

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

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday the Eighth day of March next, at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for Memorial Day.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for Highways and Bridges.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for lighting the streets with Electricity.

6. To see what action the Town will take with regard to State Aid Construction, State Aid Maintenance and Trunk Line Maintenance.

7. To see what action the Town will take to suppress the White Pine Blister.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts and legacies given to the Town by different individuals, the income to be used for the care of cemetery lots.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Evergreen Cemetery.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$250.00 to plow snow from the Trunk Line during the winter of 1927-1928.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Letter written by the late Mrs. John C. Dodge relat-

ing to the town library, before and during the Civil war, 1861-65.

The following articles were in the possession of the seventh generation of Alexander Caldwell who came from Ireland about 1718. The Caldwells were Scotch Irish. One of the descendants, Alexander Caldwell, lived and died in Bennington.

Pocket-book—was brought over from Ireland about 1718 by Alexander Caldwell to Londonderry, New Hampshire.

The Spoon—While Mr. Caldwell was whittling out a spoon from a piece of wood, one of his comrads came along and gave him this spoon, it being one that he had made out of some soft metal run in a wooden mould. It was used all the time he was in the army. On his return it was kept as a souvenir. (War of 1812).

Cuff Buttons—were made out of silver six pences, carried by Capt. John Hull of Mass. At the same time the Pine tree shillings were carried and the first money made in America. These were worn during his service in the army.

#### **REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

#### To the Bennington School Board:

There is a very definite spirit in the Town of Bennington that continually manifests itself in such splendid activities as center around the schools. We refer to the public spirit that manifested itself in the providing of playground material for the children of the town, that is planning a protected playground for them, that sees to it that adequate books are instantly available for special needs, and that manifested itself in the Institute held in Bennington last fall, where in addition to the cordiality extended by everyone connected with the affair Mrs. Pierce insisted that all the visiting teachers were her guests. The opening of the paper mills for inspection added the final touch to what several of the visiting teachers called "The best institute and the finest hospitality we have ever known."

Owing wholly to the desire of providing instruction in a well rounded seventh and eighth grade course, the School Board elected Miss Margaret Genzler to take over the work on the basis of establishing a junior high school program. To this work Miss Genzler has brought her fine personality and her excellent technique, and the work of the children is moving splendidly ahead.

Following the achievement survey made last year, diagnostic tests of individual and class difficulties have been given, and we suggest that those who are interested in child welfare and education make it their business to ask to see the personal remedial work that is being done in the schools this year, with especial emphasis on the primary room and the junior high school. These grades are critical grades, beginning well and ending well the elementary school education in Bennington. Miss Cashion has shown a splendid versatility and a strong, purposeful activity in the correction of substandard cases. Miss Cilley, in the more prosaic drill grades is extending remedial work into problem solutions, rather than overstressing computation. The result will be a greater possibility for advance in junior high school work.

None of the achievements in Bennington are haphazardly arrived at. School systems never rise higher than the level of educational desire of the School Board. And it is right and proper that the Town should give due recognition and appreciation to those chosen to represent the parents and protect the children, the members of the Board.

The morale of the school is assisted or lowered by the care given the buildings. We desire to call attention to Mr. Burnham's untiring work to keep the property in good condition, and to see to it that the children are in splendidly clean schoolrooms.

We recommend no changes in policy, and have submitted in person to the School Board such recommendations for proper maintenance of the present standards plus the normal gain that must occur where all who are interested in children are harmoniously at work, in the form of the budget herewith enclosed.
