

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



The total circulation for the year is 14,633 (or 335 in excess of last year) divided as follows :

The largest number of books issued in any one month was 1,462 in March, July being the smallest issue. The largest daily issue was on March 16, 165 books; the smallest was on Nov. 7, a stormy evening with no street lights when only 4 books were issued. The average daily issue is 49.

288 new books have been purchased during the past year, of which 183 were fiction, 105 miscellaneous.

Through the co-operation of teachers and the library a better class of reading is done by the children than formerly. Considerable effort has been made on the part of both to secure this result. Many books have been added along the line of nature study, history and travel which give valuable information in a form attractive for juvenile readers. If the influence of parents could be added to that of teachers and librarian, still greater results might be accomplished in developing a taste for good books.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Board of Education, Hinsdale, N. H.

I hereby submit for your consideration my first annual report of the condition and needs of the public school system of this town.

Since entering upon the work of supervision of the schools here, on the first of September, I have devoted much of my time and effort to obtaining a definite and thorough knowledge of the present organization, administration, and efficiency of the school system. The prosperous condition in which the schools were found speak volumes for the administration of my predecessor, Mr. Pratt, and for the efficiency of the teaching force. I find in charge of the schools a body of capable, enthusiastic, ambitious teachers who are laboring earnestly and loyally to promote the welfare of the schools. The children are interested in their work and ambitious to make the most of their opportunities, and are making reasonable progress in their studies.

The town has been fortunate in the comparative stability in the membership of its teaching force. Since September one change has been made. Miss Mary E. Mann on account of ill-health obtained a leave of absence, and Mrs. M. J. Osteyee, an experienced teacher, has been engaged to teach the school.

School visitation has occupied much the greater part of my time. On these visits I have conferred with the teacher about the work in general, and special problems in particular I have observed the character of the instruction, and have tested the ability of the pupils. By recommendation, advice, and counsel I have aided the teacher to more efficient work. I have attempted, and shall attempt, no revolutionary changes in the school work, but by a natural extension in one direction, and by a necessary elimination in another direction, by the reduction of waste time or effort through improper or entirely wrong methods, by the steady, persistent cooperation of teachers and superintendent I hope to bring about a continued improvement of the system. Time is necessary for securing the best results.

The regular attendance of children is necessary to successful progress in school work. We have had but one or two cases of illegal absence from school in which the intervention of the truant officer became necessary. During the fall term one school averaged 96% p.c., another school 95 p.c., four other schools 94 p. c., and in most schools but few tardy marks are recorded.

It is not many years since the school room instruction appealed almost entirely to the memory. History, geography and grammar were memorized by the pupils and problems in arithmetic were solved by the application of rules previously committed to memory. Reading lessons were regarded merely as exercises in pronouncing words. Little attempt was made to teach children to do independent thinking and reasoning.

There is much of the same kind of teaching to-day. Better ways are known, but it is hard to break away from previous practices. Moreover the child who glibly recites a memorized lesson *appears* to make a better recitation than he who more haltingly expresses his original thoughts and conclusions. But on the whole a better spirit pervades the work of to-day. The child's interest in the work is aroused and more joy and pleasure attends the doing of it. The reading of to-day without neglecting oral expression, has mainly in view the appreciation of the great thoughts of our best writers, the inculcation of the reading habit, and the development of a love for the best in literature, the mechanics of reading being mastered by the end of the fourth or fifth year.

In arithmetic many obsolete forms and subjects are eliminated and the pupil's energy is directed to an automatic mastery of the fundamentals and to skill in applying them to common business affairs.

In grammar all meaningless formalism is entirely eliminated and the simpler elements only are taught.

The geography work is no longer a study of dots and lines on a map, or a matter of reciting a catalogue of names, or of an "unrelated jargon of the names of capitals, capes or peninsulas," but it relates surface and climate to occupation, chief cities to their advantages of position, to their areas of supply, and to their commercial connections.

No serious case of discipline has been called to my attention. This evidence of more rational principles of school management is very gratifying. Teachers and parents no longer wish to break a child's spirit, but they try to hearten him, to develop his personality according to its natural bent. Good teachers do not scold or threaten, but are in sympathy with the child and make his work so pleasant that he pursues it with interest and pleasure.

This change in attitude in school management is responsible for the country-wide playground movement which has for its aim the provision of an adequate supply of playground apparatus and adult supervision of the periods of play. Such supervision eliminates quarreling, fighting, and swearing. It does away with the domination of the "bully" and permits every child to take part without molestation in healthful play. With the opening of pleasant weather in spring I hope to be able to make a beginning in this direction.

A recess period of well regulated plays and games under adult supervision "provides a period of healthful relaxation and recreation in place of the contamination of various degenerative tendencies, and in itself proves quite as educative as any other period of the day."

In all instruction we are not unmindful of the fact that it is the business of the school to teach children rather than subjects, and that the best product of the teaching art is a strong, noble character dominated by the spirit of service.

