## TOWN WARRANT (LAST YEAR'S)

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield, in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock, in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles:

- 1. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose all the necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to defray Town charges.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for highways for the ensuing year and raise money for the same.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the maintenance of State Aid roads.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the maintenance of Town roads.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of the poor.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of the Town Library in addition to what is required by law.

- 9. To determine the method of collecting taxes the ensuing year.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for street lighting and to establish and maintain five or more lights for the ensuing year as per petition to the Selectmen.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to grade the hill in the highway leading to John J. Griffin cottage and raise money for same.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to buy one or more road scrapers and raise money for same.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to widen the road leading to the residence of Otis Wilson and raise money for the same.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to repair the road leading from Frank Underwood's residence to the so-called Sargent place and raise money for the same.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to widen the road near the so-called "Lumber Patch," near Farr's mill, and raise money for the same.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 to fight the pine blister.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to sell parts of the old road scrapers.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to have liquor agents to handle spirituous and malt liquors for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and scientific purposes.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100,00 in trust, to be known as the Charles L. Puffer trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Charles L. Puffer burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as the Jabez Puffer trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Jabez Puffer burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for purchasing of a bronze tablet to be placed on the front of the Town Hall as a memento of the boys who enlisted and were drafted for the war from this Town, said tablet to contain all the names and rank.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for the erection of a flag pole and purchase a flag for same.
- 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## **TOWN MEETING 1919**

At the annual meeting of the voters of the town of Chesterfield holden at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday the 11th day of March 1919:

The meeting was called to order and the warrant read by the Moderator L. D. Herrick at 9 a. m.

The articles of the warrant were disposed of as follows:

Article 1. For Town Clerk—A motion was made and accepted that the Moderator be instructed to cast one ballot for Burton C. Thatcher for Town Clerk, and he was declared elected by the Moderator.

For Selectman. Harold E. Randall had 62 votes and Harold E. Randall having all the votes cast was declared elected by the Moderator.

For Selectman. A motion was made and accepted that the clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for George  $\Lambda$ . Tuttle for selectman, and he was declared elected by the moderator.

For Selectman. A motion was made and accepted that the clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Chesley J. Cripps for selectman and he was declared elected by the moderator.

It was voted that the selectmen act as assessors.

For Town Treasurer. A motion was made and accepted that the clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for John A. Joslin for treasurer and he was declared elected by the moderator. A motion was made and accepted that the selectmen be instructed to purchase the treasurer's bond.

For Auditor. A motion was made and accepted that the

elerk be instructed to east one ballot for Ellon A. Safford for auditor and he was declared elected by the moderator.

For Road Agent (Spofford District). Fred O. C. Farr had 1 vote, Frank A. Pierson had 31 votes, Nelson H. Ball had 35 votes, and Nelson H. Ball having a majority of the votes cast was declared elected by the moderator.

For Road Agent (Center District). Walter G. Barrett had 41 votes and Charles Spaulding had 42 votes and Charles Spaulding having a majority of the votes cast was declared elected by the moderator.

For Road Agent (West District). Addison M. Brown had 66 votes and Addison M. Brown having all the votes cast was declared elected by the moderator.

For Constables. Charles Spaulding, Nelson H. Ball and Harold E. Randall were elected constables by a voice vote and it was so declared by the moderator.

For Sextons. John A. Joslin, Fred E. Atherton, George L. Brown, Ralph C. Royce, Edward L. Welcome, William D. Pierce and Charles A. Tuttle were elected sextons by a voice vote and it was so declared by the moderator.

For Surveyors of Wood and Lumber. Frank H. Foster, George F. Amidon and Frank M. Holman were elected surveyors of wood and lumber by a voice vote and it was so declared by the moderator.

For Fence Viewers. Fred O. C. Farr, Burton C. Thatcher and Harold E. Randall were elected fence viewers by a voice vote and it was so declared by the moderator.

For Trustees of the Public Library. Charles D. York was elected for 3 years, Chester M. Burnham for two years and Fred O. C. Farr for one year for trustees of the public library by a voice vote and it was so declared by the moderator.

