WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing, and a Selectman for three years.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for highways and appropriate money for the same.

4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for bridges and appropriate money for the same.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and breaking snow for the ensuing year.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairing and building bridges.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day observance.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2250.00 for maintenance of Trunk Lines.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for the support of town library.

10. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise the taxable property.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept a piece of State Road near Chocorua Lake across land owned by Mrs. C. P. Bowditch, and discontinue a curved piece of State Road leading by the grove near the "Narrows".

14. To see what action the Town will take toward paying town debt.

15. To elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

16. To see if the Town will vote to use the Australian ballot system at the March town meetings.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Community Nurse Committee of Tamworth consists of three members from each section of the town, Mrs. Stella White (Chairman), Mrs. Flora Currier, Mrs. Hazel Currier, from Tamworth Village; Mrs. Carrie Nickerson, Mrs. Eva Moore, Mrs. Edith Bickford, from Chocorua: Mrs. Mary Fall, Miss M. T. Gregg, Mrs. Ellen Bookholz from South Tamworth. Each year one member drops off and a new one is chosen from the same section, so that new people are constantly being introduced into the work and responsibility. The Committee meets monthly with the nurse, hears her detailed report, approves and criticises, votes her funds for supplies and transportation, and in summer raises money in addition to the Town's appropriation from among our summer residents, who have given generously to this good cause.

The Committee will welcome heartily any suggestions that the people of the Town will give about the management of this nursing service. It has been started to aid the townspeople and their co-operation will be appreciated.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Tamworth:

I herewith submit my seventh annual report as superintendent of schools.

The schools are continuing to do good work. Nine schools are open this year, Great Hill School having closed and pupils transported to the village. Only three changes took place in the teaching staff. It is a good record when changes are few.

The list of teachers follows:

Margaret E. Brown at Pequaket has 11 pupils.
Lula M. Ball at South Tamworth has 25 pupils.
Grace E. Shannon at Downs has 14 pupils.
Rose Dearborn at Whittier has 12 pupils.
Edith M. Gilman at Bennett's Corner has 10 pupils.
Mavis O. Corbett at the Primary has 21 pupils.
Edwin C. Blackey at the Grammar has 30 pupils.
Edna B. Wilson at Chocorua has 17 pupils.
Herman W. Pearson at the High School has 15 pupils.

Statistics

For the year ending June 30, 1929, we had an average attendance of 144, an average membership of 153 and a percent of attendance of 94. Schools having 95 percent or above were as follows.

> Great Hill, 99.7 percent Pequaket, 97.6 percent Bennett's Corner, 95.6 percent Chocorua, 95.3 percent Health Work

The inspection last spring was made by the school nurse, Miss Mary Curran. Defects were noted and parents notified. A dental clinic was held at South Tamworth and Tamworth Village and many defects remedied. A clinic was also held at Tamworth Village at which Dr. Kerr examined underweight children for any signs of disease, especially tuberculosis.

Individual cases of bad eyes and throats were corrected.

Miss Curran will be with us again this coming spring to carry on the good work. We hope to have help of the state in a pre-school Toxin Anti-toxin clinic.

High School

Our high school continues to serve a large number of the eighth grade graduates. Mr. Pearson is in charge. As an extra curricula activity, some work has been done in manual training. Opportunity for this work is possible in the fine room which the school board finished off on the second floor of the Center Building.

This school and also the grammar school are having the help of Mrs. Hazel Currier in music once each week. It is fine to have help on good music. Mrs. Currier is developing music appreciation by playing some of the best selections on the piano and by giving the stories of musical composers.

Mr. Pearson has a good group of students to send out in June and there is prospect of an unusually large entering class next fall.

School Property

Mention has already been made of the new room at the Center. Provision was also made at the same time for a supply room and a chance later to arrange for serving a warm lunch in winter. All the rooms in this building are equipped with electric lights.

Electric lights have also been installed in Chocorua, Whittier and South Tamworth Schools. This is wise since there are many dark days in winter when lights are needed. It is also possible to have an evening gathering at these schoolhouses without danger from lamps.

Chocorua School was painted inside, including the new manual training room. Work was also done here on grading the yard and a fence has been built by the state highway.

At Downs, the inside was improved with paint, new adjustable seats installed and modern curtains placed in the windows. This room has been greatly improved. A heater was installed at Whittier.

At the Village, the grounds were fenced by the highways, making it safer for the children.

All buildings have been cleaned and furniture varnished.

For next year, I recommend that chemical toilets be installed at Downs. Pequaket should be painted inside, including the toilets. At Whittier we should install slate blackboards and paint inside. At the Center the chemical toilets should be reset and a cement floor laid in the basement.

In order to keep the property up, outside painting should be done. Curtains like those at Downs should be installed when new curtains are needed.

Normal School Students

Last fall Dorothea Ward and Mary Hammond entered Plymouth Normal School, making five Tamworth girls in attendance. Elizabeth Chamberlain, Doris Fortier and Alice Whiting complete the two-year course in June and will be ready for teaching next Scptember. These girls are all making good records.

It is interesting to note that September 1, 1929 was the tenth anniversary of the going into effect of the new state law. At a largely attended meeting of school boards in Concord in December, it was shown that school conditions had improved much during the last ten years. All the members of the Tamworth Board attended. Our chairman, Mr. Wiggin, was honored as one of the speakers. It was shown that the everage school year in rural towns has been lengthened to 36 weeks. More children complete the eighth grade and go on to high school. More high school graduates enter post-secondary schools. Fourteen high schools have been established in rural sections. Every town in the state has supervision. The health of the children is looked after by a nurse or physician. The normal schools have grown from 240 students to 924 students. Soon there will be a college or normal school

graduate teacher for every school in N. H.

The future will demand better citizens. The children of today are the citizens of tomorrow. Let us do everything we can for the welfare of the pupils now in our schools.

As superintendent, I wish to express appreciation for the support Tamworth gives its schools.
