WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Sullivan SS Town of Plainfield

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plainfield in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, Plainfield Plain, in said Plainfield on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, a Treasurer, a Tax Collector, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, two Auditors and any other necessary Town officers, and to cast your ballots upon the question, "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this Town?"

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, to be paid on or before one year's time, pursuant to the N. H. Laws of 1917.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for the purchase of a power road grader, and allow them to make the first payment on same of \$2,500.00 out of Highway funds as appropriated under Article 3 above.

Article 5. To see what action, if any, the Town will take to provide for a memorial to the servicemen and women of the Town.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to request the State Tax Commission to reappraise the improved lands and buildings of the Town, and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and appropriate money for this purpose.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to allow a 2% discount on 1951 property taxes paid within twenty days following the day the Tax Warrant is delivered to the Tax Collector.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance pertaining to sports on Sundays:

Section 1. It shall be lawful on the Lord's Day to engage in play, sports, games or exhibitions of physical skill, except public dancing, horse racing, prize fighting, wrestling, pool, billiards and bowling. The Board of Selectmen may regulate the time, manner and areas of such play, games and sports, and may, in their discretion, issue licenses and establish fees therefor.

Article 10. (By petition). To see if the Town will vote to elect the Road Agent and all other Town officers.

Article 11. (By petition). To see if the Town will vote to print in the annual Town Report an itemized account of the Road Agent, showing his weekly receipts and expenditures, number of hours he performed services for the Town each week, and his charges to the Town for such services.

Article 12. (By Petition). To see if the Town will vote to print in the annual Town Report an itemized account showing the disposition of all funds appropriated by the Town, or received by the Town from the State for road construction or repair.

Article 13. To see what action the Town will take with regard to the reports of Town officers.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

To the Townspeople of Plainfield:

We hereby submit the following brief report for 1950 and our general recommendations for the Town.

Roads

Besides the usual maintenance of Town roads, there have been two major improvements made during the past year, one of them the widening and straightening of the Black Hill road, and the other the work done at the lower end of the River road. No appropriation was made by the Town for the Black Hill project, but the work was done at the request of the School Board, and had the unanimous approval of the Finance Committee. We feel that one of the most dangerous sections of road in Town, now a School Bus route, has been made less so.

A free, two-day demonstration of a large power grader was utilized to widen and bank the sharp curve at the top of the Ferry Hill road, and to widen nearby sections of the River Road, also a school bus route.

The Town Road Aid money, administered under the supervision of the State Highway Department, was spent in three places this year: on the Brook Road, on a short section of the River Road below Earle W. Colby's, and in widening, improving and hard-surfacing the road to Dad's Council. This coming year it is expected that Town Road Aid funds will be sufficient to finish the Brook Road and go a long way southwards on the River Road from the point where work left off last year.

The limit of mileage of Town roads which can be tarred and maintained within the reasonable bounds of our Town budget, appears to have been reached, and we do not recommend that any additional stretches be tarred, except in some few cases where residents along the road might be willing to share expenses with the Town. It is proposed, however, to experiment further with calcium chloride, which is cheaper, as a substitute for tar on the most-travelled and dustier roads.

We have received many compliments (along with the usual number of complaints) regarding the condition of our Town roads this year, many persons comparing our roads favorably with those of other towns throughout the State. But the fact remains that our Town is greatly han-

dicapped in road maintenance by worn-out and out-dated road graders, which must be towed at a slow speed behind truck or tractor, thereby making for inefficient operation and high costs.

Town Dump

One of Plainfield's most serious needs in past years has been a central Town Dump, to serve both ends of Town. We have been fortunate in securing land for this purpose on the Stage Road, sufficiently near the Town Garage so that the Town bulldozer can service it, — and with the approval of the Finance Committee we overspent the budget of the Health Department to buy the land, and fence and develop the site. Most of the laying out and supervision of this project was done by Selectman Wilder, and much credit is due him therefor.

