

### REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

In submitting our annual report of schools to the town of Brookfield for the current year ending Feb. 29th, 1888, there is no long story to be told, but in accordance with the custom of previous years a simple statement, of such facts, as will best convey to the citizens of the town, the workings and results of our present school system, as well as the result of last year's work. We think the originators of this system regard all funds appropriated for educational purposes as Public Property, to be disseminated for the public good, without regard to sex, caste, nationality or color, to be participated in by an inherent right bestowed on us by the framers of our Democratic institutions. It has been proved beyond dispute that where the Church and Schoolhouse have stood side by side, each doing faithfully its respective work, one training the head, the other the heart, working in unison as the heads of a great family, there has been enjoyed the greatest amount of knowledge and enlightenment ever attained. Now if "Ignorance is the mother of vice" (and who can doubt it) how important that every man, and every woman, duly interested in the rising generation, especially their own offspring, should by every means in their power, seek to keep this great avenue to peace, prosperity and happiness, strictly guarded from all obstructions, or encroachments. We think the past year's experience has shown a growing interest in our own town, for when a call was made for funds to repair and improve the appearance of our school buildings, a noble and generous response was made by the citizens of the town, in creating funds for that purpose, and while expending these funds, has been attended by some perplexity, and anxiety, the work has resulted in good comfortable houses, well adapted for their purpose, and we hope satisfactory to the tax payers, and beneficial to all concerned, and while we may not expect such help as has been recently bestowed on our sister town of Wolfeborough, by the gift of the late public-spirited and Philanthropic, Mr. Brewster, we will use such means as are in our power, to obtain the highest good.

Three schools have been sustained during four months in the year, except in one instance, where, through the sickness of a

teacher, the term was shortened two days:

Three male, and three female teachers have been employed, and we think from examination, and common report, each has striven to do his, or her, work faithfully, and well. Four of

the employed were residents of Brookfield, Mr. Charles Colman, Mrs. Lizzie Lang, Miss Mary E. Colman, and Miss Hattie Goodhue, Lyman Clow, of Wolfeborough, and John Gage, of Wakefield; all except one had had experience, and all had attended Teacher's Institute, and sustain a good moral character, also an adaptation to teach, this we consider a natural gift, which may be improved by culture, but without which, no teacher can be fully successful.

A private school was sustained in the Hackett School House, during the fall, by Miss Lizzie Cate, a graduate of the State

Normal School, and native resident of this town.


