To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon, County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, at ten of the clock a.m. until seven p.m. Regular business meeting will commence at seven p.m.

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend the Building Code, Section 4 by adding: "C. All accessory buildings not used for living purposes, attached or detached must be at least twenty five (25) feet from the lot side lines and fifty (50) feet from the rear lot line."

Article 3. To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the Selectman to use the revenue, estimated to be \$113,800 from:

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150,000 for the maintenance of highways and bridges. The State of New Hampshire to furnish approximately \$44,000 in State Aid. The Town will raise the balance. (Approximately \$106,000). The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200 for the Capital Expenses of the Fire Department.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for the Capital Expenses of the Police Department.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$48,000 for a complete revaluation of all property and furthermore to authorize the withdrawal of \$25,000 plus interest from the capital reserve fund previously established for that purpose, with the balance to be raised by taxation. (Approximately \$28,000 to come from capital reserve fund, and approximately \$20,000 from taxes.)
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the Cemetery Land Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the Cemetery Fence Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 for the Sullivan County Hospice.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to establish a conservation commission of three members.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The meeting was called to order at 7:06 PM. Moderator Donald Malcolm led the townspeople in the Pledge of Allegiance. Each warrant article was read as it came up for discussion.

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

An amendment was offered by the Selectmen to have the article read: To defray town charges estimated to be \$169,325 by decreasing subsection "a" Town Officer's Salaries by \$1,000 to \$12,200.

AMENDMENT PASSED WITH VOICE VOTE

ARTICLE 2 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150,000 for the maintenance of highways and bridges. The State of New Hampshire to furnish approximately \$41,240 in State Aid. The Town will raise the balance. (Approximately \$108,760). The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 3 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200 for the Capital Expenses of the Fire Department.

The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 4 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for the Capital Expenses of the Police Department.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 5 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for the purchase of a fax machine for the town office.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 6 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 7 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 8 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the Cemetery Land Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 9 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the Cemetery Fence Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 10 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24,000 for the purchase of a 2000 Ford Explorer police cruiser and to authorize the withdrawal of \$10,000 plus interest from the capital reserve fund previously established. (\$14,000 to come from taxes and \$10,000 plus interest to be withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund).
The Selectmen recommend this article.

Discussion: The Police Chief explained that four different vehicles were priced, and this was the least expensive vehicle. The amount in this article represents the cost of the basic

vehicle. The equipment from the 1987 Ford Crown Victoria will be transferred to the new vehicle, and the 1987 Ford is intended to be sold.

ARTICLE 11 PASSED WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 for the purchase of a compactor for the town transfer station.

The Selectmen recommend this article.

Discussion: Every effort is being made to keep the trash volume down through recycling efforts, and every resident is encouraged to recycle as much as possible. Even so, the Selectmen figure that the compactor will pay for itself through reduced trucking in 3 - 4 years if one container is purchased, and 4-5 years if two containers are purchased. The article amount includes the cost of two containers.

ARTICLE 12 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500 for the purchase of a new riding lawn mower and a new self-propelled mower for the cemeteries.

The Selectmen recommend this article.

Discussion: The riding mower that has been selected is a mid-line Simplicity with hydrostatic transmission at a cost of \$3100. The remainder is for the self-propelled mower.

ARTICLE 13 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 for the Sullivan County Hospice.

The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 14 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to establish Conservation Commission made up of three members appointed by the Selectmen.

The Selectmen recommend this article.

Discussion: Much of the discussion centered around the purpose of a Conservation Commission, the main point being that it is an advisory board rather than a regulatory board. It would be a liaison between the County Conservation Commission and the Selectboard, and would monitor conservation easements, sign wetlands permits, and raise awareness in town of conservation issues.

ARTICLE 15 FAILED HAND VOTE YES 22 NO 29

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to indefinitely authorize the Selectmen, until specific recession of such authority, in their discretion, to sell Town personal property which they deem to be unnecessary.

The Selectmen recommend this article.

ARTICLE 16 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to accept a donation of land bordering the Upper Cemetery. This land will be used for cemetery purposes.

The Selectmen recommend this article.

Discussion: Bruce and Ginger Cheeney are making this donation of 65 lots to the town. Townspeople expressed their appreciation with a round of applause.

ARTICLE 17 PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITH VOICE VOTE

Article 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

- Pat Bresland asked the town to express their appreciation to Marilyn Martin for her many years of service on the Planning Board. There was a round of applause.
- Joan Beach asked for an accounting of the Stokes Aid. Bob Cunniff, a member of the Stokes Committee, explained that Samuel Stokes left a generous amount of money in trust for the Town of Langdon, the interest of which is available annually, and is stipulated to be used for undergraduate scholarships for Langdon students. Last year 25 or 26 scholarships were awarded. Remaining monies must be dispersed within specific time and purpose perimeters regulated by state law and the terms of the Trust. (property tax relief for Langdon's elderly, and medical aid for Langdon's destitute.)

The Stokes Committee meets once or twice a year. There are no limits on the number serving on the committee. New members are welcome.

- Susan Wilder commended the recycling committee and volunteers for their hard work.