The old Town Dump on Route 12-A, north of the Edward M. Pierce farm, is no longer a public dump.

Equalization of Assessments

The reappraisal of the Town, as voted at the 1950 Town Meeting, has — we feel — accomplished a constructive purpose. Whereas we would agree that some few valuations are still unfair, the taxes of the average man have been lowered; and the resulting lowering of the tax rate (from \$5.60 to \$4.50) has put Plainfield on an equal tax basis with most of our neighboring towns, — thereby giving notice to outsiders and prospective property-owners that Plainfield, too, is willing to abide by State-wide assessments.

The cost of this reappraisal by the State Tax Commission was approximately \$50 less than the sum appropriated, well below the average cost for reappraisals throughout the State. We feel that this was money well spent, and also that such a reappraisal, which is a good check on Selectmen's valuations, should perhaps be made every few years for this very reason.

Taxes

No one will deny that the most important problem facing the Town of Plainfield in 1951, as it has been for many years previous, is our high tax rate. The 1951 budget, as printed in this Town Report, calls for School District and Town Appropriations which will place the 1951 tax rate in the vicinity of \$4.60, — 10c higher than in 1950. Even at present valuations, this rate is too high

— higher than the average taxpayer can or should be asked to stand. Yet there seem to be almost no economies that can be found to lower it, — or in other words, the few economies which can be thought of, will do little towards lowering the rate in the long run. Should State Aid to Education be restored by the present legislature, Plainfield will receive up to \$10,000 additional funds — or about 70c on the tax rate. Yet the demands of the future on the taxpayers of Plainfield are such that this temporary bit of gravy will be swallowed up in a few short years' time by demands for money for the completion of the Stage Road, for new Town road equipment, and probably school additions or expansions.

The longer we study the finances and financial future of the Town, the more we find ourselves thinking of the Town as one might think of a business which is losing money. Ways must be found to put that business on its feet — otherwise all its customers, the taxpayers in this case, will be driven out of Town. What Plainfield needs, obviously, is not fewer taxpayers, but more taxpayers to share the burden with us, and make the Town a better place in which to live. At present some 300-odd property owners pay the tax bills of the Town. Would not the situation be improved if the cost were distributed among 400? or 500?

We feel that our fellow Townspeople should consider this point of view seriously, and bear in mind that the old saying, you must spend money to make money, applies to Town business as well as to any other business. While we should not be afraid to appropriate or borrow money for improvements, — we should at the same time demand assurance that wherever a dollar is spent today, another dollar will some day be made, — or at least saved. More efficient and modern road equipment, for example, leads to better roads for the same money. And better roads and better service on the roads, winter and summer, will not only help those of us who live here, but also bring others to settle here and help us with our tax burden. The same applies to better schools, and to all other public services.

Town Report

During the past year a committee created by the vote of the Town, with Vernon A. Hood as chairman, has made a study of the Town Report and of the reports of many other towns. This committee has submitted its recommendations and suggestions for the improvement of our Town Report, most of which we have incorporated into the Report this year. We trust these changes and additions will bring approval from the Townspeople, along with their thanks to the committee for conscientious and painstaking work.

Responsibility

Selectman Harold S. Wilder, Sr., has stated that he does not wish to assume any responsibility for the contents of this Town Report. His name, therefore, appears only in the list of Town officers, and in instances where payments have been made to him for services rendered the Town.