For Trustees of the Trust Funds. David W. Slade was elected a trustee of trust funds for three years by a voice vote and it was so declared by the moderator.

Article 3. Town Charges. It was voted to raise and ap-

propriate the sum of two thousand dollars for town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 4. State Aid for Highways. It was voted to accept state aid for highways and to raise and appropriate sufficient moneys for the same.

Article 5. State Road Maintenance. It was voted to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to receive state aid for the maintenance of state aid highways.

Article 6. For Town Highways. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars said money to be expended by the road agents for the maintenance of highways.

Article 7. For Support of the Poor. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for the support of the poor.

Article 8. For the Support of Library. It was voted to indefinitely postpone this article.

Article 9. Collection of Taxes. It was voted that the collection of taxes and the appointment of collector be left to the board of selectmen.

Article 10. Street Lighting. A motion was made to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year. A ballot was called for, the result of the ballot was for the motion 77 votes, against the motion 6 votes, and it was declared by the moderator to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for street lighting and to establish and maintain new lights, as per petition to the selectmen.

Article 11. J. J. Griffin Road. A motion was made to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for repairing this road. A ballot was called for, the result of the ballot was, for the motion 53 votes, against the motion 18 votes, and it was declared by the moderator to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for repairs on the J. J. Griffin road.

Article 12. Road Grader. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 to purchase a road grader.

Article 13. For Repairing Otis Wilson Road. It was voted to indefinitely postpone this article.

Article 14. For Repairing Sargent Road. It was voted that the selectmen pay Moses H. Chickering the sum of \$25.00 to be used for repairing the Sargent road so-called.

Article 15. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to widen the road near Farr's mill so-called at West Chesterfield.

Article 16. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to prevent the pine blister.

Article 17. The Sale of Road Machines. It was voted to indefinitely postpone this article.

Article 18. Appointment of Liquor Agent. It was voted to indefinitely postpone this article.

Article 19. It was voted that the town accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Charles L. Puffer trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Charles L. Puffer burial lot in the Spofford cemetery.

Article 20. It was voted that the town accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Jabez Puffer trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Jabez Puffer burial lot in the Spofford cemetery.

Article 21. Memorial Tablet. It was voted to indefinitely postpone this article.

Article 22. Flag Pole. It was voted to indefinitely postpone this article.

Article 23. To Transact Any Other Business. No other business appearing it was voted to adjourn and was so declared by the moderator at 3.15 p. m.

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairing of highways and bridges.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for highways and appropriate sufficient money for same.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917, on a section of the Cheshire Road, so-called, and appropriate, or set aside from the amount raised for highway work the sum of \$1000 for this purpose.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for State highway maintenance.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of the poor.
  - 8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the

support of the Town Library in addition to what is required by law.

- 9. To determine the method of collecting taxes the ensuing year.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for street lighting and to establish and maintain two or more new lights for the ensuing year as by request to the Selectmen.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to grade the hill in the highway leading to John J. Griffiin's Camp and raise money for same.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to borrow a sum not exceeding Thirty Thousand Dollars, (\$30,000.00), and issue and sell bonds of the Town in an amount not exceeding Thirty Thousand Dollars, (\$30,000.00), the proceeds of said sale of bonds to be used for the construction and building of the entire Cheshire Highway in said Town. Said bonds are to be issued under the authority of and in conformance with the provisions of Chapter 43 of the Laws of 1895, and Chapter 129 of the Laws of 1917, and shall bear such rate of interest as may be determined by the Selectmen.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to repair the bridge at the foot of Pond Brook Hill, so-called, and raise money for same.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to repair the road leading to the Jackson Hill Farm, so-called, and raise money for same.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200 to fight the pine blister.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money for same.
- 17. To see if the Town wil' vote to buy a Memorial for their brave sons, who have defended their country's flag, and raise money for same.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 in trust, to be known as The Robertson Cemetery Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Robertson Cemetery near the former home of the late T. N. Robertson.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$500.00 in trust, to be known as The Henry Field's Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Henry Field's burial lot, in the Spofford Cemetery.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as The Carpenter and Fowler Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Carpenter and Fowler burial lot, in the Spofford Cemetery.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

We respectfully submit this our first annual report to the school board and citizens of Chesterfield.

