STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madison qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madison on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1 To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

As follows:

Town officers salaries.

Town officers expenses.

Town hall expenses.

Town Poor.

Street Lights.

Summer highways and bridges.

Winter highways for 1930 and 1931.

Town Library.

Fire Department.

Memorial Day.

State Aid Maintenance.

State Aid Construction.

To see if the town will raise \$100.00 to be expended on the "Salter Road" so called, and appoint Mr. Wm. Salter to act as agent to expend same.

To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road that leads from top of "Savary hill" across land of Mr. Colby and others to the Deer hill road near the bridge.

To see what action the town will take regarding the "Lake Level" at Silver Lake and raise and appro-

priate money for the same.

To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to remove or have removed before May 1st 1930, the stone wall and earth embankment which have been built into Winter Road on the easterly side about five hundred feet southerly from its north end?

Will the town repair the northerly nine hundred feet of Winter Road, making it wide enough for two cars to pass and laying a small corrugated iron culvert at the low spot, and make appropriations therefor?

To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen or appoint agents to sell part of the town property namely, Christi Carter place, Daniel Ward place, land on Danforth Lane, and any others, using the proceeds to reduce town debt.

To see if the town will vote to buy one or more road machines and raise money for the same.

To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to give a quitclaim deed to J. H. Burke covering land he recently deeded to the town, said tract being located near the "Jerry Glidden" place so called.

To see if the town will accept deed of Daniel C. Ward property and agreement for his support.

To see if the town will confirm exchange of land near the fire station with an equal area from Mrs. Emma E. Gerry.

To see what action the town will take regarding purchase of baseball grounds and raise and appropriate money for same.

To see what action the town will take regarding the Boulder Road crossing, also Bathing beach crossing and raise money for the same.

To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to hire not exceeding five thousand dollars on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.

To see what sum of money the town will raise for Old Home Week.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Madison:

I herewith submit my ninth annual report as superintendent of schools, it being the seventeenth in the series of such reports.

The schools have been progressing well this year, except for the absence caused by certain children's diseases. The plan arranged last year for placing the seventh and eighth grades in the high school building has proved satisfactory. We now have a fine group of boys and girls who will receive a better training for high school than could be given in the crowded elementary rooms.

There is good prospect of pupils coming up through the grades to keep our high school in flourishing condition. Madison is blest with a large number of fine boys and girls.

Teachers are as follows:

Charles A. Dodge, Headmaster, University of New Hampshire.

L. May Quimby, Assistant, University of Chicago.

Helene Wheeler, French and Grades VII and VIII, Plymouth Normal.

Mabelle F. Moore, Madison Corner, Portsmouth Training School.

Ethel J. Whiting, Silver Lake, Plymouth Normal

Leola M. Smith, Nickerson, Plymouth Normal.

Lucia A. Morrill, Mason, Plymouth Normal.

There should be a special teacher for music and drawing.

Medical Inspection

This work has been carried on by Miss Harriet Curren. Last spring a dental clinic was held at which service was given to cases needing attention. We appreciate the financial aid given by the Red Cross.

It is expected that the state will help in a pre-school Toxin Anti-toxin clinic this coming spring. We want to do all possible for our fine boys and girls.

Repairs and Improvements

The buildings have been cleansed, floors oiled and furniture varnished. The roof at Madison Corner was repaired and shingled. Shingling was also done at Nickerson, and the inside painted.

Madison is very wise in keeping its schoolhouses in good repair.

For next year cement steps should be provided at Nickerson. Silver Lake schoolhouse should be painted inside and Nickerson painted outside. The underpinning should be reset at Mason schoolhouse.

Statistics

For the year ending June 30, 1929, our schools had an average attendance of 107, an average membership of 113 and a percent of 94.49. Madison Corner and Silver Lake are our largest schools, having a present enrollment of 30 and 31.

High School

The high school is ranked as one of the best in the state. At the anniversary meeting held in Concord last December, a picture of the school building was thrown on the screen and the speaker said "a school which, by tests and by the success of its graduates, stands among the best in the state."

From last year's graduating class of seven, we

sent three girls to Plymouth Normal School, one boy to Bates College and a girl to Malden Business College.

From the class of 1928, William Kennett entered Burdett Business College last fall.

Three of our graduates will complete the work at Plymouth Normal School in June. These will be added to our list of teachers in New Hampshire. Certainly Madison ought to be proud of the fine record of its graduates.

It is interesting to note that September 1, 1929 was the tenth anniversary of the going into effect of the new state law. At a largely attended meeting of school boards in Concord in December, it was shown that school conditions had improved much during the last ten years. The average school year in rural towns has been lengthened to 36 weeks. More children complete the eighth grade and go on to high school. More high school graduates enter post-secondary schools. Fourteen high schools have been established in rural sections. Every town in the state has supervision. The health of the children is looked after by a nurse or physician. The Normal Schools have grown from 240 students to 924. Soon there will be a normal or college graduate teacher for every school in New Hampshire.

The future will demand better educated citizens. The children of today are the citizens of tomorrow. Let us do every thing we can for the welfare of the

pupils in our schools.

As superintendent of schools, I wish to express appreciation for cordial support in the school work.

REPORT OF BATHING BEACH COMMITTEE

The Bathing Beach property has been deeded to the town for which the town has paid the \$400 appropriated at the last meeting.

By subscriptions from citizens and summer residents approximately \$138 has been raised and expended for cutting bushes and improving the property.

At a gathering of interested citizens and above subscribers, held at the Beach last July it was recommended that the property be put in care of a Board of Trustees, two to be appointed by the town, one by the Silver Lake Woman's Club, one by the Madison Board of Trade and one by the Madison Fire Department.

It is also recommended that the town at its annual meeting take the necessary action to establish a permanent right of way across the Boston and Maine Railway property to said beach.
