#### Selectmen Joseph P. Ford Twenty Years As A Lee Selectmen

Joe Ford was born in Arlington, Massachusetts to parents from County Cork, Ireland. He moved frequently during his childhood in Massachusetts and New Hampshire. In 1948, Joe graduated from Wolfeboro's Brewster Academy and in 1952 enrolled in the University of New Hampshire (UNH).

As a college freshman, he was elected as a state legislator from Wolfeboro for two terms. He graduated in 1956 from UNH with a major in Political Science and also holds a Masters Degree in Public Administration from the Harvard Graduate School (now the Kennedy School).

In 1958-1959, he went to Washington, D.C. as a Congressional Fellow with Perkins Bass and then Clifford Case.

Beginning in 1959, as a member of the UNH Political Science Department, he began teaching local government and American/State Politics.

He has been a member of the town of Lee's Advisory Budget Committee since 1976, over 22 years! He was first elected as a Selectmen in 1978 and has been a member of the Executive Committee of the New Hampshire Municipal Association since 1988. His special concerns include protecting the environment and controlling the tax rate. His interests include reading (especially history and political biographies) and bird-feeding.

#### Selectmen Dwight E. Barney Ten Years As A Lee Selectmen


Dwight Barney is an Associate Professor at the Thompson School of Applied Science with the University of New Hampshire (UNH). He has been with UNH for 27 years serving first as an Extension Livestock Specialist and then as Associate Professor. He teaches courses in Animal Science and Meat Science serving students in the two and four year Animal Science and Food Service Programs. He is a member of a number of professional educational associations including the American Society of Animal Science and the American Meat Science Association.

He has not only served as a Lee Selectmen for the last ten years but as a Selectmen's representative to the Lee Planning Board and Lee Fire Department. He is a Strafford County Farm Bureau member and one of the hosts of Lee Country Days, an agricultural open barn day where farmers from Lee and surrounding communities join together and invite the public to Lee farms to learn about local agriculture and to enjoy the open space.

Dwight maintains a small sheep farm on Cartland Road in Lee, where he raises registered Tunis sheep under the name Woolmark Farm. The primary focus of the farming operation is the sale of purebred breeding stock to Tunis breeders across the country. Dwight is currently a Director of the National Tunis Sheep Association. He is a sheep, swine, beef and working steer judge who often judges both adult and 4-H exhibitors in animal shows throughout the northeast. His interests include agricultural and conservation issues and he is an avid supporter of 4-H Youth programs.

#### MINUTES OF THE 1998 TOWN MEETING LEE, NEW HAMPSHIRE MARCH 10, 1998

The March 1998 Town Meeting for the Town of Lee, New Hampshire was called to order at 8:00 a.m. at the Mast Way School on Tuesday, March 10, 1998 by Assistant Town Moderator J. Phillip Stetson. Mr. Stetson read the Town Warrant: To the inhabitants of the Town of Lee, County of Strafford, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Mast Way School on Tuesday, The tenth day of March, 1998 to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see if the will vote to adopts amendments to the Lee Zoning ordinance as proposed by the Lee Planning Board.
- 3. Articles 3 to 29 will be acted upon at the Mast Way School on Wednesday, March 11, 1998 at 7:30 p.m.

Sworn in as ballot clerks were: Doree Townsend, Faye Keniston, Richard Smith, Madge Smith, Laura Gund, Inez Bromage, J. Derek Seeley, Beryl Banks, Janice Neill, Linda Schier, Cynthia Nizzari-McClain, Patricia Jenkins, Candice Pratt Stetiler, Frederick Stetiler, Dwight Barney, Winfield Bassage.

J. Phillip Stetson and Suzanne DeRocchi were sworn in as Assistant Moderator. Also present were the Supervisors of the Checklist, Joan Seeley, Marian Kelsey and Clara Kustra. Town Clerk, Penelope A. Stetson, Deputy Town Clerk Suzanne DeRocchi and Assistant Town Clerk Joyce LaPierre were also present. Selectmen Wellington was present for the opening of the polls.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendments to the Lee Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Lee Planning Board.

Assistant Moderator J. Phillip Stetson closed the polls at 7:00 p.m. and the Town Meeting was recessed to March 11, 1998 at 7:30 p.m. at the Mast Way School.

The 1998 Town Meeting was reconvened on Wednesday March 11, 1998 at 7:30 p.m. to act upon articles 3 through 29. Moderator Dale T. Swanson stated as all of us know that he does not adhere to strict application of Robert Rule of Order. Over the number of years that he has been doing this it has been some variation of that, some probably call it Dale's Rule of Order but it is a matter of common sense, civility and courtesy. Mr. Swanson reminded everybody to check in with the Supervisors and pick up their voter card. He then read the results of the ballot vote held on Tuesday March 10, 1998. Mr. Swanson also gave the results of the Oyster River School vote. He noted that the two bond issue did not pass. Articles 5 through 12 were all adopted.

# ARTICLE II Proposed Zoning Amendments For 1998 Lee Zoning Ordinance

The Following Changes would occur to the Lee Zoning Ordinance if adopted: <u>Changes are underlined</u>; Deletions are in (**bold** parentheses).

1.) Article V, Section D, Special Exceptions, second number 3;

Only one (1) residential structure and/or (1) business (structure), shall be permitted for that use on each lot.

2.) Article V, Residential Zone, Section D, Special Exceptions; Begin this section with the following purpose and intent statement;

The purpose of this section is to allow, on a selective basis, certain types of low-impact enterprises to be located in the residential zone. The intent is not to allow such enterprises in the midst of compact residential subdivisions or neighborhoods, but rather in areas which are otherwise suitable to such uses. Such enterprises should be low-impact in terms of noise, lighting, hours of operation, traffic, etc., so as to inflict as little disturbance as possible on the quality of life of nearby residences.

3.) New Article; If adopted would then change all subsequent Article Numbers only that follow for chronological numbering of the Zoning Ordinance.

Article XXI, Airports and Heliports, Private or Commercial;

**Definitions of General Terms:** 

Airport, Commercial: A facility used for landings and takeoffs by commercial and private fixed wing or rotary wing aircraft. Such a facility typically includes aircraft parking and service facilities.

Airport, Private: A tract of land used for landings and takeoffs by fixed winged or rotary wing aircraft belonging to the owner or lessor of the land or to a third party using the tract of land with the permission of the owner or lessor of the land.

