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NOTES FROM THE SELECTMEN

As we commence a new decade, the 70's, we would be remiss not to review the past ten years and reflect on a few of its highlights.

The assessment growth for tax purposes has bounded ahead nearly ten million dollars and is now \$28,090,000.00. The growth ten years ago was equivalent to \$320,000.00 and 1969 saw our increase at \$760,000.00. The Town charges for the same relative time was \$102,800.00 compared to \$276.510.00 in 1969. The school amount in 1959 was \$110,030.00 and for 1969 was \$407,686.00. Concluding the three major areas of expenditures, the County tax increased during the period from \$21,011.00 to \$63,000.00. It is apparent from these figures that our tax base and expenditures have increased at an accelerated pace. The Town's bonded indebtedness was \$34,000.00 at the start of the decade and \$63,000.00 for the schools, all of which was borrowed at interest rates of $1\frac{3}{4}$ %, 2.4% and 3%. Now our indebtedness is \$81,000.00 (not including schools nor the \$70,000.00 Sewer Bond) and interest rates are 6% and $6\frac{1}{4}\%$.

In 1961 the Zoning Ordinance, but three years old, was given a vote of confidence by almost a four to one margin. And uniquely in 1959 the Zoning Board heard but one case, in 1969 six cases. The total number of cases to date is 65.

In ten years the Police Department has grown from one officer, 14,000 miles traveled and a budget of \$3,500.00, to a four-man department, traveling 70,000 miles and operating on a budget of \$30,000.00.

The Municipal Court of 1959 heard 60 cases as compared to 299 cases in 1969, including now the new District Court which the last Legislature approved.

In 1962, our Town received a gift of land on Little Lake Sunapee from Walter S. Bucklin. It is now known as Bucklin

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Beach and provides a great deal of pleasure in recreation.

1963 brought approximately \$300,000.00 to our tax rolls in 15 new buildings and 16 additions. The following year, New London was reappraised and the total valuation rose from \$4,000,000.00 to \$22,000,000.00, at a presumed "fair market value" or 100% as opposed to the equalized valuation method. As compared to 1963 and 15 new buildings, 1964 found us with 35 new buildings at an estimated value of \$626,000.00. At this time, construction of St. Andrew's Church, the New London Hospital addition and Austin dormitory at Colby Jr. College were under way. The very impressive total for the year was \$1,454,000.00 of which approximately \$1,000,000.00 was added as taxable.

Midway in the decade, external influences were altering our community patterns. The State Department of Public Works awarded a contract in excess of \$600,000.00 for the Crockett Corner improvement, in addition to a 1.8 million dollar contract for 1.8 miles of I-89 through New London. Noteworthy of 1966 was the establishment of the Kearsarge Regional School District. This joined New London with Bradford, Newbury, Springfield, Sutton, Warner and Wilmot in a new regional educational concept.

George Emmerton, a former State Police officer, became our new Police Chief and was assigned the task of building our law enforcement agency. In 1965, the first Conservation Commission was established. Results of their work are sizable preserves of wild land for future use by Townspeople together with woodland paths through the Lyon Brook area of Town. All agencies and departments of our Town felt additional work loads, foreseeably, the necessity was arising for a Master Plan.

One of the major issues of 1967 was the discontinuance of the plowing of private driveways (240). The Town had over four miles of roads turned over to its Highway Department. Again, New London being foremost, became conscious of pollution and sewage problems and appropriated \$70,000.00 to be supplemented by \$40,000.00 in State Grants for our treatment facilities.

In July of 1967, Our Lady of Fatima Church, a new concept in design, was dedicated.

Rounding out the latter years of the sixties, we had I-89 opened through New London. While through traffic subsided somewhat, local traffic increased considerably. Motor Vehicle permits amounted to \$22,000.00 as compared to \$16,000.00 three years before. And finishing out the sixties in March of 1969, the Town adopted 16 amendments to our Zoning Ordinance and finalized the Master Plan which the Planning Board and Hans Klunder Associates had worked on for two years. Again being cognizant of sewage problems, the people of New London approved a \$16,000.00 appropriation for the study and planning of sewage treatment facilities in Elkins and including Pleasant Lake. Additionally the 1969 Town Meeting approved the appropriation of \$60,000.00 to buy the Parks property on Pleasant Lake, which will supplement our summer beach recreational activities. Additionally the Baptist Church opened their new Parish House.

These are but a few of the many accomplishments over the past ten year period. It would be impossible to include all in a general summation.

