for the upcoming recreational season this spring. All the costs associated with the repairs to the Pavilion and the drilling of a new well shall be reimbursed by the Town's property liability insurance.

And as planned, two new baseball/softball dugouts were constructed at the Park's upper ball field. The dugout project was a joint community effort, with the Town contributing funds from the Parks and Recreation Capital Reserve Fund (approved by a warrant article last year) along with monies donated by the Chichester Youth Association. A group of volunteers from the Chichester Youth Association dedicated many hours to construct the dugouts.

The Chichester Youth Association (CYA), which organizes the Town's baseball/softball, and soccer programs, with over 100 children participating in each program, frequently holds regional tournaments at Carpenter Park. This coming year the CYA is proposing to host a State-wide Little League baseball tournament. This would bring hundreds of athletes, their family and friends, to Chichester from all across the State to play baseball at Carpenter Park!

The previously proposed improvements to the upper baseball/softball field, as outlined in the Town's Capital Improvement Plan for 2004, which were postponed last year because of changing priorities, are now planned for this coming year. The work on the upper field will involve the completion of the unfinished portion by expanding the right outfield playing area by approximately 25 feet and bringing it into regulation field size! Therefore, the Parks and Recreation Commission has requested, by Warrant Article, funds to finish the upgrades to the upper baseball/softball field at Carpenter Park. *We look for your support of this Warrant Article and sincerely thank the Townspeople for their continued support of improvement projects at Carpenter Park over the last several years.* 

And finally, with some of the results from the Planning Board's 2003 Master Plan update survey indicating that 70% of the people responding supported the idea to "enhance the quality and variety of recreational activities" within Chichester, the Commission had hopes of conducting a follow-up Town-wide survey last year to better determine the peoples recreational needs and interests. Unfortunately, we were not able to carry out our plans for that survey. However, we still believe that soliciting the communities direct input is essential in the planning of any future major recreational improvements within the Town and we shall make an effort to conduct a comprehensive survey this coming year. We shall also be investigating alternative sources of funding, i.e. – grants, to hopefully assist the Town in the funding of any future major recreational improvements.

## TOWN OF CHICHESTER HISTORICAL SOCIETY

## **Annual Report of Historical Society**

Our society has had a very exciting and busy year. Highlights are: January 1, 2004, at the request of the selectmen, the society became responsible for the entire Community Building. This included preparing a budget, upkeep, cleaning and scheduling the use of the room upstairs. Many repairs were done to the building by society member Bernd Reinhardt. Panic bars and new locks were placed on two outside doors. A new door was installed on the 2nd floor, all were painted. The two large doors at the front of the building outside were also painted by society members. Smoke detectors were installed throughout the building. The society now has a locked room upstairs where all the file cabinets were placed, along with a map file, given to us by the Library.

March 10, 2004 the Depot Street Bridge (Thunder Bridge) was placed on the National Register. The society purchased two bronze plaques which have been placed on each end of the bridge. A "Moose Plate" conservation grant was awarded to the society for restoration and replacement of the decorative iron work and the historic plate on the bridge. Funds have arrived and work has begun.

Programs were well attended. January - Hobby Night, March - Chichester artist "Past and Present" reception, May - Garden Design, September - NH Stonewalls by Kevin Gardener, November - Yankee Humor with Rebecca Rule.

Our 1st Garden Tour was held in June. Very successful. This was a selfguided tour of a variety of gardens, 17 in all. A small exhibit of photos of old Chichester Houses and gardens were on display in the museum. We also sold plants, books and garden related items.

The most popular exhibit was entitled Chichester Artist "Past and Present". We had 22 artist represented and a total of 128 works of art exhibited. This included art in oil, watercolor, acrylic, pencil, pen and ink, woodcut and photography.

We had a float in the Old Home Day Parade and won a prize. We had a booth at the park with a time line of the 50's in Chichester, Town Reports of the 1950's, passed out copies of a poem, Old Home Day, written in 1952 by Rev. H. F. Parker. Picture of the last Post Office built in 1955, list

of students being the first class to graduate from the new school in 1950. We donated a Chichester afghan to be auctioned off.

We were visited by Chichester Central School 3rd graders in October. The students enjoyed a scavenger hunt looking for items related to Chichester's past.

