

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madison qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madison on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1 To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

As follows:

Town officers salaries.

Town officers expenses.

Town Hall expenses.

Town Poor.

Street Lights.

Summer highways and bridges.

Winter highways for 1931 and 1932.

Town Library.

Fire Department.

Memorial Day.

State Aid Maintenance.

State Aid Construction.

To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000 for the year 1931, and a like sum for the year of 1932, to be expended on the West Ossipee road so called, in conjunction with money appropriated by the state, on a 2 to 1 basis, providing House-joint Resolution No. 31 is passed during present session.

To see if town will vote to discontinue the Moore Crossing road so called.

To see if town will vote to accept the new layout of beginning of Winter Road so called, as agreed upon by abutters and Selectmen.

To see if town will vote to buy the Road Machine which was leased from T. R. Lovejoy, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$475. to pay for same.

To see if town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. to be expended on the Ball Grounds.

To see what action the town will take in regard to buying a snow scraper to be used on light snows, in front of a truck, and raise and appropriate money for same.

To see if town will vote to adopt any new system of electing town officers.

To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading to the Roswell Harmon place.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Madison:

I herewith submit my tenth annual report as superintendent of schools, it being eighteenth in the series of such reports.

Madison is especially fortunate this year in its school organization and teaching staff. Add to this a group of fine boys and girls and the stage is set for excellent results. A large majority of our pupils finish the eighth grade and enter high school. Graduates of the high school are making good in the colleges and normal schools, taking favorable place beside those from large city schools. It is recognized by state authority that graduates from the small high schools stand as well as those from the larger schools. A large number of our girl graduates have found excellent positions as teachers, after completing the course at the normal school. Several of our boy graduates have found it impossible to finance an advanced education in college or technical school. There is no place where boys can get a start at as reasonable an expense as the girls can at the normal school, most of the boys not desiring to teach. It would be a fine thing if Madison could have something like Tamworth Industries where boys could find employment and at the same time get training in mechanical skill, drafting and decorating.

Madison High School is larger this year than last. There is a senior class of seven, all of whom desire to take advanced education. Prize speaking, dramatics, athletics, editing of the Madisonian and organized club activity enrich and enliven the regular study of text books. The Junior High School will have a class of seven to enter the higher work next fall. One of last spring's graduates entered Gorham Normal School in Maine last fall. Three of our graduates complete work at Plymonth Normal School in June and plan to enter the ranks of teachers. One graduates from the University of New Hampshire and also plans to teach. Certainly the citizens of Madison do well to support their high school as they are doing so loyally.

Madison High School has been very fortunate in two special respects. It has had the strong support of Silver Lake Woman's Club which each year sponsors the prize speaking and often assists with liberal financial aid. Members of the club have often furnished programs for the school club on Friday afternoons. In the second place, the school has had a list of noted speakers that would eclipse that of larger schools. This list has included our Mr. and Mrs. Plimpton, Prof and Mrs. Hocking, Prof. Whitney, Prof. Baker, Frof. and Mrs. Daley, William Manley.

Medical Inspection

This work is being carried on by Mrs. Marcelle Bozek, a graduate of Laconia Hospital. Last spring under the guidance of Miss Jennings, a special county nurse, a Toxin Anti-toxin clinic was held at the Town Hall under the auspices of the State Board of Health and sponsored by the Silver Lake Woman's Club. Although this was largely a pre-school clinic, all school children were welcome. A Dental Clinic was also held at which a large number of children were treated. Partial financial aid was granted by the local Red Cross and this was appreciated.

Repairs and Improvements

As usual the buildings have been cleaned, floors oiled and furniture varnished. Silver Lake schoolhouse was dressed inside. Cement steps were placed at Nickerson School. For the coming year, Nickerson Schoolhouse should be painted outside, the underpinning should be reset at Mason and the outside painted. Provision should also be made for relaying the water pipe for the high school.

Madison is showing itself very wise in keeping its school property up.

After one year more when the debt on the high school is wiped out, special attention should be given to enlarging and beautifying school grounds. As Edgar Guest says: "Give us more lovers of beauty, More lovers of gardens, and we Shall lessen our need for your cannon And iron-clad ships of the sea.

"In gardens, in childhood, in painting, In music are safety and peace, So give us more lovers of beauty That hatred and quarrels may cease."