As we start the decade of the 1970's, we must all take pride in our Town being an alert rather than inert community. As is evidenced, we are not out of touch with reality or the social and economic influences affecting it. Rather we reflect the trends and forces affecting our Town and our area. We know not the rate at which growth and improvements will come; only that they shall, from past experience. Worthwhile improvements will assuredly beckon. Alertly we face the challenges of the next ten years and hopefully then might we pride ourselves as we should be permitted to do now. Courageously, may we pursue new objectives and goals and become a better community in which to live, bring up our children, enjoy our recreations and preserve our natural resources, thereby enhancing New London's leadership in the field of small New England communities.

In conclusion, the Board of Selectmen wish to thank the Town Officers, Committee members, many individuals, and employees of the Town for their cooperation throughout the past year. Be assured that your hours of service are sincerely appreciated.

FROM OTHER DECADES

NEW LONDON INCORPERATED 1779

These excerpts came from our past. The Town Meeting records of the first 21 years. The spelling is as it was written. Remember, until 1786, the "S's" were written as "F's."

February 1781 "That some men be procured for the Continental army. That the Selectmen be a committee for to hire a man for this town to serve in the Continental army for three years."

September 1781 'Voted firft to raife silver money to pay for beaf purchased for this year and to pay the soldier hired for this year."

February-1782 "Voted to grant money for school, twelve hard dollars granted".

March, 1784 "Voted that Tuesday and Friday every week be grinding days as yousel".

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June, 1784 "Voted to open a road from Kearsarge Goore (Gorge?) to Protectworth acording to the request of them".

"Voted to lay out one hundred days work in opening the road this season."

"Voted to raife ten galens of rum on the town coft for the opening of the road before menehended."

March, 1786 "Voted to build a meeting house fifty feet long and height and width in proportion."

"Voted to set the meeting house not more than forty rods distance from the mouth of Hutchiness Road so called".

August, 1786 "To see if the town will vote to petition the general court to make paper money."

September, 1787 — "Voted to give Elder Seammons a call to setel in this town as a minister of the gospel."

"Voted to give him forty pounds yearly as a salary. Three pounds in cash and thirty seven pounds in labor and grain or other produce that he may want. All to be paid at the common price."

November, 1788 — "Voted to give up the hindermost seat on each side of the broad elle in the meeting house and what ground can reasonable be spared out of the elles on the consideration of having the two hindermost pues on the floor on each side of the broad ells to sel on purpos of forewarding the finishing of the meeting house."

"Voted that the pues be sold at publick vandue."

March 1789 — "Voted to build a bridge over the bog between Capt. Brockelbank house and the meetinghouse." (Capt. Brockelbank's house is G. M. DesBarres' home.)

March 1789 — "Voted that the singers have liberty to sing the last time every Sunday with out reading".

June, 1789 — "To see if the town will vote to sel the pue ground in the galery in the meetinghouse or any part of the same in order to forward the finishing of the meetinghouse".

February, 1791 — "Voted to fence the buring yard near Anthony Sargent".

"Voted to fence the front with stone wall. Let it out to Ephrain Gile to do at three shillings and three pence per rod."

August, 1792 — "Voted that the singing pue may be built by subscription for the yuse of the town."

"Voted that those persons that live at the Northeast grant of the town be exempted from school and minister taxes in town the present year."

March, 1793 — "Voted to allow Levi Harvey fifteen shilings for riting in town book 3 years past."

November 1793 — "Voted that the town do provide a buring cloth."

"Voted that the town do provide a pound."

"Voted to build the pound on the corner of Mr. Dow's field back of the buring yard by the road."

"Voted that the pound be built thirty feet square."

March 1794 — "Voted that the corn and grain taxes for the present year be paid by the time that the Selectmen specify in the warrant given to the colecter. Other ways to be paid in cash."

"Voted the town minister and school taxes be paid the insuing year by the first day of March next."

"Voted that the Selectmen apoint places in each Distsick to receve the school tax."

Aphil 1795 — "To see if the town will purshes waits and mesures for a standard in town." "Voted to have wooden measures half bushel, peck and half peck".

August, 1795 — "Voted to warn all those persons out of town who have not been inhabitance of this town."

Marck, 1797 — "Voted that those inhabitance of New London that do not belong to the Baptist Society so call in town, have a right to invite preachers of the gospel into the meetinghouse to preach such a part of the time as shall be in proposion to the interest they own in the meetinghouse."

January, 1798 — "Voted to give one dollar as bounty to each man for in listing and in case they are caled for to march to advance five dollars to each man as part of his wages and to make up each mans pay with what Congress gives to ten dolars per month while he is in service."

August, 1798 — "Voted to receve grain for old dets due to the town provided they pay it in by the first day of November next. Rye at four shillings per bushel."

