To the inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Pilgrim Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers, for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for permanent improvement of highways made under the law passed January session, 1905. 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same; and determine in what manner the same shall be expended.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the extermination of the Gypsy and Brown Tail Moths, and take any action in relation thereto.

6. To choose two persons for three years for Trustees of Cemeteries.

7. To choose one person for Trustee of Public Library for three years.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Cemeteries for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the Town will vote to build a Town Hall building, and if voted in the affirmative, to see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the same. Also to choose Agents or Committees to carry the same into effect, or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent. on tax list of 1913, paid on or before Sept. 1, 1913.

12. To see if the Town will vote to sell the Searles

place, and if voted in the affirmative, to choose Agent or Agents to sell and convey the same.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting including appropriation of money for Memorial Day.

TRUANT OFFICER'S REPORT

In March, 1912, Mr. Harold S. Frost was appointed Truant Officer by the School Board. He has performed his duties satisfactorily, has visited each school as requested, returned the number of scholars, and if those who should be in school were not there, has reported the reason, and seen that they returned as soon as possible.

MUSIC TEACHER'S REPORT

Teaching music in mixed schools of all grades is a problem not met with in graded schools where you get the attention of a class doing the same work for a period.

I was furnished an outfit consisting of fifteen First Readers of the New Educational Music Course, a Teacher's Edition of the same, five Primary Plans books, a staff liner. ruler, four blocks of practise paper, twentyfive cents' worth of ruled music paper and a pencil, and asked to teach an hour a week in each school.

I left one of the readers and a Primary Plans book with each teacher. These were further supplemented by the teachers of No. 1, 2, 3, and 5 buying a copy of the Teacher's Edition for themselves. The other books I carried around with me.

After the sixth lesson I divided each school into what was practically two classes, the second being made up of small children and monotones. At the end of the fall term of twelve weeks the first class had learned nine rote songs, six voice drills, one breathing exercise, twenty-six terms of notation and were reading in the key of C, by note, letter and numeral.

The second class was taking part in the breathing exercise and voice drills with more or less intelligence, could draw the staff and make whole notes, half notes, quarters, eighths, and the rests.

They had also learned two note songs of their own and several exercises.

There was marked improvement in the monotones.

The second term I continued with the classes divided as before, taking more about the formation of the major scale, the chromatic scale and both forms of the minor scale, the melodic and harmonic.

At the end of the second term the second class in each school, excepting No. 5 where little folks were kept home from sickness or cold weather, has learned ten rote songs and twelve exercises.

In September there were twenty-six monotones; now there are eighteen, several of whom are improved.

The first class, excepting in No. 4, have learned two breathing exercises, twenty-five voice drills, four two-part melodies, twenty-five rote songs, and can read by note in five and six keys.

No. 4 has had the same, excepting not so many voice drills, fourteen rote songs, and has read in three keys.

Considering that a very small percentage of the

children had taken music lessons, and had had no instruction in singing heretofore, it is an advancement of which any teacher might be proud.

My plan for the coming term is to divide them into three classes, taking up the voice drills and beginners first twenty minutes; second class, twenty-five minutes, the last fifteen minutes being devoted to the first class, which has been reviewing while the second class was in operation.

With my first classes I shall take up the transposition of the scale and some simple rules of harmony.

This class will number thirteen in No. 1 school, eighteen in No. 2, eleven in No. 3, seven in No. 4, and eleven in No. 5, respectively.

Introducing music into the schools seems to have met with general favor, judging from the messages of encouragement sent me by parents from all parts of the town.

Mr. Berry wrote upon this subject, printed in an old town report: "Musical culture is an efficient aid in securing good order, and in imparting refinement to school life."
