[CHICHESTER CHARTER, 1727.]

GEORGE by the Grace of God of Great Brittain France, and Ireland, King Defender of the faith &c^a

To ALL PEOPLE to whom these Presents Shall Come Greeting-

KNOW YEE that we of our Special Knowledge and mere motion for the Due Encouragement of Settling a New Plantation By & with the advice & Consent of Our Council Have given granted And by these presents as far as in us Lyes, do give & Grant in Equal Shears unto Sundry of our beloved Subjects whose names are Entred in A Schedule hereunto Annexed that Inhabit or Shall Inhabit within the S^d Grant within our Province of New Hampshire, all That Tract of Land within the following Bounds Viz-- to begin on the South West Side of the Town of Barnstead and from thence running South Westerly on the head of the town of Nottingham untill Eight miles be Accomplished And Then North West Eight miles, Then North East Eight Miles Then South East by the S⁴ Town of Barnstead to the place where it first began & that the Same be A Town Corporate by the name of Chichester to the Persons afores⁴ forever To HAVE & TO HOLD the S^d Land to the S^d Grantees & their heirs And Assignes forever and to Such associates as they shall admit, upon the following Conditions (1) That the Proprietors within three years build or Cause to be built Sixty Dwelling Houses & Settle families in the Same & Clear Three Acres of Ground fit for Planting or mowing & that Each Proprietor pay his Proportion of the Town Charges when & So often as Occasion Shall require the Same-

2^{dly} That A meeting house be built for the Publick Worship of God within the term of four years—

3) That upon Default of any Perticular Proprietor in Complying with the Conditions of this Charter upon his part, Such Delinquent Proprietor Shall forfiet his Shear of the S^d Land to the Other Proprietors which Shall be Disposed off According to the Maj^r Vote of the S^d Proprietors At A Legal Meeting—

4) That A Proprietors Shear be reserved for a Parsonage and another for the first Minister of the Gospell that Shall be there Settled & ordained And Another Proprietors Shear for the Bennifit of A School in S^d Town-

PROVIDED nevertheless that the Peace with the Indians Continue for the Space of Three years but if it Should Happen that A War with the Indians Should

Com'ence before the Expiration of the afore S^d Tearm of Three Years That then the S^d Tearm of three years Shall be Allowed the Proprietors after the Expiration of the War for the Performance of the afore S^d Conditions, rendring & paying therefor to us our heirs and Successors, or Such officer or officers as Shall be appointed to recieve the Same The Annual Quit rent or Acknowledgement of One pound of Hemp in the S^d Town on the Last Wednesday in March Yearly forever (if Demanded) reserving alsoe unto us our heirs & Successors all mast Trees growing on on S^d Tract of Land, According to Acts of Parliament in that Case made & Provided And for the better order rule & Governmt of the S^d Town: We do by these Presents for our Selves our heirs and Successors Grant unto the S^d men & Inhabitants, or those that Shall Inhabit S^d Town That yearly & Every year upon the Second Wednesday in March forever Shall meet to Ellect & Chuse by the Major part of the Proprietors then Present Constables, Selectmen, & other Town officers According to the Laws & usages of our afores^d Province with Power Previleges & Authority as other Town officers with our affores^d Province have & Enjoy: & for the Notifying & Calling the first Town meeting we do hereby appoint Peter Wear Esg John Sanburn & Jacob ffrees to be the first Selectmen & they to Continue in S^d respective office as Selectmen untill the Second Wednesday in the month of March which will be in the year of Our Lord one thousand Seven hundred & Twenty Eight & untill other Select men Shall be Chosen & Appointed in their Steed in Such manner as is in these Presents Expressed In Testimony whereof we have Caused the Seal of our S^d Province to be hereunto affixed WITTNESS John Wentworth Esg our Leiutenant Governor & Comander in Chieff in & over our S^d Province at our Town of Portsmouth in our S^d Province of New Ham:pshire the Twenteth day of may in the Thirteenth year of Our reigne Anno Domini 1727

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Chichester Chichester, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Town of Chichester, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2004 as shown on pages 2 through 6. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town of Chichester's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

Management has chosen not to implement Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements - and Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments*. Therefore these financial statements are presented following the principles that were in effect prior to GASB Statement No. 34. Management has not presented government-wide financial statements to display the financial position and changes in financial position of its governmental activities and business-type activities. The financial statements presented do not contain separate statements for governmental, proprietary, if applicable and fiduciary fund types, nor are major and non-major funds separately identified and classified. The financial statements presented report expendable and nonexpendable trust funds, some of which should be reported as special revenue and permanent funds under the new reporting model. The financial statements also present a general long-term debt account group which should not be reported as such, but the information contained therein should be included in the government-wide financial statements were they presented. Also, the financial statements do not contain any information on capital assets because the government has not maintained historical cost records of such assets. Management has not presented a management's discussion and analysis as required. The amounts that would be reported in the missing statements and required supplementary information, and the effects of reclassifying and properly reporting the information presented are not reasonably determined.

In our opinion, because of the effects of the matters discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above do not present fairly, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of the Town of Chichester as of December 31, 2004, or the changes in its financial position or its cash flows, where applicable, for the year then ended.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Chichester basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. For reasons stated in the third paragraph of this report, we expressed an opinion that the financial statements of the Town of Chichester do not fairly present financial position, results of operations, and cash flows in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Therefore, we do not express an opinion on the accompanying combining and individual fund statements.

The total cost of the bridge is \$520,900.55 (five-hundred-twentythousand-nine-hundred dollars and fifty-five cents). SELECTMEN'S REPORT

2005 seemed to be a relatively quite and uneventful year within the Town with no major or serious problems encountered.

However, the Selectmen did remain busy over the course of the year attending to day-today "activities" and holding the regularly scheduled Selectmen's public meeting every Tuesday evening at the Town Hall.

The Selectmen would encourage the general public to attend these meetings occasionally to "listen in" and also to bring their concerns and thoughts to the Selectmen's attention. Its important that the Selectmen hear from the Townspeople!

One issue before the Town at the present time still to be finally resolved is the Marsh Pond Dam situation. Marsh Pond Dam, co-owned by the Town, is an old concrete and earth dam, which has been taken over by beavers, and holds back the beautiful 30 acre pond located behind the Town Hall. This dam has failed several times over the last years and has caused property damage downstream, twice washing out portions of Cross Road and damaging private property. The State of N.H., Dept. of Environmental Services, Dam Bureau, has issued the Town and co-owner an Administrative Order to either repair the dam or remove it. Preliminary cost estimates to replace the dam are approximately \$160,000. It is the Selectmen's belief that the cost of replacement should be shared by each owner if the dam is to be replaced. To date the co-owners of the dam have not been interested in participating in replacing the dam. Because of the State's outstanding order to either replace or remove the dam, and because of the potential liability issues, the current Board of Selectmen has decided to remove the Town's portion of the dam this spring. If the dam is to be replaced the funding issue would be brought to the Town for a vote at the 2007 Town Meeting.

