### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE


To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wilmot, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Wilmot, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will accept State Aid Construction for the Mascoma Trunk Line, so called, raise and appropriate the amount necessary for the purpose.
- 4. To see if the Town will accept State Aid Maintenance for the 4th N. H. Turnpike, so called, raise and appropriate the amount necessary for the purpose.
- 5. To see if the Town will accept State Aid Maintenance for Trunk Lines, raise and appropriate the amount necessary for the purpose.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town highways.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate any money for Old Home day.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917, on a section of Mascoma road, so called, and appropriate, or set aside from the amount raised for highway work, a sum of money for this purpose.
- 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of commencing the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 10. To act on any other matter that may legally come before the meeting.



## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Andover, N. H., Feb. 6, 1924.

## To the School Board and the Citizens of Wilmot School District:

I hereby submit my fifth annual report as Superintendent of the Wilmot schools. The roll of perfect attendance and the statistical table forming a part of this report are for the school year ending June 30, 1923, but the report also deals with the present year.

Two schools, the Flat and the Mountain, were broken up last year by illness of the teachers, making it necessary to have substitutes in each for several weeks. This year the work in the Stearns school has been similarly interrupted, requiring the employment of four different teachers up to the present time. In the schools not thus disrupted good work has been done since my last report was written.

Standard tests have been given as in previous years. In November the State Board of Education gave tests in arithmetic and spelling to all eighth grade pupils in New Hampshire. That in arithmetic was the same as one given in Springfield, Mass., in 1846, about which much was said at the time the papers were discovered a few years ago. The spelling test was not the twenty words given in Springfield but a list of equal difficulty, selected from the well-known Ayers list. These examinations were given in Springfield to the ninth grade high school pupils of average age, 15 yrs., 6 mos. They were given in Wilmot to eighth year pupils of average age, 14 yrs., 2 mos. In arithmetic the average grade in Springfield was 29.41%, in Wilmot it was 35%; in

spelling the average in Springfield was 40.65%, in Wilmot 36%. Our average was lowered by a few pupils who were conditioned into the eighth grade, and who will hardly be able to make up their deficiencies this year. Our aim is to raise our standard from year to year in order that no child may enter high school until he is adequately fitted.

Aid from the state helps us to secure better teachers and to maintain a higher standard of efficiency than would be possible if we were solely dependent upon local taxation. We received from the state last year \$2,537.51, a very material aid. Although none of this is used for administrative expenses, equipment or alterations, it so relieves us in the matter of teachers' salaries. books and supplies, transportation and other current expenses that we have been able to make needed improvements. At the Center the new floor has been laid and new seats installed; at the Flat the old seats have been rearranged and several small ones from the Mountain and the present high school building have been added for the primary children, while the stove has been moved to the northwest corner of the room and been jacketed, thus greatly improving the heating. two village schools have been changed in the last two years from unattractive, cold and uncomfortable rooms to more cheerful, and better heated rooms, with seats adapted to the pupils. The Mountain school has been improved by a much-needed coat of paint outside, and the North Road by additional windows. A few pieces of new furniture have been purchased, and several maps have been added to the equipment.

The physical examination was made in the fall term by Mrs. Heyer, and provision was made in the annual budget for whatever follow-up work seems necessary. Mrs. Heyer is ready to give advice or care in special cases and to cooperate with schools and community for the health of the children. The teachers have constantly in mind the physical comfort and well-being of the children, and are seeking to maintain such conditions as will raise the present standard of health and establish good health habits.

The high school has a present enrolment of ten. Only the two who entered this year will continue next year. Of the six now in the eighth grade some may not pass into high school. This makes probable a very small high school enrolment. One advantage in our small school is that the teacher is held responsible for keeping alive the fundamental subjects by having regular drill periods for them. There has been a marked improvement in penmanship and in the quality of all written work. This constant attention to supplementing of elementary school work by definite drill in English, penmanship, and arithmetic makes the step between elementary and high school much less difficult, and lays a firmer foundation for a thorough education.

The statistical table shows that notwithstanding the severity of last winter the per cent. of attendance was not lowered from the previous year. Among the five towns of this union Wilmot ranks second in this respect, while in the previous year it was by three points the lowest of the five. The number of tardinesses, 576, indicates a great waste of time, the most of which could be avoided by a little additional interest and cooperation on the part of parents. The lack of an attendance officer is a serious handicap. It should not be necessary for the superintendent or the school board to perform the duties properly belonging to the truant officer. There ought to be some person within the town who

would accept this office and follow up those families who persistently retard school work by lack of regularity and punctuality in attendance.

I wish to thank the school officers for their courteous support and the teachers for their loyalty and cooperation.