December, 1798 — "To see if the town will grant liberty for building more hors stabels on the publick lands by the meetinghouse." (It passed)

May, 1799 — "Voted to petition the general court to empower the town to levy a tax on all the land in town exceept publick lands to pay for roads in this town." (First general property tax)

November, 1799 — "Voted that the majority of the Singers be impowered to make and exercise such regulations as is nesary consourning the Singers or said Singing pue."

June, 1800 — "Voted to abate the taxes of Joseph (Censored) for 1799 to Levi Harvey your colecter provided said (censored) does not come back again."

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Note — By law, the Meeting must open before voting starts. Therefore, the Meeting and Polls will open at 3:00 P.M. for the consideration of Article 1.

At 3:30 P.M. the Meeting will recess but the Polls will remain open.

The Meeting will reconvene at 7:30 P.M. Polls will close at 8:00 P.M.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. This sum to include:

27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to appoint a Deputy Treasurer. (RSA 41:29a).

28. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that section of Old Route #11, lying between Station 38:00 and 44:00, approximately six hundred feet. Such land within said road limit to revert to abutting property owners.

29. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than \$50.00.

30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease the Post Office in Elkins situated on the former Parks property to the United States Postal Department; on a month-to-month basis on such reasonable terms as they may negotiate, and to do all the acts necessary to carry out this article.

31. To see if the Town will adopt the following by-law: "By-law regulating the parking on the southside of Main Street from Homans Corner, so called, to the corner of South Pleasant Street from November 1st until April 1st, except for those areas where parking is provided. Pursuant to R.S.A. 31:39 as amended 1969.

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

ANNUAL REPORT

The staff of the Tracy Memorial Library is happy to report an increase in the circulation of books and library materials, and to note a new interest of the townspeople in the services offered to them by their library.

The number of visitors during 1969 has been 11,287.

The following books have been loaned as schoolroom collections to: Williams Kindergarten, 79; to the Nursary School, 33; and to New London Central School, 311, and interlibrary loan, 4.

To answer special requests for specific material we have borrowed 57 books from the State Library; four books from Fernald Library; two books on interlibrary loan, and six films.

To supplement our regular books, we have borrowed 619 books from the Extension Service of the State Library. Our book purchases have been 88 adult books and 159 children's books. The Columbia and RCA Broadcasting Companies have sent us 75 more records, many of which have been Christmas records, which have been very popular at this season. Through subscription and gifts our magazine

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table is supplied with 43 magazines, five newspapers, and two children's magazines in the children's room. Our friends have generously contributed 36 books as gifts.

The New London Service Organization continues to generously remember us with additions to the military book shelves with the following books: "Send Down a Dove" by McHardy; "The Long Pursuit" by Hough; "Destruction of Convoy P2" by Irving; and "The Phantom Raider" by Hoyt.

We have borrowed films from the State Library to be used by these groups in their programs: Senior Citizens, Story Hours, Elkins Fish and Game Club, Baptist Church Group, New London Grange, Womans Aid, and Williams Kindergarten. During the spring months the librarians attended a ten-week course on "Better Adult Service in Your Library", sponsored by the University of New Hamsphire, and held at Plymouth State College. Mrs. Ray has attended the Southwest Advisory Councils as delegate from this library. In January, the library was host to one of the book meetings in the Southwest District, with librarians attending from towns from the Massachusetts line to Lyme, N. H.

National Library Week, in April, was observed with displays and exhibits of bells from all over the world. Sixtyeight persons came to Open House on the first night, and hostesses assisted each day throughout the week, with an average attendance of forty persons per day.

For the third year, Mrs. Loring Grimes managed the Vacation Reading Club during July and August. At the annual party for the children completing the course, a film was shown, and refreshments were served by the librarians and their helpers. Special prizes of new books were given to the two reading the most books, and to four others for writing the best book reports.

During the summer months Miss Ellen Johson was employed as a member of the staff of the library, capably handling much of the clerical work.

A crewel and needlepoint exhibit by Newport-Lake Sunapee residents was on display during July, and well attended by lovers of fine handwork. Original designs by Mrs. Virginia Van Delft and Mrs. Louise Todd were much appreciated by all.

During the month of August, the annual exhibit of Mrs. Dorothy Dey Howard was featured in the auditorium. These consisted of thirty original paintings by the artist, who is a native of Winchester, Mass., and a graduate of Colby Academy. Since she was a young girl, Mrs. Howard has spent her summers at Hastings in New London.

Our library was most fortunate in being presented with a copy of the book, "New London Fights the Civil War," by Congressman James C. Cleveland. This is a history of the participation of New Hampshire in the Civil War, and was written by Dr. Mather Cleveland, the Congressman's father.