The Selectmen, following up on the Town's direction given by a Warrant Article at last year's Town meeting created a Charter for, and appointed a Road Advisory Committee.

The Chichester website has been redesigned and is now much more informative in that it contains a greater amount of resource material and current information such as dates of scheduled meetings, minutes of Boards, Commissions and Sub-committees, etc. The new website has been very successful; we get approximately 200 "hits" a day. We would like to thank Fred Shaw for a tremendous amount of volunteer time committed to the website upgrade and also Patty Wooster, the Town's Administrative Assistant.

A great deal of appreciation is extended to all the volunteer members of the numerous Boards, Commissions and Committees for their dedicated time and efforts given to the Town. And we must certainly not overlook all the hard work done by our Town employees throughout the course of the year. A great thanks to all!!

Chichester Planning Board Town Report

Let me first say, "Thank you" to the members of the planning board who faithfully attended the monthly meetings and for fellow citizens of Chichester who also participated in the public hearings at those meetings. Secondly, I and all the board members want to wish Tracy Scott all the best in his new job. We especially want to thank him for chairing the Planning Board these past eight years. We will miss his leadership, guidance, foresight, and input which have kept the board and the meetings on track. All the associated meetings he attended and the extra hours he put in were greatly appreciated. Again, thanks.

Each year the planning board seems to get busier and the meetings go later into the night. This past year we reviewed and/or approved 5 subdivisions, 7 site reviews, 2 home occupations, 45 discussions and almost as many public hearings, plus many miscellaneous subject came before the board including legal proceedings and decisions. Chichester is growing! We are trying hard to be careful how the town grows and that it does so at a rate the Town's resources can handle. We also use the Town's Master Plan as a guideline.

Acting on suggestions from some residents of Chichester, the Planning Board formed two subcommittees. One subcommittee's task was to review the condition and future of the town's roads. They met monthly and concluded with a report containing suggestions for the roads. That report was forwarded to the Selectman and the Road Agent. The other subcommittee was made up of some members of the Board of Selectman, Conservation Commission, Planning Board and interested residents. They looked at the Town's Lighting Ordinance, Wetland Ordinance, Growth Management Ordinance and proposed a new one: Open Space Conservation Development Ordinance. Many of the problems associated with the first two were cleared up in the proposed changes. For the lighting: glare, light trespass, intensity of light in signs, etc. Concerning the wetlands: setbacks, definitions, etc. The proposed changes, if approved by the town, will clear up future potential problems people would've had with trying to do anything new to their land. You may be able to use more of your land for things you wanted to while still protecting real wetlands. We welcomed comments and input from each person and ironed out the differences to make viable changes for the better.

Many towns are adopting Open Space Conservation Development ordinances and we should also. Too many parcels were being developed leaving no parcels preserved from future development. This new ordinance will provide a landowner alternative ways to subdivide their land if they want and develop portions of the new parcels in a smaller area and the remaining land protected from future development. We have resident landowners waiting for this ordinance so they can subdivide and develop their land in such a way that will ease the impact on the town and the environment.

The Board and I urge you to read the proposed ordinances. Then go out and vote YES for the adoption of each as they show up on this year's ballot.

With these changes in mind and hopefully in hand, the community will be a better place to live and grow old. The Planning Board looks forward to a great and busy year.

Established in accordance with state law, the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) is a voluntary association of 20 communities in Merrimack and Hillsborough Counties. The Town of Chichester is a member in good standing of the Commission.

The Commission's mission is to improve, through education, training, and planning assistance, the ability of the municipalities of the region to prepare and implement municipal plans; to prepare a plan for effective and appropriate development and utilization of the resources of the region; and to assist municipalities in carrying out the regional plan.

The Commission provides a variety of planning services, including consultations on planning issues; planning research; sample ordinances, regulations, and planning documents; access to Census information and other data sources; grant information; review and comment on planning documents; development review; and educational programs. Membership also entitles a community to affordable master planning assistance, geographic information systems (GIS) mapping, build-out analysis preparation, and other land use and transportation planning-related assistance.

In 2005, CNHRPC staff:

- Assisted the Town with questions on development review process.
- Staff collected data and reported the Town regarding its annual review of the growth management ordinance.
- Assisted Town with review of proposed zoning amendments, information on fee schedules, and open space provisions.
- Assisted the Town with questions on building permits.
- Provided information to a Town resident concerning scenic roads.
- Researched lighting ordinances for the Planning Board.
- Completed turn movement counts along NH 202 as requested by NHDOT;
- Provided traffic counts to the Town.
- Assisted the Town with final amendments to the Zoning ordinance to implement the corridor study.
- Held a Smart Growth workshop in Town.

In addition to the local services described above, in 2005 the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission:

- Provided general local planning assistance to member municipalities and responded to inquiries regarding zoning ordinance, subdivision regulation, and site plan review regulation revisions.
- Coordinated sub-regional workshops related to Planning Board process and general land use/transportation planning issues.
- Coordinated three meetings of the CNHRPC Regional Resource Conservation Committee (R2C2). The R2C2 seeks to bring representatives of each of the region's communities together to work on conservation issues that affect the overall region.
- · Conducted approximately 165 traffic counts throughout the region.
- Finalized the update of the FY 2007-2016 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and participated in the development of the Statewide 10 Year Transportation Improvement Plan.
- Continued the development of the natural resources and transportation chapter of the Regional Plan.
- Organized and hosted three meetings of the CNHRPC Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC).
- Continued to maintain and improve the regional transportation model. The transportation model is an integral component of the I-93 Bow to Concord Transportation Planning Study and other local and regional transportation planning projects.
- Provided assistance to municipalities, groups and interested individuals regarding the Transportation Enhancements (TE) and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) programs.
- Developed a Class 6 roads fact sheet and provided guidance related to Class 6 road issues to interested communities.
- Provided continuing technical assistance to the Upper Merrimack River Local Advisory Committee (UMRLAC) and assisted in the initiation of the UMRLAC Management Plan update.

On behalf of the police department I would like to thank the residents and business owners of Chichester for their support over 2005. This year was another challenging year for the department as Lt. Kitson resigned from the department. This created a void, which was not filled until August. Officer Joshua Wright was hired to fill that void, and will be attending the full time police academy from January thru April 2006.

Looking back over the years the department has grown and done things never done before in Chichester such as providing police coverage 7 days a week. It has been brought to light that when State Police are covering calls their response time could be as much as 30-45 min as they may be responding from somewhere on Interstate 89 or 93 somewhere between the Hooksett tolls to the Ashland exit. When I got this information I met with members of State Police and found they do not have the resources any longer to devote a state trooper to cover 1 town that does not patrol 24 hours in a cluster of many that do. As a police officer in a small town in time of need we rely on other towns for assistance just as they rely on us. By not having a devoted police officer to patrol Chichester 24 hours we put the safety and security of the town as well as other towns in jeopardy. As the Chief of Police and a taxpayer I feel the risk of needing someone in any type emergency situation and being proactive after midnight is worth approx. \$63.00 on the average tax bill for the year. I would ask for your support in this endeavor and if you should have any questions regarding this please stop by the station or call and I will discuss it in further detail.