A. Airports and Heliports: Private and commercial airports and heliports shall be prohibited in all Zoning districts or Zones within the Town of Lee.

Mr. Swanson introduced Mr. Wellington who thanked everybody that voted for him and showed him their support. Mr. Wellington welcomed us to the 232 regular annual Town Meeting of the Town of Lee. The town is made up of geography, trees, houses, but the people that make up the community of the town, it's you all that make it all work. Recently the Town of Lee lost one of its most staunch supporters, one of its citizens, in that Lloyd Stevens passed away. We did not forget him in the Town Report, the timing was such that it had already come back from the printer but we promise to do better for another year. Mr. Wellington stated that he wasn't sure what Lloyd would allow him to say here, that probably he has said to much already, but we lost a good friend and in all his years he can not think of anybody who contributed more to this town and we will miss him. Mr. Swanson stated in that respect and considering what Lloyds significant accomplishments have been and knowing that he would be probably be displeased with me, but I would like to applaud Lloyd.

Mr. Ford stated under the operating budget of the town, Article 3, has increased \$117,041 which if over 9% increase. Mr. Ford noted on item #8 personnel administration, that item has increased over 23% due to health insurance and two new town employees. Item # 10, other insurance has decline of 26%, due to appropriation for workman comp and property liability and in both cases there has been a significant decrease. Item #12, Police Department increase of \$30,000 due to the new officer salary has been included in budget. Item 18 special duty, money we appropriate for firemen and police officers on duty at the race track, increase from \$40,000 to \$55,000, this amount does not have any effect on the tax rate, it is actually paid by the owners of the race track paid through the town. Îtem #20 has an increase of \$29,000 due to more volume, increase cost at Turn Key and a new manager position at the recycling center. The total increase in the operating budget is

\$1,413,228

\$117,041 a 9% increase, but if you take into account the transfer of the police officer position and the special duty appropriation the actual increase is closer to 5.8%. Mr. Ford stated the potential impact on our tax rate if all the warrant articles are passed, and given the results of the school vote yesterday plus the county share would be estimated to be \$3.15 per thousands.

#### ARTICLE 3 WAS ADOPTED FOR 1,413,228.00

Mr. Swanson stated on the next five articles he would like some guidance from the legislative body. The next five articles, being article 4,5,6,7 and 8, all deal with the Lee Race Track. and some provisions in addressing the ordinances that relate to the race track. What he would like to entertain and propose is that we would have a full dicussion with regard to all five articles dealing with the race track.. Then we would come back to the articles themselves for voting purposes. He stated that looking at article 4 and 5 and seeking some quidance on how the legislative body wishes to handle that because as he has read article 4, a petitioned article, we already have an ordinance and the article addresses keep the ordinance as it is. It already legally exist. Then what you have from a academic or procedural point of view is when you deal with article 5, which is asking for some proposed modification of the ordinance, even if there was a affirmative vote, if we took article 4 independently and acted upon article 4 and had an affirmative vote then when article 5 was addressed and there was an affirmative vote on article 5 it would then serve as a reconsideration and modification of that.

Mr. Swanson mentioned that Mr. Quirk from the Lee Raceway was here to answer questions. Moderator Swanson then asked if the legislative body would be willing to have a full discussion in regard to all the race track ordinance articles as basically one combined discussion. This was voted on in the affirmative. It was then decided that there would be discussion for one hour. Mr. Swanson then asked the legislative body to vote whether to allow Mr. Quirk to answer questions if there were any. It was voted in the affirmative. Mr. Swanson then asked after the discussion that he would like a motion to discontinue the discussion and move forward on the voting.

After lengthy discussion, several in favor and several against.

Wally Dennis made a motion to close discussion, seconded by Phil Stetson.

#### MOTION TO CLOSE DISCUSSION WAS ADOPTED.

4. <u>PETITIONED WARRANT ARTICLE</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Lee Racetrack Ordinance (latest amendment on March 11, 1992), "so that there be no change outside of the existing, and town approved, 1997-1998 rules and regulations for the Lee Speedway, located on Rte. 125; so that there be no expansion of operating dates from the present 23 days to the proposed 28 days or any track testing days, either on weekdays or weekends."

Mr. Swanson stated what he would like to consider at this time in order to address and dispose of it would be to entertain a motion to table article 4.

Wally Dennis moved to table article 4 pending disposition of article 5.

Mr. Swanson stated article 4 states, lets keep things the way they are and you don't have to vote on that because that's the way it is. he stated that article 5 is the real issue and he was not inclined to say we will take 5 and then try to resurrect 4 as a procedural attempt to reconsider 5.

Wally Dennis withdrew his motion

David Olken moved to table Article 4, seconded by Wally Dennis.

#### MOTION TO TABLE WAS ADOPTED.

5. <u>PETITIONED WARRANT ARTICLE</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Lee Racetrack Ordinance (latest amendment on March 11, 1992), Section 4, Lines 17 to 21 to read: "Said license shall be valid for not more than one (1) year and shall set forth the scheduled events, not to exceed twenty-seven (27), plus three (3) rain dates, per license period, stating the date, time and a brief description of each event."

The addition of the four (4) race dates (two Sunday afternoons and two Friday nights) will fill out the schedule and help assure that Lee USA Speedway remains competitive with other racetracks in the area.

Article 5 was moved by William Henze, seconded by John Chalmers.

Upon a hand count of Yes 97 and No 99 Moderator Swanson asked for a re check on the count and had four people double count and check with each other. the count was Yes 79 and No 111

#### ARTICLE 5 WAS DEFEATED.

6. PETITIONED WARRANT ARTICLE: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Lee Racetrack Ordinance (latest amendment on March 11, 1992), Section 17 by adding the following as Paragraph D: "The racetrack may schedule private safety-testing sessions for no more than four (4) race teams on not more than four (4) days in a month from April 1 to October 31 with the following stipulations: The purpose of the test sessions is to allow race teams to prepare their cars in a safe and proper manner for racing at the racetrack and to give drivers the opportunity to familiarize themselves with the racing surface to improve their skills, therefore reducing the possibility of accidents; Only two cars will be permitted on the track at any one time. The test sessions will be from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday; Test sessions may not be scheduled on more than two (2) consecutive days. All race cars must meet all requirements under this Ordinance, especially the noise level of 97db, and all safety requirements of NASCAR and the race track..

