At the summit of Mt. Kearsarge North, the inn shown on the cover was built only to be twice destroyed by storms. In 1909, the New Hampshire Forestry Commission was granted use of the destroyed hotel for a fire lookout by the Appalachian Mountain Club. The State and the US Forest Service staffed the fire tower that was built at the site until 1960. The fire tower was added to the National Historic Lookout Register in 1991 and is open to visitors to the summit.

2011 TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday, March 8, 2011 at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Articles 1-6 will be by official ballot at the Town Hall and the polls shall open for balloting at eight o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before seven o'clock in the evening. The following articles (Articles 7 - 24) in the warrant will be acted upon on Thursday, March 10, 2011 at six thirty o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of AMENDMENT No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: 1) amend Article XIX Definitions – DWELLING UNIT to specify that it applies only to residential uses; 2) amend Article XIX Definitions - MOTEL, HOTEL, TOURIST COURT, CABIN to establish three categories of units based on size and extent of cooking facilities; 3) amend Article VI (Minimum Land Area Required) to specify Minimum Land Area Required standards for the three types of Motel, Hotel, Tourist Court, Cabin units; and 4) to make non-substantive amendments Article VI to improve organization, clarity of language and consistency with state regulations. Yes [] or No [] (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of AMENDMENT No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: to amend Article XIX (Definitions) to add a new definition for Accessory Apartment, and to amend Article XIII (Permitted Uses) to make Accessory Apartment an allowed use in all zoning districts. Yes [] or No [] (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of AMENDMENT No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: to amend Article XIX Definitions – STRUCTURE to add the phrase "canopy garages, patios, retaining walls," to the list of examples included within the definition of structure, and to delete the words "and/or pavement" from the exceptions to the definition of structure. Yes [] or No [] (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 5. Are you in favor of the adoption of AMENDMENT No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: to amend Article XVI, Section E.6 (Temporary Activity Signs) to specify size limits for currently-allowed temporary signs advertising real estate for sale or contracted labor on site. Yes [] or No [] (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 6. Are you in favor of the adoption of AMENDMENT No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: to amend Article XIX Definitions – SHOPPING MALL and Article XIX Definitions – SHOPPING CENTER by replacing the words "Two or more retail establishments" with "More than two retail establishments". Yes [] or No [] (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350,000.00 for a full revaluation of the Town and to authorize the issuance of not

more than \$350,000.00 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH RSA 33) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Selectmen favor. (2/3 ballot vote required)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,999,950 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125,000.00 for town road improvements. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$168,000.00 for the purchase of a four wheel drive Highway Truck with a sander body, plow, and wing. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,400.00 for testing at the former landfill property in order to meet State requirements. Garland/Tanguay favor; Chandler opposed.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,500 to purchase a thermal imager for the Bartlett Fire Dept. The Town will be applying for a grant for a portion of the cost of this equipment. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for replacement of obsolete radio equipment and dispatch equipment for emergency personnel communications. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund established in 2005 under the provision of NH RSA 35:1 for the purpose of acquisition of land and costs associated with the construction of a new Bartlett Public Library. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert A. King and others. Garland/Tanguay favor \$10,000/Chandler opposed.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for distribution at the Selectmen's discretion to a Public Education and Government TV Station for Valley Vision to provide Channel 3 to Bartlett. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to assist the Bartlett Community Preschool. Agreeable to a petition signed by Geraldine Beck and others. Selectmen oppose.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Eastern Slope Airport authority for its use in operating the Eastern Slope Regional Airport in 2011. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,769.00 to support Bartlett home delivered meals (Meals on Wheels), congregate meals, transportation, and program services provided by the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Barbara Campbell and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,582.00 to assist The Mental Health Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terri Dyer Shedd and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,998.00 for the support of the White Mt. Community Health Center to help meet the healthcare needs of the uninsured and underinsured residents of Bartlett. Agreeable to petition signed by Drew Smith and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for support of the Tri-County Community Action Program for the purpose of continuing services of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Sean McCarthy and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the Early Support and Services Program (birth to 3 yrs.) of Children Unlimited, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Cheryl Bilder and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,590.00 in support of Starting Point providing advocacy and support to the victims of domestic and sexual violence and their children. Agreeable to a petition signed by Patricia Heiges and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Selectmen once again would like to start out by thanking all of our Town employees, volunteers, and various board members for their efforts which, when all combined, continue to make Bartlett the self-proclaimed "Greatest Little Town on Earth". There are many boards and positions that need volunteers, so make this the year you consider stepping up to the plate for your community.

The Selectmen have tried to develop a budget that, coupled with the warrant articles, will not have an adverse effect on our tax rate. With the amount of new construction in a slump, town revenues decreasing, and the fact that the State has cut back on revenues to the town, this all affects the tax rate. While our proposed budget shows an increase of approximately 4%, which is more than we like, it is mainly due to the increase in bond payments as we are now paying for the fire truck, ambulance, and loader that were approved in prior years and a substantial increase in health insurance due to rate increases and new employees in the police department. The actual expenditures in last year's budget were approximately \$100,000 less than what we had budgeted. Comparing this year's proposed budget and warrant articles against last year's, we are at almost the same level. While it looks like the total is much higher, when you factor in the \$350,000 for the revaluation that will presumably be bonded see explanation below), the overall effect on the tax rate will not be any greater than last year.

