Report of School Board.

At the last meeting of the Pittsfield, Pembroke and Allenstown Supervisory District, it was voted to discontinue the district. An effort was made to unite Pembroke, Allenstown and Hooksett, but upon its seeming failure it was thought best to unite with Penacook and Hill, and at a meeting held June 3, in Penacook, it was voted to form a district of Penacook, Hill and Allenstown and Geo. W. Sumner was elected superintendent at a salary of \$1,500.00 a year, Allenstown⁷ paying one fifth and receiving one fifth of his time. This has been a very satisfactory arrangement, Mr. Sumner proving the man for the place.

On Nov. 10, 1907, H. C. Morrison, the State Superintendent, visited the village school and on the following day, criticised the School Board by letter, a part of which is as follows:

“Wednesday, Nov. 10, I visited the graded school in Allenstown. I found conditions in and about the building distinctly improved over those prevailing at the time of my former visit some two or three years since. The schoolroom work in the grammar and primary rooms seemed to be well conceived and was being carried out as well as conditions would permit.—

I want to call the attention of your school board to the unwarrantably crowded condition of these rooms. No teacher can fairly be expected to do good work if she is obliged to have forty or fifty children in her room divided into four or even five grades. Good teachers will avoid such schools, or will accept them only for a much higher wage than they would otherwise seek. A room containing even sixty children all in one grade is a much simpler proposition than a school containing

forty-five children in four grades.

A third regular teacher ought to be employed at once. The room now occupied by the special class ought, if possible, to be fitted up for a regular class and the seats ought to be replaced with adjustable furniture early as practicable. The special class and the special teacher could very properly be moved to the lower floor and located in the town hall on movable furniture. —

The general tendency all over the state would indicate very strongly that there will be a permanent need of the extra regular room, which I have above indicated ought to be provided at once."

The School Board, on receipt of this letter, at once made arrangements to retain Mrs. Prescott for the rest of the year, and at the Christmss vacation had the intermediate room painted and new desks installed,—steel ceilings having been put in all the rooms in the summer vacation.

For the coming year a new fence should be built on the west side of the school grounds. This would be a great help to the teachers in maintaining discipline out of doors. The school grounds would be much more attractive if they could be graded and seeded down. There is also need of a new floor in the grammar room.

One hundred and fifty dollars will be required for text-books and supplies; three hundred and fifty dollars will probably cover the tuitions.

We wish the parents would read and ponder over what our Superintendent says in his report in regard to tardinesses and see if in the coming year each parent will not make an effort to have his children at school on time.

Sixth Annual Report of the Superintendent of Schools.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD:

I submit in connection with my first report three tables: The Attendance Table, the Roll of Perfect Attendance, the results of the School Census. The attendance table has been somewhat changed in form that it may correspond with reports sent to the State Superintendent and published by him. A supplement for the fall term brings the table down to date as formerly.

The tables show a sudden and decided increase in the number of pupils in the public schools. The large registration in the Special School, organized for children wishing labor certificates, demonstrates the need of such a school, and the fact that thirteen boys have been transferred to the regular classes augurs more far-reaching results than we had anticipated. Whether this increase in numbers, caused in part, no doubt, by the parochial school being overcrowded, is likely to be permanent it is too early to determine. It will at least render imperative the employment of a third teacher for the remainder of the school year. The support of this third school for so long a time as it shall be needed is not, it seems to me, too great a burden to ask the taxpayers to assume. Allentown's general tax is not high and its tax rate for the support of schools is among the lowest in the state. In the last state report, 1908, Allentown appears as number thirty-six from the lowest with a tax for schools of \$3.23 on \$1000 of valuation. The highest rate in the state, that of Plymouth, was \$10.94 on \$1000 and the average rate \$4.50

The per cent. of attendance for the current year, low even in the fall term, is likely to be considerably

lower than that of last year, and tardiness is increasing at an alarming rate. There were 147 cases of tardiness in 1908, 343, 1909 and 210 in thirteen weeks of the current year. Steady faithfulness to the daily task and punctuality are as important lessons as the schools can teach. Pupils, parents, teachers, truant officer and superintendent should all consider whether these conditions are caused by neglect of theirs.

Some interruption of school work is caused by the frequent dismissal of pupils for taking music lessons and for other causes. I ask you to consider if some ruling ought not to be made regarding this.

The frequent changing of teachers in the grammar room, deplored by your last superintendent, has continued. It is hoped that carrying out his recommendations for increasing the efficiency of the schools (opening an intermediate room) this condition may be somewhat improved. Good teachers are attracted by positions where work of a high quality can be accomplished. The five grades in the grammar room made such work impossible. Grade four is now in the intermediate room and I hope it may be possible to transfer grade five to that room after a term or two. With grades one and two in the primary room, three, four and five in the intermediate room, and six, seven and eight in the grammar room, special provision might still need to be made, during the fall term, for boys desiring labor certificates.

For a short time a music teacher has been employed who, I believe, will be able at the end of the year to show results fully warranting the outlay in that department.

The added pupils have demanded additional textbooks and supplies. The Physiologies now in use are so old that they are almost useless and should be replaced. I estimate that one hundred and fifty dollars

will be needed for these two items for the coming year. We also need two international Dictionaries and a few maps.

It is hoped to install a fire gong soon and to arrange for fire drills. With two rooms now open on the second floor from which the only exit is one stairway the possibility of providing a fire escape, is worth considering.

The grounds around the village school need grading and the railroad company should rebuild its fence. A small plowed plot at the rear of the rural school house would give an opportunity for a school garden.

The struggle for good schools is one in which we can never relax our efforts for it is an important part of that strife against social decay which is in reality our struggle for existence. "The real strength of a nation is not her banks, palaces, rich men, armaments,—splendors:—The real strength is in her men who work with their hands. That is her only asset worth talking about; her physical condition depends upon their physical condition. England has allowed her working population to deteriorate;—Germany has labored—to rear her working population in the full measure of health and vigor. When the two working populations clash in the commercial battle, down goes the English line."

Offering you my congratulations that you have succeeded in putting your schools upon a basis that promises well for the future, I respectfully submit this report for your consideration.