Under the reorganization of the towns of the state in accordance with the provisions of the new school law, it was necessary to change the groups of towns in most of the districts. Chesterfield was included in Supervisory District No. 60, composed of Walople, Westmoreland, Alstead and Chesterfield. The new law went into operation the first of September. We found it rather difficult at that time to find teachers to fill the places on the teaching force. Mr. Smith endeavored to secure teachers, but owing to the scarcity and a call for teachers in his new district, he was not able to secure teachers for the upper rooms in Spofford and Chesterfield.

We believe that we shall be able to secure permanent teachers for all of the schools soon. The change in teachers in those grades where substitutes were necessary has caused some difficulty and made it impossible to begin a permanent policy in these schools. We hope that we shall be able, before the end of the year, to secure a permanent classification of the pupils and cover the work prescribed by the program of studies.

There has been no serious epidemic this year to interfere

with the work. The teachers, both substitutes and regular, have cooperated with the school authorities to make the work efficient.

The work of the superintendent in the schools has been constructive. The grading of the pupils has been perfected somewhat, but there must continue a flexible grouping to meet the needs of the individual schools and pupils. Eventually, we hope the pupils of all the schools will be doing the work as prescribed in the minimum standards of the state requirements.

It has been necessary to make changes in a few text books, and to secure more material for reading. These changes have been made to comply with the new state program, and the reorganization of the seventh and eighth grades on the junior high school plan. In the organization of the work in number we have followed the outline in the state program in the primary grades and are endeavoring to cover the essentials of arithmetic at the end of the first six grades. In the seventh and eight grades the work is of a practical nature, and includes the work in the geometry of form and practical measurements with the fundamental principles of algebra. English is being emphasized throughout all of the grades with special attention to English composition in the upper grades. Standard lists in spelling have been placed in the hands of the teachers and a rational method for teaching is given in the state program. A recent test of results in spelling has found the pupils up to grade in the schools at Chesterfield and West Chesterfield. We hope to secure the same results in the other schools. In reading there seemed to be a need of more and simpler reading material. The work as started by Mr. Smith has been continued. Good habits of reading are being established and much silent reading is being done. The library of the town is cooperating with the school in furnishing books for the pupils in the upper grades.

After the reorganization is completed, we hope to test the results in number, reading, spelling and hand-writing, and use the data secured to make the grading more definite.

I wish to commend the spirit of the teachers and to thank them for their cooperation. Upon them rests the greater part of the burden and responsibility. They are receiving larger salaries than last year. The range is from sixteen to twenty dollars per week, yet this is not enough to meet the demands of the times. We must meet the teachers in the same spirit that they are showing in their work. Their faithfulness to the best interests of the school and pupils should be matched by a willingness to contribute willingly to the support of the schools, that efficient teachers may be secured, and the schools maintained at a level of efficiency worthy of the town of Chesterfield.

We wish to thank the school board for their cooperation, and in the adjustment of the business transactions of the school district to meet the new school regulations prescribed by the state board of education. A new system of bookkeeping has been adopted which will give a more accurate classification of the expenditures of the school district, and make a closer articulation with the accounts of the state and those of the town. This was necessary because of the new plan for state aid in towns eligible for the same.

The new law has made the work of the school authorities more difficult this year. It is pioneer work, and most of it must be entirely new. It is a wonder that we can find any time for the actual supervision of the schools, when there are so many other duties in the new reorganization plan. After this year we hope to have a practical working school law second to none.

In the face of new conditions and unsettled times may we have the thoughtful consideration of the citizens of Chesterfield. The schools need the cooperation of the people and their support. The pupils are the hope of the town and the wards of the state, and the state would aid you in securing efficient schools that your children may be better citizens of the commonwealth.
