NOTES FROM THE SELECTMAN

We take this opportunity to review for the residents of the Town of New London a few highlights of the year just past. Inasmuch as each department has an individual report in this book, our comments shall be brief.

The District Court has now completed its first full year under the jurisdiction of Judge George O. Shovan. Our court and its Justice have served the people of the district well and each of us can take pride in the accomplishments.

1970 was the year that, as voters, you authorized a Deputy Town Treasurer. This appointment was filled by Richard N. Brady.

The Conservation Committee has worked diligently to acquire new lands and easements that all citizens of New London will enjoy for years to come.

Considerable preliminary work has been done on the Elkins Beach property, under the guidance of an appointed committee of New London residents.

This year we have watched the construction of and witnessed the completion of our new United States Post Office on Gould Road. Each of us awaits moving day.

In August we accepted the resignation of our Police Chief, Mr. Emmerton. Officer Walter Reney was appointed Acting Chief and in December elevated to Chief.

1970 was the year of repeal for the Stock in Trade tax. While more than \$400,000.00 evaluation was removed from our tax roll, we are pleased to report that the Town still shows an increase in evaluation of one-half a million.

The vacancy created by the resignation of Gerald C. Prescott, chairman of the Board of Selectmen, necessitated the appointment of a new member to the Board. Mrs. Donald L. Muller was appointed to this office for the balance of

Mr. Prescott's term. Mrs. Muller came to your Board of Selectmen after having served six years on the Planning Board.

Another first for New London came with the ground-breaking of a Planned Unit Condominium on the Brocklebank property.

Building starts and additions this year indicate to your Selectmen that 1971 will again reflect the continuing growth that the Town has enjoyed in the past.

In conclusion, we wish to extend thanks to the many departments, committees and individuals that have worked long hours in behalf of their community, and especially to our new secretary, Mrs. Joseph Ryan, who works long hours on our behalf.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-Four Thousand dollars (64,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing a certain parcel of land situate on the Main Street across from the Kearsarge Telephone Company and for the erection of a building thereon to be occupied by the New London Fire Company, and to raise said sum by authorizing the Selectmen to borrow the same in the name of the Town by the issuance of serial notes or bonds, as provided in Chapter 72, Revised Laws, as amended, and for this purpose, to authorize the Selectmen to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest of such notes or bonds and to provide for the sale of the same.

This sum to be raised by the issuance of not exceeding \$14,500.00 in serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto) and to authorize the selectmen or other legally authorized representatives to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the town of New London and pass any vote relating thereto.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$34,000.00 for the study and design of replacement and new sanitary sewers within New London proper (area presently sewerred), including such land acquisition, easements, rights-of-way, surveys and borings as are required. This sum to be raised by the issuance of not exceeding \$34,000.00 in serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto) and to authorize the selectmen or other legally authorized representatives to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the town of New London and pass any vote relating thereto.

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,000.00 for the study and design of new sanitary sewers, with pumping station and appurtenances, for the Job Seamans Acres-Birch Acres area of New London, including such land acquisition, easements, rights-of-way, surveys and borings as required. This sum to be raised by the issuance of not exceeding \$18,000.00 in serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the Municipal Finance Act

(Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto) and to authorize the selectmen or other legally authorized representatives to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the town of New London and pass any vote relating thereto.

31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$31,500.00 for a study and report on proposed new treatment plant located south of Elkins village, including such land acquisition, easements, rights-of-way, surveys and borings as are required. This sum to be raised by the issuance of not exceeding \$31,500.00 in serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto) and to authorize the selectmen or other legally authorized representatives to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the town of New London and pass any vote relating thereto.

32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Sewer Commission to apply, negotiate and do all things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available in the construction of a sewerage disposal system, and pass any vote relating thereto.

33. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes if deemed necessary by the Selectmen.

REPORT OF THE TRUST FUNDS OF THE TOWN OF NEW LONDON, N. H.

On March 1, 1970, the 292 Cemetery Funds, the Ministerial Fund and the Heidelberg Prize Speaking Fund were combined into the newly created Common Fund as provided for under N.H.-R.S.A. chapter 31-27.

This action was taken to obtain the higher rate of return available during the past year and provide for possible growth of income in the future. As a result, income from all Funds for 1970 increased by \$968.62 or nearly 10%.