Article 6 was moved by Christine Burke, seconded by John Puffer.

#### ARTICLE 6 WAS DEFEATED

7. <u>PETITIONED WARRANT ARTICLE</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Lee Racetrack Ordinance (latest amendment on March 11, 1992), Section 17, by adding the following as Paragraph C: "Automotive-related flea

markets may be scheduled on the third Sunday of May, June, July, August, in addition to the traditional year-end flea market scheduled for the first weekend in November. It is understood that no engines will be permitted to start during these flea markets, all activities will take place within the confines of the track/pit areas, and only automotive-related vendors will be allowed to participate."

Article 7 was moved by Christine Burke, seconded by Dorothy Horne

#### ARTICLE 7 WAS ADOPTED.

8. <u>PETITIONED WARRANT ARTICLE</u>: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Lee Racetrack Ordinance (latest amendment on March 11, 1992), Section 17, Paragraph A to read: "No use other than vehicular racing, race car safety testing, and automotive-related flea markets shall be scheduled or sponsored at any vehicular racetrack within the Town of lee without written approval of the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Lee, New Hampshire."

Article 8 was moved by Paul Spencer, seconded by Jay Grumbling

#### ARTICLE 8 ADOPTED.

9. <u>PETITIONED WARRANT ARTICLE</u>: To see if the Town will vote to remove the optional elected Town Auditor positions from the official ballot. Since an elected Town Auditor is needed only in the absence of professional auditing firm, and the town intends to continue the use of a professional audit firm, it is unnecessary and superfluous to continue the position on the ballot.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

In an editorial last December, John D. Harrigan, the north country publisher of the <u>Coos County Democrat</u>, wrote that "between 1982 and 1992 the U.S. lost about 50 acres of farmland per hour to development. This is a sad fact all too apparent to anyone who's visited southern New Hampshire, where shopping malls and strip development are marching across the former agrarian landscape with abandon. The sadder fact is that nobody seems to care".

Fortunately, in the town of Lee at least, people do seem to care. Last March, at the annual town meeting, the residents of Lee overwhelmingly approved the Selectmen's proposal to transfer \$100,000 from town surplus into a special fund for land protection. This money, along with other funds and matching grants, will be used either to purchase land outright, or to acquire easements to ensure that certain lands remain as open space.

As a result of this action, the Selectmen last summer appointed a study group - the Town Land Planning Committee - to help identify those lands most in need of protection. There is a sense of urgency in this effort because of the recent surge of development in Lee and the seacoast region. The loss of the historic Booth Farm last year is a case in point - even though the new subdivision, Captain Parker Drive, is attractively done, and even though the developer, Eric Chinburg, has worked with the town to help protect the unique Turtle Pond area. In the coming year we expect to see the loss of several more exceptional open spaces, which only underscores the need for remedial action.

At this year's town meeting (March 10) the Selectmen will recommend the purchase of conservation easements on two parcels of land - the Verrette property (100 acres) off York Lane

and the Brady farm (45 acres) off Wadleigh Falls Road - both of which have pristine frontage on the Lamprey River. We feel that the price for these easements is reasonable, especially since about one-third of the cost will be covered by monies from the federal Wild and Scenic River program (the Lamprey was designated a Wild and Scenic River in 1995) and a donation from the Wharton fund in Boston. These external funds were secured through the diligent efforts of Judith Spang, chairman of the Lamprey River Advisory Committee, and Margaret Watkins, the committee's executive assistant.

In the meantime, the Town Land Planning Committee will continue to identify and evaluate those properties which merit protection and whose owners, of course, are willing to help and participate. Generally, these parcels include prime farmland, aquifers, unique wildlife habitats, river shoreland, certain historic sites, and potential park and recreation areas. All of us realize there is a limit to how much we can protect, but we also feel a strong obligation to do everything we can to build a lasting legacy for our children and future generations.

In the last few years the Town Administrator, Tax Collector/Town Clerk and the Treasurer have been working very closely to identify exact sources of revenues. Better identification of revenue receipts and cash flow has enabled the Board to better monitor and control the town's portion of the tax rate.






#### **Determining the 1998 Tax Rate**

The single most important concern to the taxpayer and property owners in Lee is the Tax Rate.

The town's budget has a **DIRECT IMPACT** on the tax rate and yet, the relationship between budgets and tax rates is often the most misunderstood concept for the taxpayer. In an effort to explain how this year's tax rate was determined, what follows is a presentation/explanation of how the 1998 tax rate was computed.

The <u>first concept</u> that must be understood is that the town's operating budget <u>is not the only budget</u> which determines the tax rate. In Lee, the tax rate is made up from three budgets: the town's budget, the Oyster River School District Budget and the Strafford County budget. The budget for town, county and school respectively is determined by the appropriate legislative bodies -- Town Meeting for the town, School District Meeting for the Oyster River School District and the Commissioners of Strafford County for the County.



Once these budgets are voted in by the legislative bodies and forwarded to the State, the state subtracts

anticipated revenues and state income to be returned to the respective school, county and town budgets to come up with the final (or net) appropriation needed for each budget. For 1998, the town of Lee voted to appropriate \$1,748,654 for its operating budget. However, the state determined that due to various revenues to be received by the town, only \$480,851 of the required \$1,748,654 would need to be raised by your property taxes. The same approach is used for the school and county. Revenues can be shared revenues from state funding sources such as Highway Block Grant money or money that a town collects for its services.

The chart on page 58 entitled "1998 Tax Rate Calculation" illustrates the appropriations and revenues used in determining the town's share, the county's share and the school's share of this year's tax rate.

But, you ask, how does the state determine that the town of Lee's tax rate portion will be \$2.41 in order to raise the \$480,851? This is where assessed value of property comes into play. Property (also known as inventory) is everything in the town which has value. Your land and home have a value as do commerical buildings or vacant land. These all are added together to comprise what is known as "Inventory of Value" for a town. The chart on page 59 entitled "1998 Summary Inventory of Valuation" delineates the different categories of inventory for assessment purposes.

It is the responsibility of the Board of Selectmen to report annually to the state the local assessed value of all property within the town of Lee. In a town like ours, which is primarily a residential community, the largest category of assessed value falls under Residential Buildings and Residential Land.