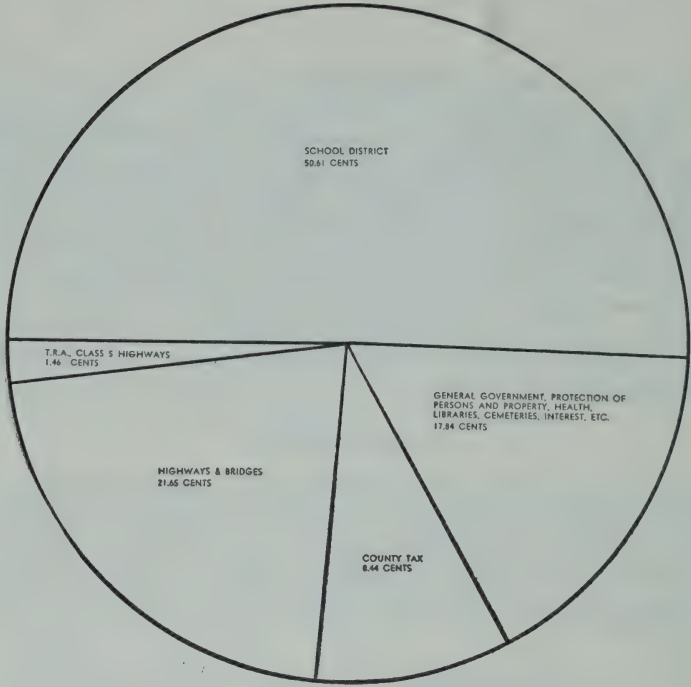

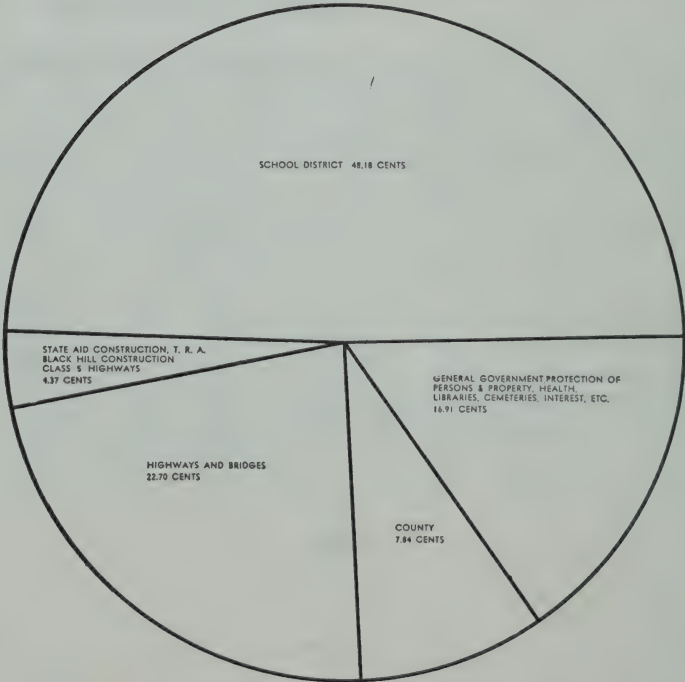

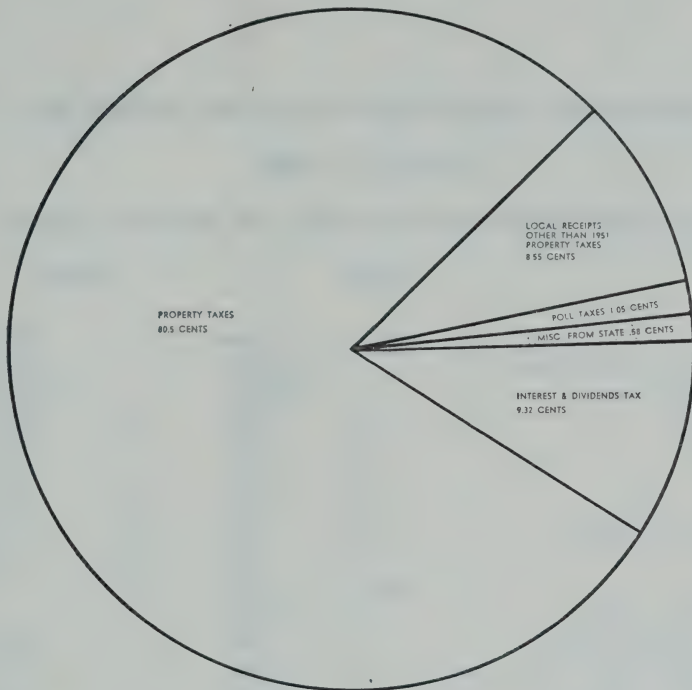
WHERE THE TOWN DOLLAR WILL GO IN 1951



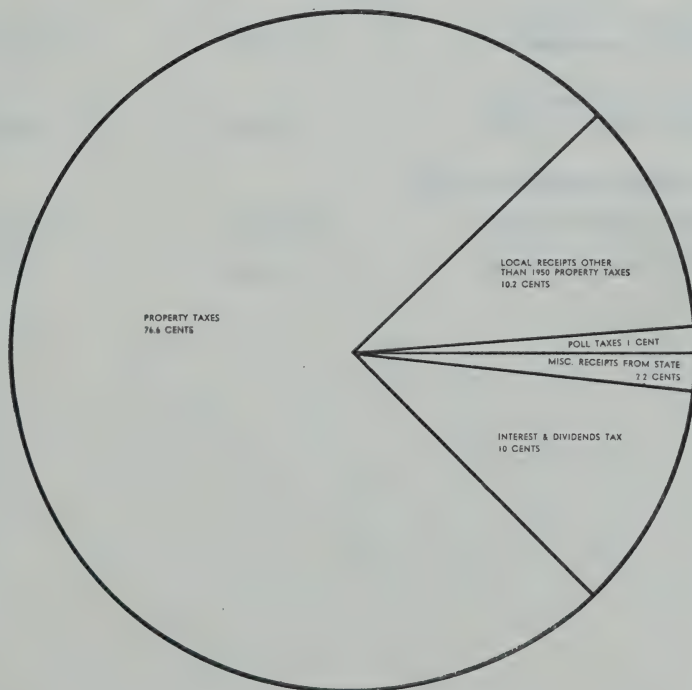
WHERE THE TOWN DOLLAR WENT IN 1950

AUDITORS' REPORT

This is to certify that we have examined the accounts of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, and Town Clerk and other Town Officers for the year ending Dec. 31, 1950, and find the same correctly cast and properly vouched.

We found that an incorrect balance had been struck in the Road Agent's Account for 1949, in that the balance of \$184.53 as shown by last years report was an incorrect balance. An additional week's checks were outstanding, and an overdraft should have been reported.

We therefore made a complete audit of the Road Agent's account, beginning in March 1948, and ending Dec. 31, 1950. In accordance with our report of the Highway Dept., as contained in this Town Report, it would appear that this deficiency or overdraft occurred prior to March of 1948, as the Bank Statement for March 1948 shows an overdraft on the fifth of that month.

To the best of our knowledge and belief, the Report of the Town of Plainfield Highway Dept., Road Agent's Account, as shown in this annual report, is a complete and true statement covering the period from March 1, 1948 through Dec. 31, 1950, as reflected by the books, Bank Statements, Deposit Book, cancelled checks, vouchers, and Payroll sheets examined by us.

In view of the fact that this deficiency was not discovered by the Auditors in 1948, and since Mr. Woodward had destroyed his records after keeping them for two years, we see no other alternative than that the Town make up this deficiency by appropriation at this coming annual meeting.

During the last fall and winter the detail mapping of all control areas in the Town was completed, as the Blue Mountain Assn. (Corbin's Park) made available funds for this work and this organization is cooperating in the control program.

Since 1946 the town has cooperated regularly each year. However, the reason that the program is not farther advanced in the Town is the fact that since 1918 to 1950 inclusive, a period of 33 years, Town Funds have been available only 13 different years.

Each year at the time that control work is going on in the town, the Selectmen are contacted and notified of the location of the areas being worked and the public is invited to go into the field and see the work in progress.