"Book Power" was the theme of this year's National Book Week observance in November. This marked the fiftieth consecutive year that the Children's Book Week Council has organized a week-long observance to alert young and old of the values to be gained from books. Guests from Wilmot, Springfield schools, and the elementary grades of New London Central School, visited the library during the week, with more than 400 persons viewing the exhibit which feautred a water wheel, constructed by Mr. and Mrs. Kenworth Kimball, and a display of new adult and children's books.

Story Hour on Saturday afternoon is popular with the pre-school children, and over two hundred children have been entertained and instructed by Mrs. Stevenson and her helpers.

The Christmas season sees us again decorated in seasonable colors, and bids all welcome to the world of books.

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REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COURT AND THE DISTRICT COURT FOR 1969

This is my eleventh and last report from the New London Court. Following the legislative transformation of the Municipal into the New London District Court in 1969, the new body began its legal existence on June 28 of that year. Since the local court is now a permanent part of the New Hampshire judiciary, I felt it proper to resign my position, effective on January 1, 1970. Governor Peterson accepted the resignation, and appointed the Hon. George O. Shovan as my successor.

New London has had a court since it was authorized by vote at the Town Meeting of 1934. The first Municipal Justice, appointed by Governor Winant, was Fred S. Lovely, who held office until his death in 1940. As his successor Governor Murphy named Wendell N. Hobbs to the post, which responsibility he filled until retirement on account of statutory age limits in 1946. Governor Dale then named Mrs. Ann Pardy to the local judgeship, which position she retained until she moved away from New London in 1954. Next in line was M. Roy London, who was named by Governor Gregg, and who held office until 1959. I was then appointed by Governor Powell. My first Court session was in March of that year. I served, therefore, for ten years and ten months, the longest judicial tenure to date in New London's history.

During my years the Court handled 1942 cases, more than in all the years preceding 1959. In the eleven years prior to 1959, for example, there were 479 cases. In the one year, 1969, there were 299 cases. Thus the volume of Court business has steadily grown, and there is no reason to think that this trend will change in years ahead. This does necessarily mean, I believe, any greater tendency toward misconduct by our own local citizens. It reflects the rapid growth of the area, a greatly improved local police department, the building of Interstate 89, and the general permissiveness of the times.

It should be remembered that a Court like that in New London has original jurisdiction or preliminary hearing for any type of crime or misdemeanor committed within its geopraphic area. Thus, during the last ten years and ten months, I have had every manner of case brought before me: hunting and fishing violations, motor vehicle infractions, liquor law matters, motor boat and water sport offense, larceny, malicious damage, dog cases, disorderly conduct charges, drug problems, marital tangles, small claims, illegal setting of fires, assault, boundary disputes, contempt of court charges, illegal check writing, refusal to pay just bills, evictions, failure to obey police orders, and preliminary hearings on murder charges. In any case which is heard by the local Court, there is the possibility of an appeal to the Superior Court in Concord. In my experience these appeals have been few. In 1969, for example, there was not one appeal from New London to a higher court.

A judge in our society does not make law. He takes a solemn oath to support and enforce the laws which the Legislature of New Hampshire and the Town Meeting have made. Laws frequently permit wide discretion on the part of the magistrate. A fine "not to exceed \$500," for example, permits the judge to levy no fine at all, or the maximum, or anything between that seems right to him. In my decisions I always sought to remember the admonition of Shakespeare to "let mercy temper justice". I tried to keep a personal interest in each case which came before me, and to think of him or her as fellow human beings, sometimes badly advised, sometimes deliberately scornful of the law itself, sometimes ignorant, sometimes confused, but generally in need of some kind of help. In appraising the accused and apportioning judgement, I may on occasion have made mistakes. But these were never intentional.

The most difficult case of all were those involving juveniles. I am pleased to report that in many of these cases I have had subsequent letters expressing thanks for the action taken, and have seen many of these youth straighten out and go on to useful adulthood.

The life of any courtroom, even one as small as that in New London, is a microcosm of the society in which we live. Justice requires prompt action and careful consideration of each case. This the New London Court has sought to give. Justice requires rehabilitation as well as punishment. This the Court has endeavored to make available. Justice requires the effort, insofar as is humanly possible to ascertain all the facts before making a decision. This the New London Court has tried to do.

The whole experience of ten years and ten months on the bench has been an illuminating one for me. I have been brought in touch with some of the great national problems, as well as those of a state and local nature. I have seen how difficult are the conditions under which many people have to live, and the afflictions which bear upon them. For this

opportunity of widening my knowledge of human nature and human affairs, I am grateful. My thanks go to the many Selectmen, the police officers, and others on the staff of the Court who have assisted me over the years. All have been helpful and none has ever sought to bring improper pressures upon me.

