

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Greenville:

We herewith submit the following report:

For many years the Red Cross has furnished hot lunches for the pupils who remained at noon. This service has been appreciated and has meant much in special cases of undernourished children. The Board feels that the need is not so urgent this year with the many requests for assistance from the Red Cross.

A bill amounting to \$343.75 for tuition at Appleton Academy was not paid until after the accounts were closed in June. The total amount for high school tuition for 1931-1932 was \$2,326.85.

A pleasing entertainment was presented in the Town Hall by the seventh and eighth grades to earn money to defray the expenses of graduation. Mrs. Bennett and pupils deserve special commendation for assuming this responsibility which has previously been paid from the school funds.

Scarlet fever is prevalent. During the vacation the building is being thoroughly cleaned and fumigated and all books in the primary room burned in an effort to check the spread of the disease. These books will necessarily be replaced at additional expense.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I respectfully submit my tenth annual report as follows:

SCHOOL ORGANIZATION

There has been but one change in the teaching staff since last year. Miss Lucy Morgan left to be married and in her place we were fortunate in securing an able and experienced teacher in the person of Mrs. Dorothy Bennett.

SUPERVISION

In previous reports I have described the routine work of my office and have spoken frequently of the testing program. The work of the past year has followed similar lines and the results of the tests have been sent to the parents as was done last year.

Improvement in teaching through the use of standard tests is well illustrated by the experience we have had in *oral reading*, systematic records of which have been kept since the fall of 1927. The test used consists of a series of five stories of uniform length and difficulty, appropriate to the grade in which they are used, standardized for the number of seconds it takes pupils to read them, and also for the number of errors made. These five tests are given at equal intervals during the school year, spaced so that the final test comes the latter part of May. The tests are given to pupils individually by their own teacher, who thus has the results immediately available to guide her in adjusting her teaching to the difficulties of each pupil.

The following summary of results is for the Supervisory District as a whole, with from seventy to ninety children in each grade.

First Grade: Median number of seconds required in May, 1928, 70; in May 1932, 50; Standard score, 78.

Median number of errors made in May, 1928, 9; in May, 1932, 3; Standard score, 5.

Second Grade: Median number of seconds in May, 1928, 130; in May, 1932, 90; Standard score, 112.

Median number of errors in May, 1928, 10; in May, 1932, 4; Standard score, 6.

Third Grade: Median number of seconds in May, 1928, 87; in May, 1932, 57; Standard score, 63.

Median number of errors in May, 1928, $4\frac{1}{2}$; in May, 1932, $2\frac{1}{2}$; Standard score, 3.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

The annual medical inspection of the Public and Parochial Schools was made by Dr. Pease, assisted by Miss Morris in September and October. Their report shows the following results:

BUDGET

The sum recommended by the School Board to be raised by taxation is \$8,300, a reduction of \$859. from the amount raised last year. \$521 of this is the estimated balance for the end of this year, not anticipated when last year's budget was prepared. Reductions have been made in the estimated amount for various items in the budget where it seems possible to make such reductions. Total contracts for teachers' salaries the current year amount to \$3,751 and we anticipate a reduction in salaries in line with the general reduction throughout the state.

SCHOOL ECONOMY

The budget as printed and explained in the paragraph above represents a very thorough study on the part of the School Board and myself in an effort to discover all possible ways of economizing in the cost of maintaining schools without seriously injuring their efficiency. We believe that local as well as national efforts at economy must heed the warning voiced by President Hoover at the National Conference: "However the national economy may vary, or whatever fiscal adjustments may be made, the very first obligation upon the national resources is the undiminished financial support of the public school. We cannot afford to lose any ground in education. That is neither economy nor good judgment."

In closing this, my tenth year of service in this Supervisory Union, I wish to express my belief that our schools have made progress and to acknowledge the interest and cooperation of the parents and citizens generally, as well as of the School Board and teachers, which has made possible whatever advancement there has been. I trust that these conditions will continue to prevail and that the standards may be maintained in spite of the effects of economic conditions.
