TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(SEAL) To the inhabitants of the Town of Sunapee in the County of Sullivan in said state, qualified to vote in Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at I. O. O. F. Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To elect a Town Clerk for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Town Treasurer, Board of Selectmen, Water Commissioners, Auditors, Agents and Committees or other Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To elect one Selectman for three years and all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to pay the outstanding debts and interest on its notes and bonds and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to defray Town Charges for the year ensuing and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to repair Highways and Bridges for the year ensuing and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will raise Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) (The State to give a like amount) To maintain its trunk line Highways and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will raise Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) (The State to give a like

amount) To maintain its State Aid Highway and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will raise Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) (The State to give a like amount) For Trunk Line construction on the Sunapee Lake Road and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917 on a section of the Sunapee Lake Road so-called, and appropriate or set aside from the amount raised for Highway work the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for this purpose.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (500.00) to improve the road leading to the new Club House on North Point so-called and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to finish the Mountain View Lake Road so-called and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for electric lights and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to maintain its fire department and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 15. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the maintenance of its public library and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 16. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of the District Nurse and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 17. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the care of its cemeteries and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to co-

operate with the Towns of New London and Newbury, to advertise Lake Sunapee, each Town to raise or appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for this purpose and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 19. To see what the action the Town will take in regard to changing the Town water system so that it will do away with the heavy air pressure and the surcharge of air in the town water, raise and appropriate money for the same and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town of Sunapee, N. H. will look after the fences and keep them in repair hereafter on the East, North and West sides of the village burying ground near the old church if the fences are satisfactorily repaired.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to lay out a Highway connecting Central St. and Main St. across the Post Office lot and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 22. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to continue permanent sidewalk construction in the center of the Town and repairs for the sidewalk at Georges Mills and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 23. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to co-operate with the State in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 24. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for participation in the Centennial Celebration of Sullivan County, authorize the Selectmen to pay the same to the Treasurer of the County Committee, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to license junk dealers and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 27. To see what sum of money the Town

will raise for the observance of Old Home Week and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 28. To see what action the Town will take regarding the purchase of a truck and plow for use in breaking and repairing highways, raise and appropriate money for the same, and pass any vote relating to the same.

Article 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

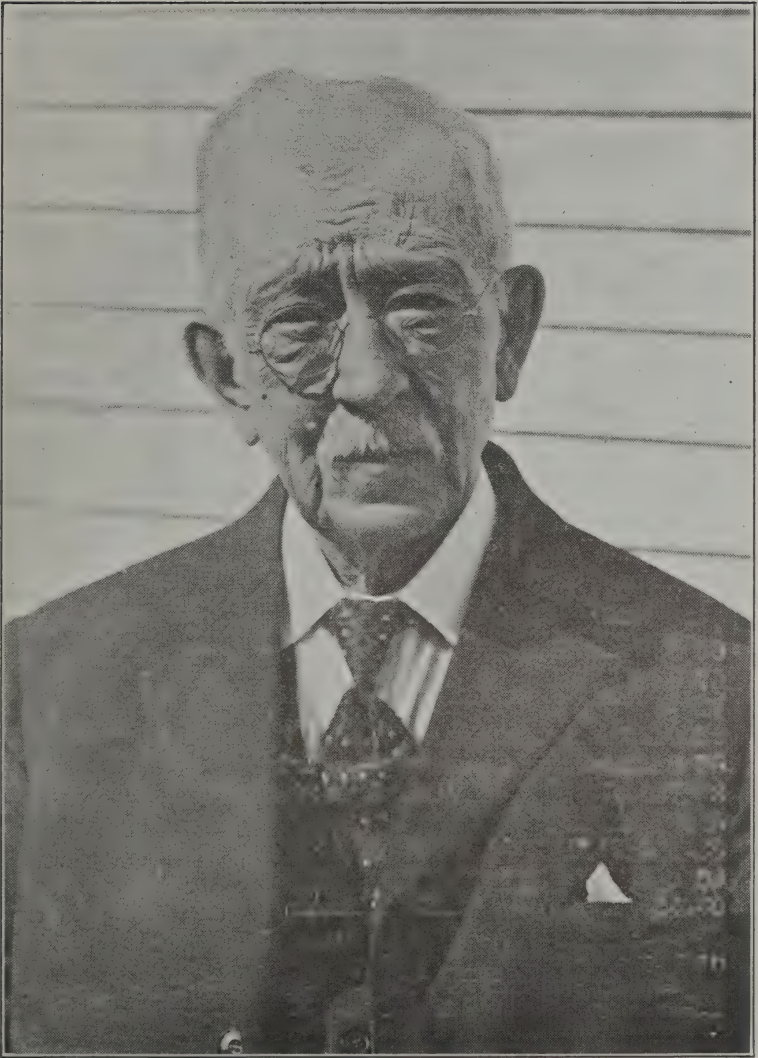

BOARD OF HEALTH REPORT

When we consider the dangers that threaten our health from the various sources of contagion we may well be satisfied with the record of the past year. Eleven cases of measles have been given attention with no bad results to report. At the beginning of this year we have three cases of scarlet fever but no spread of the disease is looked for. It should be borne in mind that it is incumbent upon the family or attending physician, if any, to report any contagious disease at once to the Board of Health. If doubt exist as to what a disease may be a physician should be called or the Board of Health notified. If this had been done in the scarlet fever cases mentioned much anxiety on the part of the public would have been obviated and your Health Officer relieved from unjust criticism.

ENGINEERS REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

We hereby submit the annual report of the department for the year 1926.

The property and apparatus of the department is in good condition. During the past year, there has been installed in the Central Fire Station, a Fire Alarm Storage Battery to take the place of the old gravity battery which has been in use since the system was installed. The installation of this battery brings this part of the department up to date with an alarm system as good as there is. The town has been fortunate in the past year in regard to heavy fire loss; the total destruction of a summer cottage at Georges Mills with a loss of \$1800 was the only loss. It was by good work on the part of the firemen at the Mills that this loss was not much larger.

During the past year, the department has answered 41 still alarms and three bell alarms, which is a record, and, with the small fire loss, we think the department deserves much credit.
