tricity.
6. To see what action the Town will take with re-
gard to State Aid Construction, State Aid Maintenance
and Trunk Line Maintenance.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Evergreen Cemetery.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars to plow the snow from the Trunk Line during the Winter of 1930-1931.

9. To see if the Town will vote to buy new chairs for the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for same.

10. To see what action the Town will take regarding the appointment of a committee of three to investigate and report at the next March Meeting a proposed plan to combine minor Town Officers such as Tax Collector, Janitor, Chief of Police, Supt. of Water Works, and to confer with the School Board regarding the School Janitor.

11. To see what action the Town will take relative to paying loan incurred by the Trunk Line Bridge, and raise and appropriate money for same.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

THE OLD COVERED BRIDGE

BRIDGES OLD AND NEW

The covered bridge was built about one hundred years ago and has been in constant use ever since, although it has been somewhat dangerous on account of being so narrow in recent years, made so by big timbers to reinforce it. Hon. Harrison Eaton, of Amherst, brother of William Eaton, Esq., of Bennington, was the first person to pass over it with a team, and Mr. and Mrs. Herbert E. Wilson, of Antrim, were the last persons to pass over it in an automobile on July 8, 1929.

The new cement bridge over the Contoocook river replaces the covered bridge that did service for about one hundred years. The arch showing so distinctly is the upper side of the bridge next to where was the temporary bridge while the new one was being built. The approaches from either end are well graded and conditions at this point of travel were never better than they are today. The bridge is wide and solid enough to accommodate and well take care of all modern day traffic.

The contract for the building of this bridge was awarded May 25, 1929, to the Lutten Bridge Company, of York, Pa., with offices in Concord, this state, and who had done much work in New Hampshire. An account of the cost of this bridge appears elsewhere in this report.

The bridge was practically completed and in use November 20, when the grading up of the road approaches at either end was begun.

In the cost of building the new bridge the town and state shared the expense.