The appropriations voted by the town meeting, Oyster River School District meeting and the Strafford County Commissioners equals the amount of money needed to be raised by taxes. The money needed to be raised by taxes is divided by the property (inventory) values to arrive at the property tax rate. The equation for determining the property tax rate is as follows:

VOTED APPROPRIATIONS minus ALL OTHER REVENUE LOCAL ASSESSED PROPERTY VALUE

X \$1,000 = PROPERTY TAX RATE

Using the figures from our charts on pages 58 and 59, to continue our example: Lee town meeting votes to appropriate \$1,748,654 to fund town operations. Revenues of \$1,307,583 and \$8,947 are deducted and an overlay<sup>2</sup> of \$26,127 and War Credits of \$22,600 are added leaving the balance of money needed to be raised by taxes at \$480,851. This \$480,851 divided by the 1998 property assessed value of \$199,865,849 (taken from chart on page 59) would equal a tax rate of \$2.41. For simplification purposes, property tax rates are expressed per \$1,000 of valuation. Put the values in the formula and it looks like the following:

 $\frac{\$1,748,654 - (\$1,307,583 + \$8,947) + (\$26,127 + \$22,600)}{\$199,865,849}$  X \$1,000 = \$2.41

The formula is repeated for the school and county portions to compute the combined tax rate. This explanation, even though it was intended to be simple, still comes across as complicated, perhaps because it is! It is my sincerest desire, however, that every taxpayer in Lee understands their taxes. Please feel free to give me a call at 659-5414 or stop by the town hall if you would like further explanation.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER

This past year we have seen continued growth in the residential area. Two large subdivisions along with other smaller subdivisions have either been approved or are in the process of being approved. Because interest rates are low and the economy is strong, many people are finding Lee a desirable place to live. With 26 new dwelling units this past year, we expect to see this number increase as more and more subdivisions are being created. One area that has not increased is multi-family development as the trend at this time is more for the demand of single family dwelling units. I expect that it will not be long before the Planning Board will be faced with either condominium or multi-family development requests. Not only Lee, but the towns surrounding us are experiencing more demand for low cost and/or rental housing; it will be only a matter of time before demand will drive builders and developers to offer other types of development to fill that void.

The area around the traffic circle continues to be a hot spot for people interested in commercial growth. We frequently meet with people interested in developing some of the remaining lots in the commercial zone. I expect the town will see further development requests in this area as well. Due to environmental and wetland issues associated with some of these lots, much time will be spent to evaluate and permit these sites.

A total of one hundred thirty-two (132) permits were issued for the fiscal year 1997-1998 with an estimated cost of construction totaling \$4,259,894.00 dollars. A breakdown of the types of permits follows on the next page:

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF LEE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Members of the Lee Fire Department responded to a record 185 calls for assistance during 1998. This surpasses the previous record of 182 responses set in 1996. Continuing growth throughout the Southern New Hampshire region is the primary reason for this increase. This trend is expected to continue through the coming years.

There was a marked increase in motor vehicle accidents during 1998, due in part to the fact Route 125 continues to grow as a major transportation corridor. This presented new challenges for members of the Lee Fire Department. New extrication procedures and materials were put in place to handle the increased severity of accidents experienced along this major thoroughfare. Hazardous materials training remains at the forefront of the department's ongoing curriculum. Thousands of tons of cargo is transported through the town on a daily basis. The department's leadership long ago recognized the potential hazards that could result in the event of a mishap and focus a great deal of energy on developing plans to mitigate any threat to town residents.

Membership in the department essentially remained the same for 1998. All members continue to seek various State of New Hampshire certification levels. New volunteers are required to pass the State's basic Firefighter level one certification after completing a mandatory probationary period with the department.

Perhaps the toughest challenge faced by members of the Lee Fire Department in 1998 came during a severe ice storm in January. Hundreds of homeowners were left without power after the storm when tree limbs took down power lines. Firefighters worked around the clock responding to calls for

assistance. A shelter was established at the fire house. Over one-thousand man hours were logged during the weekend.

The Lee Fireman's Association continues to support the department. Fund raising efforts allowed the association to procure essential tools without impacting the department's budget and alleviated the burden on the town's taxpayers. It is important to note the Association does not receive taxpayer money and relies on volunteers to raise funds throughout the year. A number of dedicated non-departmental people take part in this organization as a way of helping their fellow residents. Membership is open to anyone interested in helping their neighbors.

While no one can predict what type of challenges lie ahead, residents of the town can remain comfortable in the fact a dedicated group of men and women are always at the ready to provide assistance whenever the need arises.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before any outside burning. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands - Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and law enforcement. Early in 1998, we experienced an ice storm which caused severe damage to forests of New Hampshire. This damage created a greater potential fire hazard as well as safety hazards to many areas of the State. Your local Fire Warden and Forest Rangers need your assistance in preventing wildfires in these hard-hit areas and throughout the State. If you need assistance or information dealing with ice damaged woodlands, please call 1-800-444-8978.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local Fire Departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LEE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The past year was a year of change for the Highway Department. It was determined by the Board of Selectmen that the combined position of Highway Supervisor and Transfer Station Manager was becoming too much for one person to handle. In early Spring they decided to create a new full-time position of Transfer Station Manager thereby releasing this duty from the Highway Supervisor. During this year of transition in the creation of another department, the Highway Department spent a fair amount of time at the Transfer Station doing loader work, fabricating bins/containers, chipping brush, maintenance work and providing backup labor support. Additionally, there was a change of personnel in the Highway Supervisor's Assistant position (the only other full-time employee of the department). As the work is so varied, it takes a long time to train someone for this position but our new employee, Warren Hatch, has been coming along very well.

The early Winter of 97-98 started with a bang but, as the new year came to a close, the Highway Budget was in pretty good shape. This allowed the department to catch up a little on paving as most of the 20 subdivision roads in Lee are at an age where they need to be repaved.

The Highway Department equipment is in good shape at this time even though some of it is old and outdated. A couple of examples are the Town's 36-year-old grader (for which new parts are not available) and a plow that is over 31 years old and too small for the truck it goes on.

The most difficult problem to deal with by the Highway Department is the encroachment of landscaping (lawns, walls, fences, trees, etc.) on the highway Right-of-Way by residents. This situation usually results in blocked drainage of town roads complacency about snowplow damage and substantial increase in the cost of doing normal road maintenance.

Below is a list of the road work accomplished during the Summer season in addition to the normal maintenance duties of the department.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF LEE PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Lee Public Library celebrates another great year.....our patron use continues to grow. I would like to thank everyone who uses the library for your continued support of the library in the Lee community. Community input is always welcome.

Our circulation statistics have increased 7.6% over last year. For Fiscal Year 1997/98 we circulated:

The Friends of the Lee Library provided a new PC for Internet use. Ultranet provides the library with free Internet access. This service is available free of charge to our patrons. Free one on one Internet training is available by appointment only. A wide range of CD-ROMS have been purchased for inlibrary use. A list of available CD-ROMS is available at the checkout desk.

The dust has settled and we have been in our new, enlarged library space for two years. The new addition houses the adult fiction and non-fiction material. New books are added weekly. Our collection of adult, young adult and children's books on tape continues to grow. We offer the Boston Globe, Foster's Daily Democrat and The Transcript for our patrons use. The New York Times Book Review magazine is also available. Our magazine section has grown. Thanks to generous donations, we were able to add a free-standing magazine display rack. This houses over 59 magazines for adult readers. We are constantly looking for ways to improve our service to the community.

Programs have resumed at the library. We offer an after-school program for students in Grades 4 and up. This year the library aides worked on performing a special storytime at the end of the program. Each week we explored the Dewey Decimal System and other library skills. This program begins in January and ends in May. We offer storytimes three times a week. Turtletales meets on Wednesday at 1:00 p.m. for children, ages 5 and under; Minnietales meets Thursday at 10:30 a.m. for children 3 and under and Ducktales meets on Friday at 10:30 a.m. for children ages 5 and under. There is no pre-registration for our storytimes. We offer three Summer reading programs each year. We have one for children ages 8

and above. All of our Summer programs are self motivated. These programs are always free.

I wish to thank the Friends of the Lee Library officers and members for their continued hard work to provide funding for additional programs and materials for the library. I would like to thank the Library Trustees for their work and dedication to the library and the community. I would like to thank our special checkout desk volunteers: Carolyn Storer, Shirley Callan, Joanne Reed and our student volunteers Anu Vasudevan and Josiah LaPointe for their volunteer spirit that lives in the Lee community.

As I enter my eleventh year at the Lee Library, I wish to thank the community for their continued support for the library in the community. I wish to extend my personal invitation to all members of the Lee community - visit your Town library before you purchase the new book at your local bookstore or purchase a library card at another library. We try to uphold the saying "There is something for everyone at the Lee Public Library". And remember, if we do not have the material, we can borrow from all the libraries in the State of New Hampshire.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF LEE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Lee continues its residential growth. There are developments being built at the end of the fiscal year and several more planned for the new fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999. This increase in population causes an increase in crime. Crime per capita has not increased, only the population. But that does bring new challenges for the police.

This year we encountered our first Internet crime. We do not have officers who have any training in Internet Crime; we are struggling to learn so that we may at least keep up with the criminals. Development of a Web site for the police department will take place during the next budget cycle enabling personnel to use it as a learning tool and allowing citizens to have contact with the police department via the NET.

As an agency, reaching our allotment of five full-time officers continues to be a challenge. All full time officers are required to complete the New Hampshire Police Academy. The new full time COPS officer was hired and sent to the academy. Within a short time after his graduation, Officer Sandra Hebert gave her notice. She visited her sister in Alaska and decided that was where she wanted to live. We then entered a hiring process, hired a new officer, and sent him to the academy from which he graduated at the end of November. Following his graduation several months of training need to take place before this officer (or any new incoming officer) will have an understanding of Lee and the desires of its citizens regarding the operation of the police department.

The Administrative Office of the Courts has notified us that the Durham District Court will be closing during fiscal year 1999 – 2000. This will cause a tremendous change in the workload for the police department. Closure of the court in Durham means we will have to go to the Dover District Court.

This means that Lee's court cases will be heard with cases from the Somersworth District Court and the Dover District Court. Not only will it take longer to get to the Court to file the necessary paperwork, there will be much longer periods of time that officers will be tied up waiting to testify translating into greater overtime costs for Lee.

The amount of clerical work that is produced has increased since Lee budgeted for a full time clerical person in the police department in 1984, some 14 years ago. In the next budget, we will be looking to add a ½ time clerical person to attempt to keep up with the present workload.

In last year's budget request we asked for a SPOTS (State Police Online Telecommunications Service) terminal. That item was taken out of the request during the budget process. A SPOTS terminal is used to get motor vehicle registration information, drivers license information, criminal record checks, arrest data on arrested persons, and information from other police departments nation wide. This information is sought in every criminal investigation, motor vehicle incident, arrest and in many permitting cases such as permits to carry loaded concealed firearms. Currently, such information is produced at the Durham Dispatch Center, which costs additional moneys based on our usage, and it requires that an officer drive to the Dispatch Center in Durham to get the information. This does not seem to be cost effective. The addition of the terminal in Lee would eliminate most of the costs and would make our officers more efficient. The cost of the terminal is the same for every police department in the state and is assessed by the Department of Safety. We hope that the Town will see the need to give us this essential tool this year.

Statistically this year our calls for incidents including investigations increased only 1.9%. Our arrests for incidents increased by 11.9% which would indicate that the addition of the full time COPS officer has allowed us to solve more crimes

and arrest the individual responsible for the incidents. It should also be noted that motor vehicle accidents have decreased over the past year although the seriousness of the motor vehicle accidents has increased along with the number of fatalities. There is need for several years of data to determine if there is a trend.

The men and women of the department would again like to take this opportunity to thank the residents of Lee for their support during the previous year. We look forward to serving you over the next year.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF LEE TRANSFER STATION


The Lee Transfer Station has seen an increase in the volume of waste received at the facility this year. Bulky waste/demolition has increased the greatest due to the growing number of new homes and improvements to existing homes being done this year. Household waste has also increased as we are seeing more residents using the Transfer Station. The cost of transporting and disposing of the waste handled by the Transfer Station is increasing at an alarming rate and I am investigating ways to limit that increase.

Revenues from the sale of recyclables are continuing to decrease but, we must remember, every ton we recycle is money that we saved by not paying to have that waste hauled to a landfill for disposal.