Article 19. To allow accounts.

ARTICLE 19 PASSED WITH VOICE VOTE

Karen Smith – a new Langdon resident, won the quilt raffle.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:10 PM

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

We write this report again this year not knowing what the education funding solution will mean long term to our town finances. As you know, the courts have declared the state-wide property tax unconstitutional. We don't know yet what will happen during the appeals process or what our legislature will propose in the way of a permanent solution. Our tax bills were higher this year due to a large increase in the county tax, increased town spending, and a small school district increase. As we develop town budgets from year to year, we are aware of the many needs the town has: a police facility, improved town offices, major town hall maintenance, the need for better fire facilities, as well as the regular replacement of highway trucks and police and fire vehicles. The twice a year payment of taxes has reduced the cost of borrowing for the town.

Our five year plan for the improvement of town roads continues to work well. This year we completed the Hemlock rebuilding project and, in addition to our regular road work, did a lot of sealing. A lot of work was done this year maintaining town equipment including rebuilding the bucket on the tractor and new springs for the '86 Ford truck. In 2001 we plan to begin rebuilding Cheshire Turnpike and upper Holden Hill Road, and plan to address drainage problems on Tory Hill Road, Cold River Road, and Mellish Road. Roger Pelton has prioritized projects well into the future. The Board thanks him for his vision and understanding of our road needs.

The Transfer Station is an area of concern because the cost of operation continues to increase. The purchase of the compactor has reduced the number of pulls, but increased tonnage costs are continuing to push the cost up. We have an agreement with Walpole that allows for all Langdon recyclables to be trucked there. We need everyone to recycle to make recycling cost effective. During 2000 we shipped 235 tons of household waste to the incinerator. We need to reduce this total to control costs. The Board would like to propose to the town that, beginning in January 2002, we begin a "pay to throw" program. We propose giving each family in town 52 Langdon bags. Only Langdon Bags will be thrown into the compactor. If you run out of bags, you will have to purchase additional ones at a cost of \$2 per bag. There is of course, no charge for recycled items. We would like to discuss this at Town Meeting. Donald regularly attends workshops on recycling and is concerned about costs. We thank him for all his efforts at our transfer station.

The Board feels that our property assessment values are no longer as consistent as they should be. We are proposing a complete revaluation of property to take place this summer. The cost of revaluation will include software that will put all property tax records in a computer file. This in turn will transfer information to our tax billing software. Because we have put \$25,000 plus interest in capital reserve funds, the tax impact of the revaluation will be \$20,000. Our tax maps are completely up to date, and are in DiBernardo Associates' computer, which makes annual updates a simple matter.

The E-911 process of mapping and matching phone numbers to buildings has been completed. We expect to be able to issue new addresses within the year.

We would like to thank all those people who serve on town boards, as officers, firemen, and police officers. A small community like ours is dependent on all of us working for the community in one way or another. If you would like to serve the town, please contact the Board of Selectmen.

In closing, the Board would like to extend a special thanks to Mary Knott, our administrator. Mary has worked to make our office more efficient and responsive to the needs of the town. This year, among other projects, she has organized and protected all town reports from 1875 to the present, and worked with the Mormons to preserve town vital records.

ROAD AGENT REPORT 2000

The major project in 2000 was the paving of the Hemlock Road. We also sealed Crane Brook Road, Walker Hill Road and Ball Hill road. Sealing is the process of spraying a layer of tar on the surface of the road and covering it with sand. This adds about 1/4" of tar to the road surface as a wear coat and crack filler.

Brush was cut on Tory Hill Road, Mellish Road, Egarton Road and Holden Hill Road. The backhoe front bucket was rebuilt during the summer at the highway building. The backhoe does a lot of loading of salt and sand, and the salt had eaten holes in the bucket.

The three truck system is working out well and we are hoping to get at least two more years of service from the old '86 Ford.

This year's project will be the rebuilding of Cheshire Turnpike Road. The shoulders of the road will be fixed and the road surface repaved. Also, 3/4" of crushed gravel will be put on gravel roads that have been rebuilt: Holden Hill Road, Tory Hill Road, and Winch Hill Road. Some other roads will also be graveled. Parts of Mellish Road and Tory Hill Road will be graveled to eliminate mud or water problems. And, we hope to have enough money to finish rebuilding the upper part of Holden Hill Road to the Acworth Town Line.

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER REPORT

There are 2,200 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The number of fires reported during the 2000 fire season was below average as referenced in the statistics below. Despite this, our network of fire towers and detection patrols were still quite busy with the fire towers being first to report over 135 fires. These fires were quickly and accurately reported to the local fire department for their prompt and effective suppression efforts. Wildland fires occurring in areas where homes are situated in the woodlands are a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers. Please contact the Forest Protection Bureau to request a brochure to assist you in assessing fire safety around your home and woodlands.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ALL outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. Forest Rangers have investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217, or for general information visit our website at www.dred.state.nh.us.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection system and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. These factors are critical in controlling the size of wildland fires, keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible. Due to permitting and fire safety concerns, please contact your local fire department BEFORE using portable outdoor fire places and vessels, including those constructed of clay, concrete or wire mesh.