It is the opinion of your Trustees that it would be practical to discontinue publishing the report on each individual cemetery fund in future town reports. If this does not meet with your approval will you so notify any one of the Trustees. If a reasonable number of objections are received the reports will continue to be published.

A report on any Fund may be obtained at any time from the Treasurer of Trust Funds.

1970 has been a busy year for the Trustees and Staff of the Tracy Memorial Library. A revision and updating of the library policies was done by the Trustees and new ones were adopted in March. The increasing need for a wider representation of the citizens on the Board together with the need to share the work load of the three Trustees becomes more and more apparent. The great need for more shelf space for books has been evident for some time. Consultations regarding this project were held by the Trustees.

After the Town voted so generously at the 1970 Town Meeting to make funds available for the repair of the roof, this was done, together with the necessary plastering and painting to repair the damage caused by the leaking roof. A 3M photo copier was purchased in March and is proving of use to the Library and townspeople. A floodlight has been installed and the front of the building is now illuminated in the evening.

During the past year 225 new adult books and 112 children's books have been purchased. 1,009 books have been borrowed from the Extension Services of the State Library on the three Bookmobile visits. 62 requests for special books for our patrons have been obtained from the State Library

and 16 on Interlibrary loan. Our Library has loaned books to other libraries on request.

A number of the Grades from the Central School have arranged for a specific time to use the Library for reference material. Special Classes and Grades I visit weekly, a film showing follows a story period for some of the pupils. 23 films have been borrowed from the State Extension Department — 318 books have been loaned to the Central School — Nursery School 10 — Williams Kindergarten 64. Films have also been requested and obtained for the kindergarten.

Story hour on Saturday afternoon for the pre-school children took place for the first three months of the year — Total attendance of 50. Due to unforeseen circumstances this program was not held this past winter. The Vacation Reading Club program was again led by Mrs. Loring Grimes. This culminated with a party for the children completing the course. A film was shown and refreshments were served by the Librarians. Special prizes of new books were given for various individual accomplishments.

The Senior Citizens continue to meet at the Library Wednesday mornings for an informal chat and coffee. They seem to enjoy these visits.

A number of other groups have used the Tracy Library in the past year for their meetings and are most welcome. The Woman's Club, New London Service Organization, Garden Club, and Trustees of the Trust Fund have met in the Auditorium.

A Friends of the Library group was formed in March and we are grateful for their assistance during the annual celebration of National Library Week in April. Virginia Van Delft and Susan Rumsey created an exciting original display for this event. Exhibits in the Auditorium during the past year have included works of local artists and needlework of local craftswomen. Models made by the students in the

Social Studies class of the New London Middle School were on display. These related to their study of the Middle Ages.

Mrs. Dorothy Kimball, a substitute at the Library during the past year, has been appointed Assistant Librarian.

During the summer, Miss Ellen Johnson, a Library Science student, was employed to bring the children's catalogue up to date.

In July the Statewide Borrower's Card was initiated at all libraries which are members of the Statewide Development Program. Tracy Library now has these available upon request.

The Tracy Memorial Library is indebted to the New London Garden Club members who have generously contributed time, labor and a considerable amount of money to begin the renovation of the garden behind the Library. Their yearly gift of books is appreciated. We have received 50 books, a number of magazine subscriptions, and recordings as gifts. We thank all these donors for their continued interest in the Library.

In October Mrs. Weston Ray presented her resignation as Librarian, effective on January 1, 1971. Because of Mrs. Ray's twenty-eight years of dedicated service to the Tracy Library, it was with reluctance that the Board of Trustees acceded to her wishes. She has been unstinting in her efforts to stimulate the love of reading among the children and townspeople, and tireless in her administration of the Library. We earnestly hope that improved health will allow her to enjoy many happy years of retirement. Appreciation is also extended to her husband, Mr. Weston Ray, for his faithful discharge of his duties as custodian.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT COURT

The Legislature by its action effective June 28, 1969, created the New London District Court (RSA 502-A:1 XVIII-a) as a new Judicial District consisting of the Towns of New London, Wilmot, Newbury, and Sutton.

It has original criminal jurisdiction subject to appeal of all crimes and offenses committed within the confines of the District which are punishable by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars or imprisonment not to exceed one year, or both. In the case of major crimes the District Court has jurisdiction to commit to jail or bind over with sufficient sureties to the Superior Court all persons charged with offenses exceeding its jurisdiction to try. The Court is also vested with exclusive jurisdiction over neglected and delinquent children.

