9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Snow Removal.

10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Snow Removal Equipment Fund.

11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Observance of Old Home Day.

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Observance of Memorial Day.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Bridgewater School Board:

In accordance with the usual custom, I hereby submit a brief report of the activities of your school and the superintendent for the past two years.

In 1929, the Ashland Supervisory Union, of which Bridgewater has been a part for a number of years, was reorganized, so that now the Union consists of Ashland, Bridgewater, Groton, Holderness, Hebron, and New Hampton. I assumed my duties as superintendent of your schools in August of 1929. Since then I have managed to become acquainted with the geography of the various districts, with the school boards, the six groups of teachers, and the scholars. I have observed and studied the social, economic, and educational factors of the communities over which my duties extend.

I have secured and furnished textbooks and supplies for the teachers, scholars, and janitors. I have visited schools frequently and helped teachers with their classroom problems. Teachers' meetings have been called to discuss our problems. I have done all my office work without clerical assistance. I have attended board meetings in each of the six towns in our supervisory union. During the summer vacation, I have assisted in securing suitable teachers for the schools. These statements are made to inform the reader regarding the usual duties performed by the superintendent.

In the fall of 1929 I made a study of retardation, acceleration, and normal progress of the Bridgewater school children. I asked the teachers to make out age-grade tables of the year's enrollment of pupils. I used the tables to make a study of the school progress of children, from the point of view of yearly promotion.

All the children who made one grade a year for the number of years they have been in school, I considered as having made normal progress. The ones who skipped grades were considered accelerated, and the ones who have had to repeat were classified as retarded. The River Road School, with an enrollment of fourteen pupils had one retarded, none accelerated, that is, none unusually advanced for their age; and thirteen making normal progress. The Hill School, with an enrollment of six had three retarded, none accelerated, and three making normal progress.

During the fall term of 1929, intelligence tests were given in the two schools by the teachers under my direction. These tests helped us to find out whether or not the pupils were achieving in accordance with what we have a right to expect for their ability. We applied remedies in accordance with the needs of the individual pupils, as discovered by the tests, and the teachers' and superintendent's judgment.

Last June, one pupil, namely, William Hall of the River Road School, was graduated from the eighth grade. Appropriate exercises were held in the town hall before a large audience of interested citizens.

This year our graduating class has a larger number. The River Road School has four, the Hill School has one, and the Turn Pike School has one. With six graduates we ought to plan a program of unusual interest, and should look forward to it as the biggest event of the year in the Bridgewater schools.

Bridgewater should be proud of the fact that she has six pupils attending high school in Ashland. This is a large number considering the size of our school population. It speaks well for the interest of the community in secondary education. We have arrived at a point in

American life when anyone without a high school education is at a great disadvantage in his struggle for a living, and in his enjoyment of the institutions of life.

Last spring pressure was brought to bear on the school board to reopen the Turn Pike School. The people from that part of Bridgewater wished that their children be educated in town. In consequence of that demand the school was opened. It is taught by a normal school graduate, and has eight pupils. The school board has conducted three schools with the appropriations which were originally intended for two. At this writing we do not know just how much state aid, if any, Bridgewater may expect. In all probability the school board will call on the school district at the March meeting for sufficient funds to meet the extra expense. The expense is not great, for the opening of the Turn Pike School has eliminated the cost of transportation for eight pupils to Bristol, plus their tuition.

Some of the greatest needs of our schools as I see them are the following: jacketed stoves for a more comfortable and even room temperature; chemical toilets to eliminate the dangers that usually go with the old fashioned toilet arrangements; adjustable desks and chairs to fit the size of the pupil; and proper playground facilities for organized and supervised games. These improvements are in keeping with present day trends in education. A good way to bring them about would be to improve a school a year for a period of two or three years. Your children should be given equal educational advantages with the boys and girls of other communities throughout the country.

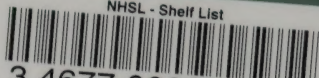