Justice has ever been one of men's highest desires. To the best of my ability, this I have sought for our town.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Your Police Department has, once again, increased its activities and duties in 1969. The personnel have worked 468 hours overtime, and because they are on salary, this means no overtime pay; and 3,328 hours on standby. These 3,328 hours are also beyond the normal duty hours and is designed to give the man in the cruiser extra help should he need it; also the man is available to answer the police telephone and assist the public with the many questions asked.

During 1969, our motor vehicle stops were 842, an increase of 33% above last year. Forty-one accidents were covered, an increase of 90%. There were 8,659 property checks, an increase of 170% and 154 places found open as a result of these checks, an increase of about 40%. Also, in 1969 there were 219 aids rendered, an increase of 140%. We also handled 11 try and locates as opposed to 6 last year, and assisted in 10 relays for other departments.

We initiated a business paper that started in the first of the year. The purpose is to acquaint the business people with the criminal problems that may pertain to them. We also try to assist them by bringing to their attention any new laws or regulations that may be helpful.

As our department progresses, we strive to achieve a higher level of professionalism. For example: every man attends a state-run police school and as many other courses and seminars as they can fit within their schedule. We also have one man who attends monthly meetings with investigators from throughout the state, for purposes of disseminating information.

As has been said, "He who would stand still, drifts behind," and I believe the above indicates that your department is not standing still.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1969 fire season was a quiet one in this area. Frequent rains kept the danger to a minimum and there were few violations. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follows: *Fire Permit*

A *fire permit* is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be prior to 9:00 a.m.and after 5:00 p.m.

Exceptions

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

Penalties

- 1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
- 2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.
- 3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.
- 4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland, maximum fine of \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

REPORT OF THE TOWN HEALTH OFFICER

As town Health Officer, I would like to give, in this annual report, a summary of my duties and activities. The town Health Officer is recommended for appointment by the Selectmen to the Director of the New Hampshire Health Department, and if approved, serves three years. The main duties are to enforce Public Health laws and regulations, and make such sanitary investigations as may be directed by the local or State Boards of Health. The Health Officer is responsible for water pollution control. To this end, the town dump and the sewage dumping pit must be periodically inspected. He is also responsible for inspection of Child-Placing and Child-Caring agencies, Private Kindergartens, Motels, Camps, Food Stores, and Restaurants. These inspections are accomplished with the aid of State inspectors.

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As Health Officer, I have conducted these inspections and kept close communications with the State Health Department to promote better relationships between the Town and State.

During the year, 40 sewage systems were built. A total of 78 preliminary and final inspections were made. The Selectmen and Planning Board have made a regulation that before a sewage system is built, a percolation test must be made under the supervision of the Health Officer. Twentyone percolation tests have been done since October, 1969.

Article 12 of the 1968 Town Warrant was completed. This was a survey of all septic systems bordering Lake Sunapee. In addition, specimens of water for bacteriological examination were taken at strategic points on Pleasant Lake and Messer Pond plus their tributaries. The report of this survey was given to the Water Pollution Commission, New London Selectmen, Lake Sunapee Protective Association, and the Pleasant Lake Protective Association. In general, our waterways are in good condition. Problems that caused pollution to our waterways were caused by faulty septic systems. Many of these were corrected or are in the process of being corrected. A more extensive study of our waterways will be made for 1970.

Our town water supply from Morgan Pond is periodically examined by me for bacteriological, chemical and physical aspects and these are found to be in excellent condition.

The report of communicable disease statistics from the local medical community will be given by Dr. Donald W. Clark, who is our Medical Consultant to the Town of New London.

Dr. Richard Rodgers will hold the Rabies Clinic this year. He will announce the date, time and place for the clinic.

I would like to express my deep appreciation to the representatives of the Town, and to the many people of the Town for their assistance and cooperation. If anyone has questions regarding the Health Department, please feel free to contact me at any time.

As medical consultant to the Town Health Officer, I am including in the Town Report information considered to be of interest to the general community. While much of the activity of the Health Officer has been devoted to the problem of water pollution, other health problems need to be recognizd. Part of this is information relating to infectious diseases in general.

In this area, the most common infectious diseases which cause disability are common colds and streptococcal infections.

The common cold is caused by a number of closely related viruses which are transmitted only by contact with another person through coughing or sneezing tiny particles into the air. The discomfort in the nose, throat, and chest can be partially relieved by cold remedies but there is no cure. The disease runs a two-week course. When fever occurs, complications are to be considered which suggest medical consultation.

Streptococcal infections generally are marked by sore throat with a fever and should always be treated by a doctor. When tonsils are present, such a sore throat is usually called tonsillitis; when they have been removed, it is called septic sore throat. The disease is the same in either case and should be treated with antibiotics prescribed by a physician. Untreated infections may be complicated by a rash which is called scarlet fever. The treatment is the same as for Strep throat without a rash. Scarlet fever is no more contagious than other cases of Strep throat. Occasionally untreated Strep infections are complicated by acute rheumatic fever or nephritis, serious diseases which are preventable. There are no immunizations to protect against Strep infections.