Our current large project is to inventory the existing barns in Chichester that are 75 years old or older. With the help of volunteer Blaze Konefal and society members we are developing a survey form to be used for this project.

Currently we have an exhibit on barns and related barn items. The display includes tools, printed materials, equipment, toys and parts of barns. Also on display boards, arranged by roads in town, photos are displayed of old and current Chichester barns.

Thanks to all of you for your support, help with exhibits, loaning items etc., attending programs, donating funds, time and items. We really do appreciate it very much. A special thanks to Frank Curatulo, Jr., honorary member, for the numerous wonderful signs he did for our museum, programs, projects, special events and the parade float.

Hope to see you in 2005 as we continue to interpret and preserve Chichester's history.

#### Annual Report of the Conservation Commission

Municipal Conservation Commissions in New Hampshire are charged with protection of natural resources and providing a focus for environmental concerns in the community. Conservation Commissions also protect and manage conservation lands and open space, especially during periods of high growth pressure, consistent with land protection goals established by the town.

Over the past year, the Chichester Conservation Commission (CCC) has pursued the following goals in meeting this charge:

#### Establish baseline water quality of Marsh Pond

Marsh Pond is a much-overlooked water body located surprisingly close to the fire station and Grange Hall. The CCC sees significant recreation and conservation potential in Marsh Pond and the adjacent Sanborn-Cray conservation lands. Determining water quality provides a baseline to which future water quality changes can be compared.

## Coordinate with the Planning Board on environmentally related rules

The CCC has worked with the Planning Board to revise the portion of the zoning ordinance dealing with wetlands and wetland buffers. The goal of this effort is to clarify the current wording of the zoning ordinance, which has proven difficult to administer by town boards.

# Increase funds available for purchase of open space and protection of conservation lands

The CCC has solicited private donation of lands and easements for preservation of open space and has successfully appealed to the town for an increase in funds deposited in the Conservation Fund from the land use change tax.

## Initiate the designation of prime wetlands

Prime wetlands are those areas, which warrant special protection because of valuable attributes such as wildlife habitat, groundwater recharge, or recreational values. The CCC hopes to initiate this process with a screening of wetlands located in the southerly portion of the town. Final designation of prime wetlands will require public presentation and final adoption of prime wetlands by the voters.

#### Implement the Sanborn-Cray Management Plan

This parcel of conservation land close to Grange Hall and Marsh Pond has been protected with the goal of providing protection of wildlife and provision of passive recreation for the townspeople. The CCC has worked on providing public access and protection of Marsh Pond as well as the possibility of extending conservation lands with the cooperation of owners of adjacent parcels.

The Conservation Commission meets at 7 PM on the second Monday of each month at the Grange Hall. We are always interested in the community's viewpoints on conservation matters.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN OF CHICHESTER

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (CRVNA) continues to offer comprehensive health services to the residents of Chichester. The following is a description of these services:

<u>Home Care services</u> respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and para-professional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting. Patients who receive services range from children who have a complex medical condition to frail elders who require supportive assistance to stay in their own homes.

<u>Hospice</u> services provide professional and paraprofessional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping he/she remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical, emotional and spiritual needs.

CRVNA's Hospice House provides residential care to terminally ill patients who have no primary caregiver or need a supported residential setting. Often patients are transferred into the Hospice House when a caregiver is exhausted and unable to care for them at home any longer. To date, this house has provided a home to approximately 700 terminally ill residents.

<u>Community Health services</u> include health education, health maintenance and preventive health services. The program includes preventive care, adult and senior health, child health, Baby's First Homecoming, immunizations for all ages, supportive services to school districts parent education and support, health education and nutritional counseling.

Community Health includes health promotion services which focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families and individuals through early intervention and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, adult screening, and immunizations. Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior health services are provided at congregate housing sites.

Over the past two years Senior Health Clinics have expanded to reach out to seniors who may require a monthly check by a nurse of their blood sugar, blood pressure, and/or diabetes management. The expansion of these services was in response to the decrease in Medicare services to seniors.