The "big ticket item" on this year's warrant is definitely the complete revaluation of the town's property values. While the town's equalization ratio and coefficient of dispersion have remained within the State limits and updates and new construction were being done every year, after doing their assessment review of the town, the NH Board of Tax and Land Appeals and NH Dept. of Revenue Administration felt that since all properties have not been visited since the last complete revaluation in 1993, that the town needed to start a program of complete review in order to be sure all properties are assessed fairly and equitably. Given the economy and especially the state of the real estate market, the Selectmen have concerns that this may not be the best time to do this, but basically there is no good time to do a reval. This is a major undertaking and will involve assessors visiting every property in town to remeasure and inspect all buildings between April and October of this year. We hope residents will cooperate with the assessors and make their jobs easier (and thus saving the town money) by allowing them to access their property. We will be bonding this expenditure and it will require a 2/3 ballot vote at Town Meeting. If the town does not approve this expenditure, we run the risk of the State coming in and doing the revaluation and just billing the town for the whole amount payable in one lump sum. We have been fortunate to have avoided a full revaluation for some years but we need to take this step this year.

Last year we indicated that there were issues pending at the Transfer Station that we jointly own and run with the Town of Jackson. While some progress was being made over these issues, some still remained and the Town of Jackson has filed suit against the Town of Bartlett. Since we are currently in litigation, we cannot discuss the matter, however, we will be trying to resolve this in the upcoming year and we feel confident that we can reach a mutual satisfactory arrangement.

Once again legal fees went way over budget last year and while we still have some pending issues, most have been resolved. The Lil Man v. Town of Bartlett cases have been resolved although some issues in that area may still remain outstanding due to appeals. Besides the previously mentioned suit with the Town of Jackson, our only other current case involves River Run Co. Inc. and their appeals with the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment. We remain hopeful that this year our legal expenses and cases will see a decrease.

Last year's roadwork in cooperation with the Lower Bartlett Water Precinct brought the final work on Glen Ledge Road and roads in Linderhof. The town also did improvements on Alpstrausse, Stillings' Grant Rd. and Cobb Farm Road. We like to wait until spring to make the final determination of upcoming projects, but it looks like the major work will be done on Cobb Farm Rd., Dundee Rd., Skyline Dr. and Alpstrausse. Other problem areas in town will also see work done.

We instituted the Enhanced 9-1-1 (E911) emergency numbering system approximately 5 years ago and it has been a tremendous help to our emergency response personnel. However, there are still many properties that do not have their number prominently displayed on their property or may possibly have the old outdated number on the property. Please remove any old numbers so that it is not confused with any existing new numbering and please display your correct number in a size and location that is easily read, especially from the road at night. If you are not sure of your number, it is printed at the bottom of your tax bill or you can contact the Selectmen's Office (not the Fire Dept.) and find out what it is.

The Selectmen have reached an agreement with Thorne Surveys to start work on updating our tax maps and this process will be starting soon, finishing either this year or next depending on the final cost.

The police department has hired two new full time officers, John Sutton and Ryan True, which brings the department up to the full complement of four full time officers. This winter we have hired a part-time plow driver, James "Red" Langdon, who works only when needed, thereby eliminating the need to hire an outside contractor to plow the Village area. While increasing the cost of wages a bit, the cost is much more than offset by a sizeable decrease in our rental fees for outside services.

The new construction in town, which adds to our assessed value, continues to decline and along with unstable property values, it means that we have to be extra careful with our spending both at the town, school, and county level. Tough decisions on items that are "nice to have" versus those that we "need to have" must be made. We lost approximately \$32,000,000 in property value last year, and in conjunction with reduced revenues, this means it becomes increasingly difficult to maintain a low tax rate so that people can afford to live in our town.

BARTLETT CONSERVATION COMMISSION 2010 ANNUAL REPORT

The Conservation Commission continues its advisory role of wetlands protection. The Commission reviewed each of the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services "Standard Dredge and Fill Applications" that were submitted. For most of these applications, members of the commission visited the site and met with the owners or their representatives to assure the reasonableness of plans and to determine if the impact that would disturb wetlands was being realistically minimized.

In a few cases, the Commission suggested the exploration of alternative approaches to the parties involved: owners/representatives, NH DES and/or Selectmen. Based on requests from the public, the Commission also approached several property owners who were planning to carry out projects that lacked proper permits.

During 2010, the Commission continued its involvement in the NH DES river water-testing program. Technically appropriate scientific testing equipment is provided by the DES. Three testing locations in Bartlett were selected following the approval of the landowners involved. To make this testing as meaningful as possible, the commission selected sites on the Saco River that indicate the water's quality where it enters Bartlett, at a mid-point and as it leaves the town's boundary. This protocol would allow the Commission to better pin-point any problems should they arise. This year some specific lab tests were added to assess changes in river water quality associated with development along and near the river bank.

The Commission is looking forward to hearing an initial report early in 2011 from Upper Saco Valley Land Trust. USVLT is conducting a natural resource inventory in the towns it oversees. The data and maps created during the study will be invaluable tools for guiding the towns in environmentally responsible decision making in the future.

Nancy Oleson and Robert Stone continue into 2011 on the Commission. Daryl Mazzaglia will continue as chairperson of the Conservation Commission through 2011. The Commission is actively looking for two more members to join its ranks. Anyone interested in participating in this important endeavor should contact the Selectmen's office at Bartlett Town Hall.

The role our endangered wetlands play in the ongoing availability of clean water for use by all forms of plant and animal life is scientifically defined as "absolutely essential". Therefore it is clearly in the general public's best interest to protect these same wetlands against any and all abuses, whether they are by ignorance or design. The Conservation Commission knows it is joined by all the citizens of Bartlett in its dedication to protecting the wetland environments of the area.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

2010 was a busy year for the Planning Board, although the number of applications considered by the Board was very low.

During the year the Board approved two two-lot subdivisions, two boundary-line adjustments, one voluntary lot merger, and three permits for cell phone installations (two on existing structures and a new monopine tower near Rogers Crossing). The Board also issued two advisory opinions regarding whether site plan review would be required for proposed development, determining in both cases that site plan review was not required.