Said Court has concurrent jurisdiction with the Superior Court of civil actions for damages in which the damages claimed do not exceed fifteen hundred dollars, the title to real estate is not involved and the plaintiff or defendant resides within the District. It has exclusive jurisdiction over litigation of small claims, defined as a right of action in which the debt or damages do not exceed two hundred dollars (RSA 503:1).

The case load of the Court for the calendar year ending December 31, 1970, was 396 compared with the case load of the previous year of 299 and consistent with the State as a whole is increasing rapidly.

There is strong indication that the present Legislature will further increase the jurisdiction of District Courts to relieve the congestion in the Superior Courts.

The Statute (RSA 502-A:7) requires the Justice of the District Court to appoint a Clerk of Court. Miss Margaret Abbott has been appointed to that office. The office of Special Justice has not been filled by the Governor and Council.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Most of your Police Department activities have increased since 1969. The one area that has decreased was in total motor vehicle stops which was down 86 from 842 in 1969 to 756 in 1970. We had 42 accidents in 1970 to 41 in 1969, 27,007 property checks in 1970 to 8,654 in 1969. 378 properties were found open in 1970 to 219 in 1969, and 19 criminal cases were investigated in 1970 with 7 of these cases closed.

In 1971 I hope we can influence the people of New London to help us. By this I mean that if you see anything that looks suspicious or if you see something actually happen, no matter what time of day or night, please call the Police Department at 526-4061. We do not care if it turns out to be anything or not, if you don't call we will never know and we don't mind false alarms. Also feel free to call us anytime for anything else we might be able to help you with — after all, we work for you.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture. To bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to prior to 9:00 A.M. and after 5:00 P.M with the following exceptions:
Commercial or industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.
2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children. Keep matches out of reach of children. This action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?
3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help," and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.

REPORT OF THE TOWN HEALTH OFFICER

The year 1970 was involved and challenging for me as your Health Officer. In February of 1970 with the expert authority of Dr. John Norris, a three evening session of Food Handling and Sanitation was held in the Town of New London for all those involved in this area. We certainly appreciated those that were concerned. I would like to thank Dr. Norris for the fine program he presented. This was a new venture and we hope to continue periodically with this type of program.

A total of 38 individual septic systems were inspected which involved several visits to these systems while being

constructed and at the end of completion. These individual systems are not only a very important concern to myself, but also to the Selectmen of New London. All systems should be constructed properly so they will function for many years and that the individuals involved should not be put through financial burdens. On October 15, 1970, a letter was written to me by the Selectmen stating that all septic tanks must have plans submitted to the State Water Pollution Commission for approval. This regulation is presently being enforced.

This year the survey of the lakes in the Town of New London were inspected in this manner. A visual inspection of all septic systems around Pleasant Lake and Messer Pond, plus Bacteriology testing of the water were accomplished. Big Lake Sunapee, Little Lake Sunapee, Otterville and Otter Pond had Bacteriology examination of the water. I hope to alternate each year on these lakes so that every other year visual inspections shall be made. Bathing areas are examined many times during the year. All the Survey reports have been made to the proper officials involved. During the latter part of the summer with the advice of the Selectman the Otter Pond bathing area was closed down to swimmers because of the high Coliform Count in the water. The causes for the high count have been discovered and are being corrected. We hope the beach area meets the safe count for this coming year; a close observation will be made.

With the help of the New London Highway Department a new area for the sewage dumping pit was found and the old dumping pit was buried and the entrance blocked off. This new area is much more efficient.

In addition to the above duties I have carried out the following responsibilities, investigation of complaints, inspection of camps, schools and others.

Water samples from Morgan Pond were checked continuously throughout the year and were found to be in excellent condition.

I have been in close touch with our District State Health Inspector and also the state officials for many problems that did occur in 1970.

Dr. Donald W. Clark will give his report as our Medical Consultant and Dr. Richard Rodgers will give his report of the Rabies Clinic.

Again, I would like to express my appreciation to the representatives of the Town, and to the many people of the Town for their assistance and cooperation. Please, feel free to call me if you have any questions regarding the Health Department.

Over the years, the Town Health Officer has had a varying degree of responsibility. At first it was a local physican's job, but he became too busy to bother with inspections of dumps, restaurants, septic systems or to collect data to report to the State concerning diseases. With more physicians, public clinics and immunizations diminished as these were taken care of in the doctor's office. Placards for quarantinable diseases outlived their usefulness with the advent of antibiotics. The Town Health Officer's work became perfunctory, and often not carried through.