The advent of vaccines to protect against polio, mumps, measles, and German measles has changed the pattern of recommended immunizations in recent years. For instance, killed Salk vaccine for polio is now rarely used; even oral Sabin polio vaccines which were given in three different types separately, are now given as three together in one dose.

It is wise to check your own records: all children before school should have had their diphtheria-whooping cough-tetanus toxoid series (called DPT). This is usually given three times in the first year, with boosters at intervals and especially just before starting first grade. Measles injection, a live virus immunization, should be given in the first year, or at least hopefully before starting school. German measles is another live virus immunization which has just recently become available, to be given to children to produce a lifelong immunity against the disease, especially so expectant mothers cannot acquire the disease and chance serious damage to an unborn child. Mumps vaccine, another live virus vaccine, produces permanent immunity and prevents the rather severe illness which teenage boys or adults are subject to. Oral polio vaccine is now given usually as a series of three oral doses in the first year with a booster before starting school. Smallpox vaccination may be given at a year with a booster before school, although some physicians wait until before first grade. At 12-14 years of age, booster diphtheriatentaus toxoid and smallpox vaccination are indicated. As adults, these should be repeated every ten years, although tetanus toxoid should be given in case of wounds, as immediate booster.

There is no immunization for chicken pox. In recent years it has been shown that chicken pox and shingles (or herpes zoster) are caused by the same virus, and the usual course of either disease is two weeks, although sometimes the distress caused by shingles requires medical attention for a longer time.

Most 24-hour stomach upsets and diarrhea are caused by viruses which are contagious but die out quickly and are not cured by antibiotics. Longer-lasting episodes indicate a need for medical consultation.

Because there is no systematic reporting of infections, and because many of the common infectious diseases are not reported to physicians, accurate statistics concerning their incidence are not available. From discussion with all the physicians practicing in New London. I can report that the incidence of strep throats is quite high, especially in winter, but no more or less than other years. Chicken pox and mumps have been seen occasionally, but in no large epidemic last year. Whooping cough is rarely seen. We have had no polio in several years. There have been scattered cases of scarlet fever and German measles, but less each year. I do not know of any regular measles in the past year. This emphasizes the importance of the polio and measles immunizations, since these diseases are all but disappearing. Hepatitus has been seen rarely, but not in any local epidemic this past year. Tuberculosis, now treated with daily medicine on an office basis rather than with a prolonged hospital stay, is seen uncommonly. However, this is still an important problem and we now see two or three cases a year. We had a salomnella epidemic arising from contaminated eggs (not local) three years ago but have not had a problem this year. The inspection of food handlers helps prevent such outbreaks (marked by protracted cramps, fever and diarrhea). While venereal diseases (syphilis and gonorrhea) have not been seen frequently, they are important because in early stages are readily treatable, and late serious complications prevented. Symptoms which worry a person, regardless of age, should be reported to his or her physician.

If there are specific questions relative to diseases which might affect the community, we will try to answer them.

INFORMATION BOOTH

We hereby submit for your consideration our annual report on the Information Booth. The Booth opened on Tuesday, July 1st, and was maintained daily, with the exception of Sunday, and closed on Saturday, August 30th, a total of nine weeks.

Staffing the Booth were Mrs. Katherine Morse from Monday through Wednesday and Mrs. Audrey Shoemaker from Thursday through Saturday. The Booth was open from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M.

Weekly reports were sent to the N. H. State Dept. of Resources and Economic Development and showed visitors from 29 states, 3 Canadian provinces and 2 foreign countries. The number of cars listed was 852 with 2,255 people, a decrease of 42% in cars and a decrease of 35% in passengers. This decrease in both cases might possibly be accounted for by the opening of Int. 89, bypassing New London for the summer season. Stopping at the Booth were 414 pedestrians and there were 130 telephone calls, including some from various states such as New York, Washington, D. C., etc. These calls for the most part were inquiring about accommodations in the vicinity.

There were numerous inquiries regarding activities in the Town. Taxes, schools and real estate, riding schools, nearest air transportation and car rental services. Also a great many people expressed appreciation of our ability to help them in past years as well as this year.

Our thanks go to many including hotels, inns, motels, camping grounds and cottage owners for their response to our inquiries. Also to the Police Department, Kidder's Garage and to many others who helped us in various ways.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

During 1969 we have been fortunate that Richard Webb of Sunapee has offered the Town of New London an easement on additional acreage which will complete our Morgan Hill plans. This will make the northeast corner of Town available to the public for hiking, riding and skimobiles.

The Conservation Commission has been working on the Green Strip along Lyon Brook which will ultimately extend from the New London Hospital to Hominy Pot — a distance of about two mlies. Two-thirds of the trail in this GrGeen Strip has been cut, and there are plans to complete the remaining sections in 1970.

Saturday Walks were conducted during the summer under the supervision of the Commission. For one of these walks a new trail was cut to the old stone quarry atop King Hill, the source of the foundation stones of New London's older houses.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

1969 was a year of consolidating gains for the Planning Board. Meetings were held usually twice a month in order to meet the demands of our work load. Work was done on codifying Zoning and Sub-division regulations, following the passage of certain amendments at the last Town Meeting. It is expected that the revised regulations will be printed and available for distribution early in the coming year.

Three new members were assimilated into the Board, one to replace a member whose term expired last March, and two to replace members who resigned because of other duties. All three have contributed to the harmonious operation of the Board.

During the year, public hearings were held on nineteen proposed property subdivisions. Twelve subdivisions were approved and three were denied. Two of those denied will probably be reconsidered when certain changes in plans have been made. In addition the Board has handled site plan reviews and minor matters relating to zoning.

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ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment held open hearings and formulated decisions on the following appeals:

On April 22, 1969, Charles H. Pratt, owner of the Miniature Department Store on Main Street, requested a variance to Article 6, Section A of the Zoning Ordinance with regard to extending his store building despite the fact that his side lot lines did not conform to the Zoning regulations. His request was granted since the size of his lot and the width of the buildings had been established prior to 1958.

Three appeals were heard on Sept. 30, 1969.

Henry Herz of Lakeside Lodge asked for a special exception to Article 9, Section C, of the Ordinance. He proposed to add a year-round cottage to his hotel-motel structure. The Board granted permission with the provision that the Town and State Boards of Health approve the method of sewage disposal.

William and Audrey Taylor of Elkins requested a special exception to Article 9, Section H, in order to use their garage as an antique shop. Permission was granted.

Leslie and Lois Shaw requested and were granted a variance to Article 4, Section 2, of the Ordinance. The variance concerned the distance from the front lot line to a proposed addition to their home in Elkins.

On May 27, 1969, Walter E. Steere, Jr., requested a variance concerning Article 5, Section F, of the Zoning Ordinance. He proposed to construct an enclosed vestibule on the main front entrance, and an open porch at the entrance to the ell, both structures to be less than 50 feet from the road on property at Tracy Farm, County Road. The variance was granted.

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On Dec. 8, 1969, Anne A. Wasson, M.D., appeared before the Board to ask for a variance to Article 4, Section B, Subsection 2, relating to size of lots pertaining to her property on County Road.

The request for the variance was denied because the Board could find no hardship existing inherently in the land in question which is not shared in common with other parcels of land in the district.

It was the opinion of the Board that the spirit and intent of the New London Zoning Ordinance would be broken if the variance were granted. The basic idea of a variance is to allow a person with a land hardship the same rights and privileges of land ownership as his neighbors. Rather than creating equity in an instance of land hardship the Board felt that granting this variance would constitute a special privilege for subdivisioning now denied to other landowners.

CEMETERY COMMISSION

During the year 1969, there were 23 interments in Elkins and Old Main Street cemeteries and none in West Part Cemetery. In the new part of Elkins Cemetery 5 plots were sold and 4 plots were sold in Old Main Street Cemetery. Several applications have been made for plots in West Part Cemetery. These will be assigned and identified with the individuals concerned in the Spring of 1970, pending grading and marking in accordance with a complete survey made in the Fall of 1969. This survey indicates that space can be made available for 320 new graves in West Part Cemetery.

The Commission established a new rate schedule in 1969, considered to be more consistent with present day costs. This rate of \$50.00 per grave, including perpetual care, has been in effect since June 1, 1969.

The Commission also deemed it wise to restrict the sale of lots to residents of the Town of New London, due to the scarcity of land available for this purpose in all three cemeteries.

It is the considered opinion of the Commissioners that Elkins and Old Main Street Cemeteries should be completely surveyed to permit updating the records as well as determining the need for physical improvements.

SEWER COMMISSIONERS REPORT

By action of the 1968 Town Meeting, voters of New London authorized a feasibility study to investigate the need for sewerage and sewage treatment facilities in the Village of Elkins, New London, New Hampshire. Subsequent action of the 1969 Town Meeting resulted in expansion of the study to include all land area and residences in the proximity of Pleasant Lake capable of contributing pollution to the lake.

On July 9, 1969, the Sewer Commissioners of New London, New Hampshire, entered into an agreement for professional services with the engineering firm of Anderson-Nichols & Company, Inc., regarding this study.

The scope of this agreement included the preparation of a preliminary study report regarding sewerage and sewage treatment facilities for the Pleasant Lake-Elkins area of New London, as well as a general study of the feasibility of providing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities for the Town of New London with the discharge of the effluent to the Blackwater River basin.

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This agreement was approved and signed by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission in its capacity as co-signer.

The investigations and studies have now been completed and our findings, cost estimates, and recommendations are presented in this completed report.

This report has not been approved by the State but as soon as it is and information is available we will make it public.

SANITARY SEWERS: The original construction of sanitary sewers was done in 1931 with major extensions and improvements made in 1939. Minor additions have been made from time to time since, as the Town has grown and new areas have developed. The system is exclusively one of gravity collection and has presently expanded to the limits that can be served by gravity alone. Presently there are approximately 1,240 persons served by the system, including over 600 students and staff at Colby Junior College. Since construction of the system began, ground water infiltration and roof or drainage connections have caused excessively high flows, resulting in clogging of lines and overloading of the treatment plant.

Some lines have been replaced this year and something will be done to help remove infiltration.

Work has been going on downstream of the plant to help correct the bad problem at Kezar Lake. But because of the unfortunate professional error the project has not been completed.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

1969 was a busy year for the Water Department with insufficient labor to complete what we had planned. However, by taking advantage of High School boys and one High School teacher, we did very well, especially in relaying the 12" pipe line and preparing and excavating the site for a two million gallon reservoir, which we hope will be completed this year, giving us two reservoirs with a capacity of three million gallons.

A new 6" pipe line was laid on Homan Street Extension and one new hydrant installed on Carter Lane, Burpee Lane.

A Calgon activated charcoal pilot plant was installed for filtrating water. The State Board of Health did not believe it practical. Analysis reports were considerably different.

We will endeavor to try other methods of filtration with the hopes that we can install some equipment that will give us better water at all times.

The system has grown to over 17 miles of pipe line, over 500 house services, nearly 50 commercial outlets, over 100 hydrants and 200 valves. Our consumption is over 60 million gallons a year, depending on the sesaon, wet or dry. Daily consumption is from 150 to 250 thousand gallons. Metering commercial establishments is steadily on the increase. Beavers continue to build dams and cause trouble. More evergreen areas, more beavers. We trap them but new families move in. We try to supply you with reasonably clean water most of the time.

For over 40 years I have been your Water Superintendent. I feel now, it is time for me to step aside and let a younger man take over. Therefore, as of Feb. 1st, I am retiring and the Commissioners have appointed James E. Bewley to be the new Superintendent. I hope you will continue to give him the same cooperation that I received during my term of office.

NEW LONDON HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION, INC.

ANNUAL REPORT

The year 1969 was a very busy and productive one for the New London Hospital and the Hospital Board, with the following accomplishments briefly outlined. During the year the medical and hospital staff cared for 1,189 adult and pediatric patients and 103 newborns. 6,068 visits were recorded in the emergency and out-patient departments, while 7,300 other out-patients visited the x-ray, laboratory, physical therapy and inhalation therapy departments.

The New London Hospital has recently been awarded accreditation for the next three years, or until a subsequent survey is made.

The Board voted to purchase a new ambulance for the sum of \$6,000.00. This ambulance will be housed at the Hospital, for use in the area, and is a rescue type vehicle, capable of carrying four patients at a time. It has been ordered and is expected to be delivered in the near future.

In order to keep pace with other New Hampshire hospitals aind due to cost of living increases, salary adjustments were made during the year for all hospital personnel.

The X-ray Department has received a gift of \$10,599.00, in the memory of Mrs. Gardner Gage, which has enabled the hospital to place an order for a new X-ray machine, to be delivered in the future.

The Hospital continued the practice of sending nurses to Mary Hitchcock Hospital for special training in coronary care.

Directional signs have been placed on Route #89. showing the direction to the New London Hospital. An event of major significance to the Hospital was the voting in by the Board, the authorization to the Finance Committee to conduct a campaign to raise money to build a fifty bed extended care unit. An extensive study was made by Hogan Winters, Inc., professional und raising counselors, who advised the feasibility of such a project. The campaign itself was eminently successful, with well in excess of \$400,000.00 raised. The architect is Mr. Alexander Majeski, Bedford, N. H. He has been working on the plans for the unit, and it is hoped that working drawings will soon be completed with ground breaking to take place this coming spring.

In spite of the large and rewarding campaign for the extended care unit, Hospital Day this year was also very successful. It was Mrs. Sydney Badmington and Mrs. William T. Andrews, co-chairmen, working many hours under difficult circumstances, who were primarily responsible for its success, and the Hospital realized \$18,594.00 from the various events.