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

Chichester Fire-Rescue

The Chichester Fire-Rescue dedicated members responded to 494 calls for service in 2005, a 24% increase over last years 400 calls. Please see the next page for a breakdown of the call types, hours and mutual aid.

I addition to responding to calls for service members attend scheduled training on Monday evenings from 7:00PM to 10:00PM. Training is based on Fire/Rescue topics on the 1st Monday of each month; Emergency Medical based training topics on the 2nd Monday; equipment maintenance and training on the 3rd Monday. The 4th Monday is used for a general business meeting and on he months that have a 5th Monday we schedule advanced Life Support training intended to fulfill re-certification requirements for those members who are EMT-Intermediates and Paramedics. Keep in mind members do all this in addition to working a full time job to support their families.

Over the last year 3 members have become EMT's, One Achieved Fire Fighter I certification and two received Fire Fighter II certification. We have added 5 new members in 2005 of which 2 came to use already trained and certified. Membership rolls are maintaining at 35 to 40 members, 65% of which are active and meet the minimum training requirements established. Once again, please do not let these numbers deceive you. We only have a few members who are either home or work close enough to respond on weekdays when 60% of are calls are received.

Last year I indicated that a committee would be put together to explore the possibility of adding full time Fire Fighter/EMT's but we had little to no interest from the public. This committee is still needed, so please contact either the Board of Selectman or myself if you are interested.

In 2005 I applied for a federal grant for adding full time Fire Fighters that is similar to the Grant the town was awarded years ago for adding full time police officers. We have not been awarded this grant as of yet but have also not been rejected. I plan of re-submitting again this year. Note, receiving the grant will still require a vote of the town to add full time personal.

I also indicated last year that we planned on replacing Tank 1, we have decided not to replace Tank 1 and have taken it out of service completely. We have re-evaluated our apparatus needs and have determined we would rely on Mutual Aid for a Tanker and maintain the 2 Engines we have one of which was slated to be replaced or re-built in 2008. We will need move that plan up a year and either re-build or replaced it in 2007. A truck committee has been established within the Fire Department to study this and come up with options, if any resident would like to participate in this please contact me.

Lastly I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the other Department Heads: Police Chief Pat Clark, Road Agent Dave Kenealy, EMD John Martel and Build Inspector Dave Paveglio for there assistance over the past year of my transition into the Fire Chief position. It is a pleasure to work with all of you and I look forward to another successful year.

2005 ANNUAL REPORT TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS

This report is presented to the Board of Directors of the Capital Area Fire Compact as a general summary of activities for the calendar year 2005. This report is also forwarded to the governing bodies of the Compact's member communities for informational purposes.

The year 2005 brought growth to our mutual aid system. We welcome Chief Michael Williams and the Town of Hooksett Fire-Rescue Department to our system. Dispatching of Hooksett Fire-Rescue started on June 15, 2005, as did dispatching of Tri-Town Ambulance Service on the same date. Tri-Town provides Emergency Medical Response and ambulance transportation to our member towns of Allenstown, Hooksett, and Pembroke. The addition of these two services increases our available personnel and equipment resources.

With the above addition to our system, the Compact now provides service to twenty member communities encompassing 711 square miles of area with a resident population of 123,655. Mutual aid response is given to and received from several other communities and mutual aid districts. Delivery of emergency service varies daily by community, based on tourism, special events, weather, and other activities.

Fire and Emergency Medical dispatch service is provided by the City of Concord Fire Department's Communications Center directed by dispatch supervisor Captain Ernest Petrin. The increased staffing proposal outlined in the 2004 Annual Report was implemented in March of 2005. In addition to the supervisor, the Center now has eight shift schedule dispatchers and a minimum of two on-duty dispatchers is provided at all times.

All dispatchers participate in telecommunications training courses. Dispatched incidents in 2005 increased to 17,418 (up by 8%) for the 19 communities who were members since 2004. The total incidents for 2005 (including Hooksett and Tri-Town starting June 15) bring the 2005 totals for all 20 communities to 19,214 which is a 19% increase above the previous year. A detailed report by community is attached.

The timing of the addition of Hooksett Fire-Rescue to the Compact and the dispatch staffing adjustment has worked advantageously for all Compact members. The staffing levels were in place when the incident load increased, and the increased revenues have lessened the fiscal impact on current members. Most communities have seen some reduction in memberships costs approved for 2006 operations.

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The Chief Coordinator responded to 215 mutual aid incidents in 2005, assists departments with incident management on major incidents, and handles the administrative functions of the Compact. He continues to participate on several state and regional committees that affect mutual aid operations.

Most Compact departments have received new digital mobile radios for their fire apparatus and emergency ambulances through the Homeland Security funding initiative. The second phase of the program is expected to provide portable communications in 2006. The intent of the program is to provide radio interoperability capability with other public safety agencies.

The 2005 Compact operating budget was \$ 759,256. All Compact operations, including the Chief Coordinator's position, office, command vehicle, and dispatch services are provided through this budget. Funding by the member communities is based on a combination of property values and population.

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The Compact Training Committee chaired by Assistant Chief Dick Pistey, with members Chief Mike Paveglio and Chief Shawn Mitchell assisted all departments in hosting at least one mutual aid training exercise during the year. Mutual aid drills involve several departments and test the system capabilities in fire suppression, emergency medical, mass casualty, rescue, hazardous materials, incident management, and personnel safety. We thank the Training Committee for their continuing support to the Compact.

The Central New Hampshire HazMat Team, comprised of all Capital Area and Lakes Region members continues to train bi-weekly and responds to 55 communities in our combined coverage area. The team operates with three response units and will welcome personnel interested in joining, training, and operating with the team. Through Homeland Security funding, the team received a "new" Hazmat response vehicle to replace the "used" 1989 unit. Most of the team financing is currently being obtained with federal grants. We also receive grant funds for education, training, and to support data collection of hazardous materials inventories reported by facilities in our operating area. We extend our thanks and appreciation to all team members for their willingness to respond to these emergencies.

We encourage all departments to send representatives and actively participate in all Compact meetings. Your input is needed on all issues and your members need to be informed of Compact activities and planning.

Thanks to all departments for your great cooperation.



Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. A fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or <u>www.des.state.nh.us</u> for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2217, or online at www.nhdfl.org.