#### ANNUAL REPORT OF CEMETERY TRUSTEES

Since our first official meeting on May 14, 1997, the Cemetery Trustees have accomplished a great deal. The Town of Lee is responsible for not only Lee Hill Cemetery but Old Parish Cemetery (formerly Gile Cemetery) on the corner of Mast Road and Garrity Road plus 13 private cemeteries with Trusts scattered about Town on various roads. Our first order of business was to site review each cemetery and determine its requirements insofar as maintenance and then discuss a course of action to accomplish this.

We began with Lee Hill Cemetery and its needs. Goals accomplished were new underground water complete with new spigots equipped with handicapped handles and hooks to hold watering cans for the use of patrons as well as the installation of trash receptacles which help keep the area tidy. Stones were washed and some repaired not only at Lee Hill but at Old Parish as well.

This work greatly improved the looks at both cemeteries. Plans for 1999 include the washing of stones in the Private Trust Cemeteries as well. Brush was cut back, bushes pruned and trees trimmed and all grassy areas in Lee Hill and Old Parish received an application of fertilizer. No Dogs Allowed signs were placed at all entrances to the Lee Hill Cemetery and two signs towards the back (one of which has disappeared, I might add). The Trustees realize that the cemetery is most inviting to walk in or through but felt this was not a place for dogs to be walked for obvious reasons. We would like to thank the residents of Lee who walk through the cemetery for observing these restrictions. We are most grateful.

Future plans call for some type of fencing for Lee Hill and repairs to fencing at this cemetery and some of the Private Trusts. A survey done at the 1997/98 Town Meeting indicated

that most residents felt the Jerith steel fencing was the type most preferred. Some type of wood fence came in second. I am afraid that vinyl-clad chainlink, which would have been the cheapest to install, was the type least preferred. A Trust Fund was established at the meeting with \$ 5,000.00, which we hope will be added to each year, to accomplish this goal at a later date.

Rules and Regulations for the cemetery were reviewed and revised. Cemetery Trust Fund reports were reviewed and several corrections made in regards to names and allocation of what was actually principal and what was interest. This is important because interest can be used but principal may never be. Randolph Stevens was officially appointed Superintendent of Cemeteries by the Trustees, a position he held under the Board of Selectmen, and a small salary instituted in order to compensate for the many extra hours spent evenings and weekends working in the cemeteries. Although we hired a private contractor to mow both Lee Hill and Old Parish, Mr. Stevens continues to mow by hand all thirteen Private Trust cemeteries for which the Town is responsible. We voted this salary in order to express our sincere appreciation for Mr. Stevens dedication and hard work which we greatly appreciate.

A storage shed was installed in Lee Hill and supplies such as memorial flags, holders, trash bags, etcetera stored there. It will also provide winter storage for trash receptacles, watering cans and other cemetery supplies needed and have them on site when needed which is very convenient.

The Trustees also replaced veterans' flag holders, which were previously PVC plastic piping stuck in the ground, with attractive, bronze holders which indicate in which war the veteran served for the placement of memorial flags for all veterans' graves at Lee Hill, Old Parish and all Private Trust cemeteries.

Additional plans for 1999/2000 include additional stone washing and repair, repairs to the front fence at Lee Hill Cemetery and fence repair at Old Parish and some of the Private Trust cemeteries. We want to plant some trees in Lee Hill and, of course, the new storage shed will receive a coat of light gray stain to help it blend in with its surroundings.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF LEE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

#### **Major Activities During 1998:**

Protection of Open Space and Wetlands - The Lee Conservation Commission has been actively working with the Town's Board of Selectmen to expand the area of protected Wetlands and open space within the Town. The Commission has sought to identify environmentally important parcels within the Town, assist in the negotiations with landowners and provide financial support from Commission funds for survey costs, sales options and other incidental expenses related to land purchase or the granting of Conservation Easements.

Management of Town Lands - Members of the Commission are working with other groups from the Town to develop a comprehensive management plan for the property owned or under management by the Town.

Advice to Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment In accordance with its primary responsibilities, the Conservation Commission has served as advisor to the Planning Board and the Zoning Board of Adjustment on matters relating to the protection of Wetlands and related matters within the Town. This responsibility resulted in a number of visits to sites related to development or zoning adjustments.

4H Conservation Camp Scholarship - The Conservation Commission continued its practice of awarding a Lee resident with a full scholarship to the 4H Conservation Camp. The

Assistance to the Town Road Agent - The Chairperson of the Conservation Commission, Dave Allan, has worked throughout the year with Road Agent Stevens in a variety of matters involving roadways and Wetland areas throughout the Town.

Oversight of the Town's Conservation Easements - The Conservation Commission has formally adopted the standards recommended by the New Hampshire Land Trust Alliance for the management of the Town's Conservation Easements and, in fulfilling its responsibilities, has visited those properties during the year.

Map of Town's Lee Hill Property - Member Richard Weyrick prepared a map displaying the property owned by the Town around Lee Hill and Wheelwright Pond.

Guided Tours of Town Conservation Land - Richard Weyrick organized a formal series of nature tours of the Town's conservation properties.

Lee Country Day - Members Anne Tappan and Silas Gund developed a pond exhibit and conducted demonstrations of Wetland organisms as a component of Lee Country day. In addition, Richard Weyrick distributed information concerning conservation issues within the Town.

**Thanks** - The Conservation Commission wishes, again, to express its thanks to Vohnny Weyrick for her attractive posters and other activities in publicizing the tours of the conservation lands.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF FRIENDS OF LEE LIBRARY

The Friends ended 1997 with another successful Holiday House Tour thanks to the participants who graciously invited the public into their homes. At least thirty local volunteers and a number of local residents provided generous donations of trees adding beauty to the houses and farms. We especially appreciated the dedication and abilities of Alice Tansey, who organized the tour, as well as the artistic skills of Ann MacKinnon, who spent many hours lending decorating touches to the homes. We truly have them to thank for providing us with this most enjoyable event.