Now his work is becoming more important again. Under the pressures of a public gradually waking up to the onrush of population, a mobile society, and so many local and distant sources of pollution, he is asked to put teeth in the public's insistence that health laws be enforced.

The Health Officer must be responsible, impartial, and insistent. He must complement other agencies in the community working for better business, education, housing, water supply, sewage disposal, recreation, etc.

The physicians in a community, so busy with personal medical services, need to supplement the Health Officer's position with regard to inspections, reporting of disease, etc., but also to provide a source of information to the public. The Health Officer must deal with people and businesses who wilfully or through ignorance contribute to spread of disease or environmental pollution. While the rights of individuals need protection, enforcement of regulations will help to control those whose activities threaten the public health.

In the past year, presumably because of childhood immunizations, measles, whooping cough, diphtheria, tetanus typhoid, tuberculosis, polio, and smallpox have all but disappeared. Mumps and German measles are quite uncommon. Chickenpox, the common cold, and other virus illnesses have continued unabated, since there are no effective immunizations for them. Hepatitis has spread more widely though infrequently in our community. Venereal diseases have perceptibly increased. Streptococcal infections, with immunizations available, have become extremely frequent. Influenza has been prominent recently and will pass soon.

In the coming year, the Health Officer and Board of Health will continue efforts to encourage the Town to take action necessary to safeguard public health. This will be directed at individuals, where proper attention will help him and the public. It will encourage proper control of water supply, individual and public sewage and refuse disposal. It will assist in those seeking information about available services for health care.

As a point of information to the Town, there will be a new man coming to New London, in a training capacity for the first year, known as a Medex. He will ultimately be em-

ployed as a physician's assistant. With many years of experience in the Armed Services Medical Corps, he will be able to do many things to assist in the care of patients under a doctor's express direction, so as to speed up the delivery of medical care. In no sense does he replace a physician or become a physician on his own, but does the things he is trained to do by his physician-employer to improve the handling of people's problems.

1970 was another busy year for the Planning Board. Due to the work load, the Board met twice a month. The compiling and revising of the Zoning and Sub-division regulations was completed and have been printed. The Board reviewed several site plans as well as handling numerous matters relating to zoning, some of which were referred to the Zoning Board. ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment held open hearings on the following appeals:

June 4, 1970 — An appeal was heard from Lakeside Lodge for a special exception to Article 12, Section B, of the Zoning Ordinance. Mr. Henry Herz wanted to take down the old Lodge building and replace it with one building con-

taining seven housekeeping units. The request was granted, provided the sewer system meet the standards of the Water Pollution Commission.

The United States Post Office Department requested a permit under Article II, Section 9, to erect an oversize sign at the construction site of the new Post Office. The request was denied under Section 9, but permitted for a six month period under Section 10.

June 15, 1970 — John and Susan Nelngailis requested and was granted permission to build a tool shed on their property which is in the residential and conservation zones. This was heard under Article IV, Section A.

Anna Parks, agent for Lake Sunapee Country Club, requested a variance for a gift shop at Pitch and Putt, under Article 10, Section B. The variance was denied.

October 15, 1970 — Lake Sunapee Country Club requested a variance under Article II, Section 9. The request was for an oversize sign. The Zoning Board does not have authority to permit any sign which exceeds the limit of the zoning regulations. The request was denied.

Arthur Prescott requested and was granted permission to enlarge the kitchen facilities and serving area of the Gray House.

Robert T. Cottrill, High Pines Lodge, asked permission, under Article IV, Section A, to remodel the Lodge for residential use, reducing the commercial usage to two units. Permission was granted with the understanding that the sewer system be approved by the New London Board of Health.

December 30, 1970 — The Lake Sunapee Country Club asked for and was granted a permit to enlarge their dining and kitchen facilities.

Harriet Buker requested a special exception to Article IX, Section A. She wanted to subdivide her land via the Planned Unit Development concept. She also needed permission to use non-contiguous land in this development. Her appeal was granted.

January 6, 1971 — Camp Wallula, Inc., requested a determination to be made concerning Article IV, Section A. The request was for a permit to make a two family home out of the main lodge at Camp Wallula. The permit was granted.