In January the Board held public hearings on two amendments to the town's Zoning Ordinance proposed by outside parties. The first would have allowed existing private sports/health clubs within Residential District A to be open to public membership. Though the Board opposed the amendment, it voted to place it on the ballot, where it was defeated by the town's voters. The second proposed amendment would have changed (by special exception) the Minimum Land Area Required standard for "Full-service Hotels" in the vicinity of ski areas. The Board also opposed this amendment and voted not to place it on the ballot, believing that while the issue needed to be addressed, much more work was necessary to determine how best to deal with it.

Also in January, the Board completed consideration of the first application submitted under the Site Plan Review regulations adopted in 2006. The Board issued conditional approval for a large motel development near Rogers Crossing. The Board's decision was appealed to the Zoning Board of Adjustment over the issue of how the Planning Board applied the Zoning Ordinance's Minimum Land Area Required (i.e., density) standard to the development. The ZBA ultimately decided that the Board's decision was not subject to ZBA jurisdiction. The Planning Board's decision is currently under legal appeal.

The Planning Board spent much of the year considering potential amendments to the Zoning Ordinance. Of greatest significance was the issue of how the ordinance deals with higher-end, or "condominium-style," hotel and motel units. After extensive discussion and two public hearings, in January 2011 the Board approved an amendment that revises the definition for hotels and motels, recognizing a wider range of unit types and setting specific density standards for the different types. The Board also approved four other amendments dealing with more minor issues. All five amendments will appear on the 2011 ballot for voter review.

BARTLETT PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

In 2010 the public library was busy filling the changing needs of the patrons as well as continuing to provide reading materials and other resources. The circulation for books, periodicals, visual materials and sound recordings was 22,310. The weeding of adult fiction was completed which made room for the addition of current materials to that collection. A weeding of the sound recordings on cassette was also completed, creating additional space to grow the audio books collection on compact disc. In response to the interest of the patrons, the growth of the visual materials collection on DVD will be a focus in 2011. There is a continued growth in the usage of the public computers, to meet that demand the library purchased two new computer systems and a scanner and continues to provide printing services to patrons as well as offering WiFi. Overdrive, the New Hampshire downloadable audio book consortium continues to see increased activity and with the addition of e-books to the downloadable collection we are also satisfying the needs of our patrons using electronic readers. In keeping current with other libraries in the state the public library and the school library have implemented a new library management system.

The librarian serves as the secretary on the board of the Carroll County Library Cooperative and attended four meetings of this group in 2010. This organization allows all of the librarians in the county to share knowledge, information and occasional costs of library related services. The librarian also participated in the organization and implementation of the One Book One Valley Program. In conjunction with the Friends group, the public library hosted both a book discussion and an adjunct program called "Crosscut, A Spoken Documentary" presented by Rebecca Rule. Additional programs at the public library included a slide show presentation about students in Africa, a presentation by Jim Miller on his book "Storyland" and the Summer Reading Program entitled "Make a Splash, Read". The Summer Reading Program was well attended by the Bartlett Recreation Department summer camp attendees who also borrowed and returned books each week, the Bartlett Community Preschool and members of the community with over 30 children attending the grant sponsored puppet show.

The librarian once again attended two major library conferences which included the CHILIS (Children's Library Services) spring conference, the NHLA (New Hampshire Library Association) Spring Conference as well as the New Hampshire Small Libraries Summit. Continuing education classes for the librarian include a "weeding workshop" at the State Library and a workshop on e-books.

The "Friends of the Bartlett Public Library" remain an active and beneficial organization. The Friends organized another successful book sale in the summer of 2010. In addition to this event the Friends have organized a fundraising evening at Flatbreads, sponsored numerous programs, contributed to the

growth of the audio collection and continue to provide refreshments at events. The library book club continues to meet on the second Tuesday of the month. Book club selections are available at the library and the club always welcomes new attendees.

The Bartlett Public Library is here to provide services to the town of Bartlett and we encourage any and all communication regarding how best to fit the needs of the community.

THE BARTLETT HISTORY FUND

The Bartlett History Fund was established by the Bartlett Library Trustees following the Town's bicentennial in 1990. The purpose of the History Fund is to further the recording of the history of Bartlett and its vicinity. Profits from the sale of the two local histories, *Bartlett, New Hampshire, In the Valley of the Saco*, and *The Latchkey was Always Out* and the sale of bicentennial memorabilia were sent aside to establish the Bartlett History Fund.

The following guidelines for the Bartlett History fund have been established:

- All moneys received from future sales of the Bartlett History books, bicentennial memorabilia, and any other project undertaken by the Trustees for the History Fund will go into the History Fund.
- This money is put into a separate account under the name "Bartlett History Fund."
- This fund may not be used for the Library budget. The Library may, however, use this fund to purchase books and material relating to the history of the town.
- This material will then become a part of the Bartlett History Collection which is being maintained in a special fireproof file cabinet.
- The money in the History Fund may be expended for historical projects, pictures, postcards, and other types of historical materials.
- The Bartlett Library Trustees must approve the above expenditures. Donations of materials and monetary gifts may be made to the Fund.

Cash on hand as of December 31, 2009 was \$19,358.63.

Receipts from book and map sales and the interest accrued were \$156.98. Cash on hand as of December 31, 2010 is \$19,515.61.

The Library has copies of its two histories: *Bartlett, New Hampshire; In the Valley of the Saco* and *The Latchstring was Always Out: A History of Lodging, Hospitality and Tourism in Bartlett, New Hampshire,* by Aileen Carroll, and a reproduction of the 1896 Birdseye Map of Bartlett for sale in the library. These books are also for sale in the local bookstores.

