# Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, on the eighth day of March next, at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, one Selectman for two years, one or more Road Agents for the ensuing year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years and two Auditors for the year ensuing.
2. To choose a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
3. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the School and Parsonage Fund interest for the year ensuing.
4. To see how much money the Town will vote to appropriate for Memorial Day expenses for the year ensuing.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200.00 and appropriate the same for the use of the Laconia Hospital Association.
6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the care of Cemeteries.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$151.53 to procure State Aid in Class 5 Highway Construction. The State to contribute \$606.13.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$229.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire, for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in co-operation with other Towns in the Lakes Region.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust control, to be spent in co-operation with the State Forest Department.

10. To see if the Town will allow a discount on early paid property taxes.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer and dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collectors Deeds.

12. To see if the Town will vote to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for all purposes for the year ensuing.

14. To see what action the Town will take toward the election of Town Officers in Town Meeting; whenever the legal notices, calling caucuses of the two major political parties indicate the intention of either party to advance no candidate for any Town office, there will be placed upon the ballot the name of any legal voter of the town, whose candidacy is supported by a petition of twenty-five (25) other legal voters. Independently of any caucus intention indicated or action, the Town Clerk will place on the ballot

the name of any individual whose candidacy is supported by a petition of forty (40) legal voters. The petition in either of these instances and the names of the signers will be transcribed on the town records.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the maintenance of the skating rink and baseball field. Relief labor to be used where possible. Northfield to raise the same amount.

16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of it's Officers and Agents for the past year.

17. To choose any other Officers and Agents for the year ensuing.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

### *Teachers*

Miss Florence Dunningham, teacher of one of our sixth grade groups, resigned in June. This vacancy was filled by the appointment of Miss Anne Piecuch, a Plymouth graduate. Miss Piecuch had had two years of experience in teaching, and had also spent a year in study at Boston University.

Just before Christmas Miss C. Ruth Haire, teacher of grade one, asked for a release from her contract that she might accept an offer of a position in Rhode Island. Her request was granted. We were all sorry to have Miss Haire leave. Miss Piecuch was transferred to grade one and Miss Beatrice Pelletier was appointed to fill the vacancy in grade six. Miss Pelletier is a graduate of Keene Normal School and has had several years' experience in teaching in Fitzwilliam, New Hampshire.

Mr. Francis W. Tatro, Supervisor of Music in the schools of Franklin, a graduate of New England Conservatory of Music, was chosen to carry on the work in instrumental music which was introduced in September.

After the decision to discontinue the No. Four school it was planned to transfer Miss Mary A. Reilly to the Union School as a helping teacher. Miss Reilly resigned in August and no one was chosen in her place.

*Annual Report of School Nurse*

During the year the school physician has been assisted during two physical inspections of the school children. New equipment has made it possible to have a more careful eye inspection for each child. Records have been kept of each defect and parents have been notified in each case. In many cases explanatory calls have also been made urging the correction of defects. Seventeen



tonsillectomies have been arranged for with the help of various welfare agencies, as well as a few dental and eye corrections. Some clothing has also been provided with the help of local organizations.

The continued interest and helpfulness of the Superintendent of Schools and the staff of teachers in the health work for the school children is very much appreciated.

*Consolidation*

Eleven years ago when the towns of Tilton and Northfield by legislative action were united into a single school district to be known as the Tilton-Northfield Union School District, there were six one-room rural schools in Northfield and four in Tilton. Gradually these schools have been discontinued so that at the present time we have but one rural school in Northfield, the Oak Hill, and one in Tilton, the Lochmere school. These two schools care for only the children in grades one to six in their respective communities. The seventh and eighth grade pupils in these communities are transported to the school in the village. We have what amounts to a consolidated school for these two towns. This consolidation was made possible in part by the gift to the district of the Eastman property by the late Obe G. Morrison. In the Eastman building we house our sixth grade in two divisions, the work in Home Economics in grades six,

seven and eight, and the work in wood-working for the boys in grades six, seven and eight, and the office of the superintendent of schools.

This consolidation has meant much additional transportation. Mr. Archie G. Wheaton has the contract for the transportation over four routes. His equipment consists of two modern school buses. Other routes are covered by Mr. E. Weston Dow, Mr. Charles E. Gilman, and Mrs. Evelyn Colby. One hundred twenty-five children are transported.

#### *High School Enrollment*

For many years Tilton School has afforded to the boys and girls of this community the opportunity for a secondary or high school education, and for twenty years the community has assumed the entire financial obligation. Tilton School has been our high school and the local boy or girl has been as free to attend Tilton School as he would have been to attend a local high school had one been maintained.

There has been a remarkable increase in high school attendance throughout the country during the last twenty years. Almost every child is now attending high school, and the modern high school is confronted with a problem quite different and much more complex and difficult than formerly. Instead of being called upon to educate a selected group it must educate all the children of all the people. To successfully meet this challenge has meant in many cases reorganization, introduction of courses of a different type, change in method of instruc-

tion, change in emphases and not infrequently a change in attitude.

This present year there are one hundred sixty-five local children enrolled in Tilton School. Ninety-six of these are girls. In addition there are seven in the Franklin High School, two in the Laconia High School and one in the Concord High School. The expenditure this year for high school tuition will be approximately \$19,000.00.

I have reason to know something of the plans which those who are now directing Tilton School have for the immediate future of this institution. I know something of their hopes and expectations which, if realized, will mean a better institution but one somewhat different from that which has existed in the past. It is probable that the new institution will not find it convenient to continued indefinitely its present educational relationship with the community. It probably will not choose to continue to serve as our high school. The earlier we are willing to face this situation fairly and begin to make preparations to meet the problem the more certain we are of a satisfactory solution.

#### *Improvements*

With some assistance from the W. P. A. decided improvements have been made in the appearance of some of our school buildings.

At the Union building new celotex ceilings have been installed in the first-floor corridor and classrooms. The interior of the building has been repainted and revarnished with the exception of the assembly room. The

exterior wood work has also been repainted, and also the fire escape.

The Eastman building has lost its gloomy aspect, repainting with a lighter color has greatly improved its appearance and attractiveness. The Oak Hill school has been reshingled and the exterior of the Lochmere school painted.

#### *New Equipment*

The school board has recently added to our equipment a Bell and Howell Filmo Projector. This is a gear driven machine and for our needs I believe there is no better on the market. Visual education is becoming increasingly important. Many films may be obtained free from the office of the State Board of Education, and many others for a small fee from various film libraries.

#### *New Opportunity*

Free instruction in certain musical instruments is now being offered to those pupils who are interested. It is necessary for the pupil to provide his own instrument. This work is under the direction of Mr. Francis W. Tatro, Supervisor of Music in the Franklin schools, who is with us one afternoon each week. Much interest and enthusiasm has been developed. I believe it a very desirable addition to the opportunities which are being given to the local school children.