Fundraising enables the Friends to purchase items for the library and to enhance the quality and variety of the resources available for use by the public. Proceeds for the year came not only from the House Tour (@ \$1000) but also from Friend's memberships, individual donations, car washes, bake sales, Tshirt sales, raffles and Doggie Walk-a-Thons. Some of the items purchased this past year for the library included a new computer (with Internet access) for patron use, Encarta, laser printer, surge protector, 100 Years of National Geographic (CD-ROM), The Stateman's Yearbook, The Boston Globe, a dehumidifier, items for the children's Summer Reading Program and public passes to the Christa McAuliffe Planetarium, The Children's Museum of Portsmouth (Summer), The Museum of N. We were fortunate to have local Globe columnist Don Murray and award-winning novelist Carolyn Coman discuss the writing process, as well as local gardener and artist, Jill Nooney, narrate her intriguing slide show entitled "Irreverent Garden Art."

At our Annual Meeting in May, we welcomed Gladi Porsche, Mary Stumhofer, Wendy Moloney and Susan Thran as new Board members and Mariette Young as Vice-President. Carla Contarino was re-elected as Secretary, Marie Richards was re-elected as Treasurer and Alice Tansey and Toby Gordon were re-elected as Board members. We said good-bye to Gloria Quigley, whose years of work with the Friends was much appreciated.

No pun intended, but to wrap up this year in review, I'd like to tell you about a Friends project which some of you may not be aware of. It has taken place quietly in local homes, being passed from person to person in centuries-old tradition, as each person contributes to it her own special touch to create a masterpiece. #### ANNUAL REPORT OF LAMPREY RIVER ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Lamprey River Advisory Committee has had an active year. Committee member Dick Wellington has spearheaded the production of a 20-minute video portraying the Lamprey River through history. Upon completion, the video will be made available to libraries, historical societies and schools in the region.

The park at the Wiswall Dam in Durham is nearing completion and will be officially named John Hatch Park. John was a founding member of the Committee and was a well-known artist and professor at UNH. Funds from the U. S. Parks Service have been put to good use preserving this site for passive recreation. It is also on the National Register of Historic Places. John Wastrom, a stonemason whose specialty is restoration, has been engaged to restore the stone wall in the park. A monument to John Hatch will also be featured. Land preservation along the river is a priority for the Committee and, so far, 14 acres of property owned by the Weeks family have been protected. The Committee is working on securing easements for the Verrette and Brady properties, totaling 9,000 feet of river frontage and more than 200 acres of land.

U. S. Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt came to the banks of the Lamprey on the Spang property to recognize successful efforts by the Committee to secure Wild and Scenic designation for the river in Lee, Durham and part of Newmarket on that program's 30th Anniversary. He said, "This designation is a model for the entire nation." He expressed strong support for the fish ladder that is needed at Durham's Wiswall Dam and expressed concern for the way stream flows are regulated on rivers such as the Lamprey. The Committee is working with Babbitt's office to secure funding for more river conservation.

Students and teachers from the Epping Middle School have been working with the Committee, UNH, the Lamprey River Watershed Committee and Volunteer River Monitoring Coordinator Beth Malcolm monitoring the river in Epping at 7 locations. So far, the river in Epping appears to be in good health with the exception of areas adjacent to the Wastewater Treatment Plant. The school obtained a grant to purchase equipment and develop a brochure on their work from the New Hampshire Estuaries Project, funded by the Environmental Protection Agency. The Committee also actively supported Epping's move to obtain Federal funds to improve the plant.

Wildlife habitat and, in particular, the habitat of the endangered species the Blanding's Turtle, has been done on the Verrette property and in the oxbow near Camp Hedding in Epping. These turtles are important ecologically as well as indicators of the health of the river.

The Committee, working with regional planning commissions, has developed a sophisticated set of GIS maps for Lee, Durham and Newmarket with partial coverage in Epping. A set of recent aerial photos are also available, commissioned by the Committee for use in the Lamprey River video project.

Judith Spang of Durham chairs the Committee with Dick Dewing, Dick Lord and Gary Lauten being members from Durham. Joe Ford, Sharon Meeker, Kitty Miller, Dick Wellington and Brian Giles represent Lee, Sue Beaulieu the Town of Newmarket and Kevin Martin, the Town of Epping. The Committee works with both the State's River Protection Program and the National Park Service's Wild and Scenic Rivers Program.

The board reviewed and approved a site review application made by Purdy Funeral Services for a funeral chapel on Rt. 4 in the commercial zone. The board reviewed and accepted the application for site review made by John Andriola/William Martin for a golf driving/practice range to be located on Rt. 4 in the residential zone.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE

The Transfer Station saw nominal increases in the volume of materials received. Revenues from the sale of recyclables were down and the markets yielded less money for the same recycling efforts.

It was determined by the Board of Selectmen that the combined position of Highway Supervisor and Transfer Station Manager was becoming too much for one person to handle. In early Spring they decided to create a new full-time position of Transfer Station Manager thereby releasing this duty from the Highway Supervisor. James Andersen was hired for the new position of Manager of the Transfer Station.

With the presence of an on-site Transfer Station Manager, sticker regulations have been enforced and the appearance of the facility has been greatly improved. A program utilizing volunteers was initiated to staff the Swap Shop and other areas of the facility. The volunteers offer assistance to users and help the manager maintain the facility.

The Committee has been alerted to the projected growth of the Town as evidenced by new areas being developed for housing. This is expected to show increased use of the transfer facility.

Thanks goes to all the volunteers whose time and effort have helped make the Transfer Station facility a better place for the users. A special thanks to Randy Stevens for his years of dedication to the development and implementation of the Transfer Station and the recycling program.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

During the 1997-98 fiscal year, action was taken by the Zoning Board of Adjustment on Twelve (12) applications resulting in fourteen (14) actions.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment reviewed and acted on (4) Special Exceptions, (6) Variance requests, (2) Amended Special Exceptions, (1) Appeal from an Administrative Decision, and (1) Equitable Waiver of Dimensional Requirements.

A Variance was granted to Cynthia Lansol to allow the placement of a larger mobile home on a site. A Variance was granted to Sullivan Tire to allow them to become a truck inspection station. A Variance was granted to Alan Lapointe to allow an addition to the existing building at Alan's Diesel Service. A Variance was granted to Katherine McRae to allow the temporary placement of a mobile home on site while a stick built home was being constructed. A Variance was granted to John Andriola/William Martin to allow a golf driving range use on property located on Rt. 4.