BARTLETT POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 2010

In 2010, we continued to experience an increasing number of burglaries and domestic-related crimes. We strive to deal with these issues while keeping within our budget, which is always a challenge. In the later part of the year, the department responded to a rash of burglaries and break-ins at several local businesses. Through police investigative efforts and the cooperation of local and state police agencies, a "task force" was initiated involving Conway, Bartlett, Jackson, and Madison police departments. This collaboration resulted in several arrests being made early-on in the investigation. Our efforts are continuing with the help of Berlin police and the NH state police in trying to solve the remainder of these burglaries.

In 2010, the department again received a New Hampshire Highway Safety Agency grant to conduct overtime DWI hunter patrols. These extra patrols were at no cost to Bartlett taxpayers. In addition, the Highway Safety Agency generously provided twenty-five bike helmets to local children as part of the spring Bicycle Rodeo at Story Land sponsored by the Mt. Washington Valley Velo Club. We thank the agency for their continued support.

The department saw several personnel changes in 2010. In April, we welcomed John Sutton as a full-time officer. Officer Sutton attended the 153rd session of the New Hampshire Police Academy and was presented with a certificate of graduation on December 3, 2010. In July we were sorry to lose Officer Garry Sherry to the Conway police department. Officer Sherry had been a valued and trusted employee for nearly 6 years and we wish him well in his new position at Conway. Also in July, Ryan True was hired on a part-time basis. Officer True was then promoted to full-time capacity in December and is presently attending the 154th Academy.

A new Chevy Impala cruiser was added to our fleet in July, replacing a 2001 Crown Victoria. The department recognizes these are difficult economic times and appreciates the vote of the townspeople who made this new vehicle possible.

The department continues to be involved with the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School on the Thursday afternoon ski program and the "Project Alert" substance abuse curriculum. We would like to thank the administration and staff at JBES for their continued support. In an effort to maintain the peace and tranquility of Bartlett village that residents expect, we are working with the school and recreation department to provide viable alternatives for local youths and surrounding areas in the form of after-school activities.

Lastly, I want to express my appreciation to the dedicated members of the Bartlett Fire Department, Bartlett/Jackson Ambulance, and Bartlett town road crews who do such a tremendous job helping the department and serving the people of this community. And, as always, we are supported by the Board of Selectmen and the town's administrative staff and would like to thank them all for their help.

We look forward to serving the community of Bartlett in 2011.

BARTLETT JACKSON AMBULANCE SERVICE

Bartlett Jackson Ambulance continues to reach new records. Over 510 calls for service were recorded in 2010. This number reflects an increase of about 12%.

Technology is always advancing in things like cardiac and stroke care as well as seizure and diabetic care just to name a few. Transport equipment such as stair chairs and power-assisted cots continue to be some of the best innovations in decades for use by emergency service providers. Unit 70 (the ambulance) has been on 510 calls and has logged 7,200 miles since January 4, 2010.

Our elderly population has added a new dimension to the health care our providers give. Compassion, understanding and constant training are a component of all the wonderful care available in the Mount Washington Valley.

The Bartlett Jackson Ambulance Service members would like to thank the doctors and nurses as well as all the Memorial Hospital staff, the help and friendship of the Bartlett and Jackson Fire Departments, and the assistance of the Bartlett and Jackson Police Departments. Their involvement with us has made significant differences on countless occasions. We would also like to thank NH Fish and Game, Appalachian Mountain Club, SOLO, NH State Police, and the Carroll County Sheriff's Office for dispatching and responding in areas such as Hart's Location. Twin Mountain and Gorham Fire and Rescue also deserve recognition in this group.

It is truly an honor to serve the people of the Towns of Bartlett and Jackson and the Mount Washington Valley.

The year 2010 has been another very busy year with our department responding to 365 calls. We did see an increase in call volume as compared to the 338 calls in 2009.

This year long time member, Michael J. Pollard retired after 38 years of dedicated service to this Department and community. Mike was the type of member that if you did not see him at a call or training, he was sick and unable to be there. For the past 11 years, Mike was the pump operator/driver of Engine 1 and he knew that Engine from the inside out. Mike knew how to get water to the interior crews and where every piece of equipment was on the Engine. All the Officers and Members of Bartlett Fire Department wish Mike and his wife Leah the very best and he will be sorely missed and hard to replace.

We are considering a used piece of equipment to replace our Utility 1 vehicle which is a 1989 Ford Ambulance. A \$50,000 Capital Reserve Fund was established last year to possibly be used for this replacement. We have been doing some research on line and have determined a decent used piece of replacement equipment that would address our needs currently costs approximately \$100,000.

We continue with our in house trainings and have included in our budget request funding for some formal certified training. Some of the training this funding request will support is auto extrication and Fire Fighter I & II. It has been some time since our department has trained in a formal hands-on extrication class. We also have members who are very interested in becoming Fire Fighter I & II certified through the NH Fire Training Academy. We strive to find and take advantage of all the free training we can, but unfortunately not all training is free. This formal training in addition to our in-house training will continue to help keep us professionally trained and better prepared as a Department to protect the lives and property of the residents and visitors to Bartlett.

Our mutual aid association, Mt. Washington Valley Mutual Aid Association, continues to meet on a monthly basis and works to improving our mutual aid system. Some of the goals the Association has for 2011 are improving radio communications between Departments and improvements to on scene accountability of responders. We thank these Departments for their assistance in 2010 as without them it would be extremely difficult for us to mitigate the larger incidents.

In closing I want to thank the Officers and members of the Bartlett Fire Department for their dedication, commitment, and support of this increasingly very busy department. In addition the other agencies and departments of the Town of Bartlett who we work closely with and regularly assist us, including the

Bartlett/Jackson Ambulance, Bartlett PD, Bartlett Highway Dept, Bartlett Recreation Dept. and Board of Selectmen and Administrative staff. Last but definitely not least, we thank the taxpayers and voters who not only support us at the Town meeting but the other 364 days a year as well.