A course in handwork and manual training including cooking and sewing and wookwork in the upper grammar grades should be undertaken with the opening of a new school year. While a special teacher might be desirable, such a teacher is not essential. Results far better than nothing may be obtained by an enterprising teacher who is willing to make a beginning, and through her mistakes to learn better ways.

We have in our high school capable teachers and the school is in a healthy condition. The principal's report will give particulars as to progress and special needs.

Regarding the work in music I will quote the words of Miss Cummings :

"A boys' class in music has been formed in which are all the boys above the fifth grade. They show interest, and they have improved in syllable reading and time."

The girls' glee club in the high school has been working this year towards a piano fund.

It seems as though a new piano is needed more than anything else in the musical line for next year. The first five grades are nearer grade standard this year than before since I came. Rote songs are sung with expression and syllable singing is progressing.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT.

To the Board of Education :

In accordance with your request I herewith submit my report as principal of the Hinsdale High School.

School opened on September 3rd, 1912, with 19 pupils in attendance. Since that time three have left school; one to go to work, one on account of her family removing from town, and one for other reasons. There has been one addition to the school by the coming of a pupil from another town. Also one of last year's graduating class comes in every day to take post graduate work.

The present membership by classes is :

The small number in the high school this year is due largely, I think, to two causes: first, to the large number of pupils that left school before the end of the last school year; and second, to the failure of all of the graduating class at the Grammar School to enter this High School. Some going elsewhere to school and some going to work.

The percentage of the young people of the town who are of high school age and not attending school is very large. This is due in part to the numbers who leave school to go to work as soon as they reach the age limit as set by law when they can receive certificates permitting them to work in the mills and factories of the town.

The average daily attendance for the fall term was 16.24, and the per cent of attendance 93.92. So far during the winter term it has not been so good due chiefly to sickness. Every effort should be made by the parents to have their children regular in their school attendance, for their work suffers and the chances of the pupil's passing is lessened by absences; also the child should be made to see that his school work should always come first, and all other matters second. Except in very rare cases the child should never be tardy. Promptness is one of the things that a child should learn early in life.

Outside work is necessary for every pupil, and a minimum of two hours study at home every day is necessary. If any child spends less than that amount of time on his school work at home every day, the parent must realize that his work is being slighted and that the next report card w.llshow the results of such slighting. Any inquiries, information or suggestion from the parents in regard to the pupil's home or school work will be gladly received by the principal.

The method of ranking and of sending out report cards, at the end of every six weeks is the same as last year.

The course of study in the high school this year, found at the end of this report, is the same as that of last year. Some changes will probably be made before another year due to the changing of the requirements for approval of secondary schools by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Drawing, usually found in the work of the high school bas not been given this year, due to the resignation of the drawing teacher of last year and to the unsuccessful efforts at securing another to take her place. This defect in our program, I hope, can be overcome next year.

During the past year many much needed additions have been made to the school equipment; additions in the laboratory equipment and apparatus particularly. A large chemistry table has been installed in the chemistry laboratory. A number of pieces of apparatus have been added to the supplies of the physics department. These have all been necessary to the laboratory to do the experiments required by the approved course of study for secondary schools. At present the greatest handicap at the school, particularly in the science department, is the lack of running water in the building. All water used in the laboratories has to be brought in, in pails, by the students.

An addition has been made to the school library of a complete set of Dickens' works, bound in leather. This was won by the school in a contest run by one of the town merchants. I wish, at this time, to thank all of the citizens of the town who so liberally supported the school in this contest.

I wish to call attention to the work of the Glee Club, composed of the girls of the school. It is a very active organization and a great help to the school in many ways. Theresults they have attained speak well for them and for their director, their music teacher.

The attitude of the pupils towards their teachers and their school work is very good.

The small number of boys in the school makes it almost impossible to do much of anything in regard to athletic activities as a school.

We wish, at this time, to thank the music teacher for her good work, also to thank the assistant teachers for their very willing co-operation and faithfulness at all times, and the superintendent and board of education for their advice and help.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hinsdale, Qualified to Vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects :—

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see if the town will vote to accept and adopt the report of the Selectmen, Auditors, and other town officers.

Article 3. To choose all other necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of ordinary town charges, for the support of the poor, for the maintenance of the fire department, for lighting the streets, and for all other necessary expenses arising within the town.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to ask for state aid for permanent highway and raise and appropriate the required sum of money for same, or act in any manner thereon. Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars for maintenance of State Highway under the provisions of the automobile law or act thereon.

Article 7. To see what action the town will take in regard to the depot St. Bridge, or pass any vote in relation thereto.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for laying the dust on the streets near the town hall and school buildings in the village, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to place and maintain one street light on Cream Pot Hill between the roads leading to Chas. F. Polly's and F. C. Sargeant's or act in any manner thereon.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to place and maintain one street light on Chesterfield road between the houses of Mrs. Jeffords and F. J. Veber or act thereon.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary for the building of a road from Prospect St. near house of Samuel Liscom thence southerly to and connecting with River road or act, in any manner thereon.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to lower fire pipe on Northfield St. where grade of road has been changed or act in any manner thereon.