A Special Exception was granted to Joel Bedard for a wetlands crossing for a driveway to access a building lot. A Special Exception was granted to Thomas Perry to allow a wetlands crossing to access a building lot. A Special Exception was granted to John Andriola/William Martin to allow a wetlands crossing to access a golf driving range area of a site. A Special Exception was granted to Roy Wilson to allow a water impoundment (pond) to be constructed on a site. A Special Exception was granted to Charles Goodstein to amend a previous Special Exception to include an additional detention pond to be constructed on the site. A Special Exception was granted to Arthur Wheeler to amend a previous Special

Exception to include the addition of a 50' x120' building for storage to be constructed on site.

Sullivan Tire Inc. requested an Appeal for Administrative Decision which was denied for an inspection station.

An Equitable Waiver of Dimensional Requirements was requested and granted to Amanda Esposito which allowed a side building setback of 9 +/- feet.

A Variance was requested by James Daley on behalf of Daley Realty Trust to allow the expansion of a non-conforming use for the existing transportation business for parking, and was denied.

All applications are on file at the Office of Planning & Zoning and are available for review by the public upon request.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF DURHAM AMBULANCE CORPS.

In 1998, the Durham Ambulance Corps. celebrated its 30th anniversary of providing 24-hour emergency service to Durham, Lee, Madbury and the University of New Hampshire in memory of Dr. George G. McGregor. The Corps. is a private, non-profit, volunteer service funded by patient billing, appropriations from the communities and donations.

1998 was another record-breaking year for the DAC with 966 responses to emergency medical calls. There were 373 calls in Durham (38.61%), 292 calls to the UNH campus (30.22%), 186 calls in Lee (19.25%), 38 calls in Madbury (3.93%) and 77 mutual aid calls to other communities (7.97%).

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS IN 1998**

Several DAC members completed Emergency Medical Technician - Intermediate (EMT-I) training. This 110+ hour program trains EMTs to perform advanced patient assessments, administer intravenous fluids and medication and insert endotracheal airways. Corps. volunteers now include 4 paramedics, 1 paramedic student, 14 EMT-Is and several EMT-I students.

We have continued to explore community needs and, in planning for the future, we are meeting with representatives of the communities we serve to do strategic planning.

We have recruited many new members and are continuing to offer scholarship funding for EMT training to permanent area residents.

#### **GOALS FOR 1999**

Public education and Corps. member training programs will be expanded by increasing paid personnel time dedicated to educational tasks.

We will begin the process of purchasing a new ambulance, including exploring various options, meeting with vendors and writing specifications.

We will formalize the Quality Improvement process, including revision of the patient satisfaction survey that is sent to all patients so that the survey results may be used to numerically track patient satisfaction.

We owe a great deal of thanks to the communities and citizens of Durham, Lee, Madbury and UNH for their continued support and especially for their generous response to our fundraising efforts. We would also like to thank the Durham, Lee and Madbury Fire Departments, the Durham-UNH Communications Center and the Durham, UNH, Lee and Madbury Police Departments for their support. Most of all, we would like to thank all the DAC volunteers for their many hours of dedicated service that has enabled us to provide state-of-theart emergency medical care to the communities for over 30 years.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF LAMPREY HEALTH CARE

Lamprey Health Care provides a variety of services to residents of your community. Lamprey Health Care has been providing service for 28 years to our communities. We are very proud of this achievement and wish to thank the citizens of Lee for your continuing support so that we can continue to provide service to our neighbors and communities.

The Senior Citizen Transportation Program operated by Lamprey Health Care is one of the most important services provided to residents of the area. The busses provide necessary transportation for food shopping, for medical appointments, the pharmacy and for recreational trips. Residents are picked up at their homes and are assisted with bundles and with shopping, if necessary. The Senior Transportation Program is affiliated with COAST.

All seven of the busses operated by this program are handicapped accessible. Special appointments which cannot be incorporated into the specific routes serving your area are arranged through the Transportation Coordinator and a group of volunteers. The Program almost operates as a "Friendly Callers" program in that the seniors who ride are in contact with the program, and if not, they are checked on to be sure that everything is all right. The Transportation Health Workers (Drivers) from the program also do necessary errands for their riders if they are unable to do them due to illness, etc. This program does a great deal toward keeping our elderly population healthy, independent and in their homes.

The medical services provided by Lamprey Health Care include primary medical care, health promotion and education

and social services. Increased capacity in both our Raymond and our Newmarket centers allows Lamprey Health Care to serve the residents of our local area in a timely and efficient manner. Staffing for both Centers includes seven Board Certified Family Physicians and one Pediatrician. Five Nurse Practitioners and a support staff of Registered and Licensed Practical Nurses, a Dietitian, a Diabetes Educator and Community Health Workers round out the medical team. Medical care provided includes prenatal care, adult medicine and geriatric medicine, as well as, screenings and follow up for various medical conditions including an emphasis on breast and cervical cancer through our Women's Wellness Program.

Lamprey Health Care has a primary mission to provide for the total health needs of the residents of our service area. From prenatal to geriatric care, from primary health care to transportation for seniors, we take great pride in the services provided to the communities we serve.



- outreach office for Strafford County located in Rochester at One Wakefield Street (332-0775);
- accompaniment to medical and legal (police and court) appointments;
- information and referral to related services such as attorneys and therapists;
- support groups for survivors, their parents and partners;
- child sexual assault prevention education programs in area schools, recreation programs, camps and scouts;
- adolescent workshops on sexual harassment and sexual assault:
- professional training and consultation to police departments, hospital and school personnel and human services agencies;
- sexual harassment in the workplace workshops to municipalities and businesses.

Our program is committed to providing support, education and advocacy to all survivors of sexual assault and sexual abuse and their parents, partners and other community members.

The primary objectives of Sexual Assault Support Services are to empower survivors and to support them in their healing process and to educate the community, heightening prevention programs throughout the school system in order to broaden awareness among students, teachers and the community of the issues of sexual assault and harassment. In addition, our staff coordinates with police departments and hospital staff to improve response to sexual assault cases and to assure a supportive environment for the survivors.

Sexual Assault Support Services has provided services for 20 years. Volunteers are welcome and are utilized in all aspects of the program.

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Lee Lee, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Lee as of and for the year ended June 30, 1998 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Lee has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Lee, as of June 30, 1998, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Lee taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Lee. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.