Please contact your local fire department before doing ANY outside burning.

REMEMBER ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT FOREST FIRES!!

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT –2000

The Zoning Board of Adjustment meets on the 2nd Tuesday of each month at 7:30 PM at the Town Hall, at the discretion of the Chairman. Meetings are open to the public and all interested parties are invited to attend.

Two matters came before the Board during the year 2000. The first was an application by Cold River Materials for the annual renewal of its' special exception and permit for sand and gravel excavation at its site on Cold River Road. A public hearing on the application was held on February 22, and the application was granted, subject to various conditions.

The second matter was an application by Kurt and Laurie Meyerrose for a variance to permit the construction of an addition onto their residence on Village Road. A public hearing was held on June 6, and the application was granted.

The membership of the Board through March of last year consisted of Ginger Cheeney, Carroll D. French, Clarence Koss (ex-officio Selectman representative), Donald Malcolm, and Joan Stratemeyer, Chairman. In April the Selectmen appointed Russell Lacroix and Walter Royce for three-year terms on the board. The other members are Ginger Cheeney (term expires 2002), Carroll D. STOKES SCHOLARSHIP TRUST –2000

In 1987 Langdon resident, Samuel E. Stokes, Jr. set up The Stokes Scholarship Trust, and placed a sizable sum of money into that trust. The income from the investment of these funds was to be distributed at least annually "to a student or students who are residents of the Town of Langdon, NH, to assist them in their education above the secondary school level, including but not limited to a student or students who attend a school or program for nursing training." Further, "If in any year no student qualifies to receive a distribution of income hereunder, then the Trustee may distribute income to or for the benefit of one or more aged or indigent residents of the Town of Langdon, NH to assist such persons in paying medical bills or real estate taxes assessed against the homes in which they live." This Trust was activated in 1994 with the death of Samuel Stokes.

The Stokes Committee meets annually in May to process scholarship applications and make recommendations to Fleet Bank, the designated Trustee of the Stokes Scholarship Trust. The following individuals are on the committee: Jeffrey Holmes, Donald Malcolm, Kathleen Beam, Fred Roentsch, J. Hayes Stagner, and Robert Cunniff.

**HOME HEALTHCARE, HOSPICE & COMMUNITY SERVICES
REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2000**

In 2000, HCS – Home Healthcare, Hospice and Community Services continued to provide home care and community services to the residents of Langdon. The following information represents a projection of HCS's activities in your community in 2000. Prenatal Care, hospice services and regularly scheduled wellness clinics and child health clinics are also available to residents. Town funding partially supports these services.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The actual cost of all services provided in 2000 with all funding sources is projected to be \$8,625.

These services have been supported to the greatest extent possible by Medicare, Medicaid, other insurances, grants and patient fees. Services that were not covered by other funding have been supported by your town. Town support in 2000 totaled \$631.

For 2001, we request an appropriation of \$3,000 to be available to meet the home care needs of Langdon residents.

SULLIVAN COUNTY STUDY COMMITTEE

In July 2000, the County Commissioners and County Delegation asked the towns in Sullivan County to appoint representatives to form a committee to review the operations of the county government and to consider what county services should be eliminated, modified, or expanded, and to review the formula by which the cost of county operations is apportioned among the towns. The Selectmen appointed the undersigned to represent Langdon on this Study Committee.

The committee has been meeting bi-weekly since last September and more recently on a weekly basis since it is to submit its report early this spring. Until January the meetings were primarily devoted to visiting and learning about the operations of the various county government departments such as the Department of Correction, the Sullivan County Nursing Home, the County Attorney's Office, the Sheriff's Office, and the Registry of Deeds.

The committee has not yet voted to make any specific recommendations. The following suggestions for consideration have been offered by various members: privatization of the Sullivan County Nursing Home, consolidation of the two district courts, additional funding to alleviate conditions at the county jail, abolition of county government, and altering the tax apportionment formula from its present equalized assessed valuation basis to one partially based on Department of Corrections and welfare services usage by the towns.

The original due date for the Committee's report was February 28th, but that date has now been extended indefinitely.

We are proud to have some of the finest EMS providers in the region among our staff.

We would not be able to provide such quality care if it were not for the efforts of the Langdon Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue. Their efforts are essential in the provision of the best EMS system that can care for a rural environment. They continue to provide excellent basic care for all the citizens of Langdon and are an important part of our EMS team. We look forward to another year of working closely with the Langdon Fire and Rescue.

LeFevre Ambulance Service has again been active in the area of education. Our staff has been instructing and coordinating EMS courses of all levels for the local EMS district, benefiting all towns and services within the area. We have also been providing CPR and First Aid classes for lay persons, industrial agencies, and EMS providers. LeFevre Ambulance Service hold monthly training sessions at its office in Bellows Falls. Any parties, especially Langdon EMS providers are encouraged to attend. Anyone wishing information on classes or training sessions is encouraged to call our non-emergency number for information.

During the year 2000, LeFevre Ambulance Service responded to a total of 66 calls for service in the Town of Langdon. The calls for service break down as follows:
