REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

Fellow Citizens of Stoddard:

Again it becomes our duty to report to you the condition and progress of our schools for another year.

No new or unusual conditions have arisen during the year, but the same perplexing problems confront the school board in an ever increasing degree. The difficulty of securing efficient and satisfactory teachers, the decreasing school population, scattered over a large area of territory necessitating the providing of conveyance, and the schooling of some in adjoining towns, are a few of the situations to be met.

Three different schools have been maintained in town, divided into two terms for each school, and aggregating $66\frac{8}{10}$ weeks.

Five different teachers have been employed. The total number of pupils registered was 61, and eight have been schooled out of town as follows: 2 in Marlow, 4 in Sullivan, and 2 in Antrim, the latter for a short time only. The cost of tuition is 30c per week in Marlow, and 40c in Sullivan, for each pupil. Besides these, two scholars have been out of town to an academy and a high school, as the law provides.

The sum of \$55.00 has been paid for conveying scholars, as will appear from the report of the treasurer. In the payment for conveying, the school board make no pretense of allowing for the actual cost, but proceed on the belief that parents have a duty and a responsibility of their own, and the amount allowed from the school funds is a help, and not a full recompense. The board are pleased to say that they have been met in this spirit.

It is our earnest wish that all parents would take a deeper interest in our schools, visit them, encourage the teacher, and endeavor to have their children prompt and regular in attendance. The evils of tardiness and irregular attendance have often been pointed out, but the remedy must be found in the homes. Sixty-one pupils, and one hundred and sixty tardy marks! Is comment necessary? Of course the great majority are innocent, but the reproach rests upon the whole through the faults of a few. It is noticeable that the tardy marks are against the names of those who do *not* live the farthest from the schoolhouse.

At the spring enumeration the number of children between the ages of 5 and 16 years reported by the truant officer was 66; 36 boys, and 30 girls.

In the purchase of text books and supplies the school board have bought only what was needed, and have made no change in text books. It is hoped a newer edition of geography will be introduced the ensuing year.

Repairs have been made upon the three schoolhouses. The most extensive on the one in Division No. 2. Each of the others has been painted and some new windows put in. A detailed report of the schools is as follows:

SCHOOL No. 1—CENTRE.

The summer term of ten weeks was taught by Miss Julia E. Connolly of Brookline, Mass, a teacher of experience, and one who came well recommended. She labored faithfully and conscientiously, but her unfamiliarity with country schools was unfavorable to her success. Number of pupils registered, 36. Tardy marks, 38. 33 attended to reading, spelling, penmanship and arithmetic, 23 to geography and grammar, 9 to history, 6 physiology, 3 bookkeeping, 2 algebra, and 2 botany. Number of visits by school board, 9, by citizens and others, 38. Roll of honor, 5. Wages of teacher per month, \$30.

For the fall term the board were fortunate in securing the services of Miss Bessie L. Simonds of Antrim. Miss

Simonds proved herself capable and well fitted for her work. The school was harmonious and good progress was made. Number of pupils registered, 28. Number of tardy marks, 41. All attended to reading and penmanship, 26 spelling and arithmetic, 25 geography, 19 grammar, and one history. Length of term, 12 weeks. Visits by school board, 10, by citizens and others, 34. Pupils on roll of honor, 2. Wages of teacher per month, \$32.

DIVISION No. 2—(NEAR MR. POLLARD'S).

Both terms of this school were taught by Miss Lillian Murray, whose conduct of the school was satisfactory to the school board. The school is small and there is not the incentive to work and effort to either teacher or pupils that there is in a school of larger size. The wages of teacher per month was \$24 for both terms. Spring term, number of pupils registered 7. Tardy marks 7. All attended to reading, penmanship and arithmetic, 4 spelling and drawing, 6 geography, 2 grammar and 1 history, composition, physiology and algebra. Visits by school board 3, by citizens and others 12, pupils on roll of honor 3, length of term in weeks 10 4-5.

Fall term, number of pupils registered 5. Number of tardy marks 2. All studied reading, penmanship and arithmetic, 4 spelling, 2 geography and grammar, and 1 history and algebra. Length of school 10 weeks. Number of visits by school board 5, by citizens and others 10. Pupils on roll of honor 3.

DIVISION No. 3—SOUTH STODDARD.

The spring term of eleven weeks was taught by Miss A. Lillian Parker of Plaistow, N. H., who succeeded very well and met the requirements of a teacher in a satisfactory manner. Number of pupils registered 17, number of tardy marks 26. All attended to reading, penmanship and arithmetic, 15 spelling, 11 geography and composition, 10 grammar, 3 history, and 1 algebra. Visits by school

board 6, by citizens and others 48. Pupils on roll of honor, 0. Wages of teacher per month, \$31.

The fall term of twelve weeks was taught by Miss Helen F. Barnes of Worcester, Mass. This is another case where a teacher from the city has not made herself popular in a country school. Various small faults, trivial in themselves, were enlarged upon, and the seeds of discord sowed by some of the parents. In their visits to the school, the school board saw much to commend and nothing of any moment to condemn. The discipline was good, the methods of instruction of the right character, and the examination conclusively showed good progress made in the different studies. Number of pupils registered 14. Number of tardy marks 49. All attended to reading, penmanship, arithmetic and drawing, 12 spelling, 10 geography, 9 grammar, 7 composition, 3 history. Number of visits by school board 7, by citizens and others 10. Roll of honor, 0. Wages of teacher per month, \$31.

The number of tardy marks have been put down in the hope that the attention of parents will be caught, and an effort made to blot out this evil in future years.
