

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in town affairs:

'(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, March 9, 1937, at 10 a.m. to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To elect a Town Clerk, Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Member of Trust Funds Committee for three years, Library Committee, one member for three years, and all other necessary town officers.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of its highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the amount necessary to secure State Aid for the construction of State Aid Highways and the maintenance and construction of town roads.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray Town charges.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Shedd Free Library.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to assist the Band in putting on a series of band concerts this summer.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to instruct its officers, who collect money, including the Trust Fund Committee, to pay all money collected into the Town Treasury and if redistribution is necessary, disbursement to be made by orders signed by the Selectmen.

Article 10. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100.00 and perpetually care for the Andrew J. Cutting lot in the East Washington Cemetery.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to accept from William H. Manahan, Jr., the sum of \$200.00, the same to be held by the Town Trust Fund Committee, and the net income therefrom to be used in the care and maintenance of that lot in the East Washington Cemetery known as the Fred Brockway lot, it being the lot in which Alice Jones Brockway is buried, and also in the care and maintenance of the monuments and markers thereon.

Article 12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to make a contract with the Public Service Company of New Hampshire to supply electric current for lighting the Town House, the Shedd Free Library, the Garage and whatever street lights are decided upon; when such current is available, and to temporarily finance the cost of such current by borrowing or otherwise.

Article 13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to wire the Town House, the Garage and the Shedd Free Library for electric lights when current is available, and to temporarily finance the cost of such wiring by borrowing or otherwise.

Article 14. To see if the Town will accept the sum of \$100.00 and perpetually care for the Sumner N. Ball lot in the New Cemetery.

Article 15 To ascertain the opinion of the qualified voters of the town on the following question, to wit: Is it expedient to revise the Constitution?

Article 16. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to advance the necessary funds to the School Board for the purpose of wiring whatever schoolhouses they decide upon, if electric current is available, the necessary funds to be raised by borrowing or otherwise.

Article 17. To see if the Town will take any action regarding the purchase of fire pumps, raise and appropriate any money for this purpose, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 18. To transact any other business legally coming before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and the Citizens of the Washington School District.

The superintendent of schools submits this his second annual school report for your consideration.

School Organization

School Board: J. Victor Dyer, chairman; Perley H. Crane; Mrs. Amy Farnsworth.

Superintendent of Schools: Vincent Gatto, Ed. M., Hillsboro, N. H.

Teachers: Mrs. Ada Wagner, East Washington, salary \$900.00, New Hampshire teaching license. Mrs. Ruth Ladd, Dole school, salary \$900.00, New Hampshire teaching certificate. Miss Ella D. Perham, Center school, salary \$900.00, New Hampshire teaching certificate.

All the teachers are normal school graduates.

The following pupils maintained perfect attennance without being tardy during the school year 1935-1936 for the number of terms indicated.

East Washington: Clinton Cornell, one term; Ruth Cornell, two terms; Dorothy Dyer, one term; Arthur Pavelicek, one term; Frank Pavelicek, one term; Raymond Pavelicek, one term; Rose Pavelicek, one term; Ruth Pavelicek, one term; Arthur Tucker, one term; Jennie Tucker, one term.

There were no graduates from any of the schools.

General Discussion

We did not have any eighth grade in our schools last June. Consequently there was no graduation. However we observed the end of the school year with suitable closing exercises in the town hall before a large audience. The various schools in town furnished musical numbers, recitations and playlets. The superintendent of schools spoke on educational matters, and the school board furnished refreshments. The occasion proved to be one of the most enjoyable events of the year in Washington.

Every school this year has one or more pupils in the eighth grade. We look forward to next June with great interest, and expect to have one of the best graduations which the town schools have ever presented before the public.

We were in hopes to introduce the study of music in our schools this year. In fact a music supervisor was engaged but, for various unavoidable causes our plans failed to carry out. We hope that we may meet with better success in the near future.

With the financial assistance of the State Board of Education the Dole school was remodeled during the summer vacation. The improved building, the more spacious play field, and the greater equipment enable us to do a better job with our boys and girls. The children from Windsor who heretofore attended school at Hillsboro Upper Village came to Washington well prepared to take their places side by side with Washington children. The school is serving the educational needs of the two communities effectively.

At the last annual meeting a progressive policy was adopted for the gradual improvement of our school buildings. Accordingly during the summer vacation each member of the school board took charge of improving one building. The result was a material improvement which reflects credit on the district as well as those who led in the movement. A number of things remain to be done such as painting better lighting, a better grade of curtains, and the improvement of toilet facilities. Another condition which needs immediate attention is the seats and desks especially at the Center school. The furniture in the last named school is rapidly going to pieces. We should begin with one school at a time, and replace the old furniture with movable desk units which may be adjusted to the changing size of the children. At the present time it is very difficult for a long legged child to occupy his seat with the pressure of the desk on his knees five hours a day. The same is true of the child who has to sit with his feet dangling above the floor level.

It would be a fine thing if we could appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for books for next year. This amount would leave us a margin of twenty-five or thirty dollars to purchase additional supplementary reading on science, travel, economics, and weekly periodicals to broaden the mental horizon of our children.

It is gratifying to commend the work which has been done by the nurse with the support of the general public for the health of our children. The dental clinic which was held early in the year has eliminated many a toothache and other complications. The old saying that a healthy body means a healthy mind is ever true. The proper time to remedy the physical ailments of the children is during their school life.

The superintendent appreciates his opportunity to work with the school board and a corps of teachers intensely interested in the general welfare of the boys and girls of Washington. Let us so act and work as to leave our schools a little more advanced as the years go by.