BARTLETT RECREATION DEPARTMENT 2010 ANNUAL REPORT

Let me begin with thanking the many businesses and individuals who donated to Bartlett Recreation in 2010. This, coupled with the support of the recreation committee members and the many volunteers who give so much of themselves, is what make our programs and events so successful. The support and hard work they provide is greatly appreciated.

Scholarship assistance was in great demand this year, with nearly \$5000 given out to area children for summer programming, after school programming, as well as our two high school scholarships we continue to provide to graduating seniors, all of which is fundraised through our department. Funds raised through the golf tournament and the annual donation letter are the largest contributors to our Scholarship Fund.

2010 was a very busy year for Bartlett Recreation. Over the past several years we have created many new programs and events, to the extent that we host at least one community event each month, in addition to the sports and after school programs offered.

For the first time we hosted a skate exchange and skate night for the community. We assisted nearly a dozen children with donated skates. We continue to collect gently used skates, skin pads, cleats and baseball gloves for those who are just starting out or are in need.

In February, a Father Daughter Dance, was added, offering a night of dance, appetizers and desserts, festive decorations, a photo shoot and music. We will continue to offer this as an annual event.

The B.E.A.R. Summer Program saw record numbers once again. All six weeks were full to capacity; we are anticipating another busy summer. We have a great all adult staff, who work very hard keeping the children engaged and active. This structured program provides the children of our communities a great safe and fun summer. The children learn to swim, play cooperative games, have a library time, guest speakers, crafts, trips and make lots of memories.

Bartlett Recreation continues to work closely with the area schools of Bartlett and Jackson. In an effort to enhance the Friday Night Activities, the recreation department purchased four Wii's, along with enough controllers that sixteen children rotate through 4 stations, and still have time for foosball, ping pong and socializing. In November, we had 41 children in grades 5-8 participate. These games will also be used for special events and rainy days during the summer.

Volunteers remain in high demand for our fundraisers, programs and events. We have so many areas in which you could provide assistance from concessions, parade, concerts, events programs, general office help, providing assis-

tance with keeping the skating rink clear of snow, to spending a day on the golf course.

We have a new web page which provides all the information needed about our many programs and events, which was done at no cost, with many hours provided by the Mount Washington Valley Volunteer of the Year, Stephen Libby. He donated many hours to creating it and still gives us many hours maintaining it. In 2011 we expect to be able to take online payments for all of our programs and events. We move into 2011 holding true to our mission statement of providing a variety of quality recreation and leisure programs for all age groups within the towns of Bartlett, Jackson and Hart's Location. We will continue to bring activities, events and sports that will bring families as well as the community together.

2010 ROAD AGENT REPORT

In 2010 the highway crew did another full road reclamation on a portion of Cobb Farm Road that was in much need of repair as well as a short piece on Stillings' Grant Road. Further out on Cobb Farm Road, we did a grader shim method of hot top and are looking into doing more work on this section in 2011.

The final inch layer of hot top was done on the section of Glen Ledge Road that was part of the water line project which came out very nice, and the same was done to the section off Mittenwald Strasse.

We had about 2,000 feet of Alpstrausse repaved and are looking to putting that on next year's list of grader shimming. These are the big projects that were done in 2010. We did some other grader shimming on a couple of other roads as well as our grading of dirt roads, ditching, cold patching, sweeping and brush cutting.

In 2011, we are looking into road improvements on Cobb Farm Road, Alpstrausse, Dundee Road and Skyline Drive as well as our regular maintenance work.

I want to thank the rest of the Highway Crew of Earle Fernald, Don Miller and Earl Hill for their time and effort that they put into their work year round. I want to give a big thank you to the townspeople for all the support they give us. And a thank you to the "girls" in the office, the Board of Selectmen, Fire Chief Pat Roberts and the Bartlett Fire Department and Police Chief Tim Connifey and the Bartlett Police Department for all their help and support.

2010 TOWN MEETING MINUTES

Moderator Robert Clark opened the Annual Town Meeting by swearing in the election officials and then opened the polls at the Bartlett Town Hall on Tuesday, March 9, 2010 at 8:00AM by reading the following:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday, March 9, 2010 at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Articles 1-2 will be by official ballot at the Town Hall and the polls shall open for balloting at eight o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before seven o'clock in the evening. The following articles (Articles 3-25) in the warrant will be acted upon on Thursday, March 11, 2010 at six thirty o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

We hereby certify that we posted a like copy of said Town Warrant and Budget on February 22, 2010 at the Post Offices in Glen and Bartlett, at the Town Hall in Intervale (Bartlett) and the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School (the places of meeting), all being public places within the said Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire. A true copy of warrant attest: Board of Selectmen: Gene G. Chandler, Douglas A. Garland, and Jon Tanguay.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of adoption of AMENDMENT NO. 1 to the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as proposed by outside parties as follows: To amend Article XVIII, Section D (1) (Special Exceptions) by adding the following: "y) Sports/Health Clubs in the Town Residential District A. A Sports/Health Club is a structure and grounds that may include health and recreation facilities such as racquet courts, swimming pools, workout and weight training rooms and equipment, locker and shower facilities, meeting rooms, restaurant and/or lounge which is clearly subordinate to and in support of the health and recreational purposes, and other facilities as normally associated with amenities provided in support of resort residential living complexes, provided that: 1) the facility was in existence at the time of adoption of this amendment; 2) the facility has previously been used as a private amenity for the residents and guests of a condominium or resort residential living complex; and 3) the facility is operated as a private facility for use by members and is not open to the public at-large on a day-use basis." YES or NO (Planning Board opposes by a vote of 5 to 2)

Voting occurred until 7:00PM when the polls were closed and ballots were counted. There were 309 ballots cast. The results were announced as follows:

There were write-ins for the various positions and copies of those are available at the Town Clerk's office. Motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting until Thursday, March 11, 2010 at 6:30PM at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School.