SEWER COMMISSIONERS REPORT

1970 was a busy year for the Sewer Commission with notable improvements being made in the existing plant operations, completion of the nutrient removal portion at our plant, TV survey of portions of our sanitary sewers as well as replacement of some of our existing sewer lines.

We have repaired or replaced portions of our mechanical equipment at the treatment plant to insure efficient operation of the plant until such time as it is replaced. Various pieces of testing equipment were purchased this year to aid the plant operator in his work, thus improving the quality of the effluent discharged from the plant.

Considerable time has been spent with the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission and our engineering consultants, Anderson-Nichols & Co., Inc., discussing a course of action for the improvement in our sanitary sewers and treatment plant. Out of these hours of discussion has come our request for funds for improvements and extension of services as itemized in the Warrant Articles.

WATER SYSTEM PRECINCT**

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the inhabitants of the New London Water System Precinct: We take this opportunity to report on the activities of your Water Department for the year 1970.

Early in the year, with winter nearly over, we had one frozen service. A State highway grade change was the contributing factor and a relocation has been made.

Meters were installed in three multi-use buildings. The department added seven new services, one of which is to the new United States Post Office building. Five old services were replaced. A six inch service was installed for the new Extended Care Unit presently under construction at the New London Hospital.

Two new six inch mains were put into service during 1970. The first, one thousand twenty feet in length was installed between Twin Lake Villa and Hide-Away Lodge.

This replaced an old two inch line which had been in use many years. One new hydrant was installed terminally on this line. Two areas of ledge were encountered and we had a crossing of Kidder Brook. Secondly, a six inch main, three hundred forty-seven feet in length, was installed on Seaman's Road which replaced an older three inch line.

During the past summer over seventy-five hydrants of our one hundred and two received a fresh coat of paint. One older hydrant on Pleasant Street was replaced by a new steamer nozzle type.

Early in the summer a forty-two pound beaver was trapped on the brook after considerable havoc and dam building. Three additional beaver were trapped in the watershed area later in the year.

We wish to report a few of the ecological efforts of your department. The holdings of the precinct in the Morgan Pond area number some one hundred and ninety acres. Additional acreage is owned completely around the pond for a depth of one hundred feet. This is further enhanced by timber cutting control for another four hundred feet beyond the owned shoreage. Fifty foot rights on either side of the brook protect the delivery of water nearly two miles to the reservoir.

With the help of three high school students we were able to cut the growth of alders and brush, tear out old beaver dams and clear our vehicle roads during the summer months. This must be done periodically to provide aeration and sunlight, also to discourage beaver migrations to the watershed area. The total length of clearing was over six miles.

In April of 1970 the State of New Hampshire Department of Public Works gave a parcel of land to the water department. This lot is adjacent to the New London State Highway shed. We anticipate its use for a water department building in the near future.

Our construction plans for the coming year are to replace twelve hundred feet of old three inch main with new high pressure six inch. This will be on the Crockett Corner-Sutton Road. Three small hydrants on this line will be replaced by the standard regulation size.

At the time of this report, applications have been made for three new house services and two new six inch extensions within the precinct. Additional work is scheduled on number two reservoir, not yet completed. Again we hope to update several of the older hydrants and install gate valves ahead of others presently without same (which as a point of interest, were part of the WPA program in the 30's and a budgetary exclusion).

Whether the General Court enacts new laws governing the use of snomobiles over ponds for water supply, reservoirs and other holding basins, we anticipate having to post these impounded water areas under our control. This will be done as a precaution to ensure the precinct's water supply against certain risks.

In conclusion we wish to report the ever present need of the department to flush the system several times during the year for quality control. Normally, the first will be immediately after the closing of regular classes at Colby Jr. College in June, and secondly after the leaves have fallen in October. Conditions over which we have no control may warrant additional flushings.

ANNUAL REPORT

During 1970, the New London Hospital was left a sizeable legacy in the will of Eleanor H. Lovett, including \$10,000 as a gift to the Hospital library, \$25,000 unrestricted, one building, and one-half of the residue of the estate.

The Long-Range Planning Committee, headed by Carl Swinnerton, reported that there is striking evidence that the population of the hospital community will be tripled in the next thirty years and suggested that aside from the extended care unit, the hospital must triple its capacity in that time. The committee feels that it can serve the region best by remaining a good general hospital and leave the super-specialties to the larger, established centers such as those in Hanover.