I would in closing this short statement like to call attention to the fact that not only Town funds but State and Federal funds are used in this important work, and in fact all of the mapping of the control areas in Plainfield has been done without the use of Town Funds.

I shall be glad at any time to furnish detail data which is available at my office. The control program in Plainfield is not up-to-date, and every effort must be made to speed up the work in order that our future pine crop may be protected.

REPORT OF THE TOWN REPORT COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of Plainfield:

Your committee as appointed by the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen in accordance with the vote passed at the last annual Town Meeting to make recommendations and suggestions to improve the printed Town Report and make it more interesting and informative, have endeavored to perform the duty assigned to them.

We have examined our Town Report critically and find that it has numerous virtues and also shortcomings. Since it first was issued for the year ending March 1849 it seems to have been like "Topsy" in that it "just grewed." Your committee believes that the recent annual reports are quite good as financial reports; however we think that other information besides financial accounts should be included. We have made a study of the reports as issued by some thirty other towns in this State and Vermont. The following suggestions and recommendations, which if found to be practical to use by the several officers of the Town, should achieve the purpose for which this committee was formed.

The cover could be improved by using a light color and less printing on it. The title page has for many years been only a repeat of the cover, and we suggest as an improvement that it carry such information as the latest census figure, tax rate, total valuation, state officials that we help chose in the biennial election, etc. The list of Town Officers should be complete and include the Finance Committee and any other special committees for the year. A designation should be made showing which officers are elected and which are appointed and if appointed, by whom the appointments were made.

We suggest that the articles of the Town Warrant be printed somewhat farther apart, so that there would be sufficient room for anyone to write in notations at the Town Meeting. A summary of the minutes of the last annual meeting and of any special meetings during the year are good, if not too long to justify inclusion. A written report by the Selectemen, as a foreword giving a general summary of the work of the past year and what they recommend as projects for the ensuing year appears in several reports of other towns and would be an excellent addition to our own.

We recommend including after the budget, circular graphs in percentages of "Where the Town Dollar Came From" and "Where the Town Dollar Went." We favor the printing of the summary of the inventory and appropriations for five and ten years ago, along with the current years figures for comparison.

Under the detail of payments in the Selectmen's Financial Report we would like to have the appropriation appear at the top of each section and at the end of each section the amount of overdraft or excess remaining as the case may be. The reports of the Ward and Burnap funds should indicate the purpose of the funds.

It would be well to include a written report of the Finance Committee showing how the committee has met its problem for the year gone by and what they recommend for action in the coming year. Other committees, agents of the town or officials who might make reports in writing are the Forestry Department (on Blister Rust Control), Welfare Department (on Old Age Assistance), Hospital Agent, Overseer of the Poor, Librarians, Fire Warden, Road Agent and Auditors.

We suggest that the soldiers' exemptions allowed be listed in detail and a chart of the Town Officers bonds and Insurance policies on Town property be also listed. We earnestly recommend the publishing of the Vital Statistics in a form similar to that appearing in our reports before 1926, as the more detailed information is very useful to anyone using old reports for reference.

In former years some of our reports had illustrations in them, and we believe that was good and think they should be again included in limited number, if the expense can be kept at a minimum. Maps might also be used as illustrations. Plainfield has a long and interesting history since it was chartered in 1761 and fortunately most of the early records of the town have been preserved. A brief sketch or illustration of some events or interesting document of former days would be welcome.

In conclusion, your committee does not favor the including of irrelevant or unnecessary details, as they are sometimes confusing, detracting from the general

appearance of the report and crowd out more useful material while also adding to the cost of printing.

To the inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Plainfield, in the county of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Plainfield in said District on Saturday the 10th day of March 1951 at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To choose Auditors or other agents for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and other officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of said district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue

and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxation by the district.

Article 8. To see if the District will vote to continue transportation of high school pupils and provide money therefor.

Article 9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the rental or sale of the Brook School house.