Moderator Clark then opened the deliberative portion of Town Meeting held on Thursday, March 11, 2010 at 6:30PM at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Jimi Emery. Moderator Clark then pointed out where the various handouts and town reports were available in the room, the location of the automatic defibrillator and the emergency exits, and read the results of Articles 1 and 2.

Moderator Clark then proceeded with the rest of the Warrant.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,913,500.00 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Gene Chandler, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, spoke to the article and directed those present to pages 9 and 12 of Town Report to review the detail of the budget. Chandler went through the budget line by line, explained that we just found out that the radio tower on Tyrol (shared with Jackson) had blown over and requires \$2,100 to repair, explained the current Transfer Station situation, and then asked for any questions. Library Trustee and Treasurer Leo Sullivan asked why there was only \$36,000 in the library line rather than the \$36,600 that the trustees had asked for.

Chandler explained it is because there was a balance of \$1,600 and the Selectmen used \$600 of that to offset the budget and there was still a \$1,000 cushion in there. Sullivan stated that the budget goes from Town Meeting to Town Meeting and that is not what is in there. Chandler explained that their budget is from Jan. to Dec. and that all departments operate for three months of the year without a budget. Sullivan disagreed. Chandler disagreed with Sullivan. Sullivan made the motion, seconded by Library Trustee Julia King, to add the \$600 back into the library line. Vote was taken = **PASSED** + \$600.00 (\$1,914,100). Motion was then made by Chandler, seconded by Selectman Doug Garland, to add \$2,100.00 for the repair of the radio tower. Vote was taken = **PASSED** + \$2,100.00 (\$1,916,200). Discussion continued. Julia King asked about the \$2,000 in the line for a code compliance officer. Chandler explained that we have that there in case we find someone willing to take on the job. Frank

Graham asked about the details for police officers. Chandler stated it was reduced because there were not as many road projects going on but revenues offset this item anyway. No further discussion. Vote was taken on the article as amended = PASSED (\$1,913,500 + \$600 + \$2100 = \$1,916,200). Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (\$1,916,200).

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$160,000.00 for town road improvements. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Gene Chandler, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, spoke to the article. Brief discussion. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (\$160,000.00).

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$27,000.00 for the purchase of a compactor at the Transfer Station. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Gene Chandler, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, spoke to the article explaining it would cost \$13,500 to fix the old one and we could do that but Selectmen felt it was more prudent to get a new one. Bill Fabrizio asked if it was a new compactor. Chandler responded yes. Francis Savard asked what the life expectancy was. Chandler responded at least 10 yrs. Hopefully. No further discussion. Vote was taken = **PASSED (\$27,000.00)**.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for the completion of the installation of the fuel system of the generator at the Josiah Bartlett School. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Gene Chandler, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, spoke to the article. Motion was made and seconded to amend the article by adding \$1,500.00 bringing the total to \$7,000.00. Chandler explained that this was due to a decision regarding the fuel supply. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (+\$1,500.00). No further discussion. Vote was taken on the Article as amended = **PASSED** (\$7,000.00).

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,400.00 for testing at the former landfill property in order to meet State requirements. Garland/Tanguay favor; Chandler opposed. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Gene Chandler, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, spoke to the article. Vicki Harlow asked why Chandler was opposed to the article. Chandler responded it was due to his disagreement with the State's decision to revise the closure requirements after we had our plan approved, however, he realizes this is necessary and hopes because our tests have been good that we can reduce the number of tests required. Paul Pagliarulo asked if there was any financial benefit to the town. Chandler stated no. No further discussion. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (\$5,400.00).

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,500.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser and related equipment. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Gene Chandler, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, spoke to the article explaining we were replacing a 2001 Crown Victoria with a Chevrolet Impala. No discussion. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (\$21,500.00).

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to support Phase 1 of the Resource Inventory for the Strategic Conservation Planning Project of the Upper Saco Valley Land Trust as requested by the Bartlett Conservation Commission. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Jim Hastings, who is on the Board of the Upper Saco Valley Land Trust and a Bartlett resident, spoke to the article. Selectman Chandler stated that when the Conservation Commission met with the Selectmen to discuss this program, they had indicated that they would not be going on private land without permission of the property owner and asked if any part of this project included going on private land. Hastings stated no, it was done with software. Bert George asked again whether they would be going on private land to do this study. Hastings again stated no. No further discussion. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (\$2,000.00).

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$43,700.00 for a Fire Chief's Response vehicle. The town has applied for a grant for 35% of the cost of said vehicle. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Fire Chief Pat Roberts spoke to the article, explaining that he would like to get an SUV type of vehicle rather than a pick up truck like he has now in order to transport both people and equipment if necessary. This will replace the current 2000 Ford Pick Up, however, the fire department would like to keep this truck to replace the 1953 Dodge truck on loan from the State. Roberts explained the difficulties involved with using the 1953 Dodge due to its age when mechanical devices were a little different than now. Frank Graham asked if this would go out to bid. Roberts stated that the price we have is the State bid price, so basically the bidding process has been done. Fire department member and former Bartlett Fire Chief Roger Labbe vouched for the unreliability of the Dodge. Roberts stated that we have applied for a grant, which would pay 35% of the cost of the truck, however, it has to be approved at Town Meeting before the grant can go forward. Some confusion arose as to whether the amount in the article represented the 65% town share or 100% of the cost. Roberts stated that this amount is 100% of the cost so the truck can be purchased whether we get the grant or not. No further discussion. Vote was taken = PASSED (\$43,700.00).

