

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Marlow qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Jones Hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a town clerk for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To choose a selectman for the three years ensuing.
- Article 3. To choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 4. To raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid for highways and to raise money for the same.
- Article 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of state aid and trunk line roads.
- Article 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repair of highways and bridges.
- Article 8. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for town library.

Article 9. To raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 10. To raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the observance of Old Home Day.

Article 11. To see what action the town will take in regard to the control of the white pine blister rust and to raise money for the same.

Article 12. To see what action the town will take in regard to the acceptance of trust funds and especially a legacy under the will of Perley E. Fox, late of Marlow, deceased.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to sell and convey certain real estate, more particularly two house lots in Washington, D. C., belonging to the estate of Perley E. Fox of Marlow, N. H., such sale being necessary in order to complete the provisions of said Fox's will in which said town is interested as legatee, said town joining with the Methodist Episcopal Church in said town and others in making said sale and conveyance, and to choose an agent to sell and convey the town of Marlow's interest in the said lots, the proceeds of said sale to be paid to the Executor of the will for distribution.

Article 14. To see what action the town will take in regard to the discontinuance of the road running northerly from the Harvey Priest place so called to the Acworth town line and also the road from said mentioned road to the Increase S. Rogers place so-called and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 15. To see what action the town will take in regard to procuring land for a public dumping place and to raise money for and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 16. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges and to apply on town debt.

Article 17. To bring in your votes for a delegate to the Constitutional convention to be held at Concord on the first Wednesday of June, 1930.

Article 18. To hear the reports of officers, agents or committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The members of the Marlow School Board:

I herewith, submit my fifth report as superintendent of your schools.

A study of the accompanying statistical report will disclose the fact that the year 1928-1929 was one of decided progress in the schools of Marlow. The percentage of attendance was the highest in recent years, 93.86. The number of tardinesses was 137 and the lowest on record. The children and the parents of Marlow appreciate their schools, as is shown by regular attendance and few late arrivals. Standardized tests given in both schools prove the work in the fundamentals to be on a level with that of the best schools of the country. To further emphasize the importance of good scholarship in our schools there was instituted, last year a scholarship contest in which all grammar schools of this union were represented. Each school sent one or two teams of three pupils each to Charlestown, on the appointed day-not to engage in play or to have a good time but to take examinations in Arithmetic, History. Reading and Geography. No prizes were offered, the only reward being the announcement of the results of these tests by teams and schools. I am sure the interest shown by the contestants and the competing schools answered the criticism sometimes heard that pupils now-a-days do not care for scholarship.

During the summer, the school building was renovated on the outside, so that it is now an attractive plant, with the exception of the entrance. The system of heating and ventilation has long been unsatisfactory. Recently the windows have been altered so that it is now possible for them to be lowered from the top and in such a way as to prevent direct drafts through the room. Jacketed stoves—or better still—modern self ventilating stoves should be installed that heating may be evenly and economically distributed.

A recent movement in Education is the broadcasting of school courses of study under the direction of the United States Commissioner of Education. The first series of courses started February 4 and consisted of broadcasts twice weekly, of History and English lessons for the upper grammar grades. The time will soon be here when a school will be "out-of-date" that is not equipped with a good radio. The music appreciation hour of the New York city schools is broadcast directly from the New York class rooms. A radio in school would bring to the pupils of Marlow exactly the same work as the children of that rich city enjoy. These courses are just the beginning of more valuable work to come. In towns where school budgets must be carefully watched school boards will be hesitant about installing radios. It is here that the opportunity is offered to the large number of citizens who are interested in the schools, to show this interest in a way that will add much to the efficiency of those schools and bring a refining and broadening influence into the lives of our pupils. Is there not some individual or society that is able and would be willing to contribute to such a cause?

I wish to express my appreciation for the kindly interest shown by the great majority of the citizens of Marlow and for the helpful advice of the board individually and as a group.