Fire activity was high during the first several weeks of the 2005 fire season, with red-flag conditions issued by the National Weather Service and extreme fire danger in the southern and central portions of the state. This period of increased initial attack activity prompted a 5-day ban on open burning, the first such ban in several years. Despite the dry conditions, the state's largest wildland fire was contained at 29 acres. Our statewide system of fire lookout towers is credited with keeping the fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Fires in the wildland urban interface damaged 10 structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. "Emergency Management" is the systematic approach to preparing, for responding to, and recovering from major emergencies. While all emergencies cannot be avoided all the time, some can be prevented, and most can be managed in ways that minimize their impact.

The town of Chichester maintains and is ready for emergencies ranging from terrorism to chemical, radiological, and biological spills to fire, medical emergencies, and natural disasters. In general, Chichester's Emergency Management takes an "all hazards" approach to planning. This means that plans are intended to be applicable to virtually all emergencies, even though each situation may vary widely. The Town of Chichester follows four components of emergency management: prevention, incident management, recovery, and continuity.

This was evident in October of 2005, when Chichester experienced substantial flooding causing damages of approximately \$30,000 to town and private property. David Kenneally, the Town Road Agent and I attended a meeting with the State of New Hampshire Bureau of Emergency Management and met with FEMA officials to apply for monies due to the flooding. Chichester received \$23,530.94 as result of this application. The EOC, Emergency Operations Center, was also opened to accommodate the flood victims.

The Chichester Highway Department, Police and Fire Rescue all play a major role in maintaining the safety and well being of all the residents of Chichester not only in emergency situations, but on a day to day basis.

As Chichester's Emergency Management Director, I would like to give a special thank you to the Town's Road Agent, David Kenneally, for his ongoing dedication to the town of Chichester. He plays an instrumental part in the functioning of the town 24 hours a day.

Annual Report of the Road Agent

Last year had been very tough for the Highway Department. As you may recall we had a powerful snowstorm in January. My crew and I worked long hours to keep the roads clear and safe. You may not know that Governor John Lynch, declared a State of Emergency for Merrimack County and surrounding counties. What that meant for Chichester was the Town would receive federal grant money from the Federal Emergency Management Agency ("FEMA"). The Town received approximately \$7,600.00. This absorbed some of the costs associated with the snowstorm.

With the Spring came the rains and they kept coming and coming. I had a very difficult time trying to accomplish ditching and road repairs. It seemed as though no sooner had I graded and graveled a road the rain would come again washing out the road.

Then the Fall came. Who can forget the storm in October? Roads were washed out and flooded. Without the help of the Fire Department and Mr. John Martell I would not have been able to keep residents out danger. Thank you to the Fire Department and Mr. Martell for their time, dedication and standing out in the cold pouring rain to re-direct traffic; and making sure no one drove down roads that were washed out. The cost of this storm was over \$30,000.00! Mr. Martell was advantageous in helping me with requesting FEMA grant money. Luckily, the Town received federal grant money from FEMA. The Town received approximately \$23,000.00.

As you may recall, at last year's Town Meeting an amendment was made on the floor to an existing warrant to create a Road Advisory Committee ("RAC"). Subsequent to the Town approval and establishment of RAC the Board of Selectmen created and approved a Charter for RAC and it was adopted by the members on April 19th, 2005. The membership was comprised of a minimum of seven members, including the Road Agent, a representative from the Board of Selectmen and a member from the Fire Department. Four other members were to include Town residents, with an engineering background in highway design, planning or construction and one with field experience. In all we had a total of 11 members. Their primary responsibility was to develop a written Road Management Plan. The plan was to include long and short term maintenance and repair goals and identify, prioritize and establish a schedule for any future major roadway construction.

The members were split up into three groups and were given an area of Town to walk the roads and analyze what needs to be done and they were asked to rate the roads. Center

Road was a road that was suggested as a "high priority" for reconstruction. Also, advised by the Committee was the upgrading of Webster Mills Road. The bridge on Webster Mills Road over the Sanborn Creek is being replaced; this would be an excellent time to upgrade the road and pave it. I wish to thank all the members of the Committee for their time and dedication to this project. I know it was a lot of work, and I sincerely appreciate all of their efforts. Thank you!

The Summer of 2006 will bring a new look to Webster Mills Bridge over Sanborn Brook. The bridge is going to be replaced. The State will pay for 80% of the replacement costs. Unfortunately, more than \$24,000.00 came out of the Highway Department's budget to cover the cost of the engineering for the bridge. That did not leave a lot of money for the big projects that I had planned. However, I did manage with the help of my crew to pave part of Depot Road, Cross Road and Smith Sanborn Road.

I am looking forward to a very productive year. Thank you to all who have supported me and helped in maintaining the roads.

Annual Report Of The Building Official

The 2005 Permit activity for Single Family Dwellings was limited to twelve (12) Permits due to the growth ordinance. Following is a five (5) year comparison:

Acquiring a blank Building Permit Form prior to contacting the Building Inspector assures that you will come ready with the required information. A Building Permit cannot be issued for a new family home or new commercial construction without an approved waste disposal "septic" system from the State of New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control division and a driveway design approval from the Town Road Agent.

The Town's current Building Codes are the current ICC Building and Fire Prevention codes, the 1988 Life Safety Code (a copy is available for review at the Town Library). State law also requires that all new structures as well as structures which are being improved to more than 50% of their assessed value be in compliance with the NH State Energy code. The addition of bed or bathrooms may also require your septic system to be reviewed.

The Building Inspector is available almost any time; if you have any questions regarding work being done or you need an inspection do not hesitate to call. If hiring contractors you should not hesitate to check their credentials or references.

There is currently an Impact Fee required in some categories. A copy of the Impact Fee Schedule is available at the Town Office or may be requested from the

Building Inspector by calling (603) 798-4350. Further information can be obtained by searching the web for the Town of Chichester, NH at <u>www.chichesternh.com</u>.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

2005 Annual Report

The Parks & Recreation Commission (Commission) successfully completed both projects that were planned for the last year, 2005, which included additional upgrades to the Carpenter Park facilities and a Town-wide recreational survey.

At last years Town meeting a warrant article was approved to expend funds for improvements to the upper baseball/softball field at Carpenter Park so as to bring it up to Little League regulation size. This project was a joint effort by the Town and the Chichester Youth Association who donated monies to help fund the upgrades. With the assistance of the Road Agent, Dave Kenneally, the upgrading project was completed with only the final grading and seeding of the newly expanded outfield area remaining to be done. This shall be completed this coming spring.

The second accomplishment of the Commission last year was to develop and send out a Town wide recreational survey to all property owners to gather their direct input so that the Town may plan for any future new or upgraded recreational facilities and programs that may be needed based on the communities direct input. Over 250 survey questionnaires were returned to the Commission, most all being received by the end of December, 2005. This survey will provide the Commission with a very good sampling of the communities input on their needs and desires.