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of NH RSA 35:1 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to be placed in this fund. Selectmen favor. (Majority vote required) Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Gene Chandler, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, spoke to the article. No discussion. Vote was taken = **PASSED UNANIMOUSLY (\$50,000.00)**.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund established in 2005 under the provision of NH RSA 35:1 for the purpose of acquisition of land and costs associated with the construction of a new Bartlett Public Library. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jane Duggan and others. Garland/Tanguay favor; Chandler opposed. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. No one spoke to the article and no discussion. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (\$35,000.00).

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for distribution at the Selectmen's discretion to a Public Education and Government TV Station for Valley Vision to provide Channel 3 to Bartlett. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Gene Chandler, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, spoke to the article explaining that people had expressed an interest in the past in having Ch. 3 and this seems to be a valid amount to get that service but it does not at this time include coverage of Bartlett events, just to be able to view Ch. 3. Frank Graham stated he felt that we should get a written agreement to cover Bartlett events. Chandler stated again that it does not include any coverage of Bartlett events unless Ch. 3 does it on their, this is simply to get Ch. 3 turned back on to view high school events, SAU school board meetings, and whatever else is on. Frank Pingree asked what amount of time do we get to view? Chandler stated whenever it is on. Suzette Indelicato stated her support for the article so families who cannot afford to attend their child's events at the high school can view them. No further discussion. Voice vote was taken - Moderator determined it was too close to call and asked for a show of hands. Vote was taken by a show of hands = PASSED (\$5,000.00).

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to assist the Bartlett Community Preschool. Agreeable to a petition signed by Susan Gaudette and others. Selectmen oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Jennifer McCarthy, who is on the Board of Directors of the Preschool, spoke to the article stating that the preschool is in crisis due to lack of enrollment, how they have made changes and done fundraising to make up for the lack of income and how access to the school environment is very beneficial to the students. Frank Graham spoke in support of the article and then made a motion, which was seconded, to amend the article to add \$2,000.00. Leslie Mallett spoke against the amendment stating that she supports the preschool as it came into being when she was a member of the School Board but that the Board of Directors asked for the \$2,000 (not \$4,000) and we should keep it at that amount. Selectman Gene Chandler spoke against the article because it is a private organization and not a proper use of town funds, but that it may be more appropriate to be on the school warrant. Vote was taken on the amendment to add \$2,000 = FAILED. Sue Gaudette, who is on the Board of Directors, spoke in favor of the article and stated that they do work hard on fundraising. Jennifer McCarthy stated that they will continue with fundraising, but the State has also capped the scholarship contribution, which has affected them also. Geri Beck, also on the Board of Directors, asked why the Selectmen support another organization like this (referring to Art. 21 Children Unlimited). Chandler stated that the Children Unlimited article is for early support services and not for the daycare aspect of their organization. Vicki Harlow made a motion, seconded by Leo Sullivan, to move the question. Leslie Mallet objected stating the discussion was still progressing and not repeating and people should have an opportunity to talk. Harlow and Sullivan then rescinded their motion and second and discussion continued. Frank Pingree stated that if it is a worthy organization and it can't make it on \$100,000, then \$2,000 wouldn't make any difference to it. Bill Fabrizio, former School Board member, stated that the preschool saves the school money in the long run and supports the article. No further discussion. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (\$2,000.00). Gene Chandler, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, then explained that he didn't mention this before because he didn't want to influence the discussion or vote but the NH Dept. of Revenue Administration, who has final approval of the expenditures voted on at this Town Meeting, has indicated to us during preliminary review of our warrant that this article may be disallowed due to it being a private organization and that they will require more details before making a final ruling.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 in support of Carroll County Transit for the following transportation services: Public Transit Fixed and Commuter Routes, Demand Response Senior Transportation and Long Distance Non Emergency Medical Transportation. Selectmen oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Selectman Chandler explained the Selectmen's opposition is because they are asking for the same dollar amount from all towns rather than proportionately and that they will not be serving Bartlett. No discussion. Vote was taken = FAILED.

Julia King made the motion, seconded by William Fabrizio, to take Articles 16 through 22 as a block or bundle. Francis Savard spoke against bundling. No further discussion. Vote to taken to bundle Articles 16-22 = **PASSED**. Moderator Clark then asked for any discussion on Articles 16-22. Frank Graham asked why we are supporting the airport in Fryeburg. Selectman Chandler responded because it serves the whole valley and Bartlett was one of the original towns supporting it. Rick Murnik questioned the wording of Art. 18 and whether this was Northern Human Services. Vicki Harlow stated yes. No further discussion. Vote was taken on Articles 16-22 = **PASSED**. All articles passed in the amounts shown as follows:

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Eastern Slope Airport authority for its use in operating the Eastern Slope Regional Airport in 2010. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (\$500.00).

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,769.00 to support Bartlett home delivered meals (Meals on Wheels), congregate meals, transportation, and program services provided by the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Barbara Campbell and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote was taken = PASSED (\$4,769.00).

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,582.00 to assist The Mental Health Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Maureen Hanlon and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (\$3,582.00).

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,330.00 for the support of the White Mt. Community Health Center to help meet the healthcare needs of the uninsured and underinsured residents of Bartlett. Agreeable to petition signed by Drew Smith and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (\$6,330.00).

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for support of the Tri-County Community Action Program for the purpose of continuing services of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Paul Caplan and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (\$4,000.00).

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the Early Support and Services Program (birth to 3 yrs.) of Children Unlimited, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Sean McCarthy and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (\$4,000.00).