Hospital Day was extremely successful this year, with a net total of \$24,307.00. Grateful thanks are extended to the Chairman, Thomas F. Baird, and his Co-chairman, Howard Moody, and all the many town and committee chairmen. The Board is currently holding discussions on a master plan for Hospital Day in an attempt to make it easier for future chairmen.

The Summer Residents Association, Mrs. John Graham, Chairman, deserves many thanks for the gift of \$5,509.75 for the purchase of new equipment including such items as a Cardiac Monitor, a Surgilift transfer stretcher, a Zimmer Traction Frame plus accessories, and other items.

Due to increased costs, approval was given for an increase in room rates of \$54-58 per day for a private room, \$45 for a two-bed room, and \$37 for a four-bed room, bringing our hospital closer in line with the rates charged in hospitals elsewhere in the New Hampshire-Vermont area.

In July, clearing was done in the area of the Extended Care Unit on a cost-plus basis, and in August the bids were opened for the ECU, the contract being awarded to the firm of Bion E. Reynolds Contracting, Inc., the lowest bidder. They hope for a completion date of July 31, 1971, and started work on the building immediately. A contract was entered into with the Maine Surgical Supply Co. for the furnishing of the ECU, and a loan has been secured through the efforts of John Kiernan and John Ballin for the remainder of the money necessary to complete the building. Progress has been steady and it is expected that the opening date goal will be reached. The building committee, with George Wells, Chairman, Harold Welch, Joseph Dobson, Joseph Fleming, Henry Kidder, Kenneth Sherman and Bradford White, has contributed many hours to this project and deserves our deep appreciation. Mr. Francis C. Gallup has been named administrator of the ECU.

Dr. Anne Wasson is on a leave of absence from the Hospital Staff for service in Hyden, Kentucky, and the following four doctors have been accepted on the staff: Dr. Donald Catino, consulting privileges in internal medicine; Dr. Kenneth Watson Jones, use of the laboratory and X-ray facilities covering the emergency department with admission privileges; Dr. Lendon Snedeker, honorary member; Dr. Vincent P. Marran, oral and plastic surgery.

RABIES CLINIC

This is to report that I ran the second Town Rabies Clinic for Pets on May 1, 1970. We vaccinated 101 dogs and 3 cats at that time. These Clinics are run every three years to offer the taxpayers of New London an opportunity to have their pets vaccinated with a three year Rabies Vaccine which is required by State law for licensing all dogs three months and older.

I wish to commend the Town for sponsoring these Clinics every three years, and to my knowledge we are one

of the few Towns in the State offering this type of an arrangement. Most communities do not sponsor the Clinics and they are run by private individuals or service organizations. By having the Town support this program the dog owners of New London are receiving a reduced rate on the vaccine.

I personally keep a list of all tags that are handed out and with the number we can easily locate, in many cases, a dog who has strayed from home to a neighbor or some other part of town.

NEW LONDON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

In June, 1970, the New London Chamber of Commerce was incorporated in accordance with state laws by a group of interested citizens for the purpose of maintaining and preserving the high economic, professional, and cultural quality of New London.

At the present time there are 40 members. Any business firm, individual, association, corporation, partnership, or estate sharing similar civic interests is eligible for membership.

Since its incorporation, the Directors have met weekly. The Chamber of Commerce has sponsored its first annual breakfast for the benefit of the New London Hospital, with a net profit of \$267; discussed with the Public Service Company removing overhead wires from Main Street and obtained cost estimates; prepared a condensation of the Anderson-Nichols report on the town sewer system; and prepared a map

for the use of tourists, businessmen, and merchants. A supply of the maps will be made available at the Information Booth.

The Chamber of Commerce is now responsible for the management of the Information Booth, and has provided a bulletin board in the new Post Office which will be for the exclusive use of townspeople, with no commercial advertising.

The organization has sponsored open meetings to discuss ways of handling the rising incidence of shoplifting, and the proposed new sewer system. There will be additional open meetings in the future.

It is anticipated that the Chamber of Commerce will become an increasingly important instrument for the presentation of concrete opinion on town affairs from the merchants' and businessmen's viewpoints. It will cooperate with all administrative groups to support the best interests of the town.

Initial promotion of any new program is the most difficult period. Our accomplishments during this first year of operation have been enthusiastically received, and the cooperation of many friends augurs well for the future. Your participation in our efforts will be appreciated for New London, both by reputation and potential, can be one of the model communities of the State.