This coming year, 2006, the Commission shall be committed to working on the proposed project as previously outlined in the Town's current Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). The proposed CIP project for 2006 is to have the three separate land parcels, which make up a total of approximately 50 acres donated to the Town by the Carpenter family in 1963, surveyed to determine the Town's actual property boundaries and to also have some topographic work done to provide the "lay of the land" for any possible future expansion or planned use by either the Parks & Recreation Commission or the Town's Conservation Commission.

Combining the information gathered from the Town wide recreational survey, and having a definitive map/plan of the Carpenter Memorial Center properties, will allow the Commission to develop a long range master plan/management plan based on communities direct input. It is our hope to develop this "plan" over the course of this year and as part of the process to also hold at least one public informational meeting to gather additional input from the community.

The Parks & Recreation Commission wishes to thank everyone who participated in the Town-wide survey for their time and consideration, and we also greatly appreciate all the members of the community who have continually supported our efforts over the last several years to improve upon, and provide, the Town with quality recreational facilities and opportunities.

We also must not forget the Chichester Youth Association who's membership provide a tremendous amount of time and effort in helping upkeep the Park by doing spring cleanup, ballfield maintenance, trash removal, etc., etc. And of course credit is due to all the members of the Old Home Committee who do a great job of taking care of the Park before, during and after the splendid Old home Day events that we have been having over the last several years. <u>*Thanks to all!!!*</u>

TOWN OF CHICHESTER HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Annual Report of Historical Society

Our society has had a very busy and successful year.

This year's programs are as follows: January – "Researching an Antique Home" speaker Tom Towle. March – "Harvesting Ice and other Chichester Lore" speaker Walt Sanborn. May – Field Trip to Barbara Frangione's Barn, "Early Barn Construction & Restoration", speaker Steve Fifield. July – "Celebrate Thunder Bridge". September – "Chichester Barn Survey". November- "Come to the Table – Potluck"

Our Barn Survey Project has been very successful. We have learned a lot, origin of the word "barn", types of nails, saws used, barn architecture and it changes. The survey teams found unusual and unique features, such as, 27" wide floor boards, spiral cow ramps, inside silos, wooden pegs, cobblestone floors and several windlasses, to name a few. A data base of the material collected and pictures will be available soon at our museum. In the future the data will be sent to the NH State Division of Historical Resources Barn Survey Data base. The society members appreciate the participation of the town barn owners who made it possible for us to survey over 80 barns that were 75 years or older. The barn note paper which was created from drawings done by two of our members, Dottie McKoan and Frank Curatulo Jr. The sales of the Barn Calendar and barn note paper were successful in raising funds for this project.

The restoration and replacement of the decorative iron work and historic plate on Thunder Bridge was completed by Cassidy Bros. of Rowley, MA., under the Moose Plate Grant. A Brown Historic Site sign has been placed at the entry of the road leading to the bridge and also signs where parking is available.

The Society had a booth at Carpenter Park on Old Home Day with a display of barn/farm related items. We were very fortunate to receive from the Chichester Congregational Church a very generous gift of the church clock and a 9 piece pewter communion set. The pewter set dates to 1795 making this our oldest item of Chichester History.

Third graders from Chichester Central School visited our museum in September to learn about their community's history. They enjoyed a scavenger hunt of barn and farm life items.

Many thanks to all for your support and helping make this a most successful year. The society is always looking for new members interested in helping with various projects. Let us know how you would like to help.

We look forward to 2006 with programs that will be informative, entertaining and spark continued interest in the collection and preservation of Chichester history.

Chichester Town Library 2005 Annual Report

The Chichester Town Library underwent several changes during 2005. The town, at its March Town Meeting, voted to expend funds to install new carpeting in the library's main room and to purchase a new circulation desk to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act. The carpeting was installed in late April by Holmes Carpeting. The trustees could not have pulled off this week-long project without the many volunteers who helped box and label the library's collection, carry it and all furnishings to a storage container in the driveway, then turn around and restore everything once the carpet was down. Our sincere thanks to everyone who helped.

The installation of our new circulation desk took longer than we anticipated. Although we received a proposal from a commercial cabinet company, we wanted something that better fit the beautiful old building housing the library. Steve Winchester of Center Barnstead agreed to make a desk that would be compatible with the library's historic décor and meet ADA requirements. If you haven't seen it since it was installed in November, we hope you stop by to see the beautiful work Steve did on the desk and how well it complements the library's décor. Also, check out the beautiful new table and chairs set added to the children's section of the library. Now our youngest citizens have a place to wait while their parents look for their selections.

Our librarian, Liza Prizio, offered several programs to patrons in 2005. The Children's Thursday morning story hour was held during the school year. Preschoolers enjoyed stories, sang a song or did a craft followed by a snack. The Children's Summer Reading Program, Camp Wannaread, was a huge success in 2005. As many as 50 children participated reading over 250 books. Because of the generous support of many local businesses, the library hosted several events during the reading program: Eastern Mountain Sports offered a workshop entitled "What To Do If You Get Lost In The Woods;" members of the Astronomical Society brought telescopes one evening and children and adults alike viewed the stars and planets "up close" in a neighboring field; and Gail Drucker, a storyteller, entertained everyone the last night of the reading program. In December the library offered its final program of the year: an Ukrainian egg decorating workshop for children. It was so successful, the class will be offered to adults in early 2006.

Since 1991, the library's collection has been maintained using a DOS-based computer system, which has become harder and harder to service. In late December, we purchased new library software that will allow us to more efficiently maintain our collection, patron database and statistics. We look forward to completion of this software upgrade in 2006 and to the programs and events Liza is planning.

The cost to operate our library remains a modest figure and is due largely to the many wonderful volunteers who give generously of their time, money and expertise. On behalf of the Chichester Town Library, a big thank you to Millican Wholesale Nurseries for their generosity in once again supplying plants for our annual plant sale in May and to each of you for your continued support of our library through your taxes, volunteer services and donations to our collection and book and plant sales. 2005 Annual Report of the Chichester Conservation Commission

Municipal Conservation Commissions in New Hampshire are charged with protection of natural resources and providing a focus for environmental concerns in the community. Conservation Commissions also protect and manage conservation lands and open space, especially during periods of high growth pressure, consistent with land protection goals established by the town. Over the past year, the Chichester Conservation Commission (CCC) has pursued the following goals adopted in 2005 and those continued from previous years:

Continue water quality monitoring of Marsh Pond

Marsh Pond is a much-overlooked water body located surprisingly close to the fire station and Grange Hall. The CCC sees significant recreation and conservation potential in Marsh Pond and the adjacent Sanborn-Cray conservation lands. Determining water quality provides a baseline to which future water quality changes can be compared. The ongoing questions about the Marsh Pond dam have created some uncertainty about the long term preservation of Marsh Pond as a town asset.