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,929.00 in support of Starting Point providing advocacy and support to the victims of domestic and sexual violence and their children. Agreeable to a petition signed by Colleen Allbee and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote was taken = **PASSED** (\$1,929.00).

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Highway Truck Capital Reserve Fund established in 2003. There is a zero balance in this account but it was not discontinued. This is being done at the request of the NH Department of Revenue Administration. (Majority vote required) Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Gene Chandler, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, spoke to the article explaining although it seems unnecessary since there is no money in this account, NH Dept. of Revenue has asked us to close this account properly. Road Agent Travis Chick asked if we could put some money in it now as we will be needing a truck. Chandler stated no because it has not been warned that a dollar amount would be voted on. No further discussion. Vote was taken = PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following resolution to be forwarded to our State Representative(s), our State Senator, the Speaker of the House, and the Senate President: Resolved: The citizens of New Hampshire should be allowed to vote on an amendment to the New Hampshire Constitution that defines "marriage". Agreeable to a petition signed by Michael Wernette and others. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Moderator Clark explained that he has received a petition signed by 7 registered voters requesting that the vote on this article be done by secret ballot. Michael Wernette spoke to the article explaining that this would make it a democratic process by putting it to a vote as a constitutional amendment to define marriage and that 133 towns in NH have this on their ballot. Maureen Hanlon spoke against the article stating it had nothing to do with the democratic process that it was a discrimination vote. Susan Wernette stated that this was not an attack on civil rights or discrimination but was part of the democratic process. Frank Graham stated that he was from the old school and to him marriage is between a man and a wife and they have children. Jean Gustin spoke against it stating it is not a proper place for this on a town warrant. Motion was then made and seconded to call the question. Vote was taken = PASSED. Moderator Clark then opened the polls at 8:05PM. Voting took place for approximately 20 mins. Moderator Clark gave last call for voting. Polls were closed at

8:25PM and Moderator Clark directed the Supervisors of the Checklist to count the ballots.

ARTICLE 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Henry Villaume asked that everyone come to the Annual School Meeting on Tuesday, March 16, 2010 at 6:30PM. Moderator Clark announced the Firefighters Association dinner on Saturday and that baked goods were still available from the Rec. Dept. in the back of the room. Frank Graham thanked the Selectmen and Moderator for their hard work during the year. Moderator Clark then read the Special Recognition page in the Town Report to acknowledge those who have served the town. Bill Fabrizio asked for the roads on the list for improvements this year.

Chandler stated we don't like to commit to anything until we see in the spring what the winter damage is but the plan does include a portion of Cobb Farm Road. Rick Murnik asked what are we doing about the Selectman in absentia (Jon Tanguay) and can the Board of Selectmen function with only two. Chandler stated that we currently still have three Selectmen and yes we can function with only two.

Moderator Clark then read the results of Article 24 as being YES = 43 and NO = 68 and therefore **ARTICLE 24 FAILED**.

There being no further discussion, the motion was made and seconded to adjourn. Vote was taken = **ADJOURNED AT 8:32PM**.

TOWN OF BARTLETT REGULATIONS

The Town of Bartlett Officials closely monitor compliance with the following ordinances, regulations, and by-laws. This list is provided to make people aware that these regulations exist and a summary of each regulation appears here. Complete descriptions may be obtained from the Selectmen's Office and any questions should be directed to that office.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE: prohibits parking on town streets between Nov. 1 and May 1 (24 hours a day). Violation = fine of up to \$50.00 plus towing charges.

SNOW PLOWING REGULATION: prohibits the plowing of snow into or across any town road.

EXCAVATION PERMIT REGULATION: requires permits to be acquired 24 hours prior to excavation in a town road. Violation - fine of \$100.00.

ILLEGAL DUMPING ORDINANCE: prohibits dumping and littering at other than in authorized areas at the Transfer Station. Violation - fine of \$100.00.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ORDINANCE: prohibits drinking of alcoholic beverages in public places. Violation - fine of \$25.00.

TEST PIT INSPECTION ORDINANCE: requires inspection of pits prior to application for State septic design approval. Fee of \$25.00 per pit dug.

SEPTIC SYSTEM DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION ORDINANCE: governs the design and construction of septic systems and requires all septic system designs, prior to submission to the State, to be reviewed by the Selectmen's Office. Fee of \$50.00 per design.

BUILDING PERMIT ORDINANCE: required for construction of signs, structures, changes of use, etc. which would affect property value and/or to which zoning requirements apply. Violation = fine up to \$275/day. The following is the new fee schedule effective as of 2003:

PERMIT TO OCCUPY ORDINANCE: required prior to occupancy of any construction that is intended for habitation or for which a septic system is required. Violation = fine of up to \$100 and/or \$10/day each day of violation.

ZONING ORDINANCE: addresses the regulation of such items as signs, setbacks, density, green areas, frontage, permitted uses, telecommunications, ridgeline development, etc.

SITE PLAN REVIEW REGULATIONS: governs the review and approval /disapproval by the Planning Board of site plans for the development, change, or expansion of use of non-residential tracts where the total square footage of the footprint of the building(s) is greater than 5,000 square feet.

FLOODPLAIN ORDINANCE: governs activity in the floodplain.

GRAVEL PIT ORDINANCE: governs excavation of gravel pits.

DOG LEASH BY-LAW: requires that all dogs be restrained by leash or under direct control of owner. Violation - fine of up to \$100 plus board reimbursement.

SPECIAL EVENTS ORDINANCE: regulates the conduct of special events. Violation = fine of up to \$300.

ELECTIONEERING ORDINANCE: eliminates all electioneering or signature gathering on Town or School owned property at any meetings or elections held within the Town of Bartlett.