Article 10. To see if the District will vote to authorize the purchase of motor vehicles for the transportation of school pupils and provide money therefor.

Article 11. (By Petition) To see if the District will vote to raise by taxation and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 (four thousand dollars) and vote to instruct and authorize the School Board to borrow an additional sum of \$16,000 (sixteen thousand dollars) to be paid off annually over a ten year period; in equal amounts the total sum of \$20,000 (twenty thousand) to be expended on the purchase of land, the constructing and equipping of two class room units thereon; the same to be located near a central point in town; under the supervision of a joint committee consisting of the School Board and three other voters appointed by the Moderator.

Article 12. (By Petition) To see if the District will vote to continue the function and duties of the School Building Committee and authorize the Moderator to appoint five citizens of the Town to serve on said committee for the ensuing year.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Plainfield:

This is my eighteenth report on the conditions of the Plainfield schools. The principal problem in elementary schools in any community, and especially in a community the size of Plainfield is to obtain qualified teachers. This year we have been able to find teachers for the schools but three of these are teaching on a permit which means summer school attendance in order to have the credential renewed. The increase in enrollment this year was particularly noticable at the Plainfield Plain School. Some twelve to fourteen pupils registered in the fall who were not expected when plans were made last March. This necessitated the employment of another teacher and the securing of additional room. As you all know, this latter was found in the Blow-Me-Down Grange building. Both the School Board and I are very appreciateive of the attitude of the Grange in making this room available. It is most likely that this will have to be continued for another year, although a few pupils have withdrawn from the Plainfield school. The enrollment for the eight grades will be in the vicinity of eighty pupils.

The enrollment for next year in all of the schools should give us enough pupils at Meriden and at the Plain for three rooms each, and this arrangement should be made in order to allow a teacher to do a good grade of work.

The new formula for state aid is based on a foundation program which allows \$175 per pupil for elementary schools and \$225 per pupil for high school. Our expenditures for last year were \$38,323.64 for current costs. The new formula is based on the local district paying an \$18 school tax, which on the present equalized valuation figures \$24,941.30. According to the formula we should receive the difference between \$38,425.00 and \$24,941.30 or \$13,483.70 but we will receive whatever the legislature provides, if the formula is not revised. There is, in addition, a proposed general aid of \$10.00 per pupil which would be of some help in general tax reduction. All of this state aid is very problematical and we shall not know until the end of the general court session what is what.

We are not paying our teachers enough and in some cases money enough has not been available to allow us to command the teachers that we would like in every instance.

Transportation for high school pupils is a considerable item but it has made high school opportunities possible for some pupils that I am sure would not have been able to "hitch hike" their way to Windsor and Lebanon. We have been advising eighth grade boys who are qualified, to attend Kimball Union Academy provided the Academy is offering the courses these boys desire.

We have been able to employ Mrs. Dorrance LaCoss as school nurse and she, with Dr. Whitney have examined all of the children in all of the schools. Mrs. LaCoss is following up the work and is endeavoring to attend to the needs of the children. The case work and individual attention with reference to clinics, etc. is more of a job than the general public realizes. The budget provides for a school physician and school nurse for next year.

Just recently an order has come from the State Board of Education advising all teachers to take the first aid course and in turn teach it to all of the children according to the grade level of the pupil needing it.

The Parent Teachers Assoc. at both Meriden and Plainfield are continuing with the noon luncheons. The district is not contributing any money to this program except as it provides hot water and general facilities. Of course, when much of the equipment was bought there was federal aid for refrigerators, stoves and some help on dishes and tables. This material, of course, will remain the property of the district.

The school buildings in both Meriden and Plainfield need to be enlarged or better yet a consolidated school should be established. For either of these purposes the district should make provision by laying up capital reserve funds even if it is only a thousand a year.

It is a privilege to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the School Board members, P. T. A. and other citizens for helpfulness in planning for the schools and I am especially grateful to the teachers and children for many courtesies.