Seek funding to implement the Sanborn-Cray Management Plan

This parcel of conservation land close to Grange Hall and Marsh Pond has been protected with the goal of providing protection of wildlife and provision of passive recreation for the townspeople. The CCC has worked on providing public access and protection of Marsh Pond as well as the possibility of extending conservation lands with the cooperation of owners of adjacent parcels. As of this writing, purchase of a five-acre parcel adjacent to the Grange Hall by the town is nearly complete. This parcel will allow for safe access to the Sanborn-Cray parcel to fulfill the passive recreation goal.

Coordinate with the Planning Board on environmentally related rules

The CCC has worked with the Planning Board to revise the portion of the zoning ordinance dealing with wetlands and wetland buffers, and to propose a new section dealing with open space conservation zoning. The goal of the wetlands effort is to clarify the current wording of the zoning ordinance, which has proven difficult to administer by town boards. The goal of the open space conservation effort has been to provide development alternatives on large lots which set aside open space.

Improve communication through the town web site

The Conservation Commission portion of the town web site has been updated and now provides valuable links to other valuable conservation-related information. Check it out at http://www.chichesternh.org/Public_Documents/ChichesterNH_Conservation/Conservationcom_mission.

Continue the study of town wetlands

An inventory of wetlands provides a planning tool for the town and provides the information for possible designation of prime wetlands. Prime wetlands are those areas which warrant special protection because of valuable attributes such as wildlife habitat, groundwater recharge, or recreational values. The CCC has completed the wetlands inventory in the southerly portion of

the town and will consider continuing this effort in the remainder of the town. Any designation of prime wetlands will require public presentations and final adoption by the voters.

The Conservation Commission meets at 7 PM on the second Monday of each month at the Grange Hall. We are always interested in the community's viewpoints on conservation matters.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN OF CHICHESTER

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (CRVNA) continues to offer comprehensive health services to the residents of Chichester. The following is a description of these services:

<u>Home Care services</u> respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and para-professional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting. Patients who receive services range from children who have a complex medical condition to frail elders who require supportive assistance to stay in their own homes.

Hospice services provide professional and paraprofessional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping he/she remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical, emotional and spiritual needs.

CRVNA's Hospice House provides residential care to terminally ill patients who have no primary caregiver or need a supported residential setting. Often patients are transferred into the Hospice House when a caregiver is exhausted and unable to care for them at home any longer. To date, this house has provided a home to approximately 700 terminally ill residents.

<u>Community Health services</u> include health education, health maintenance and preventive health services. The program includes preventive care, adult and senior health, child health, Baby's First Homecoming, immunizations for all ages, supportive services to school districts parent education and support, health education and nutritional counseling.

Community Health includes health promotion services which focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families and individuals through early intervention and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, adult screening, and in munizations. Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior health services are provided at congregate housing sites.

Over the past two years Senior Health Clinics have expanded to reach out to seniors who may require a monthly check by a nurse of their blood sugar, blood pressure, and/or diabetes management. The expansion of these services was in response to the decrease in Medicare services to seniors.

Professional and para-professional hourly home services are provided on a private fee-for-service basis. Health education and instruction are part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Chichester may request service: patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. The nurse who completes an assessment will coordinate with the patient's physician a plan of care to meet the patient's specific needs. If the patient does not have a physician the nurse will assist the patient to identify one and schedule a visit. The agency has developed a program with the NH-Dartmouth Family Practice Residency Program to coordinate a house call visit by a resident to a frail elder's home who is unable to leave his/her home.

A call to Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (1-800-924-8620) is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. The CRVNA office is open Monday through Friday from 7:30am to 5:00pm. A nurse is on call twenty-four hours a day. The On-Call Nurse can be reached by calling 1-800-924-8620.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for the individual without health insurance and/or who is unable to pay the full charge. However, to fee scale, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. The community health services are provided to residents often times free of charge. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectible.

This agency is certified as a Medicare/Medicaid Provider, licensed by the State of New Hampshire, and is a member agency of the United Way of Merrimack County.

The Committee has avoided increasing taxes for the upcoming year, 2006. While each town's share has changed slightly do to population changes, the total taxes collected by the District haven't increased since 1999. 2005 saw a decrease in recycling revenue. Although not dramatic, it reflects a decrease in scrap metal and fibers from amounts received the previous year.

During 2005 the District purchased a new roll off truck and a new Bobcat skid steer. Both pieces of equipment were paid for without the requirement for debt or lease payments. Repairs and improvements were accomplished at the rear of the building around the canister area. These repairs addressed concrete wear and EPA storm water concerns.

For 2006, the District will start the process of closing the old 'landfill'. You will note that no funds are budgeted in 2006 for the project. Over the last several years, the District Committee has funded a reserve account for the purpose of accomplishing the closure. Funds will come from this reserve account and there will be no impact on taxes, at least for 2006.

MINUTES OF THE CHICHESTER SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING MARCH 5, 2005

The annual meeting of the Chichester School District began at 10:05 A.M. in the Multi-Purpose Room of Chichester Central School on March 5, 2005, presided over by School District Moderator Peter Marsh. There were approximately 40 people at the time the meeting opened, but eventually as many as 65 people were in attendance. Moderator Marsh asked those present to stand for a moment of silence and the Pledge of Allegiance.

Introductions of those at the front table were then made as follows:

School Board Members--Benjamin Brown, Chairperson John Poirier Paul Twomey

School Administrative Unit #53 Assistant Superintendent--David Dziura

Chichester Central School Principal: Pamela Stiles

Chichester School District Clerk: Gloria Nardini

Moderator Marsh discussed the rules of the meeting and explained that he would use the same procedures as used at Town Meeting. Articles would automatically come to the floor. He also asked that one motion at a time be before the assembly. Kate Mara motioned that these rules be adopted; this was seconded by Cathy Klapproth. This motion passes by a voice vote. He then asked that non-residents be allowed to speak, especially David Dziura from S.A.U. #53. Doug Hall moved that this be allowed and Donna Chagnon seconded the motion. This passed by a voice vote.

Article 1: TO HEAR THE REPORTS OF AGENTS, AUDITORS, COMMITTEES, OR OFFICERS CHOSEN, AND TO PASS ANY VOTE RELATING THERETO.

These reports began with Principal Stiles making a report on the state of the school. She made it known that all teachers were in compliance with the federal standards required by No Child Left Behind.

School Board Chairman Benjamin Brown then gave his report for the following Articles 2 and 3 and explained how the sums of money being asked for had been determined.

Nancy Fraher made a motion to accept the reports submitted. Theresa Whiddon seconded the motion.

MOTION PASSED VOICE VOTE

Article 2: TO SEE WHAT SUM OF MONEY THE DISTRICT WILL RAISE AND APPROPRIATE FOR THE SUPPORT OF SCHOOLS, FOR THE PAYMENT OF SALARIES AND BENEFITS FOR SCHOOL DISTRICT OFFICIALS AND AGENTS AND FOR THE PAYMENT OF STATUTORY OBLIGATIONS OF THE DISTRICT. THE SCHOOL BOARD RECOMMENDS \$4,405,220. THIS ARTICLE DOES NOT INCLUDE APPROPRIATIONS VOTED IN OTHER ARTICLES ON THIS WARRANT.

> Moderator Marsh opened the floor for discussions on the Budget. There was some discussion on the School Board's proposal to add a second bus to take students to Pembroke Academy. It was wondered if a second bus was actually necessary and it was asked if other ways had been considered beside the District paying the full amount for this second bus. Issues of paying for health and dental benefits were brought up. A motion to accept Article 2 as written was made by Nancy Fraher, with a second by David Crowell. Moderator Marsh stated that this vote would be taken by a show of cards.

MOTION TO ACCEPT A BUDGET OR \$4,405,220.00 PASSED 63 FOR 2 AGAINST

Article 3: TO SEE IF THE DISTRICT WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE COST ITEMS SET FORTH IN THE COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT REACHED BETWEEN THE CHICHESTER SCHOOL BOARD AND THE CHICHESTER TEACHERS ASSOCIATION FOR THE 2005/06, 2006/07 AND 2007/08 FISCAL YEARS WHICH CALLS FOR THE FOLLOWING INCREASE IN SALARIES AND BENEFITS:

2005/06	\$87,565.00
2006/07	\$96,478.00
2007/08	\$93,326.00

AND FURTHER TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$87,565.00 FOR THE 2005/06 FISCAL YEAR, SUCH SUM REPRESENTING THE ADDITIONAL COSTS ATTRIBUTABLE TO THE INCREASE IN SALARIES AND BENEFITS AGREED TO BY THE CHICHESTER SCHOOL BOARD AND THE CHICHESTER TEACHERS ASSOCIATION.

Discussion on this article followed. It was asked how many individuals were involved in this agreement. There are 30 teachers, of which 6 are part time. A general discussion followed with most just asking for clarification of points of the agreement.

Nancy Fraher called the question and asked that Article III be accepted as written. Neil Andrew seconded this motion. Once again, since this is a fiscal matter, Moderator Marsh asked for a show of cards.

ARTICLE 3 PASSED AS WRITTEN 52 FOR 13 AGAINST

Article 4: BY PETITION: SHALL WE ADOPT THE PROVISIONS OF RSA 40:13 (KNOWN AS SB2) TO ALLOW OFFICIAL BALLOT VOTING ON ALL ISSUES BEFORE THE CHICHESTER SCHOOL DISTRICT ON THE SECOND TUESDAY OF MARCH.

(This petition article has been placed on the meeting warrant for discussion purposes only. Voting on this petition article will be by ballot at the March 8, 2005 elections.)

Board Member Twomey explained how SB2 would work and the changes that it would entail. Before making his explanation, Mr. Twomey admitted that he is biased against SB2, but would try to make his explanation as objectively as possible.

Dean Wolfe, who had brought the petition before the District, was then given the opportunity to explain the benefits he saw in the Chichester District adopting these provisions. His main reason was that he hoped that more people would be able to be involved in making decisions for the District.

ARTICLE 4 DEFEATED BY BALLOT VOTE AT THE POLLS ON MARCH 8, 2005 211 YES 265 NO

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

During the past ten years, two very influential books on educating high school students have attracted a significant following throughout the United States. These books, <u>Breaking Ranks:</u> <u>Changing an American Institution</u> (1996) and <u>Breaking Ranks II: Strategies for Leading High School Reform</u> (2004), have offered a blueprint for re-design intended to create schools that successfully prepare students for the radically different world they will encounter during the twenty-first century. Rather than review and critique the status-quo, these documents offer detailed action plans and specific strategies which have proven to be "best practices" in assisting students to achieve high educational standards.

The basic recommendations of the <u>Breaking Ranks</u> study are that high schools must form collaborative philosophical and practical working relationships among educators, parents and the greater community to identify and reach consensus on what is truly important for every student to know and be able to do, that a school culture must be created where every student is known and feels connected, invested, and valued, and that educational standards should be based upon the expectations and demands of the real world.

For example, many of us recall classrooms where the teacher, stationed in front of the room, delivered information to a largely passive group of students seated in neat rows. At each lesson's conclusion, we were given tests which emphasized our ability to retain and repeat that information. Now greater emphasis is placed on students' completion of projects which involve both individual and group work and offer real-world learning challenges. The intention is that students become active participants and share in the responsibility for their own learning as they try new ideas and approaches to solve a problem, combine their strengths with those of their peers, and clearly demonstrate their engagement in and mastery of the assignment.

Pembroke Academy, the A.R.E.A. high school serving the vast majority of Chichester's high school students, has used <u>Breaking Ranks</u> as its guiding document for the past several years. Pembroke Academy's faculty and administration have worked diligently to create a curriculum that is student-centered and focused on providing an in-depth understanding of essential concepts and skills and to ensure a climate dedicated to each student's growth and success. These efforts have resulted in steadily improving test scores and, more importantly, in the graduation of young women and men who exemplify the best attributes of the community and will become successful, contributing citizens.

<u>Breaking Ranks</u>, while by no means a guarantee of success, has offered Pembroke Academy a detailed, thoughtful and sustainable plan for educating Chichester's high school students. I invite you to learn more about the tenets of the <u>Breaking Ranks</u> strategies, which have been endorsed by leading educational organizations including the National Association of Secondary School Principals, the New Hampshire Association of School Principals and the New Hampshire Department of Education, and to contact Pembroke Academy to see these strategies put into action.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

Chichester's school community continues to thrive. Chichester Central School and Pembroke Academy continue to make high quality education available for our citizens. With such a long list of federal and state laws, rules and requirements, this is no small feat. While requirements continue to increase, our teachers and administration continue to rise to the challenge, helping our students meet adequate yearly progress (AYP). As we participate in school board meetings month after month, and sometimes week after week, the school board is continually amazed at the ingenuity, the resourcefulness, and the positive attitude we see and hear about in regards to the approaches used to accomplish all of the progress in educating our children. There is much to be proud of.

Our entire staff of teachers, certified staff, educational assistants, behavioral assistants, administrative staff, food service staff and custodial staff make our school building a place of learning. With the leadership of our Principal and the SAU, the CCS building is transformed on a daily basis from a school building to a place that fosters, encourages and enables our students to succeed. On behalf of the school board, thank you for the work and dedication you provide to our students and community every day.

Our school volunteers are another invaluable part of our school team. Once again this year, our volunteers were awarded a Blue Ribbon Award from Partners in Education because of the large amount of time and energy volunteers contribute to our school.

Included in this booklet is the Principal's report. Please take the time to read it and learn about some of the specific accomplishments at CCS during this past year. Principal Stiles continues to lead our school community in the pursuit of excellence in education both academically and in helping to create well rounded citizens. By almost every measure, we are a very good school that continually works at improvement.

