

### Warrant for Annual Meeting

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Mont Vernon in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Mont Vernon on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$75.00 to pay the tuition of town scholars attending Stearns School.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes of three percent if paid before July 1st, and two percent if paid before August 1st.
- 5. To see if the town will accept state aid for the construction of the Class II road known as the Francestown Turnpike and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$675.00; or will accept state aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$470.19.
- 6. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- 7. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- 8. To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.

### **Daland Memorial Library**

The records of the past year compared with former reports show a gratifying increase in the use of your Library, which encourages your Librarian and Trustees to make even greater effort to serve you.

We wish that your apparent appreciation of the privileges of recreational and educational reading afforded you, might be shown by a larger appropriation so that even more benefit might accrue.

The circulation of books and magazines was 5104, 456 more than last year.

From various sources we have acquired 192 books, but the demand for new books is increasing.

We gratefully acknowledge gifts of books from Miss Mary Bancroft, Miss Emma Flint, Mrs. Amy Abbott, Mrs. Lucia Auryansen, Miss Edna Spinney, Miss Elaine Boutwell, Mrs. Philip Thayer, Mrs. Ralph Morgan, Miss Edith Wellington, and Mrs. Winthrop Wood, also a set of 14 volumes by Theodore Roosevelt given in memory of Mr. and Mrs. John Murphy by their children.

Twenty-six books have been purchased from the fund in memory of Cecil K. Bancroft and Harry W. Conant, former trustees, and 40 from the J. F. Wellington Fund. The New Hampshire Public Library Commission through its State Aid has given us 38 books, and we are glad to publicly acknowledge the active interest and cooperation we have received from the Commission in many ways. Through them we have also added 15 books to our shelves by exchange of duplicates.

Our magazines on the reading table are about as last year, though somewhat curtailed, to balance the budget.

The Library has been obliged to function with a

depleted staff of Trustees, but the willingness and efficiency of the remaining members has bridged the gap very effectively. Mention was made in the last report of the loss sustained by the Library in the death of Mrs. Mary V. Peck, whose term would have expired this March.

The Daland Trustees have been peculiarly unfortunate in the loss of several members from whom we had reason to expect great assistance and service for many years.

Last March we were shocked to learn of the untimely death of Robert F. Marden, who had so capably and ungrudgingly assumed the duties of Treasurer of the Daland Trustees. Since then his secretary has aided Mr. W. P. Woods in carrying on this vitally important function, and it is a pleasure at this time to render a slight acknowledgement of appreciation of their unselfish use of time and energy in our service.

The lighting system in the Library has always been inadequate, and this condition has been greatly improved by the installing of three new lights in the main room, with new and larger bulbs in the stack room which has in the center the one large fixture taken from the main room. During the short winter days this was appreciated by all using the Library, and was accomplished by the Daland Trustees, who have also improved the grounds by removing and pruning shrubs.

The Library has been open every library day of the year, and while the circulation is very satisfactory, many of you do not avail yourselves of your privileges, and as a source of information and an inducement to non-patrons a list of worthwhile books of recently added non-fiction was prepared but space is lacking, and with a cordial invitation to come in and use your own Library, and with grateful appreciation for all assistance and encouragement, this report is respectfully submitted.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Mont Vernon:

I herewith submit my seventeenth annual report which is the eighteenth in the series of such reports.

#### Union No. 40

Beginning with the school year 1933-1934 Hollis was added to the four districts which had comprised this union since 1919. The apportionment of joint expenses of the district is at present as follows: Amherst 17%, Brookline 8%, Hollis 14%, Milford 56%, and Mont Vernon 5%.

#### Organization of Grades and High School Tuition

Just before school opened last summer there were found to be new families in town which would increase the enrollment at the village building so that there would be too many children for one teacher—considering that all grades from I-VI were to be represented. Accordingly, Miss Catherine Morgan was engaged as an assistant teacher to Miss Draper. Miss Morgan was graduated from Wheelock School last June and was able to meet the state requirements to secure a teaching license for the primary grades. The increased enrollment also required a slight change in the lower school room to make room for another row of seats, but this was accomplished on short notice and school opened on time in September. Should the enrollment continue as large as when school opened or perhaps increase to more than forty children, two regular teachers would certainly be needed. This would mean that the upper room at the village building would have to be used again, in which case grades VII-VIII could be combined with grades V-VI as was formerly done before arrangements were made for grades VII and VIII at Milford. From the point of view of preparation for High School it would seem much better to continue grades VII-VIII at Milford if it can be done, especially since Milford maintains a six-year High School which includes grades VII-VIII. The present enrollment in grades I-VI (32) is no more than there has been several times during the last few years under one teacher. The table below will show this more in detail:

#### Transportation

At the March meeting in 1935 it appeared to be the wish of the district that transportation of pupils should not be limited to the state minimum requirements which apply to pupils two miles or more from the school to which assigned. Accordingly, transportation has been arranged to accommodate practically all pupils except those who live quite near the schoolhouse at a total cost of about \$1450 for the present school year. Families who move in or out, of course, will change the transportation cost one way or another.

#### Repairs

During the last summer the village building was given a complete interior painting and the woodshed floor was re-laid. Suggestions for the future are: 1. Shingling; 2. New swings for the playground; 3. Stockroom on the lower floor; 4. Improvement of toilets. This involves also a water supply.

#### Music

Mont Vernon has been very fortunate to have proceeds from the Daland Trust Fund to assist in providing music instruction for pupils. The income from this has been about \$100 per year for several years. Now, however, it will probably be about \$50 per year. With this assistance we have been enabled to have a music supervisor visit schools each

week. This service is being rendered by Miss Elsie Wheeler of Greenville. She also has similar work in Milford, Brookline, and Amherst schools.

In conclusion, it may be well to point out that in planning for the needs of a school system it is important to consider what will best serve the interests of the children over a period of years even though a variation from a long term program may appear to be a temporary advantage.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To Mr. Harold C. Bales, Superintendent of Schools, Mont Vernon, N. H.:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report of the health work in Mont Vernon schools, it being the sixteenth year of this work.

The medical examination was made in September by Dr. Burns, the nurse assisting. A tabulated report of this inspection will be found in the school physician's report.

Three children received toxoid treatment to prevent diphtheria at the clinic in Milford, October 8, 1935.

One pupil was vaccinated by the school physi-

cian in October. The vaccination record of the school is now 100%.

Eye examinations were made and two children found to have defective vision. It is hoped to correct these at an early date.

Ten schoolroom visits have been made during the year which consisted of short health talks, class room inspections, and attention to the needs of the individual children. Home visits have been made whenever necessary. Clothing has been furnished as needed by the Red Cross Chapter.

Federal funds furnished milk to the pupils needing it during the winter months of 1934-1935. This is very beneficial for those who bring lunches each day.

One child received necessary treatment for an orthopedic deformity at Grasmere Hospital.