Professional and para-professional hourly home services are provided on a private fee-for-service basis. Health education and instruction are part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Chichester may request service: patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. The nurse who completes an assessment will coordinate with the patient's physician a plan of care to meet the patient's specific needs. If the patient does not have a physician the nurse will assist the patient to identify one and schedule a visit. The agency has developed a program with the NH-Dartmouth Family Practice Residency Program to coordinate a house call visit by a resident to a frail elder's home who is unable to leave his/her home.

A call to Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (1-800-924-8620) is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. The CRVNA office is open Monday through Friday from 7:30am to 5:00pm. A nurse is on call twenty-four hours a day. The On-Call Nurse can be reached by calling 1-800-924-8620.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for the individual without health insurance and/or who is unable to pay the full charge. However, to fee scale, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. The community health services are provided to residents often times free of charge. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectible.

This agency is certified as a Medicare/Medicaid Provider, licensed by the State of New Hampshire, and is a member agency of the United Way of Merrimack County.

The Committee has avoided increasing taxes for the upcoming year, 2005. While each town's share has changed slightly do to population changes, the total taxes collected by the District haven't increased since 1999. 2004 was an exceptional year for revenue. It should be noted that the District has been very fortunate to have had increasing revenues, which have held taxes in check, but it's unlikely to continue on a long term basis.

During 2004 the District constructed a new burn area and improved road access to the compost pile. Slopes were seeded and drainage was addressed to avoid any sediment runoff as required by the EPA storm water pollution prevention program. Funds for the work were drawn from recycling revenue and the Reserve Fund set up by the District for the purpose of closing the old landfill. We have now moved all operations away from the old landfill, which is the first step in closing (sloping & seeding) the site.

For 2005, the District is replacing the roll off truck with a new Kenworth and is also replacing the Bobcat with a new unit. The 2005 District Budget allows for these two purchases without increasing taxes and without incurring any debt or lease payments. We have the funds available to pay for the equipment when it arrives. During the summer of '05 the District will be doing some minor construction between the building and the canister wall, again related to EPA storm water pollution prevention. This may cause some inconvenience, so please bear with us.

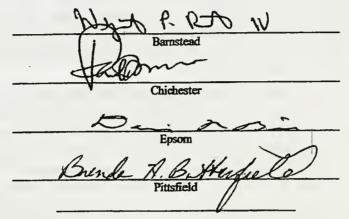

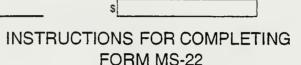

# MINUTES OF THE CHICHESTER SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING MARCH 6, 2004

The annual meeting of the Chichester School District began at 10:05 A.M. in the Chichester Central School Multi-Purpose Room on March 6, 2004, presided over by School District Moderator Peter Marsh. There were approximately 60 people at the time the meeting opened, but eventually as many as 80 people were in attendance. Moderator Marsh asked those present to stand for a moment of silence and the Pledge of Allegiance.

Introductions of those at the front table were then made as follows:

School Board Members--Benjamin Brown, Chairperson Ronald Medhurst John Poirier

School Administrative Unit #53 Assistant Superintendent-David Dziura

Chichester Central School Principal: Pamela Stiles

Chichester School District Clerk: Gloria Nardini

Moderator Marsh discussed the rules of the meeting and explained that he would use the same procedures as used at Town Meeting. Articles would automatically come to the floor. He also asked that one motion at a time be before the assembly. He then asked that non-residents be allowed to speak, especially David Dziura from S.A.U. #53. John West made this motion and it was seconded by Kate Mara. It was passed by a voice vote. The first article came to the floor.

# Article 1: TO HEAR THE REPORTS OF AGENTS, AUDITORS, COMMITTEES, OR OFFICERS CHOSEN, AND TO PASS ANY VOTE RELATING THERETO.

Mr. Marsh let the assembly know that these included written reports contained in the Town Report on pages 111-118 as well as the oral presentations that would be made on this day. Pamela Stiles made a report on the state of the school emphasizing the results of standardized testing and reporting that the school had been a finalist for the Excellence in Education award. She also reported on the Citizens' Voice Forum, which gave the community a chance to express what they felt was important for education.

Frank Lemay gave a report on the Grounds and Facilities Development Task Force. He talked about the areas that they had considered; what they had decided not to deal with at this time (putting in new playing fields) and what they would continue to work on (starting to set up the Frangione property as an outdoor classroom).

School Board Chairman Benjamin Brown then gave his report on how the proposed budget had been arrived at. Since the last budget the property in Chichester had been reassessed and he showed the formula that the School Board had devised so that past years' assessments could be compared with this year's. To compare these, past years' rates had been divided by 191.8%. He also needed to explain to the voters that this year the School Budget would be affected by having less revenue coming in especially from the New Hampshire Adequate Education Fund. The School Board in setting up the Budget tried hard to eliminate as much as they felt they could from the Budget without affecting the quality of education, so that the taxpayers would not face higher tax rates to cover this loss of revenue.

Mr. Brown then addressed the issue of the new Collective Bargaining Agreement made with the Chichester Teachers Association. This Agreement, if passed, would be in effect for the following budget year.

Kara Mara moved that the reports be accepted as presented and Nancy Fraher seconded the motion.

#### MOTION PASSED VOICE VOTE

Article 2: TO SEE WHAT SUM OF MONEY THE DISTRICT WILL RAISE AND APPROPRIATE FOR THE SUPPORT OF SCHOOLS. FOR THE PAYMENT OF SALARIES AND BENEFITS FOR SCHOOL DISTRICT OFFICIALS AND AGENTS AND FOR THE PAYMENT OF STATUTORY OBLIGATIONS OF THE DISTRICT. THE SCHOOL BOARD RECOMMENDS \$3,995,701. THIS ARTICLE DOES NOT INCLUDE APPROPRIATIONS VOTED IN OTHER ARTICLES ON THIS WARRANT.

Moderator Marsh opened the floor for discussions on the Budget. There were questions on the numbers of students from Chichester going to Pembroke Academy, how salary increases compared for certified versus non-certified staff, and how the further \$19,507.00 in cuts made in various budgeted areas would affect the tax rate. Nancy Fraher made a motion to accept the article as written and Rene Brooks seconded this motion.

It had been established that the \$19,507.00 in cuts would affect the tax rate by \$0.09 per \$1,000.00. Anne Banks moved to amend Article 2 by adding \$19,507.00 to the bottom line. This was seconded by Michelle Walter. This would change the bottom line of the Budget to \$4,015,208.00. Moderator Marsh told the voters that for votes on the Budget he would have a show of hands. The amendment to the article was opened to discussion. Some talked in favor of the amendment feeling

that it would not affect the tax rate by much, others reminded the assembled that the new teachers' contract still needed to be voted on and others suggested that the voters should defer to the School Board's decision to try to hold expenses down.

The amendment to raise the bottom lien by \$19,507.00 was voted on.

# MOTION FAILED 29 FOR 52 AGAINST

Tom Laliberte made a motion to increase funds for reading material. Mrs. Stiles explained that the school would be able to adequately meet the needs of students and provide them with enough reading material. Mr. Laliberte then removed his motion.

The motion that Nancy Fraher had made and Rene Brooks had seconded to accept the article as written was then brought back to the floor. This motion was then voted on.

MOTION TO ACCEPT A BUDGET OR \$3,995,701.00 PASSED 78 FOR 0 AGAINST

Article 3: TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE COST ITEMS SET FORTH IN THE COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT REACHED BETWEEN THE CHICHESTER SCHOOL BOARD AND THE CHICHESTER TEACHERS ASSOCIATION FOR THE 2004/05 FISCAL YEAR WHICH CALLS FOR THE FOLLOWING INCREASE IN SALARIES AND BENEFITS:

2004/05 \$81,281

AND FURTHER TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$81,281.00 FOR THE 2004/05 FISCAL YEAR, SUCH SUM REPRESENTING THE ADDITIONAL COSTS ATTRIBUTABLE TO THE INCREASE IN SALARIES AND BENEFITS AGREED TO BY THE CHICHESTER SCHOOL BOARD AND THE CHICHESTER TEACHERS ASSOCIATION.

There was no discussion on this article. Theresa Whiddon motioned to accept this article as written and it was seconded by Nancy Fraher.

## ARTICLE 3 PASSED VOICE VOTE

Article 4: TO CHOOSE AGENTS AND COMMITTEES IN RELATION TO ANY SUBJECTS EMBRACED IN THE WARRANT.

A motion was made by John Poirier to pass over this article until Tuesday, March 9, 2004 when the polls would be opened for voting for School District officers. David Colbert seconded this motion.

# MOTION PASSED VOICE VOTE

Article 5: TO TRANSACT OTHER BUSINESS THAT MAY LEGALLY COME BEFORE SAID MEETING.

John West remarked on the good presentations made by the speakers. A round of applause was given for the job done by the School Board. Lou Barker addressed his support for the Board.

There was no other business and a motion was made by Theresa Whiddon and seconded by Katie Ruoff to adjourn this meeting.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The well-being of students and school staff has always been a high priority. Probably everyone can recall participating in periodic fire drills as a student. These drills have long been a basic and common sense requirement designed to prepare schools for safe evacuation in case of emergency. Those of us who were students during the late 1950's and early 1960's may also remember air raid drills, intended to address the eventuality of nuclear attack. During the past decade, however, societal changes, terrorism, and a greater recognition of the effects of natural disasters and hazardous materials contamination have combined to create a dramatic increase in schools' awareness of and concern for occupant safety. The news media has reported almost daily on events such as the school hostage standoff in southern Russia, the series of devastating hurricanes in Florida this past fall and the Columbine-style plot recently uncovered involving students at a Massachusetts school.

We all hope that disasters or emergencies such as these never impact our community, but recognize that the need for comprehensive emergency planning has become an essential obligation. The New Hampshire Office of Emergency Planning and our local fire and police departments have been instrumental in assisting us with development of a pro-active, workable plan for addressing a wide variety of situations ranging from intruders in the building to severe weather conditions to a hazardous chemical release in our vicinity. Among the emergency plan's guiding principles are that a leadership structure is established, specific standardized functions and tasks are assigned to school personnel, procedures are kept as automatic, basic and user-friendly as possible, school personnel and students become familiar and comfortable with their roles and responses in advance and practices are regularly conducted to assess our plan's readiness and effectiveness.

In Chichester, all but the main office doors are locked and regularly monitored throughout the day. Staff and approved visitors wear identification badges. Emergency response teams have been established. Within each team, specific roles and responsibilities, such as first aid, communications or student safety, are assigned based upon individual skills, knowledge and training.

Emergency drills of various types have become ever more routine. Students and staff practice exercises such as lock-downs, reverse evacuations and secure classroom drills designed to prepare for specific emergencies. At the conclusion of such exercises, responses are critiqued and suggestions for improvement strategized.

The process of equipping the school with basic emergency supplies and materials is underway. Grants, donations and budgeted funds have been utilized to provide many classrooms with emergency kits containing such items as class lists, space blankets, bandages, cold packs, flashlights and other basic gear. The school nurse has compiled a similar emergency kit intended to address more complex and specific medical needs. Incident safety vests and radios to facilitate internal communication as well as contact with police and fire officials have been obtained, and the school kitchen tries to keep a supply of non-perishable, easily prepared foods on hand. A quick-reference chart of various emergency procedures has been compiled and distributed.

None of us can predict with any certainty if or when we will be called upon to utilize our training and preparations in response to a real crisis. We all believe, however, that the effort and resources given to emergency preparedness is a wise and worthwhile investment.

#### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

Chichester Central School has lived through another year of the "No Child Left Behind: (NCLB) Act. While the requirements continue to increase, our teachers and administration continue to rise to the challenge, helping our 3<sup>rd</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders to meet adequate yearly progress (AYP) for the third year in as many years of testing. As we sit through all the school board meetings we have every year, the school board is continually amazed at the ingenuity, the resourcefulness, and the positive attitude we see and hear about in regards to the approaches used to accomplish all of the progress in our kids. I'd like to share a few of them with you here.

In terms of the capabilities of our staff, each and every one of our teachers have met the "highly qualified teacher" (HQT) status required by NCLB. Between summer workshops and regular professional development, our entire staff has participated in programs for the integration of higher level thinking into every facet of classroom curriculum. In addition, for the second year in a row, the school received a federal grant, the funds of which are being used to provide an outside consultant to work with the staff in managing and assessing student achievement on the new "grade level expectations" (GLE) being incorporated by the state. She is also working with the staff to improve our language arts curriculum.

Our students are all involved in the "6 Traits of Writing" program. This school-wide approach to writing is providing a common language of instruction and a method of writing that enhances skill levels. Through the funding from a federal grant, all teachers have been trained in this program.

The work of triads, a joint meeting of teachers of a single subject from Pembroke Academy and all the sending school districts (Allenstown, Chichester, Epsom, and Pembroke), is an ongoing effort to align the curriculums across the sending districts and to align those curriculums with the expectations of the Academy's freshmen teachers in order to start each student on an even playing field with their counterparts from the other districts and to provide each of them the smoothest possible transition from grammar school to high school. We already have a process in place that allows our top students to bypass the freshmen Spanish and Math courses and we have recently included the ability for them to also option out of a required "basic technology" course by showing proficiency in each area of the course before leaving 8<sup>th</sup> grade.

An outdoor classroom committee has been formed to design and build an area for educational and recreational enrichment on the lands provided to us by the generous donation of Mrs. Frangione. N.H. Fish & Game has given us some welcome advice on the project and more is being solicited from other groups around the state. The work on this project is being funded by a grant from the N.H. Moose Plates. While it has temporarily stalled due to the frozen ground, it will begin again in earnest this spring.

The Office of Emergency Management provided Comprehensive Emergency Management Planning for Schools (CEMPS) training to school personnel. In response to this planning, the emergency response plan was updated and new drills are being practiced with the students and staff during the school year.

The Citizens' Voice Forum that was held at the school last year has recently provided results from the numerous forums held around the state. This project is partially in response to the court ruling that declared the state was responsible for paying for an adequate education. These results will be reviewed by the school board and presented to all those who participated in that forum (and anyone else that is interested) in the months to come.

Finally, once again our school volunteers won the Blue Ribbon award presented by Partners in Education for outstanding participation.

As can be seen, the school board is extremely proud of our entire staff, our students, and our volunteers. They continually exceed every expectation placed upon them and happily ask for more. There is a great deal to be done as our school continues to prepare itself for the realities of NCLB but we have our own reality: a top-notch, dedicated, motivated, and extremely capable group of people that all work together to provide our children the best possible education. We hope that everyone in town is as proud of our school as we are!

Thank you for your continued support of our school community. Without your support, both financially and through participation, the experience and knowledge gained by our students would not be as valuable.

#### Principal's Report

No Child Left Behind; Adequate Yearly Progress; Grade Level Expectations. New regulations and guidelines have been placed upon schools in an effort to insure that every child meets specified standards at the end of each academic year. For the past several years, the school board and administration have had a yearly goal that articulates the need for the school district to carefully move towards compliance with the federal act. NHEIAP test scores and the results from the Iowa Test of Basic Skills have given the staff data that helps to adjust and improve curriculum. The math committee studied several different programs and will begin using the new Harcourt series in grades 5 and 6. These new textbooks incorporate the grade level standards along with vocabulary that is important for the students to know. This series also maximizes the use of technology, allowing each student to have available an e-book. Textbooks on-line make learning easier and more accessible. Six traits of writing and 4 Blocks are utilized in the language arts area.

Last year, the school received a federal E-grant in the amount of \$36,069 which is being used to promote grade level curriculum development. This summer, the school was awarded \$32,060, which is being dedicated to sustained professional development. A curriculum specialist will be visiting the school from November through March to provide teachers with strategies and pedagogy that will strengthen student learning. We will also be using a new electronic assessment tool which will give teachers specific and immediate feedback on a child's strengths and weaknesses. For the last three years, Chichester Central School has met and/or exceeded the requirements for adequate yearly progress. The staff is committed to implementing strategies that will promote excellence in each child.

We welcomed several new staff members to the CCS community: Laurie Jaquith (Title I and math tutor), Sarah Downer (Speech and Language), and Nancy Joy (PE). We also, sadly, said good-bye to a long-time employee of the school—Mr. Francis Pike. Mr. Pike worked at the school for 16 years, doing just about anything that needed to be done. In his own quiet manner, he made sure the school was "up and running" so that the students would have a clean and warm building in which to learn. We said good-bye but we have not forgotten the hardworking, dedicated man that gave many years of service to Chichester Central School.

The Citizens Voice Project solicited from many Chichester residents their view of what makes for an adequate education. As a result of community input, the school has outlined how we address: leadership, being good citizens, structure and discipline, lifelong learners, effective communication, life skills, and curriculum. A direct change of programming was the result of information we received which included: 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders now having a formal study skills program; middle school students have choices in fine arts; and the community service requirement has been formalized and tied into social studies.

Many of the 286 students at CCS took part in a variety of co curricular activities during the 2003-2004 school year. Basketball, soccer, cross-country, baseball, softball and cheering gave our students the opportunity to participate in team sports that were sometimes competitive in nature. Other organizations gave students the occasion to shine in a myriad of areas, including: technology club, drama, Lego League, band, newspaper, yearbook, dance team, dance committee, geography

and spelling bees, and poetry night. Providing children with after-school activities makes for "shining stars" in non-traditional learning settings.

We are thankful for the amount of support we receive each year from the community. The outdoor classroom committee has been busy working with NH Fish and Game and (CULLEN) to map trails to be used by the school and town. A \$4940 grant from NH Moose Plates is covering the set-up expenses. Our PTO organized the Welcome Back Bar-be-cue, Pancake Breakfast with Santa, Family Fun Nights and other family oriented activities. The number of hours that volunteers gave to the school once again resulted in CCS being given a Blue Ribbon Award from Partners in Education.

Whether children are having fun at the winter carnival, being recognized for outstanding writing with a 'Pen and Ink' ribbon, or working with a group to complete a science experiment, we always strive to provide activities that develop a child socially, emotionally, physically, and academically. We recognize and appreciate the time that parents spend with their children in the pursuit of excellence. Together we will impact the future, clearing a way for each child to reach their full potential.

## REPORT ON COMPLIANCE AND ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

December 18, 2004

The School Board Chichester School District Chichester, New Hampshire

I have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business type activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, each major fund, and the aggregate reaming fund information of Chichester School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2004, which collectively comprise the Chichester School District's basic financial statements and have issued my report thereon dated December 18, 2004. I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

### Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Chichester School District's financial statements are free of material misstatements, I performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants, non-compliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of my audit, and accordingly, I do not express such an opinion. The results of my tests disclosed no instances of non-compliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

## Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing my audit, I considered the Chichester School District's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine my auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing my opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting. My consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessary disclose all matters in the internal control over financially reporting that might be a reportable condition or material weaknesses. A reportable condition involve matters coming to my attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design of operation of the internal control over financial reporting that, in my judgment could adversely affect Chichester School District's ability to record, process, summarize and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the general purpose financial statements. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one of more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. I noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that I consider to be material weaknesses.

This report is intended for the information and use of the audit committee, management, others within the organization, School Board, and federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

I extend my thanks to the officials and employees of the Chichester School District for their assistance during the course of my audit.

Appendix on Internal Controls

This is an Appendix to the December 18, 2004 Chichester School District report on internal controls and compliance based on an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. The following are items that came to my attention during the audit regarding the design and operations of internal controls and compliance with laws, regulations, and other provisions of contracts and grants:

# 1. School Lunch Deficit

Criteria: The school lunch program is a self supporting fund.

- Condition: Over the past few years, the expenditures in the school lunch program have been greater than the revenue. This has resulted in a deficit (negative) undesignated fund balance at June 30, 2004 of \$50,067. The deficit has been carried by the generally fund cash flows, but is getting to a size that it may be difficult for the general funds cash flows to cover the deficit.
- Cause: The food cost and related program costs may not have been adequately monitored. The student census is small, and the food service program does not include a snack bar.
- Recommendation: The School Board considers budgeting a general fund transfer of funds to cover the past deficit. For future program years, the programs revenue needs to be increased or program expenditures need to be lowered, or a combination of both. If balancing the school lunch program within it revenues is not deemed the method of choice, an annual appropriation in the general fund should be made to support the school lunch program.
- Management Response: Beginning with fiscal year 2004/05, the School Board has begun budgeting, in the General Fund under Transfer to Food Service, an amount to cover the cost of salary and benefits for the Food Service Director. The intent is that this appropriation will cover the short falls being experienced by the program and will begin covering the past deficit.