The work of triads, joint meetings of teachers of several subjects from Pembroke Academy and all the sending school districts (Allenstown, Chichester, Epsom, and Pembroke), is an ongoing effort to align the curriculums across the elementary schools. They also work to align the curriculum with the expectations of Pembroke Academy's freshmen teachers in order to start each student on an even playing field with their counterparts from the other sending districts. This helps to provide each freshman with the smoothest possible transition from grammar school to high school. We have a process in place that allows our top students to bypass freshmen Spanish and Math courses. We have included the ability for students to option out of a required "basic technology" course by showing proficiency in each area of the course before leaving 8th grade. This effort is an example of how well the districts in the School Administrative Unit (SAU) are working together to ensure the best education for our students.

The drop out rate at Pembroke Academy continues to improve. The drop out rate for Chichester students at the Academy continues to be extremely low. Both of these significant achievements are, at least partially, a result of specific programs instituted first at CCS and then shared with the other school boards in the SAU. The program identifies students as early as possible that are at risk of dropping out. It then follows specific action items to ensure each student at risk of dropping out has every opportunity successfully complete their high school education. Focus on this issue began over six years ago. The results have made a difference in the school community but more importantly, in the lives of the students that have directly benefited from the program and stuck with their education.

The outdoor classroom committee has been working to complete an area for educational and recreational enrichment on the lands provided to us by the generous donation of Mrs. Frangione. N.H. Fish & Game gave us some welcome advice on the project and more is being solicited from other groups around the state. The work on this project is being funded by a grant from the N.H. Moose Plates. Trails and learning stations are being created to compliment the outdoor classroom that will be a part of each grades learning experience. Thank you to all that have given their time and expertise to ensure the success of this project.

The school board is extremely proud of our entire staff, our students, and our volunteers. We are also very thankful for the strong support of our community. There is a great deal to be done as our school continues to effectively deal with the realities of No Child Left Behind (NCLB) but we have our own reality: a top-notch, dedicated, motivated, and extremely capable group of people that all work together to provide our children the best possible education.

Thank you for your continued support of our school community. Without your support, both financially and through participation, the experience and knowledge gained by our students would not be as valuable.

Principal's Report


In August, 2005, 278 children attended the first day at Chichester Central School. The staff had identified several goals for the year including: safety for all, championing all children, and monitoring the use and implementation of high quality curricula. We welcomed some new faces to the school and said good-bye to others. New to the staff were Mrs. Lisa Clark, who joined the special education team. Mr. Tony Cipriano filled the teaching vacancy left by Mrs. Tara Yeaton. We wish Mrs. Yeaton all the best in her future endeavors. Our school year began smoothly and with a well defined direction.

NWEA's *Measures of Academic Progress* (MAP) testing made it possible for each teacher to use data to design individual and classroom instruction that focused on maximizing student learning. New math books for grades 5-8 and the school-wide use of the 6+1 Traits of Writing program created a commonality of language while leaving room for individual teacher style and creativity. The Chichester teachers did a wealth of work to align the NH Grade Level Expectations to classroom lessons, thus insuring that students were receiving a rich and balanced education.

Professional development is a key ingredient to teachers staying on the "cutting edge" of education. During the spring, a representative from RM Frameworks gave a presentation of a technology-based tool to help students understand complex concepts. The response was overwhelmingly positive! The benefit of this tool was obvious—teachers could use pre-designed lessons that were aligned to the NH GLE's, they could input and share their own lessons, and the display was bright and unique, insuring that children would respond to it in a very positive way. In the summer, the school was awarded \$32,060 in the form of a federal grant, which was dedicated to this sustained professional development. Every eligible classroom teacher volunteered to take part in the year long training. Materials purchased for the technology lab during the fall were used by teachers to hone their skills. Additional hardware purchases are planned for 2006. The RM training will be a means through which teachers will develop curriculum using modern technology.

Other professional development opportunities were also taking place in 2005. A curriculum specialist visited the school to provide teachers with strategies on pedagogy and assessment. Teachers attended workshops on mind mapping and the Brain Gym. The professional reading group discussed books on methods for becoming a better teacher. Chichester Central School has met and/or exceeded the requirements for adequate yearly progress during every year required under NCLB. The staff is committed to implementing strategies that will promote excellence in each child. "There are no secrets to success. It is the result of preparation, hard work, and learning from failure." (Powell)

This fall, students and staff planned, designed, and painted murals throughout the building that highlight the spirit and curriculum of the school. These projects have promoted student's working together to accomplish a task and children taking pride in their building. Whether children are having fun at the winter carnival, being recognized for outstanding writing with a 'Pen and Ink' ribbon, or working with a group to complete a science experiment, we always strive to provide activities that develop a child socially, emotionally,



physically, and academically. Many of the students take part in a variety of co- curricular activities. Basketball, soccer, cross-country, baseball, softball and cheering give our students the opportunity to participate in team sports that are sometimes competitive in nature. Other organizations give students the occasion to shine including: technology club, drama, Lego League, band, newspaper, yearbook, dance team, dance committee, geography and spelling bees, and poetry night. Providing children with after-school activities makes for "shining stars" in non-traditional learning settings.

We are thankful for the amount of support we receive each year from the community. Our PTO organized the Welcome Back Bar-be-cue, Pancake Breakfast with Santa, Ice Cream Social, and other family oriented activities. The number of hours that volunteers gave to the school once again resulted in CCS being given a Blue Ribbon Award from Partners in Education. This year, we welcomed 85+ grandparents to the school in celebration of "Grandparents Day." Children proudly showed members of their extended family their classrooms and their school building. The outdoor classroom committee has been busy working with NH Fish and Game to identify where trails could be created and learning stations established. A \$4940 grant from NH Moose Plates is covering the setup expenses.

We recognize and appreciate the time that parents spend with their children in the pursuit of excellence. Together we will impact the future, and as a former Pennsylvania Governor said, "Education stands firmly as the cornerstone of our great nation. A commitment to education is a commitment to our children and their future. Our children are our most precious resource and we, as citizens and communities must never forget that the skills and knowledge we provide our children with today will become the foundation of tomorrow."

1 have audited the financial statements of Chichester School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2005, and have issued my report thereon dated December 18, 2005. I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing my audit, I considered the Chichester School District's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine my auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing my opinion on the financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting. My consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessary disclose all matters in the internal control that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one of more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements caused by error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. I noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that I consider to be material weaknesses.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Chichester School District's financial statements are free of material misstatements, I performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants, non-compliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of my audit, and accordingly, I do not express such an opinion. The results of my tests disclosed no instances of non-compliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

This report is intended for the information and use of the audit committee, management, others within the organization, School Board, and federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

I extend my thanks to the officials and employees of the Chichester School District for their assistance during the course of my audit.
